# Hello from Chef Tony

It's time to get back to school, we will be providing safe and nutritious meals to everyone while keeping a safe social distance, and still providing the best tasting food. Also, be assured we will be taking every precaution to ensure the safety and wellbeing of your children and staff at our schools

and Glencoe-Silver Lake Schools are eager to welcome you and your student back to the school café with new flavors, menu stations, and events that are sure to inspire a healthy and fun 2020-21 school year! With that being said we will be doing it a little different. You will see social distancing posters on the walls and stickers on the floors and on dining room seats. In almost every environment we shop or visit you see these stickers. We will be using them to practice social distancing. Staff will be wearing either masks or face shields for everyone's protection.

**Breakfast and Lunch** 

Breakfast and lunch will be served by our staff, we will not be having community stations, i.e., tongs or self-serve condiments, things like that. They will walk through the line and let the staff know what they would like and we will put it on a tray and hand it to them. In case we have to serve in the classroom, we will be taking orders for how many lunches or breakfasts we need and dish them up in take-out containers and deliver them to the classroom. We will be using scanners at the Point of Sale so they will not have to punch in their lunch number.

**GSL Jr/Sr high** will have a "food court" style servery that will include a Pizza Station, Grill Station, Create Station and the Traditional Lunch Station as well as ala carte options and an "On the Go" station for grab and go options. We also feature a coffee bar for high school students and staff, served during breakfast.

Snacks

An after-school snack program will be offered at the high school café for students participating in an afterschool activity such as athletic practices, ESL, drama, Robotics, Community Education programs and much more. Students can purchase a snack for \$1.10 with cash or with their school food account. Students receiving free/and or reduced benefits will be served a snack free of charge.

Fresh Produce and Local Partners

Chartwells K-12 and GSL are proud to support local farmers and companies, bringing students the freshest possible produce. Local produce will be served to the students from several local farmers through Bix Produce.



**Dietary Needs** 

Chartwells believes that managing food allergies is not just about helping children avoid the foods to which they are allergic, it is also about providing safe and nutritious meals in an environment in which they feel comfortable and accepted. All special dietary requests must have a written request from a physician submitted to the school nurse and/or the food service office. As you prepare for the return to school, here is what you need to know about keeping your child safe and healthy at

- Every year GSL's Health Department asks you to fill out a health survey for each of your students. It is very important that you fill this out to the fullest extent each academic year. We do not keep this form from year to year. Old information does not carry over. Student health surveys may be turned in during the Open house.
- Prescription medications cannot be given in the school setting until we have received an authorization form with signatures from both the physician and parent
- Inhaler/Epi pens: Please remember that students CANNOT self-carry/self-administer unless it is advised by the physician (this information is included on the form mentioned above).

# Student-School Health Information

- Do you have questions regarding medication administration in schools? Please review our policy 516, Student Medication Policy (available on GSL's website www.k12.mn.us) If you have further questions please contact me or your student's building health office.
- Immunizations: Please ensure your student is up to date on their immunizations, and that you provided the school with an updated shot record. We check immunization status annually and are required to report our findings to the State of Minnesota.
- Forms are Online! You can access health forms mentioned, on the school website. For all students, regardless of age, select "schools" then "high school." Under the links on the right-hand side, select "health department," and on the right hand side you can find forms under "Contents." If you have additional health questions/concerns, please contact me or your student's building health office.

#### Welcome to the 2020-2021 School Year.

It is hard to say welcome to the new school year when it feels like we never finished the last school year. I think we can all agree that we want this nightmare to end. Especially to you parents that are trying to juggle schedules and wondering what your child will be doing from one day to the next. We need to get back to our school routines and activities and trust me when I say you are not alone. As school administrators, we want nothing more than to have our staff and students back, safe and healthy.

During the pandemic shutdown this spring, we were able to get an early start with some of our projects that otherwise would not have gotten started until June. Here is a brief update on what we have been busy working on the past few months.

New Dust Collection System at the High School Woodshop - \$90,000. The old dust collection system was original to the building and has been in need of replacement for quite some time. Those of you that have been in our wood shop will know what I am talking about. Bathroom

remodel project at Lakeside - \$100,000. We finally tore apart the first set of restrooms that were in dire need of an upgrade so we started with the restrooms across from the office. They look amazing. Over the next two years, we will be working on updating the other two sets of restrooms at that campus and hopefully look to start at the high school campus on restroom upgrades as well. Cement work — check out the front and west side of the Lincoln building and the new entrance at Lakeside. Great improvements to both campuses for \$107,000. Classroom ceilings and lights. We were able to overhaul three classrooms at Lakeside with new ceilings and lights - \$30,000. The plan will be to continue to do a few classrooms every summer until we get them all completed. The Lincoln parking lot was upgraded with infrared patching and chip sealed coating along with new striping and signage for \$67,000. Other smaller items included entryway matting at the front of the high school and the front entrance at Lakeside, painting, mechanical repairs, as well as some deep cleaning. Also included on our list is any health and safety items that need to be addressed.





