A Message from your Superintendent

Dear Parent/Guardian,

As I write this, I am watching the snow fly outside my window. There may be times when we need to adjust the school day or close school. I would like to take this opportunity to update you on the process of closing or delaying school.

We take the closing of school very seriously, and we take many different factors into account when deciding to close school. We look at multiple weather forecasts, temperature forecasts, and updates from county emergency management systems. Our Director of Transportation, Mr. Robert Dennis, drives on many of the roads throughout the district to accurately judge how our busses will perform in inclement weather. Our Director of Facilities, Mr. Gerhard Leuer, will ensure that if we open, the campus will be cleared of snow and ice.

The decision to close school for the school day will be made as early as possible. If it is possible to make the decision the night before, I will do so, but if that is not possible, I will always do my best to make the decision by 5:30 AM, so that parents can work on finding alternate child care arrangements if needed. If school is closed for the day, all athletic and extracurricular activities will also be cancelled for the day. For weekend extracurricular and athletic events, a decision will be made, and parents and students will be contacted directly by the coach or advisor. Additionally, it may be necessary to cancel after school activities. That decision will be made before students leave for the day, and will be announced at school, as well as through our "all call" system.

To let everyone know about school closings, the school will communicate with the community in the following ways:

Please be sure that your contact information is up to date with the school, so that you will receive the all-calls.

Sometimes, weather conditions and forecasts provide significant assurance school will be able to open two hours after the usual time. In this case, it may be necessary to implement a "two hour delay".

In the event of a two hour delay, the following steps will be taken:

- The start of school will be delayed by two hours
- Busses will start their runs two hours later than usual, with
- pick-ups planned two hours later than usual
- Morning BOCES Vocational/ Technical students will remain at the high school
- Dismissal times remain unchanged during a delay
- Breakfast will not be served

Please note, a two hour delay will not be used to "buy time" to see if conditions improve.

Ultimately, parents make the decision on whether or not to send a child to school. If you feel that it is unsafe to send your child to school, the district will respect your decision.

Additionally, please remind children to be alert for vehicles on the road at this time of year. Falling snow, potential slick spots, and mounds of snow require those driving, walking, or waiting for a bus be more alert and take extra care at this time of the year.

We thank you for your continued support and cooperation.

Oak Orchard Students Explore Fire Safety Trailer

The Medina Fire Department recently spent some time at Oak Orchard Elementary School talking to students about fire safety and allowing them to explore the Orleans County's Emergency Management Office's fire safety training trailer. The 35-foot-long trailer is available to all 12 fire departments in the county and was paid for with a \$75,000 state grant from Senator Robert Ort. The trailer is used to help children and families develop a fire escape plan.

"We were lucky enough to have the trailer for the whole week," says Oak Orchard Principal Julie Webber. "We like to get the community into the school as much as possible and this lets the children know that the fire department is here to help them. Our students, grades first, second and third got to visit the trailer. Pre-K and kindergarten had a traditional fire safety talk in the classroom. It was very cool, they practiced crawling on the floor to exit the trailer. It's a real life experience for them. They also got to practice calling 911 as well."

Firefighter and paramedic Steve Miller says, "We had the trailer the week before Fire Prevention Week to showcase this to the school. We pumped fog into the trailer to simulate smoke and we talked to the students about having two ways out of their home. We also talked about the importance of changing your batteries in your smoke detectors twice a year and overall fire safety and what to do in the case of an emergency."

The trailer is set up with a kitchen area, hallway and a bedroom. The firefighters talked about how to handle pots and pans on the stove and kitchen fires. They also discussed the importance of touching the doors to see if they are warm before opening them. One of the features of the trailer is that the doors can be controlled to get warm to the touch from built-in heating elements. There is a window at the back of the trailer with a ladder that the students practiced getting out of. "We tell them when there is smoke you want to get nice and low. Because smoke rises," says Firefighter Miller. "We explained the importance of when they get outside to have a meeting place for their family so everyone can be accounted for. Our purpose is to provide fire safety tips to the children and make it fun for them. It's a great tool for us to use."

They also helped to feed the homeless. When asked how she felt doing something nice for the people there she said, "It just made my heart open up more."

