### A Message from your Superintendent

In a few weeks, the New York State Grades 3-8 English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics Tests will be administered to students. Based on parent and teacher feedback, the number of test sessions for these annual assessments was reduced from three to two; that change remains in effect this year. This means that students will take each subject test over only two testing days instead of three as in past years. Additionally, the 2020 Grades 3-8 ELA and Math Tests will continue to be untimed.

Below you will find a summary of the changes that were made to the Grades 3-8 English Language Arts and Mathematics Tests over the past several years.

- Fewer testing sessions. Last year, the Grades 3–8 ELA and Math Tests were reduced from three test sessions per subject to only two sessions per subject, meaning each subject will have two days of testing instead of three. With fewer test sessions, each test will have fewer questions than in past years, lessening test fatigue for students and better enabling them to demonstrate what they know and are able to do.
- The tests continue to be untimed so students who are still working on their exams will be allowed to continue to work, within the confines of the regular school day. Students who finish may be permitted to hand in their test materials (or submit the test if testing on computer) and leave the room. If so, students should exit quietly so they do not disturb any students still working.
- Test questions are reviewed and written by New York State Teachers. Hundreds of New York State educators were involved in creating and reviewing questions for 2020 Grades 3-8 ELA and Math Tests and selecting the questions for the test forms.

### Teacher and Principal Evaluation/APPR

• Student performance on the 2020 Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests will have no employment-related consequences for teacher and principal evaluations. This means that no teachers or principals in New York State public schools will be affected by the results of the 2020 Grades 3-8 ELA and MathTests.

### **Release of Test Questions and Instructional Reports**

• Test questions and instructional reports will be released before the end of the school year. Like the past several years, the State Education Department will release 75-percent of questions from the 2020 tests and the instructional reports for educators on or around June 1. The event is hosted by the Empire Alpaca Association and the New England Alpaca Owners and Breeders Association. "It is the first time we have participated as part of an education piece," says Mr. Eick. "We had the students set up a display. ## High School Students Share Love of Reading with Middle School Students



Medina High School English teacher Beth Dickhut and Curriculum Director, Dr. Denise Stappenbeck, started off the school year brainstorming ways to keep middle schoolers engaged in reading. With the success of the We Read campaign, the educators thought that if the fourth graders had someone to read with one on one, they would find the experience more enjoyable. "I asked the juniors and seniors in my class if they would be willing to volunteer to be reading partners with the younger students and they were very excited about the prospect," says Mrs. Dickhut.

Mrs. Dickhut and High School librarian, Jennifer O'Toole, came up with a list of appropriate books and distributed them to the juniors and seniors who were participating. "Some of the older books, my students had read when they were younger and wanted to share with their mentees," explains Mrs. Dickhut. "Some of the newer books, they thought would be fun so they agreed to read one of those."

Then began the process of pairing up the middle schoolers with their mentors. Mrs. Dickhut and Middle School librarian, Kristen Phillips, asked the high school students to make mini movies about the books. Technical Support specialist, Joe Roaldi, worked with the students on how to use the app Flipgrid to make their movie. Based on the videos, the younger students picked who they wanted to work with. "The movies were great," says Mrs. Dickhut. "Some of the students got so creative with them and based on that the middle schoolers picked what book they wanted to read."

In November, the middle schoolers met their mentors and received the book they chose as a gift, thanks to a grant, with a special note from their mentors. The Book Shoppe helped the school district order the books and also donated bookmarks to celebrate their reading adventure. "Sue Phillips has been great to work with and has been so helpful with our reading campaign. We are grateful for her helping out and hope she enjoys her retirement," says Mrs. Dickhut.

Throughout the process, the mentors and mentees met again and communicated online using Google Documents to ask and answer questions. "For our first time doing this, we were very happy how it went," says Mrs. Dickhut. "Like anything, we saw some things we are going to change to make the process easier and get more students involved. What we loved about it, is that it built a connection between the students and made reading more exciting for all of them."

## Mustangs to play in Class C for football

The football division alignment and opponents will have a very new look for Medina this fall as the Mustangs will be competing in Class C instead of Class B due to a change in the state's enrollment numbers for each of the sport's five classifications (AA, A, B, C and D).

In 2019 the state's classification enrollment numbers for Class B were 355-584 and for Class C 230-354.

The new classification enrollment numbers for 2020 for Class B will be 397-629 and for Class C 261-396.

Those changes will have Medina, which is listed at 356, shifting to Class C while Albion at 443 will remain in Class B.

Six other schools, which were in Class B last year, have also dropped to Class C including Tonawanda, Newfane, Lackawanna, Springville, Alden and Eden.

The tentative three division lineup for the 18 schools in Class C will be as follows:

C North - Medina, Newfane, Akron, Wilson, Tonawanda and Cleveland Hill.

C Central – Lackawanna, Springville, Alden, Eden, JFK and Gowanda/Pine Valley.

C South – Fredonia, Cassadaga Valley/Falconer, Southwestern, Chautauqua Lake/ Brocton/Westfield, Allegany-Limestone and Clyer/Sherman/Panama (CSP).

The 14 Class B schools will be divided into two enrollment based divisions.

Albion will be in the B2 Division along with Lake Shore, Maritime, Olean, Maryvale, Dunkirk and Depew.

The B1 Division will have West Seneca East, Burgard, East Aurora, Iroquois, Pioneer, Cheektowaga and Lew-Port.

This fall's Section VI schedule itself could also have a new look after a proposal to increase the number of regular season games from seven to eight. The eighth game would be played on the weekend which previously was used for preseason scrimmages.

This would be the first time Section VI schools have played an eight game regular season since 2008 when the section added a quarterfinal round for the sectional playoffs. Those quarterfinal games occupied the weekend which had previously been used for the eighth game of the regular season.





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