To be able to afford all of these projects we use our Long Term Facilities Maintenance Revenue (LTFM) that the District receives each year. We receive approximately \$650,000 between State Aid and Local Levy. These dollars can only be used on facilities projects like those that I listed. The money cannot be used for staffing, curriculum, textbooks or vehicles, only on facilities. We have a long list of "To Do" projects that we evaluate each year to determine which projects we need to look at completing first based on priority and safety. The district has 386,633 square feet of buildings to maintain, not including our outdoor areas. With that much space, you can probably guess there is always something that needs fixing!

Along with our summer projects, our district office staff has been working hard on year-end entries, preparing for the new school year (how-ever that might look) and working with our auditors. A new challenge for us this year is completing our audit remotely. Nevertheless, the audit is coming along nicely and we should have final presentation to the school board at the October board meeting. At this time, we have no surprises with our financials, which is always a sigh of relief for me and the District will still maintain a healthy financial status.

I would love to tell you to stop in anytime like I always encourage you to do if you have questions, but with COVID please give me a call first as our visitors to the buildings are limited and then we can set up a time to meet that doesn't conflict with student traffic.

Thank you so much for your continued support of the District in these challenging times.



# School bus safety

Students will be given school bus safety information the first weeks of school. Training will take place in the classroom and on a school bus. Parents, students and bus drivers play an important role in school bus safety. Bus drivers attend training meetings on issues including first aid, safe driving, and transporting students safely to and from school. Students need to practice, follow the bus rules and respect the rights and privileges of others. Parents should:

- Make sure students understand the transferring to other buses in the morning and afternoon to get to school and home.
- Make sure elementary students know their name, address, telephone number and bus number.
- Be at the bus stop the first couple of times or until the student is comfortable about the bus stop.
- Send a note along with the student if there are any changes in pick-up or drop-off.
- Remind students to always look both ways before crossing any street or roadway.

You, as a parent/guardian, are responsible for your child's comprehension of the school bus safety information. Transportation to and from school can be safe and efficient when riders cooperate with the bus driver, teachers and other passengers.

# School bus expectations and policy

LL STUDENTS must ride their designated buses unless a written note from the parent(s) or guardian(s) is brought to school. If a student is going to ride a different route, a signed note must be presented to the classroom teacher or office. The teacher will sign the note and it is then handed to the driver of the bus. Without parental and school permission, no student is allowed on an alternate bus route. Buses will stop only at regularly scheduled stops.

Glencoe-Silver Lake school buses transport students in grades K-6 who live more than one mile from the schools they attend or students in grades 7-12 who live over two miles walking distance from the school they attend.

The bus driver will make every effort to abide by the schedule. Extremes in weather and poor roads do occasionally cause minor deviation from the schedule. The care and discipline of children on the bus lies solely with the bus driver.

Your assistance is requested to encourage good safety and citizenship. Children are asked to obey the following rules when riding the bus. The bus driver is in charge of enforcing the following rules:

- Walk onto the bus
- Listen to bus driver
- Use a quiet voice and respectful language
- Sit and face forward
- Keep hands, feet, and objects to yourself
- Walk off the bus

All misbehavior cases should be reported to Terry Becker at the transportation office (320-864-3032).

Parents or guardians will be notified of any suspension of bus privileges. Consequences for elementary students may include, but are not limited to:

- 1st offense warning
- 2nd offense three-school-day suspension from the bus.
- 3rd offense five-school-day suspension from the bus.
- 4th offense 10-school-day suspension from the bus/meeting with parent.
- Further offenses individually considered.

Note: When any student goes 60 transportation days without a report, the student's consequences may start over at the first offense.

The safety of our students is of primary concern to the bus drivers. Here are "bus stop expectations" to discuss with your child:

- Listen to the supervisor
- Play safely
- Be friendly
- Line up when buses arrive



# Get together and form a walking bus

Studies show that fewer children are walking and biking to school, and more children are at risk of becoming overweight. Changing behaviors of children and parents requires creative solutions that are safe and fun. Implementing a walking bus can be both. One of the primary reasons why parents are reluctant to allow their children to walk to school is because of safety issues. Many children are now driven to and from school every day. A walking bus gives more children the opportunity to walk to school safely every day. Items to consider include:

- 1. The school district is not responsible for students participating in a walking bus. Parents are responsible for their own children.
- 2. To begin, invite children from families who live nearby to walk.
- 3. Pick a route and take a test walk.
- 4. Take a look at the sidewalks or paths along the route.
- 5. Consider the traffic. How busy are the streets?
- 6. Look at the crosswalks along the route. Is it easy to cross the street?
- Everyone meets at a pre-arranged time and walks to school together. More students will join the walking bus just because they see it.

