

Governor's Proposed Budget Calls For Increases In Education Funding

In mid-January, Gov. Gavin Newsom released his budget proposal, which includes funding for education. The response from the education community has been largely favorable, based on assumptions taking place with both California's economy, as well as trends across the nation.

The state continues to see a positive economic landscape, with unemployment falling to 3.9 percent during the fourth quarter of 2019 and national gross domestic product growth of 2.3 percent during the same period.

Gov. Newsom sees continued growth during the 2020-21 budget cycle, although he anticipates slower growth, especially toward the end of the next budget year. The governor is proposing \$84 billion for the Proposition 98 guarantee, with approximately \$74 billion targeted for K-12 schools and districts. The Prop. 98 funding would include a \$2.9 billion increase from the 2019-20 budget. It also would include a modest cost of living allowance (COLA) of 2.29

Many of Gov. Newsom's proposals for public education funding include one-time monies for programs to improve teacher recruitment, training and retention (\$900 million) and for schools to provide wrap-around services across their communities (\$300 million). Gov. Newsom also looks to provide short-term funding for on-going programs that support early learners with exceptional needs (\$250 million), as well as meal reimbursements for enhanced school nutrition (\$70 million).

In terms of pension relief for the California State Teacher Retirement System (CalSTRS) and California Public Employees Retirement System (CalPERS), Gov. Newsom does not provide any new funds, citing the 2019 Budget Act that included buying down increasing employer contribution rates for CalSTRS and CalPERS. Many districts regard higher pension costs as their most significant fiscal challenge. Additional supplemental funds from the legislature would help districts address existing liabilities, providing long term relief for district budgets.

Our county's schools and districts received keen insights and data about the budget process during an annual workshop on Jan. 22 with Capitol Advisors Group, based in Sacramento. The budget process will be finalized in the coming months with negotiations by both houses of the state legislature. County Schools will continue to monitor developments and provide our districts with the most up-to-date information to make budget decisions that best serve their students and communities.