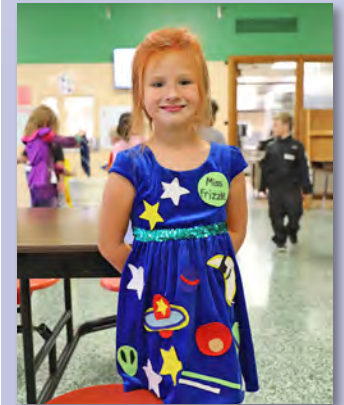

Agriculture Class Uses Alpaca Fibers for Dryer Balls

Medina High School's Agriculture Exploration class has taken on a cool project, they are making dryer balls out of alpaca fiber.

An alpaca is a species of South American camelid and is very similar to a llama. The district's farm houses several of the animals and Agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, Todd Eick, thought it would be a great project for his students to make all-natural dryer balls. The balls are a friendly alternative to chemicals in fabric softeners and dryer sheets that reduce static and wrinkles. "Most of the students in the Ag Exploration class are in 8th and 9th grade and have been spending class time skirting alpaca fibers," he says. Skirting means cleaning out vegetation from the fibers. "We make the dryer balls out of the skirted material and the waste that is picked out is either turned into mesh balls for bird nest makers or put into our compost bin. It is a zero waste project."

Medina High School's Community Service Teaches Students the Value of Helping Others

Every year, Medina High School staff, organized a Community Day in the cafeteria. Participant in Government teacher Todd Bensley says that the school extends an invitation to different community organizations to come and try to get students to do community service with them. "Each student has to do ten hours of community service with an organization. We had 14 organizations show up so that students could make the initial contact and then it is up to the students to follow through with the contacts."

Students met in the cafeteria and made their way around all the tables so that they could see what kind of activities the organizations offer. Mr. Bensley says that some students have already done their community service and don't have to pick from anyone at the cafeteria. "They are free to pick their own organization to volunteer at. This gives them an opportunity to make a connection with a non-profit."

Chairperson of Community Action in Orleans and Genesee Counties, Ronnie Barhite, says she thinks it is very important for students to volunteer their time. "Being involved helps them to realize that it is not just about you. They need to help others because that is how a society works when people work together. If they give a little volunteer time, maybe when they leave school they will find other places to volunteer. A lot of volunteer jobs turn into your real job or your second or third job. It gives the kids a real sense of accomplishment."

Jennifer Ossont, who also teaches Participant in Government at the High School, said, "It is so important for our students to see that our school is a vital part of the community, and we appreciate these organizations coming in to expose our students to all of the great resources and opportunities our community has to offer. It is a win-win situation for the community and our students."

Oak Orchard's New Playground Brings Physical and Social Benefits

As part of the Medina Central School District's Capital Improvement Project, Oak Orchard Elementary received a new playground over the summer. The previous playground was designed for a grade three to five population before the district was restructured and didn't suit the wants and the needs of many of the school's Pre-K to third grade student body. "When we knew we were getting a new playground, everyone was excited because it could be developmentally age appropriate," says Oak Orchard Principal Julie Webber. "It was a huge task to start with a blank slate. The first place where we started was with our students. We asked our student council members to ask their classmates what's your favorite part of the playground and what would you like to see on the playground? They created a list and that is what we started with."

After receiving the students' wish list, a team of teachers, from each of the different grade levels, met to discuss what they would like to see in the new play space. "We also incorporated our physical education teachers so it was meeting the students' mobility and physical development needs as well as safety. Our school nurse was also a great resource so that we could make it ADA compliant with wheelchair accessibility and adaptive swings," says Mrs. Webber. The school also consulted with the Medina Police Department to make sure the area was visible to them when they were patrolling the area after school hours.

After compiling their list and looking through catalogs they worked with the company GameTime Playground to complete the project. "It came together beautifully. We made it the red and blue colors of our district and I think it is a great addition to our campus," says Mrs. Webber. "The students' favorite parts of the old playground, swings and slides figured prominently in the design."

Along with the District's color, Mrs. Webber saw this as opportunity for students to embrace the Mustang Mission. "Our Mustang Mission is Respect, Responsibility, Honesty and Kindness. So every classroom before they were able to go out and use the playground, which they were so excited to do that first day, they had to sign a contract that they would demonstrate those behaviors on the playground."

