Gov. Newsome Provides May Budget Update

Governor Gavin Newsome has rolled out his May revision of the 2019-20 fiscal year budget to be adopted by the state legislature.

Under Newsom's revised plan, California will be sending \$81.1 billion to K-12 schools and community colleges beginning in July. Among other highlights of the May budget revision:

- An additional \$119 million for special education compared to January, which amounts to nearly \$700 million more (compared to the 2018-19 Budget Act) in ongoing funding for special education.
- \$146 million to address teacher and administrator recruitment, retention and training.
- Significant investments in early education programs, child care, children's health and parental leave.

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
