

THE PASCHAL TRIDIUM



PASSION DEATH RESURECTION

The Easter Triduum is a single celebration of three days that marks the end of the Lenten season. It helps us to understand the deeper meaning of the passion, death and the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Triduum is liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery. It also helps us to understand our own journey of faith as Christians, and to ponder the events leading to our redemption.

It is known as the "Paschal Mystery" because it is the ultimate fulfillment of the ancient Jewish Passover (or Pasch), which itself was a recollection of how God brought the Jews out of their slavery in Egypt. The spotless lamb was slaughtered at the Passover meal and consumed—that same night the destroying angel "passed over" the homes marked with the blood of the Passover Lamb, and those covered by the Blood were saved. This was the Old Testament prefigurement of Jesus' work at the Last Supper—where he inserted himself as the Paschal Lamb—and Calvary, where the sacrifice was offered to save us from our slavery to sin. With the Holy Eucharist, we consume the victim that died for our sins.

The Paschal Mystery is, therefore, God's plan of redemption for the fallen human race through the passion, death, and resurrection of the God-man Jesus Christ. It is one marvelous event stretched out over three days.

FOLY THURSDAY

Holy Thursday is a day of deep spiritual significance in the Catholic Church. It celebrates the institution of the Eucharist as the true body and blood of Jesus Christ and the institution of the sacrament of the priesthood and the commandment to love and serve each other. Holy Thursday stresses the importance Jesus Christ put on the humility of service, cleansing with water, the sacrifice of Christ's Body, and the Eucharist. Holy Thursday stands as a profound and sacred day, connecting us to the heart of Christ's mission and His selfless love for all.

JESUS INSTITUTED THE HOLY **EUCHARIST & PRIESTHOOD**





Jesus instituted the Holy Eucharist by taking bread, blessing and breaking it, and giving it to His Apostles, saying: "Take and eat; this is My body". He then took a cup of wine, blessed it, and giving it to them, said: "All of you drink this; for this is My blood of the new covenant which is being shed for many unto the forgiveness of sins". Finally, He gave His Apostles the commission: "Do this in remembrance of Me". Jesus inaugurated His Eucharist at the Passover meal, saying: "Take, eat; this is my body".

JESUS COMMANDS THE APOSTLES TO LOVE & SERVE ONE ANOTHER

Holy Thursday, also known as "Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandatum," meaning "commandment" or "mandate," reflecting Jesus' words to His disciples after He washed their feet in an extraordinary display of humility and service. He said, "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another" (John 13:34, KJV). This foot-washing is often replicated in Christian Maundy Thursday services to symbolize Jesus' call to love and serve one another.





HIS SACRIFICE FOR OUR SALVATION

On Good Friday we commemorate the crucifixion of Jesus Christ because it is the most crucial part of the story of His life, death, and resurrection. It is a day of deep reflection on the suffering Jesus endured to atone for the sins of humanity, and it serves as a reminder of the depth of God's love and mercy.

Good Friday is a solemn day of mourning, reflection, and penitence for Christians worldwide. Through Jesus' suffering and death, He took upon Himself the burden of sin, offering the gift of salvation to all who believe in Him. The promise of forgiveness and eternal life emerged from the cross, shattering the chains of sin and death. This day invites us to contemplate the transformative power of sacrificial love within suffering—a love that forever changed the course of human history.

Resurrection of Jesus Christ

Easter commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the tomb, occurring three days after His crucifixion. This event fulfills the prophecy of the Messiah's persecution, death for our sins, and resurrection, as foretold in Isaiah 531. It serves as a reminder of our victory over sin and a source of daily hope.

Triumph Over Death

The significance of Easter lies in Jesus Christ's triumph over death. His resurrection signifies eternal life granted to all who believe in Him. It confirms all that Jesus taught and preached during His three-year ministry.

Hope and Transformation

Easter is a time of profound hope and spiritual rebirth. The resurrection symbolizes the potential for transformation and a new beginning, both individually and collectively. It inspires believers to leave behind old patterns and embrace the promise of a renewed life aligned with Christ's teachings.

IEaster transcends mere celebration; it represents the core of Christian faith—the victory over death and the promise of new life.

HOLY WEEK PLENARY INDULGENCES

The Catholic Church grants a maximum of **1 indulgence per day** for **oneself** or the soul of a **deceased**.