There are benefits to a walking bus:

- 1. It's sociable, healthy and enjoyable.
- 2. It reduces parking problems near the entrance of school buildings.
- Children learn about safety and become more aware of their environment.

## <u>Student Pick-Up Notice - Important!</u>

Beginning in September, all of our <u>student pick-ups will take place at the main Lincoln Elementary Entrance (Door 11)</u>, which is located along 16th Street. We are making this change to improve our ability to supervise children and assure their safety. Parents, when picking up children during the day and/or after school, park in our lot at the corner of 16th & Pryor. Walk along the south side of the building and <u>enter Lincoln Elementary through Door 11.</u> At dismissal, please wait on the ramp as children are dismissed at 3:10 PM. Please call 320-864-2666 with any questions.

\*You must check in at the Lincoln Elementary Office if you are visiting the school, volunteering, dropping off late, picking up students early or at the end of the day. Door 14 on the west side of Lincoln is no longer a student "pick up" door.

# Data privacy policy (Release of student information)

he school will observe the following policy to conform to the requirements of the Family Rights and Privacy Act of 1974: Student pictures and identifying names will be printed in the school yearbook and all district publications and given to the local news media on occasions that warrant it. However, any student, or the student's parent, if the student is under the age of 18, may request that his/her picture not be published or information released in the news media or school publications. Requests are to be made in writing to the building principal. Participation in any group picture implies consent for release of picture with name. This policy does not apply to pictures taken by the news media or information gathered and printed by the media. Due to yearbook publication deadlines, students must submit requests prior to December 15. The school district recognizes its responsibility in regard to the collection, maintenance and dissemination of pupil records and the protection of the privacy rights of students as provided in federal law and state statutes. Directory information means information contained in an education record of a student which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. It includes, but is not limited to: the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. This information is public data on individuals. Directory information does not include personally identifiable data which references religion, race, color, social position or nationality. The parent or adult student has the right to refuse to permit the designation of some or all of the categories as directory information with respect to that particular student. If the parent or student notifies the school district that they don't want this information designated as directory information, the classification remains

#### Indoor air quality notice

lencoe-Silver Lake school district is proud to be taking a leadership role in providing a safe, comfortable and productive environment for our students and staff so that we achieve our core mission - educating students. School staff, students and parents can obtain checklists or self-help information so they can properly evaluate their child's home or other out-ofschool situation by contacting the school. Staff and parents can also obtain

information about school facility construction, maintenance and housekeeping practices, chemicals used, mold and HVAC related information, chemical producing academic subjects, and pesticide and herbicide applications to determine the extent to which school activities contribute to a child's symptoms by contacting the school. # 2020-2021 school year asbestos notification

ederal legislation (asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act – AHERA) requires each primary and secondary school in the nation to complete a stringent inspection for asbestos and to develop a plan of management for all asbestos-containing building materials. Glencoe-Silver Lake Public Schools have a goal to be in full compliance with this law. As a matter of policy, the district shall continue to maintain a safe and healthful environment for our community's youth and employees. Brady Flaherty, Dashir Management Company, is the person designated as Asbestos Program Manager for our schools. He can be contacted at 320-510-0825. An operation and maintenance program is in place through which we respond to our ACBM on a continuing basis. In keeping with this legislation, all buildings owned or leased by Glencoe-Silver Lake Public Schools were inspected by EPA-accredited inspectors and samples were analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the school prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for handling the asbestos located within its buildings safely and responsibly. During the last school year, Glencoe-Silver Lake Public Schools conducted the following with respects to its asbestos containing building materials: Boiler rooms and tunnels at Lincoln and High School pipes and glove bagging Federal law requires a periodic walk-through (called "surveillance") every six months of each area containing asbestos. In addition, the law requires all buildings to be reinspected three years after a management plan is in effect. Musser Environmental Consulting, Inc. will accomplish this under contract. Areas where management issues are noted during inspections and surveillances have been, and will continue to be, dealt with promptly. Short-term workers (outside contractors, i.e., telephone repair workers, electricians and exterminators) must be provided information regarding the location of asbestos in which they may come into contact. All short-term workers shall contact Brady Flaherty Dashir Management Company, 320-510-0825, before beginning work in order to be given this information. Glencoe-Silver Lake Public Schools has a list of the location(s) and type(s) of asbestos containing materials found in the school buildings and a description and time-table for their proper management. A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review in the District Office. Copies are available at 25 cents per page. Employment and services criminal history background check notice to parents

he school district has adopted a policy, the purpose of which is to promote the physical, social, and psychological well-being of its students. Pursuant to this policy, the school district shall seek criminal history background checks for all applicants who receive an offer of employment with the school district. The school district also shall seek criminal history background checks for all individuals, except enrolled student volunteers, who are offered the opportunity to provide athletic coaching services or other extracurricular academic coaching services to the school district, regardless of whether compensation is paid. These positions include, but are not limited to, all athletic coaches, extracurricular academic coaches, assistants, and advisors. The school district may elect to seek criminal history background checks for other volunteers, independent contractors, and student employees.

