
OHS coaches Samuelson and Ksionzyk honored

What to do on a cold, snowy day? Visit Hawaii, of course! The Gray Team recently took a virtual field trip to the Pearl Harbor Memorial in Hawaii. Students were able to video chat with an actual survivor of the Japanese attack on December 7, 1941. His name was Captain Bob Kinzler and he told the students that he was 19 years old when the attack took place (making him 89 today!). He was serving in the US Army at the time and vividly remembers being awoken by the bombs going off in the harbor. He told the students, "You wake up pretty fast when you realize you're being attacked by the enemy." Captain Kinzler



showed the students many pictures of himself as a young man stationed on Hawaii. He explained that he was a Morse Code radio operator assigned to Schofield Barracks on Oahu. Luckily, Schofield Barracks was not a target for the Japanese planes. During the attack, Captain Kinzler said his company was ordered to move the battle station to the local high school football stadium in Honolulu. Shared transportation a win-win

Olean, Portville, and Hinsdale School Districts are happy to announce the consolidation of transportation services. With this shared service, Hinsdale and Portville will continue to maintain their transportation departments while serving Olean City School District. The District will pay for all costs associated with transporting their students. Portville and Hinsdale will benefit as Olean begins sharing the burden of overhead costs, including: bus maintenance, debt service, driver benefits, supervisory and administrative costs, and building maintenance. In sharing these costs, it is conservatively estimated that the combined savings will be nearly \$400,000 annually. All three superintendents, and the Boards of Education, concur that this consolidation will open up other areas where services can be shared. Sharing services will help us provide more diverse programming for our students, while saving taxpayers money. We see this as vital in maintaining each of our districts and their unique strengths.

The share will impact the start times at the four elementary schools. The start time will be 15 to 20 minutes later than our current start times. The Middle School and High School start times will remain the same. The District is currently finalizing the specifics and will get notifications out to all impacted families within the next month.
