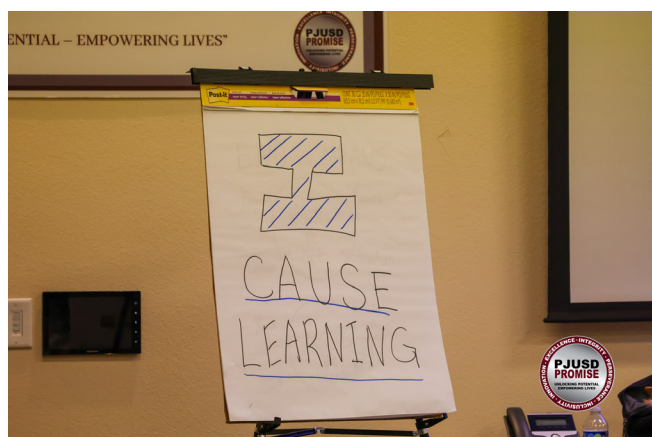

Focus Area 1: Academic Achievement

"Fostering student achievement is a central focus of the PJUSD Promise. It is our goal to ensure students are supported with rigorous academic experiences that prepare them to be college and/or career ready upon graduation."

Building Capacity for Student Achievement

In our first year of the PJUSD Promise, our district has begun setting the stage for great progress in enhancing academic achievement across all grade levels. We are dedicated to supporting our teachers with the best training so they can provide the highest quality education to your children. Each month, our teachers participated in professional development focused on writing standards, creating measurable objectives, engaging students actively, and social-emotional learning (SEL) competencies. These efforts ensure our teachers are equipped with the latest tools and strategies to help students succeed.



We used data to drive our decisions and improve student outcomes. Our leadership team met regularly to analyze student progress in English Language Arts and Math, as well as social-emotional learning and attendance. These data-driven discussions helped us identify strengths and areas for improvement, ensuring we provide the best support for our students.



Our leadership team also took important steps to boost academic achievement through the PJUSD Leadership Academy. Over 70 district leaders, including teachers, instructional coaches, site administrators, and union leaders, took part in a 5-day intensive training provided by the Gary D. Soto Consulting, Inc. They learned how to work together effectively to support student achievement through clear goals and strong instructional practices.

Instructional coaching has been a key part of our strategy. Coaches received comprehensive training and provided one-on-one and group support to teachers. They helped improve teaching practices through modeling, observations, feedback, and co-teaching. This year, we also designed and led district-wide professional development for all TK-12 teachers and created a detailed curriculum map for grades TK-6.



Some of our students' successes were highlighted by achievements in language proficiency. This year, 55 students received the State Seal of Biliteracy, recognizing their ability to speak, read, and write in multiple languages. Additionally, 192 English Learner students were reclassified as English Fluent Proficient, opening up more academic and elective opportunities for them.



We also expanded our Career Technical Education (CTE) programs to prepare students for various career paths. The Medical Pathway was redesigned, and the first group of Certified Patient Care Technicians completed their certification. We hosted our first annual College and Career Fair and continued to develop new CTE pathways, including a Cosmetology/



Barbering program set to launch in Fall 2024.

By providing rigorous academic experiences and extensive support systems, PJUSD is dedicated to ensuring that our students are well-prepared for college and career success. We remain committed to fostering student achievement and helping each child reach their full potential.

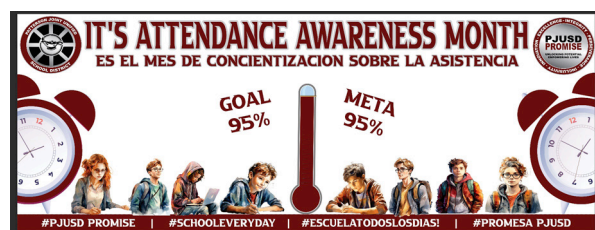
Attendance Matters: Small Team Makes Big Impact

Focus Area 2: Student and Staff Safety and Wellness

“Safety and wellness are essential components of an environment that is conducive to teaching and learning. PJUSD Promise fosters a culture that promotes the emotional health, safety and well-being of students and staff. We will cultivate an environment that fosters mutual respect among students, staff, and educational partners.”

