#### PEP Grant Provides Summer Fun



Summer Outdoor Adventure Camp sponsored through the PEP grant was held the weeks of June 26-June 30 and July 31-August 4 from 9-3 each day. There were 50 students from Olean, Hinsdale and Portville school districts who participated in this free camp. Some of the activities throughout the week were: Kayaking down the Allegany River, Archery, Tennis, Swimming, Indoor and Outdoor Ropes Courses at Portville Central School, Kayaking and Swimming at Quaker Lake State Park, and Laser tag in Buffalo.

The Carol M. White PEP grant from the Federal Government for our physical education department has been completed. The purpose of the grant was to enhance our physical education programs in grades K-12.

#### Understanding BMI Screenings And Your Child

BMI Screening & Weight Status Category - Every year, students in grades Pre-K, K, 2nd, 4th, 7th, and 10th are screened for height and weight to determine their Body Mass Index. This is mandated by NYS Education Laws Sections 903 & 904. The information is collected and compiled by the Nurses and reported to the Department of Health. The information is provided in total numbers in each weight status category, and no personal student information, including names, is shared. Regardless, parents are still given the option to "Opt-Out" of having their child's weight status category included in the report. Parents are notified in writing by the Nurse's office when their child's weight status category is above the 99% or below the 5%. It is then recommended that your child follow up with their personal health care practitioner.

What is BMI? BMI is an abbreviation for Body Mass Index. BMI is calculated from your child's weight, height, sex and age. BMI helps determine the risk of developing one or more specific diseases linked to obesity such as Diabetes, Heart Disease, Sleep Apnea, Asthma, High Blood Pressure, etc. A healthy BMI is between 18.6 and 24.9

**Understanding BMI** - Each child is unique and growing at their own pace, so we must take into account the child's age and map boys and girls differently. Instead of a classification

of overweight or obese, children are classified in four different categories. (See below) Please note, it is also sometimes not a precise science, as not all body styles are the same. It is up to the child's Personal Health Practitioner or School Physician to determine if the BMI results are an accurate reflection. (If a student has a larger or smaller body frame, more muscle development, or is very athletic, their BMI may not be an accurate depiction.)

School Districts are notified when they are required to submit Weight Status Category Reports to NYS. This is usually required every other year. When your child's school is required to report during a particular school year, it will be posted on your child's school website. Any parent NOT wanting their child's weight status category included in the overall report must submit the "opt out" form to the school's Nurse. This form can be obtained off the OCSD website or by contacting your child's Nurse.



#### Important District Back-To-School Reminders

#### **Custodial Paperwork**

If you have custodial paperwork for your child, you should provide your child's school with a copy. Without the custodial paperwork on file, the school assumes that both parents have full rights. For your child's safety, if there has been a change in custody or if an order of protection exists, please submit a copy to your child's principal. If you are a non-custodial parent who would like to receive information regarding your child's academics and invitations to parent-teacher conferences, you should submit an annual request to your child's principal.

#### **Update Contact Info**

Attention Parents/Guardians: If you have changed your address, phone number, or acquired a cell phone, please make sure to notify the school office so that we have up-to-date information.

#### **District Evacuation Drills**

Parents are advised that Olean High School will conduct a building evacuation drill during the school year. Students will be relocated, under supervision, to an



off-site facility for a period of time during the drill. This evacuation drill is intended to be a proactive response plan in the event of an emergency situation. School Districts across New York State are required to conduct one full evacuation drill and several lower-scale emergency drills throughout the school year.

#### **County Counseling Centers**

The Olean City School District houses a counselor, Jenna Golden, from the Cattaraugus County Counseling Centers in each of the schools. Ms. Golden helps individuals struggling with issues such as attention, behaviors, bullying, anger, anxiety, sadness and much more. Ms. Golden

is accepting referrals from all grade levels and they can be made through the school or directly to her by calling 716-257-2674. She accepts most insurance plans and those she cannot accept, she can refer to an appropriate provider.

#### **Permission for Student Release**

Students are not allowed to leave school buildings or grounds without written permission and for legitimate reasons only. According to state law, school children may only leave school with persons approved by the child's parent or guardian. School officials will be required to check the identity of persons requesting a child's release against a list provided by the parents or guardian. The law also stipulates that a student will not be released to a person who is not on the list unless the child's parent authorizes the release.