# Minnesota school districts responsible for identification of students

#### with disabilities

n response to the individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA), Minnesota Districts must demonstrate that "all children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities and who are in need of special education and related services, are identified, located and evaluated." This responsibility extends to children with disabilities who receive their formal education in a private school. Home schooled children are considered private school children in Minnesota. Upon request, the Glencoe-Silver Lake Public School District will provide information to concerned parents on specific disabilities including information about the educational or behavioral manifestations of each disability. Parents who believe their child may indeed have a disability may request procedural information on how to arrange for an evaluation through the Glencoe-Silver Lake Public School special education staff. Parents of students who are evaluated and are found to be eligible for special education services will become part of a team that will develop, implement, and monitor the effectiveness of an Individualized Education Plan to meet the identified needs of their children. If you have any questions or would like to receive information about specific disabilities or evaluation, please contact the principal of the school building your child would attend in the Glencoe-Silver Lake Public School District if he/she were not being home schooled. The Glencoe-Silver Lake Public School is committed to promoting academic success for its students.

# Bullying is expressly prohibited on school district property

or at school-related functions A safe and civil environment is needed for students to learn and attain high academic standards and to promote healthy human relationships. Bullying, like other violent or disruptive behavior, is conduct that interferes with students' ability to learn and teachers' ability to educate students in a safe environment. The school district cannot monitor the activities of students at all times and eliminate all incidents of bullying between students, particularly when students are not under the direct supervision of school personnel. However, to the extent such conduct affects the educational environment of the school district and the rights and welfare of its students and is within the control of the school district in its normal operations, it is the school district's intent to prevent bullying and to take action to investigate, respond, remediate, and discipline those acts of bullying which have

not been successfully prevented. The purpose of Policy 514, Bullying Prohibition Policy, is to assist the school district in its goal of preventing and responding to acts of bullying, intimidation, violence, and other similar disruptive behavior. An act of bullying, by either an individual student or a group of students, is expressly prohibited on school district property or at schoolrelated functions. This policy applies not only to students who directly engage in an act of bullying but also to students who, by their indirect behavior, condone or support another student's act of bullying. This policy also applies to any student whose conduct at any time or in any place constitutes bullying that interferes with or obstructs the mission or operations of the school district or the safety or welfare of the student, other students, or employees. The misuse of technology including, but not limited to, teasing, intimidating, defaming, threatening, or terrorizing another student, teacher, administrator, volunteer, contractor, or other employee of the school district by sending or posting e-mail messages, instant messages, text messages, digital pictures or images, or website postings, including blogs, also may constitute an act of bullying regardless of whether such acts are committed on or off school district property and/or with or without the use of school district resources. (Refer to Policy 524, Internet Use Policy Development, for more information). Any person who believes he or she has been the victim of bullying should report the alleged act(s) immediately to an appropriate school district official. The harassment report form is available from the principal of each building or in school offices, but oral reports will be considered complaints as well. # Notice concerning use of pest control materials

he GSL school district utilizes a licensed, professional pest control service firm for the prevention and control of rodents, insects, and other pests in and around the district's buildings. Their program consists of: 1. Inspection and monitoring to determine whether or not pests are present, and whether any treatment is needed; 2.Recommendation for maintenance and sanitation to help eliminate pests without the need for pest control materials; 3. Utilization of non-chemical measures such as traps, caulking and screening; and 4. Utilization of EPA registered pest control materials when needed Pests can sting, bite, cause contamination, damage property, and spread disease; therefore, we must prevent and control them. The long-term health effects on children from the application of such pest control materials, or the class of materials to which they belong, may not be fully understood. All pest control materials are chosen and applied according to label directions per Federal law. Information about the scheduling of interior pest control inspections and possible treatments is available by contacting Brady Flaherty, Dashir Management Company, at 320-510-0825. Similar information about the scheduling for application of herbicides and other materials to school grounds is also available by contacting Mr. Flaherty. Parents of students may request to receive prior notification of any application of a pest control material, should such an application be deemed necessary on a day different from the days specified in the schedule.
