






Class Comp

EE Cookie

Each year Mr. Perry's JCC History classes take part in a cookie project. For this project students decide on a topic or event in US history and create a baked good to represent the event. They then bring in their cookie, show it to the class, and then give a presentation on why that event was significant to American History. Often students bring extra cookies for their classmates, which they appreciate! This year Emma Edwards did her presentation on the Underground Railroad. Emma baked nine different cookies each representing different quilts sewn by individuals along the Underground Railroad. Each quilt contained a unique "code" which the conductors of the Underground Railroad could decipher these codes to guide them in their search towards America's promise of "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" in the North.

Sullivan Hoffman chose to salute veterans and the greatest generation through his project. Sullivan created his cookie depicting the insignia of the 101st Airborne Division. For his presentation he described the unit's role in Operation Overlord. The 101st made the D-Day invasion of Normandy successful by parachuting in behind enemy lines using the cover of dark. They then disrupted Nazi communication and hindered Nazi reinforcements from reaching the beaches.
