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A Message from Dr. Morris (continued):

Proposition # 1: I would like to remind you about the upcoming Constitutional Amendment vote on November 7, 2023. The proposed amendment to Article 8, section 4 of the Constitution removes the special constitutional debt limitation now placed on small city school districts so that they will be treated the same as all other school districts.

This November 7, a YES vote will allow small city school districts to operate under the same debt limit as all other non-city school districts in New York State. Currently, small city districts are limited to a 5% debt ceiling rather than the 10% debt ceiling all other non-city school districts operate under law.

Many of New York's 57 small city school districts must break up needed construction and improvement projects into a series of small projects spread over many years to remain under their debt limit. A 10% debt limit will allow such projects of larger scope and scale to be completed sooner with better financial efficiency.

The small cities, such as Olean, were named in the NYS Constitution in 1951 as a way to give control and responsibility for their fiscal affairs. This 5% limit is the lowest included in the Constitution or in Statute and now, in 2023, does the opposite, limits a small city district's ability to control their fiscal affairs.

Voter approval of the proposed constitutional amendment would not give small city schools special treatment—it would allow them to have the same debt limit as their suburban and rural counterparts. A YES vote will not raise your taxes.

This is a once-in-a-generation opportunity for impactful change for small city school districts such as Olean. This referendum deserves your full and enthusiastic support.

Veterans Day: On November 10th, we will honor and express our gratitude to the brave men and women who have served in our armed forces. Our schools will have special events and activities to commemorate Veterans Day activities. On behalf of the entire district, I would like to thank our veterans for their service.

Winter Preparations: November also marks the beginning of our preparations for the winter season. Snow will happen! We will ensure our schools are ready for the colder weather and that our students are safe and comfortable.

The Olean City School District continues to be a place of growth, learning, and community. I am proud of our students, educators, and the school community for making October memorable. As we move into November, I am optimistic that it will bring new opportunities and accomplishments for us all.

Thank you for your ongoing support and commitment to our students' success. Let's embrace the coming month with enthusiasm and dedication! Together, we will make November a time of growth, learning, and achievement.