#### **Technology News Updates for Back-To-School**

#### **District Mobile App Enhancement**

Over the summer, the district has been working closely with Blackboard, our web site provider, in making enhancements to our district mobile app. One of the biggest changes to the app occurred within the Student Portal. Student logins have changed. Rather than using their ID numbers, student will now be using their network login usernames and passwords. This change was made to make the flow of data seamless from eSchoolData to the mobile app the district.

Parents and guardians with Parent Portal accounts will notice less of a change. Their usernames remain the same. When parents or guardians first log into the Parent Portal on the mobile app they will have to change their password. This is done by clicking the "Forgot Password" link where they will be prompted to set their password for the site. What parents will notice is a better interface with the parent portal than they had with the previous version of the mobile app.

If you have not already done so, the app is available for download from the Apple App Store for Apple products or Google Play for Android products. Find the mobile app by searching for OCSD or Olean City School District.

Pathways to Employment and Community Pre-Vocational Services Lend

a Hand - This summer the Technology Department was, again, able to enlist the assistance of two different programs, Pathways to Employment and Community Pre-Vocational Services through the Rehabilitation Center in Olean. Their clients provided the support needed to replace missing screws from the bottom of laptops, clean the exterior case, the screen and keyboards of student laptops, vacuum the laptop cases, place identification labels on new iPads and put new protective cases on them. One of the clients, Zach, show us his technology skills by combining and organizing data from multiple spreadsheets of laptop information into one spreadsheet.

We truly appreciate this partnership with the Rehabilitation Center and look forward to a continued collaboration with them. Having Zach, Adam, Nicole, David and Desirae as partners in getting the laptops ready for our August orientation nights has been a tremendous help for all of us in the IT department.

#### Letter to Parents for School Meal Programs Special Provision Options (Provision 2 Non-Base Year & Community Eligibility Provision)

Dear Parent or Guardian:

We are pleased to inform you that <u>Olean City School District</u> will be implementing a meal certification option available to schools participating in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs for 2017-2018.

What does this mean for your child(ren) attending the school(s) identified above?

All students enrolled at Olean City School District are eligible to receive a healthy breakfast and lunch at school at no charge to your household each day of the 2017-2018 school year. No further action is required of you. Your child(ren) will be able to participate in these meal programs without having to pay a fee or submit an application.

#### **2017-18 CAFETERIA PROGRAM CHANGES**

The Olean City School District is committed to providing every student enrolled in our schools with all the tools they need to succeed, including nutritious meals that everyone can enjoy together. That is why we are excited to announce that for the 2017-18 school year, we are using a new school meal program option to offer school breakfast and lunch every day, at no charge, to all students. The Community Eligibility Provision program is offered through the New York State Child Nutrition Department.

#### Below are questions and answers regarding this new program.

#### How does this program work?

The New York State Child Nutrition (CN) Department began this program several years ago with federal funding backing the program. School districts must be eligible based on their specific poverty rates and have to apply to CN for approval.

#### What does this mean to my child(ren) attending Olean?

Your child(ren) will be able to eat both a breakfast and a lunch free every day.

#### Does the school provide a second breakfast or lunch for free?

No. The school only gets reimbursed from New York State on the first breakfast and lunch served. Families are responsible for payment of a second meal.

#### Can my child(ren) still bring their lunch?

Yes. However, if they buy milk, it is the families' responsibility to pay for the milk.

#### How will ala carte items (such as pizza, nachos, etc.) be handled?

A la carte items will remain the same in that families are responsible for payment. Again, it is only the first full breakfast and lunch that are free.

#### Does this program change the food that can be served?

No. The district must still continue to follow all food and dietary guidelines that are set by the New York State Child Nutrition Program.

#### Will I still need to fill out paperwork for the cafeteria program?

No.

#### Will the school district ever request household income for other programs?

Yes. Other federally funded grants that the district receives are based on the district's poverty levels. This data was previously gathered through the cafeteria free and reduced application process. In order to continue to receive such grants, the income information still needs to be gathered.

