Senior Colton Cowan led the boys' team with 12 points, eight rebounds, and two assists; Jaxson Daniels (11) scored seven points, three rebounds, and two steals; and Jace Roberts (10) scored five points, 10 rebounds, and two assists. For the girls, Ava Wightman (11) scored eight points and four rebounds; Taylor Campbell (10) seven points and five rebounds; Gracie Winn (12) seven points, three rebounds, and a steal; and Sarah Prince (10) two points, eight rebounds and two steals.

After key victories against Ore City, Linden Kildare, and Harleton, both teams will advance to playoffs, with the boys' team second in the district and the girls vying for second or third with McLeod.

The details of the first playoffs games are yet to be determined, but one thing is for sure: where the Lions and Lady Lions go, their fans will follow.







Strength in Numbers Powerlifters Rank Regionally After January Quad Meets

On Monday, Jan. 8, the Lady Lions powerlifting team competed at Union Hill, where almost all of the girls hit record lifts.

"It was encouraging to see these young ladies break personal records on their first opportunity of the season," coach Donnie Denman said.

Lainey Ledbetter (12) won the 198lb weight class, followed by Jessica Hobbs (12) in second. Addison Smith (11) placed second and Savanna Clark (10) third in the 181lb, and Daytona Vaughn (11) placed fourth in the 165lb weight class.

"I know I can't speak for everyone else, but I want to beat all of my maxes from last year," junior Daytona Vaughn said. "I definitely think that getting mentally stronger will help me get physically stronger and help me achieve my goals of lifting more than I did last year."

Then, on Friday, Jan. 19, the boys' team

hosted and won a quad meet with an overall team score of 51 points.

Four Lions won their weight classes: Isaiah O'Neal (11) with a total of 760 lbs, James Evans (12) with 915 lbs, Jacob Griffin (10) with 1090 lbs, and Reed Cooper (12) with 1190 lbs. Preston Woodall (12) placed second in his weight class with 725lbs, Jacob Humphreys (10) second with 990lbs, Gary Dacus (11) third with 620lbs, Joey Adams (10) third with 670lbs, Tommy Branscom (10) third with 940lbs, and Dalton Hawkins (9) third with 900lbs. Carter Cooper (9) placed fifth with 715 lbs, and Calab Day (9) placed sixth with 665 lbs.

"I feel like as a team we did really good for our first meet of the year," junior Gary Dacus said. "But there's always room for improvement. I would like to improve myself by increasing my weight and continuing to lift more than what I was lifting last year before my accident." "Union Grove's baseball atmosphere is a lot different than what I am used to. We are extremely well put together and it feels more like a family."

A record number of shooters will represent UG at the San Antonio Rodeo Junior Shoot-Out at the National Shooting Complex Feb. 16-18, which tests both team and individual skill.

"You never really know how well you're going to perform in shotgun until you get there," sophomore TJ Fowler said. "We have been practicing a lot and getting ready, and we've been doing well. As a team, we'll crack up a lot of points, but independently I should do fine."

This is Fowler's second year in the competition, which uses a formula for scoring that allows any shooter to win. To prepare, the boys practice every Thursday after school. Harleton (2022 bi-district finalist), Union Hill (2022 regional finalist), Big Sandy (2022 bi-district finalist), Beckville (2022 regional quarterfinalist), and Hawkins (area finalist), but with six returning starters who received post-season accolades last year, Halcumb is "super pumped" about the season.

"It is going to be a tough district but we are looking forward to a lot of good baseball," Halcumb said. "Protect the Pride!"

Without the girls' basketball players, Coach Molly Mackey does not have enough players to field a softball team and had to cancel the February scrimmages, but the girls will play Arp on Valentine's Day before their first tournament of the year, Feb. 16-18 in Sabine.

"I very excited to see what this year's season is going to bring," Izzy Gregg (10) said. "Everyone is working hard with a good mindset in practice. I love everyone's encouragement, and we always do everything as a team!"



High school track does not compete until March 3, but junior high girls will compete Feb. 21 at White Oak, then the boys and girls teams will host the first home meet of the year —and first ever meet for seventh grade boys— Feb. 27.

"I'm excited," Konner Messer (7) said. "I want to do shotput and discus. And I think doing cross country [last fall] will help me succeed with track."

Messer said the boys have been working lower body to get faster. The girls have been running sprints and timed bleacher drills during the athletic period.

