Elementary, JH UIL Teams Ready for District

Months of work preparing for academic UIL will come to fruition in December with both the elementary and junior high teams competing in district meets.

Second through fifth grade students will compete at Linden-Kildare on Monday, Dec. 4. The students involved should report to campus at 7:15 a.m. in jeans and a school shirt unless competing in a speaking event. The bus will leave at 7:45, and all students must ride. Lunch will be provided, and students can purchase additional snacks from a concession stand at the contest. The buses will return around 4 p.m. Students should have received a schedule of competition times in their Tuesday folders.

The One-Act play cast and crew will compete on Wednesday, Dec. 6, then the rest of the sixth through eighth graders will compete at the Region 8 Service Center in Pittsburg on Dec. 13. Sixth grade students should also report to the elementary campus at 7:15 a.m. in jeans and a school shirt unless competing in speaking events. The junior high meet will likely run a little longer, but buses plan to return around 5 p.m.

Students participating in speaking events need to dress according to instructions from their coaches. Specifically, these students cannot wear articles of clothing that indicate the school they attend so that judging can be as unbiased as possible.

Alternates will not attend the meets unless notified by their sponsor or a school office.

All students who compete in writing will write prior to the meets so that anon-

ymous judging can begin upon arrival at the meet locations.

The pressure is on for students to do well, as UG has won for the last several years by a wide margin.

"I think there's a lot of pressure to do well because we've won for — I think Mrs. Spears said 11 years in a row," eighth-grader Emma Wadle said. "We don't want to be the group that breaks the streak."

But students and coaches have put in the work and anticipate performing well.

"We've been listening to the music list and doing quizzes," seventh-grader and Music Memory team member Lori Lormand said. "We have to memorize what the songs are and write the names correctly. I think I'm gonna do good. I think the team will do well."

Some who served in active combat or support roles.

Some who suffered injuries. Some who saw things they can't forget, did things they wish they could let go.

61 men and women who knew the price of freedom and were wiling to pay it anyway.

On Nov. 10, students, staff and community members gathered to honor the servicemen and women in attendance, as well as all the other veterans who served this country, with the annual Veteran's Day program that included performances from the band, cheerleaders, the theater department, fifth grade music class, and a trio of sixth graders.

The program began with the band performing processional marches and a welcome from Superintendent Kelly Moore. Carter Cooper (11) led the audience in prayer, fifth graders Iker Uribe and Khloe Payne gave the pledges, and senior Owen Matthew delivered opening remarks.

The program proceeded with the majorettes' performance to "Sounds of Sousa", then the fifth graders took the stage to sing "Veterans March" and "How Do You Tell A Veteran Thank You". The junior high and varsity cheerleaders also put on a show to "Red White and Blue" to honor the veterans in the crowd.

"I was really nervous while we were practicing," freshman cheerleader Miley Nono said. "But once we started performing, it wasn't as nerve wracking anymore."

Seniors Daytona Vaughn, Sarah Clowers and Katy King welcomed the guests and announced the veterans in attendance, then Vaughn sang a duet with Layla Kirk (8) to "Traveling Soldier" and a solo of "At Last", and sixthgraders River Martindale, Coleton Burnett and Cooper Littlejohn read "The Noble & the Brave".

"I think that the game against Linden-Kildare gave us the confidence and motivation to be capable of beating Hawkins at our next game," eighth grader Landry Harris said.



Four Years Running Girls' XC Returns to State

Anticipation at the starting line sets the tone for the last race of the season the state meet.

Three seniors take one last look at the girls next to them before they run the state course for the fourth and final time.

"As I was warming up at the beginning of the race, all I could think about was how I couldn't believe this would be my last race ever," senior Ava Wightman said. "I was excited to be running at state but also a little sad that I would never get to do it again."

Through rigorous practices and tough meets, the girls developed an unforeseen bond.

"Some of the girls I had never talked to until cross country," Wightman said. "We have someone in every grade, but we still all ended up being best friends."

They learned to push themselves and each other — all the way to state, where senior Sophie Pyle led the team, finishing in 84th place out of 150 runners with a time of 13:29. Wightman placed 114th, Danica Vestal (9) 117th, Rachel Potter (9) 134th, Jenna Scott (12) 140th, Averi Cook (9) 143rd and Gracelyn Head (10) 144th.

Junior Keira Taylor, who ran the state meet as a freshman and sophomore, had to watch from the sidelines due to an injured hip.

"I went to the chiropractor and got adjusted, and it seemed to have helped," Taylor said. "About two weeks later, it had just rained, and we were running on the track. I slipped and re-injured my hip. We iced and rested me for a period of time. Then I ran at district but I was still in pain, so we decided to end my season in order to hopefully allow enough time for me to heal for basketball."

Taylor still traveled with the team, acting as their manager.

"You don't realize how much you want to go run two miles with your friends until you watch them compete against the



best without you," Taylor said. "I felt bad not being able to go to the starting line with them and finish together at the end."

The seniors have finished their cross country careers, but the younger runners reflect on lessons learned and plan for future seasons.

"Cross country has taught me that I'm the only one who controls whether I meet my goals," Potter said. "I can't wait for next year."



Journalism Students Learn Color Theory, Graphic Design

The students mixed paint to see how primary and secondary colors form complementary, analogous and monochromatic color schemes before they design their own page layouts.