HOLY THURSDAY

- Sing the Tantum ergo
- Adore the Blessed Sacrament in a monument for at least 30 minutes

GOOD FRIDAY

- Participate in the adoration of the cross
- Participate in the Way of the Cross

HOLY SATURDAY

- Pray the rosary with 2 or more people
- Attend the Paschal Vigil

A plenary indulgence removes all temporal punishment due to one's sin

> It is also necessary to fulfill the 3 basic conditions: Sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Pope.

Your Guide To HOLY WEEK



Palm Sunday

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, a day that echoes with the elated cries of "Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Matt. 21:9). Jesus enters Jerusalem, where crowds lay palm branches at his feet, recognizing him as the long-awaited Messiah. The symbolic act of laying down palm branches was a gesture of homage reserved for kings and dignitaries in ancient Israel, in this case acknowledging Jesus as the rightful King of Israel (Mark 11:1–11; Luke 19:28–40; John 12:12–19). As Jesus enters the holy city riding a donkey, the crowd is filled with anticipation, reverence, and jubilation.



Holy Monday

Upon leaving Bethany the next morning, Jesus and disciples passed by a fig tree that was full of leaves but was completely fruitless. Jesus cursed the tree for being fruitless, and it withered by the next day. Jesus was about to judge a generation of those who practiced rites and rituals of a fruitless religion. He used the moment to teach the disciples about genuine faith — such that faith even the size of a mustard seed could move mountains when it is aligned with God's will (<u>Matthew 21:21-22</u>). Jesus returned to Jerusalem and cleared the Temple. He overturned the tables of corrupt money changers, declaring, "My Temple will be a house of prayer, but you have turned it into a den of thieves" (Luke 19:46).



Holy Tuesday

On Tuesday morning, Jesus and his disciples returned to Jerusalem. At the Temple, Jewish religious leaders were enraged at Jesus for establishing himself as a spiritual authority. They arranged an ambush with the intent to put him under arrest. But Jesus eluded their traps and declared severe judgments on them. Later that day, Jesus left Jerusalem and went with his disciples to the Mount of Olives, which overlooks the city. There Jesus delivered the Olivet Discourse, an extensive revelation about the destruction of Jerusalem and the end of the age. He speaks, as usual, in parables, using symbolic language about the end times events, including His Second Coming and the final judgment.



Holy Wednesday

On Wednesday of Holy Week, Judas Iscariot, one of the twelve apostles, decides to betray Jesus, handing Christ over to the high priests and Temple guards: So he agreed, and sought an opportunity to betray him to them in the absence of the multitude (Luke 22:6). With Judas acting as their spy, this day has become known as " Spy Wednesday."

Holy Thursday



Maundy Thursday, also known as Holy Thursday, commemorates the Last Supper. On Holy Thursday, Jesus institutes the Eucharist and washes the feet of his apostles. This as captured in John 13:5, washing the humility, service, and love of Christ that we, his disciples, are called to emulate. In a culture where washing feet was a task relegated to servants, Jesus, the Son of God, takes on the role of a servant and thereby ordains His apostles as the first ministerial priests of the New Covenant (see Matt 20:25–28; 18:1–4). The Holy Thursday foot washing ceremony has deep religious significance: according to Tradition, it represents the service and charity of Christ, who came "not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matt. 20:28). The season of Lent ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, which commences the Easter Triduum or "Paschal <u>Triduum</u>," a three-day period named after Jesus's offering Himself as the New Covenant Passover Lamb of God, and which concludes with Evening Prayer (Vespers) on Easter Sunday.

Holy Friday



Good Friday, the most solemn day of Holy Week, commemorates the Passion of Jesus Christ. It is a day of reflection, penance, and deep contemplation on the ultimate sacrifice made for the redemption of humanity. Christ's Passion, culminating in his crucifixion and death, reminds us of the weight of our sin and the unfathomable love of God. Catholics around the world participate in solemn liturgies, reflecting on our Lord's redemptive suffering, venerating the Cross, and receiving Holy Communion. They also pray the Stations of the Cross, in which the faithful meditate on our Lord's journey to Calvary, a place also called "Golgotha," meaning "skull."



