

## To 50,000 Feet and Beyond Rocketry Wins Newton Award

One rocket. One one-pound payload.

One chance to see how far they'll launch.

SystemsGo rocketry students successfully launched their rocket "Big Bertha" 11,430 feet at the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico on Saturday, June 25. The launch earned the team a Newton Award, which representatives from SystemsGo

delivered to the October school board meeting.

"It was fantastic to watch the kids be rewarded for their hard work," sponsor Rhonda Baker said. "The strongest point of the Systems Go program is the fact these rockets are STU-DENT built. Teenagers are completing these rockets, and it is not easy. When you have

seen the frustrations, seen the tears, seen the challenges they have faced and overcome to even get the rocket to White Sands - you are already excited. But then to see it ignite and leave the ground - to watch them watch with such trepidation - and hear the yell in such pure glee - fantastic!"

At the beginning of the school year, the class split into three groups with specific jobs: propulsion, avionics and recovery, and airframe.

"In every group there is a manager and a few workers, plus a program director and assistant director which are over all different things like PO orders, emailing

companies, and integrating all systems," senior Gracie Stanford said.

The team presented their designs to NASA and Boeing engineers and built and adjusted "Big Bertha" throughout the year, finishing preparations in May to make the 11-hour trip to White Sands. There, they had one day to work on their rocket on

site, so the team went to the

missile range to assemble their ignition system, the screws, and the avionics technology. The next day was time to launch, and UG was first on the rail.

"We left the hotel at 4 a.m. to travel to the range once again and to a safety spot while launching," Stanford said. "We all sat in a small control room and heard the




countdown while we watched our fabulous launch on camera."

After the launches, the teams returned to the launch site to find what was left of their rockets, which new technology made easier than in previous years.

"2022 was the first year that there was radar that could track the rocket, along with cameras to video part of the flight," Stanford said. "Normally, we just have to wait until SystemsGo gives us the altitude."


Even with the new record in the books, for sponsor Greg Park, the goal remains the same

"Target altitude is 50,000 ft with successful deployment of recovery system," Park said.

## 33 and Counting Band Returns to State Contest

The high school band will compete at the state military marching contest at McLane Stadium of Baylor University in Waco on Nov. 1. The band will perform in the preliminary round at 11 a.m. against 10 other bands. Although head band director Andy Thompson expects competition from Beckville and Carlisle, who he says have "solid marching shows", he is confident the band will perform well.

"We have made steady progress and have had two fantastic run-throughs," Thompson said. "I expect the band to advance as one of top 5 finalists in Class 2A and march again in the evening."

To prepare, band members have been working on the details of their drill and building endurance to perform twice.

"This year's drill is very complex and has challenged each individual in the sharpness of their turns," Thompson said. "We

must stay consistent in the uniformity of ALL turns."

However, the group's hard work hasn't dampened morale.

"This marching season has been intense due to weather and nerves, but all of that has been upstaged by the amount of fun and talent our band has," drum major Sarah Clowers said.

This is the band's 33rd consecutive year to earn straight ones in contest and third trip to state. After two years of driving just a few miles down highway 80 to the Pine Tree stadium for state, the band will finally get the chance to have some fun and show off their skills on a larger stage.

"I know we can walk away from state with a gold medal," drum major Briyanna Blalock said. "Win or loss, we still made it to state, and we should be super proud of that."



## UIL Teams Medal At Invitational Meets

The journalism team won second place overall and earned 11 medals at the Pine Tree invitational. Sydney Pritchett (11) won first place in News and Feature, fourth in Editorial, sixth in Headlines, and the Best Paper of the Day award. CreeAnn Bozarth (9) won first in Headline, third in Feature, and sixth in News. Jamie Russell (10) placed fourth in Feature, Emma Holder (10) placed fifth in Editorial and sixth in Feature, and Nick Scavone (9) placed fourth in Headlines.

Pritchett also won first place in Feature at the Lindale meet, where Lucky Woodard (11) placed fifth in Headlines, Brayden Carter (11) placed fifth in Computer Science, Kameron Townsend (11) placed fifth in Computer Applications, and Emily Lynch (12) and Thomas Navarro-Gonzalez (9) placed first and fourth in Ready Writing.

The speech team also competed well at the Lindale meet, with Shane Deaton (9) placing fifth in novice congressional debate and Addison Manos (10) and Hunter Rogers (9) winning novice cross-examination debate. Manos earned the Golden Gavel top speaker award.

Preston Woodall (12) placed sixth in varsity Lincoln-Douglas debate. Partners Kyler Littlejohn (12) and Brendon Fuller (12) placed fourth and Parker Haley (9) and Colton Mead (10) placed sixth in varsity cross-examination debate. Russell placed third in prose interpretation, Littlejohn placed fifth in informative speaking, and Fuller placed second and Mead sixth in persuasive speaking.

### Cross Country Wins Big at District, Regional Meets

The boys team placed seventh out of 22 schools with Will Wilson (11) earning 35th place out of 162 boys. Brendon Fuller (12) placed 36th, Celson James (9) 38th, Preston Woodall (12) 49th, Lane Turner (11) 62nd, Isaiah O'Neal (11) 93rd and Jaxson Daniels (11) 134th.

#### **DISTRICT RESULTS**

Each of Union Grove's cross country teams traveled to Hawkins for the district meet on Wednesday, Oct. 5.

Both the varsity Lions and Lady Lions won their district championships. 
"We increased our numbers [from last year]," Ag teacher and FFA sponsor Joshua Shafer said. "It was cool for us since we're a small school."

## Finney's Football Phase Injury Tears SRO from Arena

Quad torn. College not happening.

A dream deferred. A challenge accepted.

Officer John Finney played high school soccer and football until his senior year when he tore his quad; he knew then he couldn't play football in college.

"I was devastated at first," Finney said.
"All I had ever done was sports."

Not playing football in college shut down opportunities for an NFL draft, so he became a firefighter and coach.

"Then I moved to East Texas, and I have been coaching soccer in Longview since 2001," Finney said. "I coached at LeTourneau for about 2 years. I played a little bit of, I wouldn't call it semi-pro, just football for adults."

He eventually became an SRO, and, while working at Gilmer, helped coach.

"I taught the kickers how to kick off and kick field goals," Finney said. "That's when we did the punt, pass, and kick. I made a bet with the kids if I won the truck or the car or whatever I would go try out [for the NFL]."

Finney, who could kick approximately 55-yard field goals at the time, was the oldest man at the tryouts. He scored 8.99 of the 9 points required to make it to the national combine, but that wasn't the end of his football career.

"I did D3, which is right under semi pro," Finney said. "I did a little arena. I liked it. It was fun. It was really fast. I got offered a pro deal but I couldn't play. Too far away and my daughter was here."

He kicked for the Arlington Aviators until he tore his ACL. Now, Finney advises students not to pass up opportunities they might want to reject.

"When I got hurt, [scouts] wanted me to go to a junior college. I thought I was too good for junior college," Finney said. "I wish I would have gone instead of throwing a fit. So that's what I tell kids today."