The contracts are displayed on the wall as they walk out the door to the playground to remind them of their mission not only in the school, but in the community. "So far we have not had one incident of anyone breaking their contract," Mrs. Webber says proudly.

The school is hoping to continue improving on the space in the near future. "We still want to add some elements like some landscaping and greenery. That is a work in progress. We are very excited about it, as is our PTSA and our community members. It is great to get such good feedback. We do ask however that the community refrain from using it during school hours to ensure the safety of our students."

2018 Distinguished Alumni

Warren Beeton, Class of 1960
Excellence in His Chosen Profession

Warren Beeton graduated as Valedictorian of the Medina High School class of 1960. He then graduated from Cornell University with a Masters in Engineering. Warren had a successful career as an engineering manager, culminating as Vice President of Engineering for Emerson Climate Technologies, a leading manufacturer of air-conditioning and refrigeration compressors. In this role, Warren and his organization developed cutting edge, high-efficiency compression technologies now common in air conditioning and refrigeration equipment around the world.

Warren also assumed worldwide responsibility for Government Affairs at Emerson Climate Technologies. In this role, he provided leadership for Emerson on the Board of the Alliance for Responsible Atmospheric Policy, where he worked with the US Environmental Protection Agency, State Department, and Congress on energy efficiency, stratospheric ozone depletion, and climate change. He also worked with Congress on the American Clean Energy and Security Act, which included a Cap and Trade provision to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The bill passed the U.S. House of Representatives in 2009; although it later failed in the Senate, and brought attention to the need for climate change action.

Warren has published numerous papers and was a frequent speaker at industry events involving energy efficiency and climate change. In 2008, he received the Richard C. Shultze Distinguished Service Award from the Air-conditioning, Heating and Refrigeration Institute.

Upon retiring from Emerson, Warren has worked to educate the public and legislators on climate change. He is co-founder of the Prince William Virginia Chapter of Citizens Climate Lobby, a national organization which advocates for carbon pricing legislation to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. He also teaches classes on the science of energy and climate change to continuing-education students in Northern Virginia.

Binh B. Hua, Class of 1992
Excellence in His Chosen Profession

Binh B. Hua is an extremely proud graduate of the Medina High School class of 1992 where he also served as the class president. During his time at Medina he was a member of the football, wrestling, lacrosse, and soccer teams. He graduated and was the recipient of the Xerox Award in the Humanities and attended the University of Rochester, majoring in economics. He continued onto Georgetown University where he received an MBA in Finance. He worked on Wall Street and was one of only a few students in the world to be hired by both Goldman Sachs and Soros Fund Management. Through his work in finance, he has advised the most powerful companies in the world, including Exxon Mobil, Goldman Sachs, General Electric, Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, and the Bank of America.

He is currently the Managing Director for Falcon Capital Advisors, where he develops the strategy and execution plans for the development of public and private client companies, as well as U.S. Government institutions. He also recently co-founded a private equity company called Boca Capital Group. He is a former Board Member and Committee Lead for Bethesda Cares, a non-profit organization with over 500 volunteers, their mission is to prevent, ease and end homelessness in Montgomery County, Maryland.

Binh is very grateful for his time in the Medina School system and adamantly believes the educational foundation and support from his teachers provided him the fortitude and confidence to do anything in life. He attributes his career successes directly from the expansive education he received in Medina. He currently resides in Boca Raton, Florida with his wife and two daughters.

We want to thank Mr. Hua and Mr. Beeton for talking to our students before the ceremony. Mr. Hua talked about how Medina prepared him extremely well for college and beyond and the amazing effect his coaches and teachers had on shaping the person he is today. He talked to the students in Mrs. Ossont's Economics and Participation in Government classes about ways to make their career choices a reality through differentiating yourself, using your passion and drive, investing in yourself through education and training and surrounding yourself with talented and motivated people.

Mr. Beeton also talked about his teachers at Medina High School and the impact they had on shaping his future. He told the students that failure is part of life and that you learn through your mistakes and they should strive to keep working hard to achieve their dreams. He used Einstein's quote that I have not failed, I have just found 10,000 ways that have not worked. Warren also spoke in the classroom to Mr. Bensley's Advanced Placement classes about his work with policy change in the federal government.