"I'm kind of excited," Eliana Villamendez (8) said. "This year, I'm going to try harder and do more relays."

GT Students Win Plaque for Impromptu Resolution Writing At January's Region 7 Model United Nations Conference

Nine junior high Gifted and Talented students represented Haiti and Bolivia at the Region 7 Model UN Conference Jan. 23 and 24, the group's first appearance at such an event.

"It was kinda fun because we got to talk about all the countries and show off our flags in a flag walk," Kaden Carter (7) said. "It felt exciting because we got to do something new for GT."

As part of the conference, students watched a video on lead poisoning and then were given one hour to research and write an impromptu resolution.

"The Haiti group got third place, probably would have done better if I had not interrupted frequently with instructions for other parts of the competition," sponsor Tina Burns said. "We were mainly there to observe this year, so we were all surprised when they called our nation."

Since this was the group's first appearance at Model UN, they only participated in the general assembly, in which they voted on resolutions as a team. Next year, they'll break into smaller groups or enter sessions that simulate meetings like the World Health Organization (WHO), Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), or North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) as individuals. The seventh graders also plan to enter the 3D map competition next year.

"I am so proud of them for all of their hard work," Burns said. "We are planning on a lot more hardware next year!"

FFA will host an authentic Louisiana crawfish boil and live and silent auction on Saturday, Feb. 25 at Shadow Ranch in Gilmer. Tickets will cost \$30 for adults (anyone over 12) and \$20 for 12-year-old and younger children. The all-you-can-eat event will span from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

"This is a really big event for our community and our FFA program," Ag teacher and FFA sponsor Josh Shafer said. "The Union Grove FFA Alumni will put that money back into the FFA program through helping pay for travel, contests, awards, banquets, and possibly even scholarships."

The event will also auction student projects, such as fire pits, a backyard smoker, a Wok style cooker, blanket ladders, picnic tables, and handmade spurs.

"I am really looking forward to the crawfish boil," Carter Cooper (9) said. "I hope lots of people come and it performs well."

The tractor tech team will compete in their area contest Feb. 3. Aidan Vanmeter

(12), Cash Coleman (11), and Rowdy Williams (11) previously competed in the Paetow invitational in Katy Jan. 14 and placed fifth as a team. Coleman also placed sixth individually.

"We will be going to look at a Kubota tractor on the way down there," Coleman said. "Then we will head to the contest at Sam Houston State University. The contest consists of 3 sections which are debugging, test, and components."

Then the meat-judging team of Kenia Velazquez (12), Angelina Leyva (12), Sam Stanley (10), and Lane Turner (11) will compete Feb. 18. The five-part contest includes identifying cuts and judging quality of meat, and answering questions.

"Meat judging is something I never thought that I would be doing, but here I am, loving it," Velazquez said.

Recently, 17 Agriculture students gained industry-based certifications by passing a 100-question exam.

"These certificates are both vetted and supported by big names in the agriculture

industry," Shafer said. "Due to their leadership in the field of animal science, employers recognize the value behind the Elanco brand."

Additional students are working on certifications in welding from the American Welding Society and wildlife ecology conservation and management from Ducks Unlimited.

Forty-five members of the high school band and 59 junior high musicians will play in the solo and ensemble contest Feb. 2-3 in Gilmer.

"I think that the solo and ensemble contest is a good way to challenge yourself with difficult music, and it's a good way to learn how to collaborate with people," freshman August Vestal said.

Most students begin with a Class 3 solo as seventh-graders and work their way up to Class 1 in high school, and their performances are judged on a 1-5 scale, 1 being almost perfect. In order to advance to the state contest, students must earn a 1 rating on a Class 1 piece.

"I have done the solo and ensemble contest for two years, and I plan on doing it again this year," Vestal said. "Both my seventh and eighth grade year I got a 1 on my solo. This year, I want to advance to state with my ensemble group."

To prepare, soloists have been practicing with a pianist who will accompany them in contest, and ensemble members are working together before and after school and during their ensemble elective.

"I'm really excited for solo and ensemble this year," sophomore Hannah Coulter said. "I'm in a French horn ensemble, and I think that if we work really hard we'll be able to go to state."

During the band periods, directors Andy Thompson and Jonathan Stafford have been preparing students for the upcoming Concert and Sight-Reading Contest. The bands will perform a practice run Feb. 28 before the actual contest in March.

"We basically go through a course of jumps," Keira said. "It is timed, so you just try to do it as fast as you can."


