HS Teams Medal at UIL Invitationals

High school UIL teams have begun competing in preparation for their district meet in April with plans to do as well as the elementary and junior high teams and repeat last year's success at the state meet.

Speech and debate students competed in their third meet of the year on Dec. 2 at Lindale. Brendon Deary (11) placed fourth in Poetry Interpretation, Colton Mead (11) placed fourth in Prose Interpretation, and Mead and Jamie Russell (11) finished in fourth and fifth place respectively in cross-examination debate speaker points. Each competitor finished closely behind students from Pine Tree, Sulphur Springs, Hallsville or La Vernia 5A and 4A schools. Parker Haley (10) and Alana Cox (9) and Kenneth Flanagan (10) and Peyton Hancock (9) also competed in CX debate. The speech team also competed at Chapel Hill Mt. Pleasant, where Deary won the poetry division, Russell place second in prose, and Daytona Vaughn and Haley placed second and Flanagan and Russell placed third in duo acting.

The journalism team competed in the virtual Centex meet Dec. 7. Sydney Pritchett (12) placed third in Feature Writing, fourth in News Writing, sixth in Editorial and fifth in Headline Writing. Bailee Hosak (9) placed second in feature, seventh

in news and seventh in Copy-Editing, McClane Handorf (9) took fourth in Headlines and sixth in Copy-Editing, Russell placed sixth in News and eighth in Feature, Daytona Vaughn (12) placed ninth in Feature, and Lucky Woodard (12) placed 10th in Headlines.

The current events team participated in the November/December Virtual Chal-

lenge meet. Elise Daugherty (11), Tommy Branscom (11), and Sirena Loven (11) won fourth place team in 2A, outscoring many 3A, 4A and 5A schools, including Sabine, White Oak, Carthage, and Longview. Daugherty won fifth place individually in 2A out of over 150 students and outscored all of district rival Ore City's team members

The students interviewed for their positions and attended a leadership conference Nov. 16 to prepare for their roles.

"Model United Nations is a fun and interesting experience that will teach me responsibility," Sturkie said.

proving fast," eighth-grader Jaxon Ledbetter said. "I am very confident we will get the win."



Prior to becoming the tyrannical president, an ambitious 18-year-old Coriolanus Snow is chosen to mentor the "songbird" Lucy Gray in the 10th annual Hunger Games. Desperate to restore the Snow family's wealth and status, Coriolanus ensures Gray's survival through the Games then sacrifices those close to him to escape his punishment for doing so.

This movie does a wonderful job of adapting Suzanne Collins's book to the screen, and if you're a Hunger Games fan, we definitely recommend this movie.

Making Snow — a quintessential villain in the original trilogy — relatable had to have been challenging. Viewers who have read or watched the series already know he turns out to be the bad guy, but showing President Snow gradually turn from a good-hearted, well-intentioned character to merciless and evil through a series of conscious decisions is great.

"I decided it was best to stay closer to home," Evans said. "It actually worked out better."


Being off work allowed Evans to care for her daughter, alum Amanda Evans, as she recovered a major injury and finished her semester exams.

"She had a bucket-handle meniscus

tear, the worst meniscus tear you can have," Evans said. "Within a week, she was having surgery. When they got in there, they found out it was worse, because they actually had to move her meniscus back into place after they stitched it up. It was a blessing I was able to stay home and take care of my daughter the entire month of December."

She also began her job search during this time. Without an ESL certification or Region 7's Reading Academies, Evans thought her options may be limited, but Algebra teacher Paula Adkison and former Pre-Cal teacher Rhonda Wilcox told Evans about the Geometry position.

"I texted [superintendent] Kelly [Moore] and said 'Hey, I don't know if y'all have anything available. If not, I understand. You know, it's semester," Evans said. "The next afternoon I got a call from [then principal] Rachel [Evers]. I talked to my husband and prayed about it, and here I am."
