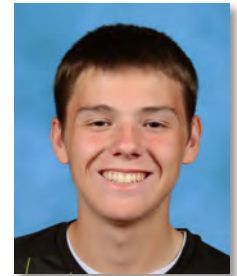

Australian Rotary Vocational Team Visits Medina FFA

FFA advisor, Todd Eick and his FFA students recently received some very knowledgeable visitors to their Ag Science Research Center/model farm.

Members of the Vocational Training Team Project from Australia arrived to the High School to see the farm and meet with the students. While in the United States they want to experience the many aspects of Fruit Farming including production, pest control, water management, geography, as well as explore labor methods, government influences and marketing avenues.

Members of the team include: Team Leader Les Mitchell, a professional agricultural scientist. He has considerable experience in crop protection but particularly in non-chemical aspects to pest control and plant growth regulators. Elizabeth Mace, who is the Director for Fruit Growers Victoria and has worked in the horticulture industry for 20 years. Jon Van Popering, who oversees the production of Australia's largest kiwifruit and nashi orchards. His main focus is producing high quality fresh fruit for local and export markets. Ross Abberfield manages the Goulburn Murray Valley Fruit Fly Project, a multimillion dollar Victorian Government initiative aimed at increasing awareness of fruit fly.

The students and Mr. Eick talked to them hydroponics and greenhouses. Mr. Eick says it was a great opportunity for his students and the program to talk to the experts and share with the visitors about themselves and the farm.

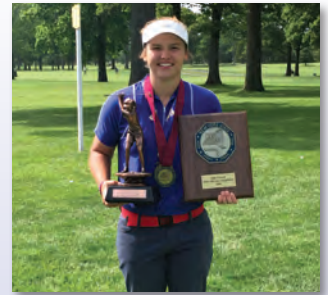
Medina Students Come Home Victorious from the Nassau County Empire State Games

Five students from Clifford Wise Middle School and Medina High School recently competed at the Nassau County Victory Challenge Empire State Games for the Physically Challenged at Mitchel Athletic Complex in Uniondale. Competitions included: Track (40 Meters, 60 Meters, 80 Meters, 100 Meters, 400 Meters and 800 Meters), Swimming (Freestyle, Backstroke and Breaststroke), Table Tennis, Basketball, Ambulatory Wheelchair, Power Wheelchair, Field (Club Throw, Discus, Distance Kick, Precision Throw, Soft Discus, Archery, High Jump, Shot Put, Soft Shot and Long Jump) and Slalom events.

Coaches and chaperones: Pam Maryjanowski, Travis Phillips, Carl Tuohey and Gary Scoles cheered on the athletes as they competed in the Long Island event. "They represented Medina with class and pride and were outstanding," says Mr. Phillips. "They were excellent ambassadors of the game. Amazing effort and sportsmanship." Carl Tuohey, whose son Jackson went to the games said, "It was a great time and it was so nice because a lot of the kids would not get to participate in something like this. Mrs. Maryjanowski allowed us a chance to go into New York City and see the sites that some of the kids would not have an opportunity to ever do."

"I have been involved in this program for 34 years," says Mrs. Maryjanowski. "It is a program very near and dear to me. Eight years ago, New York State decided to cut it, fortunately Nassau County saw the need to keep the games going. It is a great opportunity for over 950 kids, with any kind of disability, to come out and show what they are made of. They showed a lot of grit and determination."

So much grit and determination that the students received tons of medals that they received to the applause of friends, family and classmates at the Medina High School. "We were so lucky that we were able to attend," says Mrs. Maryjanowski. "Thanks to the generosity of the Barb Barnes Foundation, MAAC, the Medina Area Association of Churches, PAC (Parent Athletic Club), St. Peter's Church, a teacher here and an anonymous donor we were able to take the students and have a great time."

Sophomore Melanie Green won the NYSPHSAA state championship held at par-72, 5741 yard Yellow Course at Bethpage Golf Course on Long Island. She is the reigning NYS high school girls' golf champion.

She went under two during the second round and finished the two day event with a total of 138 and won by two strokes. "She was driven after finishing third last year so it's not surprising she came back and won it," said Medina golf Coach PJ Bell. "She just loves the game of golf and she just works so hard at it. She is 100 percent committed." Green said an early momentum booster came early on Sunday. "My first two shots on the first hole on the second day were really huge and gave me a lot of confidence moving forward," Green said. "After my drive I had 118 yards to the green where I hit a soft pitching wedge and put it about four or five feet. It was a huge shot because the pin was on the top tier and I really stuck that wedge close."

Medina Bands Takes First Place at Music in the Parks Festival

The Medina Mustang Marching Band traveled to Chicago, Illinois on April 26th to 29th to perform in a competition at the Music in the Parks Festival. The festival was started in 1981 and is a day-long event for students of choral, orchestral and band ensembles held annually across the US. Music groups perform before adjudicators who rate the ensemble and then awards are issued at the end of the day.

