The ability to attract new teachers to the classroom across California is a pressing need, which is why the Countywide Teacher Recruitment Fair offers great opportunities for those who are looking to enter the field of education.

On March 30 from 9 a.m. to noon, 18 school districts across San Bernardino County, as well as institutions of higher education, will be present for the recruitment fair at the National Orange Show in San Bernardino. Recruitment stretches across a variety of fields in K-12 education from those teachers with multiple- or single-subject credentials to special education to career technical education.

School Districts Sought For Statewide Community Engagement Network

There is an exciting opportunity for school districts across the state to take part in the first-ever Peer Leading and Learning Network as part of the statewide Community Engagement Initiative, of which San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools is a lead oversight agency.

Applications are being accepted through March 11 for school districts to apply for the network. As many in our region may be aware, the

Community Engagement Initiative is an integral part of California's new System of Support, which has been established to build school district capacity to ensure that each student has the resources needed to succeed. County Schools is jointly heading the efforts to lead the initiative, along with the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence (CCEE), the California Association of Bilingual Education (CABE) and Families in Schools.

School districts selected to take part in the network will have the unique opportunity to help lead the initiative's efforts to build statewide capacity for meaningful community engagement in our state's public schools. Districts also will be asked to make a three-year commitment to participate and will receive a stipend to offset the costs of participation.

Briggs K-8 School from Chino Valley Unified, which won a national title in 2018.

Briggs was among five regional champions crowned at the event. It's exciting to see the development of the teams' projects and the excitement that the students and their teachers bring to the competition.
