

Listening To Student Voices Creates Meaningful Change



More than 300 high school students are having their voices heard this year as part of San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools countywide Student Advisory Panel.

In today's fast-paced and technology-driven world, now more than ever, there needs to be time set aside just to listen - especially to our students. Making time to hear their concerns, as well as their outlooks and need for opportunities, is why San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools convened its first Student Advisory Panel in 2015. This year, more than 300 students from 50 high schools in 20 school districts, have enlightened educators and elected officials about issues that are impacting their schools and communities, and also presented solutions to address those issues in the areas of health/wellness, safety, education and economy.

In a county as large as San Bernardino - with more than 406,000 public school students in 33 districts spread out over more than 20,000 square miles - that leaves plenty of room to listen. Students and districts have embraced this concept. The number of Student Advisory Panels has grown two-fold since its start, including adding a Student Advisory Panel so that each region of the county (Desert/Mountain, East Valley and West End) is represented.

County Schools Connects Students with Industry Professionals

It's an exciting time for growth in County Schools' Innovation and Engagement branch. Beginning this 2019-20 school year, Innovation and Engagement's <u>Alliance for Education</u> has worked closely with business and community partners to implement innovative approaches to connect students with the world of work. The SBConnect Series kicked off in the fall through a promising digital meeting platform called Nepris. The platform brings working professionals into classrooms via technology, so students gain insights into how their coursework relates to the work world.