In concert band Medina won 1st place in Class A with a score of 96 and a superior rating. In Jazz, Medina won 1st place in Class A with a score of 96, an overall high jazz score. Alyssa Beyer was recognized as best jazz soloist. In Parade they won 1st place in the large band division w/a score of 95. There were approximately eight groups from New York,

Michigan, Virginia, Nevada, North Dakota and Illinois.

Jim Steele, Medina Band Director, said the kids did a great job in their performances. "The chaperones are to be commended for all of their diligence in keeping everyone on track with their busy schedule."

In addition to the competition the group went to a Chicago Cubs game, The Blue Man Group, Willis Tower, the Navy pier and the Six Flags amusement park in Gurnee, Ill.

The band will perform next at the Gorham Pageant May 11th & 12th followed by the Memorial Day parade.

"This one was a little bit different from our regular Family Fun Night. It was sponsored by National PTA and it was a grant that I found in the fall and they offered to send us some materials and some funding so that we could a little bit more hands-on family fun science."

It was the most attended Family Night that the Medina school had ever had. "We had over 550 people and we had ten different science stations that the families could partake in," explains Mrs. Granchelli. "We were using items like baking soda, balloons and vinegar to encourage families to try things at home."

She said what was nice is that high school students volunteered their time to run the different stations with teachers and took charge of the activities. "They used the baking soda and vinegar to fill the balloons

on pop bottles. We really wanted to the kids to be able to reproduce the experiences at home."

The kids also really loved the activities like making goop from scratch. The We Read campaign members and the local library were also on hand to talk literacy with the families. "There was also a book fair. We filled the night with everything we could imagine," Mrs. Granchelli laughs. "The really nice thing with this grant is that they sent us door prizes to give out and the influx of money helped us have an all you can eat sundae bar. "The whole evening was messy, sticky and fun," she says. Sounds like a great evening!

Jason Smith, Lyndonville Central School District Superintendent, and Mark Kruzynski, Medina Central School District Superintendent say that their districts' collaboration over the last several years has proven to be very successful.

The districts, like many communities across America, find their student populations dwindling as families get smaller. "In the six and a half years I have been at Lyndonville," says Mr. Smith, "We have worked with Medina on a variety of projects, most notably athletics. We have been able to offer our students marching band, cross country, soccer, football and of course the musical. Looking at our declining populations from both schools and keeping an eye on the long-term, we believe that working together whenever possible is the best thing for our students." Mr. Kruzynski says the partnership benefits everyone. "This expands the amount of programs available for kids, which is the ultimate goal, and expands the quality of the programs for the kids as well. We are always evaluating and always looking at different things that we can share and save money."

The annual musical has been very well received by both the districts' communities. Mr. Smith makes the observation that it helps the directors have a bigger cast and more talent to draw from. "It has become a richer experience

for the cast, crew and the audience." The two superintendents have even got in on the act. "Mark and I both had the privilege to play in the orchestra this year for "The Addams Family". That was a lot of fun for us."

The superintendents and the athletic directors meet on a regular basis as well to update one another on their findings and discuss how to improve upon their success. "One thing that we are looking at in Lyndonville, in respect to sports, is the transportation department here at the schools to offer more comprehensive transportation," says Mr. Smith. "We don't want

to put the students at a disadvantage to travel to and from Medina. That is something we have heard from our community over the past couple of months and we are looking to make some improvements there." Mr. Kruzynski says that Medina is exploring that as well. "Now that the Girls Soccer will be hosted by Lyndonville next year, we will also be providing transportation for all of our soccer players who need it."

The superintendents have walked a fine line providing collaborative opportunities for all

their students while maintaining their individual identities. Both districts believe that their school colors and mascots provide a common thread that runs through generations as symbols of their town's character and history. "It is interesting because both districts wanted to retain their identity as Tigers and Mustangs," says Mr. Smith. "But both of our districts recognize the need to share. We have two districts that work very well together and both Mark and I work well together professionally and that is the key to our relationship."

There has been a nice side benefit for partnering together on the activities as well. "Many of our students have become friends across both districts," says Mr. Kruzynski. "Relationships are being formed that

would not be formed otherwise. That was not the primary goal, but it was definitely a benefit."

Planning ahead, both superintendents says they will continue to meet to map out how they can provide the best opportunities for their students. "Our board officers have met and are going to meet again in July to see how things are progressing, assess what is going well and see what we can improve," says Mr. Smith. "We are always looking for ways to save money for both the districts," says Mr. Kruzynski. "In the long-term we are hoping this partnership can evolve to see where we can share costs well into the future."