Holy Saturday

Holy Saturday is a day of vigil, a period of waiting and anticipation. The Easter Vigil, the summit of the Paschal Triduum on Holy Saturday evening, is a profound liturgical celebration that takes place after nightfall. This ancient tradition, dating back to the fourth century, marks the high point of the Triduum and thus ignites the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection from the dead. At the Easter Vigil Mass, the Paschal— or Easter—Proclamation is made, which is part of the ceremony to light paschal candle. Known in Latin as "The Exsultet," the Proclamation and the Easter Vigil's baptismal liturgy symbolize together our journey from darkness to light and death to new life in Christ.

He is Risen

Easter Sunday

On Resurrection Sunday, or Easter, we reach the culmination of Holy Week. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the most important event of the Christian faith. The very foundation of all Christian doctrine hinges on the truth of this account. Early Sunday morning, several women (<u>Mary Magdalene</u>, Joanna, Salome, and Mary the mother of James) went to the tomb and discovered that the large stone covering the entrance had been rolled away. An <u>angel</u> announced: "Don't be afraid! I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He isn't here! He is risen from the dead, just as he said would happen." (Matthew 28:5-6, <u>NLT</u>) On the day of his resurrection, Jesus Christ made at least five appearances. <u>Mark's Gospel</u> says the first person to see him was Mary Magdalene. Jesus also appeared to <u>Peter</u>, to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, and later that day to all of the disciples except <u>Thomas</u>, while they were gathered in a house for prayer. **The eyewitness accounts in the <u>Gospels</u> provide what Christians believe to be <u>undeniable evidence</u> that the resurrection of Jesus Christ did indeed happen. Two millennia after his death, followers of Christ still flock to Jerusalem to see the empty tomb. Sunday's events are recorded in Matthew 28:1-13, Mark 16:1-14, Luke 24:1-49, and John 20:1-23.**

St. Agnes Catholic Church Invites You To Holy Thursday Monuments



Join us on Holy Thursday after the 7PM mass at a procession of the Blessed Sacrament through seven Monuments within our church ending at Albertson Hall.

From the night of Holy Thursday to Good Friday in the morning, it is a biblical and Catholic devotion to visit seven churches (monuments), a tradition started in Rome by Saint Philip Neri and that has spread throughout the world.

The purpose of the visit to the 7 Monuments is to thank Jesus Christ for the gifts of the Eucharist and the priesthood that He established on that Holy night.

The Lord is also accompanied in solitude and suffering in the Garden of Gethsemane. The affronts he received in the houses of Annas, Caiaphas, Herod, Pilate, on Calvary are remembered and He is accompanied in the silence of the tomb.

According to tradition, each church, after the Mass of the Lord's Supper, keeps the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle and erects a Monument as a sign of thanksgiving to Jesus for His Sacred Passion with which He lovingly redeemed the world.

Each visit calls on the faithful to reflect on the seven final places Jesus went from his arrest on Holy Thursday to his death on Good Friday. At each church, pilgrims kneel before the altar of repose, meditate on a scriptural excerpt, and offer prayers and adoration.

The Divine Mercy Novena is a nine-day devotion was shared with the world by St. Faustina Kowalska (1905–1938), a simple, uneducated nun from Poland chosen by Our Lord to be an apostle and secretary of his mercy. Our Lord told St. Faustina: "I desire that during these nine days you bring souls to the fountain of my mercy, that they may draw ... strength and refreshment and whatever grace they need in the hardships of life, and especially at the hour of death."

The Lord asked St. Faustina to begin the novena on Good Friday. "Each day you will lead a different group of souls and immerse them in the sea of my mercy," he instructed. "Each day you will beseech the Father through my bitter passion for graces for these souls."

This novena can be made at any time, but the faithful are encouraged to begin it on Good Friday in preparation for the feast of Divine Mercy, which is celebrated on the Sunday after Easter.

How to pray the Divine Mercy novena

The novena consists of praying a daily Chaplet of Divine Mercy along with specific prayer intentions for each day. The chaplet is prayed on rosary beads as follows:

- The Lord's Prayer
- Hail Mary
- Apostles' Creed
- On each of the large rosary beads say:
- Eternal Father, I offer to you the body and blood, soul and divinity of your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

On each of the small rosary beads say:

For the sake of his sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.