#### Who will be requested to send in household income information?

If you receive SNAP, TANF, FDPIR, Medicaid, or have foster children, you do not need to fill out a household income eligibility form. If you do not receive any of these services, then you should fill out the household income eligibility form included in this newsletter.

It is the district's policy that all data gathered is confidential and only aggregate numbers are used for grant purposes.

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA): Notice to Parents and Eligible Students (students over 18 years of age) of Rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). You are notified that you have the following rights in relation to student records:

- ❖ The right to inspect and review students' education records within a reasonable time but not more than 45 days from the day the Olean City School District receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes is inaccurate or misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. Parents or eligible students may ask the Olean City School District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. If the Olean City School District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- ❖ The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the Olean City School District discloses educational records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.
- ❖ The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Olean City School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA.

Except for disclosures to school officials, disclosures related to some judicial orders or lawfully issued subpoenas, disclosures of directory information, and disclosures to the parent or eligible student, §99.32 of the FERPA regulations requires the school to record the disclosure. Parents and eligible students have a right to inspect and review the record of disclosures. A school may disclose PII from the education records of a student without obtaining prior written consent of the parents or eligible student:
- To other school officials, including teachers, within the educational agency or institution whom the school has determined to have legitimate educational interests. #### Tips To Establish 'Screen Time' Guidelines

As the summer of 2017 draws to a close and many families start to settle in to the new routines that the school season brings, it's a great time to re-establish or establish some family guidelines on screen time for your child at home.

Based on national trends and our own observations as elementary educators, screen time on tablets, phones, computers and TV is an inescapable reality of modern childhood, with kids of every age spending hours upon hours in front of iPads, smartphones and televisions. And used properly, we agree that these devices can help your child educationally.

However, a number of troubling studies connect delayed development in kids with extended or too much exposure to electronic media or "screen time." These devices can unintentionally cause permanent damage to their still-developing brains.

Too much screen time too soon can greatly hinder the ability to focus, to concentrate, to lend attention, to sense other people's attitudes and communicate with them, and build vocabulary.

Between birth and age three your child's brain develops quickly and is particularly sensitive to the environment. When your child spends too much time in front of a screen and not enough getting interaction from the real world, his or her development becomes stunted. And not just for a while. If the damage happens during these crucial early years, its results can affect him or her forever.

Much of the issue lies with the fact that what makes tablets and iPhones so great—dozens of stimuli at your fingertips, and the ability to process multiple actions simultaneously—is exactly what young brains do not need.

Tablets are the ultimate shortcut tools: Unlike a father or a mother reading a story to a child, for example, a smartphone-told story or movie spoon-feeds images, words, and pictures all at once to a young reader. Rather than having to take the time to process a mother's voice into words, visualize complete pictures and exert a mental effort to follow a story line, kids who follow stories on their smartphones get lazy. The device or video does the thinking for them, and as a result, their own cognitive muscles remain weak.

#### Too much screen time can also prevent your child from making friends.

The brain's frontal lobe is the area responsible for decoding and comprehending social interactions. It is in this corner of the mind that we empathize with others, take in nonverbal cues while talking to friends and learn how to read the hundreds of unspoken signs—facial expression, tone of voice, and more. The most crucial stage is in early childhood, during that same critical period, and it's dependent on authentic human interactions. So if your young child is spending all of his time in front of an iPad instead of chatting and playing with adults and other children, his or her empathetic abilities will be dulled, possibly for good.

#### Too much screen time can cause attention problems.

Have you ever seen a mother chuckle as her baby tries to "swipe" a real photograph, or punch their fingers onto a poster or book as if it were a touchscreen? It may seem cute, but it points to something much deeper in the child's brain—an internalization that all actions have an immediate effect, and all actions elicit a quick response.

This is true in the on-screen world, but nowhere else. When every finger swipe brings about a response of colors and shapes and sounds, a child's brain responds gleefully with the neurotransmitter dopamine, the key component in our reward system that is associated with feelings of pleasure. Dopamine hits in the brain can feel almost addictive, and when a child gets too used to an immediate stimuli response, he will learn to always prefer smartphone-style interaction—that is, immediate gratification and response—over real-world connection.

Here are some questions you can ask yourself to determine if screen time rules may need to be a part of your back to school routine

Your child is unset when you ask him to stop his screen