Together We Can Make a Difference

As the 2023-2024 school year began, a major area of focus for our district was improving our school attendance rates. In order for us to foster a proper learning environment, we need our students present and on time each day. Aiming for a 95% attendance rate across all schools, we launched the “On Time On Target” campaign to raise awareness about the importance of regular attendance. Our Attendance Liaisons engaged with parents at site-level meetings and collaborated with school administrators to proactively address attendance issues. Additionally, our continued partnership with Attention 2 Attendance (A2A) facilitated effective communication with parents through positive messages and attendance reports. These comprehensive efforts led to an increase in the average daily attendance rate to 92.5% and a reduction in chronic absenteeism to 20.3% by mid-May. Several schools saw over a 1% increase in their daily attendance rates. We celebrated our students and school sites that demonstrated significant growth, recognizing the collective effort towards improving attendance.



We also introduced the PLUS Program at Patterson High School to foster student leadership and connection. PLUS stands for Peer Leaders Uniting Students and is a youth-facilitated program that engages a diverse cross-section of student leaders to create communication, care, and community among the student body. Throughout the school year, PLUS students hosted forums, feedback surveys, and discussion sessions on critical issues that students experience. Through feedback and pro-social bonding, PLUS students helped develop solutions through the guidance of peer-to-peer problem-solving. The success at Patterson High School has encouraged us to expand the program to the Middle School next year. We look forward to its expansion and continued success.



This year, some of our schools promoted kindness in a unique way. Northmead and Walnut Grove partnered with Patterson Starbucks to distribute 3,000 hand-decorated coffee sleeves with kind messages. This initiative allowed Starbucks customers to receive a kind message, hand-written by our students, to start their day alongside the purchase of their morning coffee. Staff and community members shared photos of their "Cups of Kindness" on social media, spreading the cheer throughout the community. At the conclusion of the week, Northmead students and staff created a vibrant rainbow by wearing different colors, promoting kindness within and beyond the school. The sentiments of kindness were later reinforced in the school year, as schools celebrated Mental Health Awareness Month in May. These celebrations featured



informative sessions, fun activities, and valuable resources to promote mental well-being. We applaud our students and staff for developing and implementing such innovative initiatives, highlighting our commitment to creating a supportive environment for our students.

Another notable initiative was the Human Trafficking 201 presentation, held in collaboration with Invest In Me, Love Patterson, and Without Permission. Over 100 attendees were empowered with knowledge to help keep our children and community safe. Despite the tough subject matter, the information provided was vital for raising awareness and potentially saving lives. We are proud of the strides made this year and remain committed to fostering an environment where every student can succeed through consistent support and engagement. Together, we can make a difference and help our students reach their full potential.



Focus Area 3: Facilities & Resources

Enhancing our Educational Environment

In the 2023-24 school year, our district has made significant progress in facility development. At the start of the year, we completed several key projects. The 9th Street traffic mitigation was finalized, allowing us to open our theater for school use. This improvement has significantly enhanced safety and accessibility for our students. Additionally, Patterson High School started the year with brand new wood flooring in the Dave Klein Gym, offering a refreshed and improved athletic facility. We also proudly opened the new Francis J. Bettencourt Theater, which hosted its inaugural theatrical



performance of "The Wizard of Oz." Since then, the theater has been a venue for various school and award celebrations. In its inaugural year, the celebrations concluded with a memorable graduation ceremony for our Open Valley and Del Puerto High School students.



Looking ahead, we are excited about the progress in our new and improved facilities. The Pool and Frontage Rejuvenation Projects at Patterson High School are nearing their completion date in August. These projects have made great strides throughout the year and will soon provide our students with a new front area to enjoy and a state-of-the-art pool.





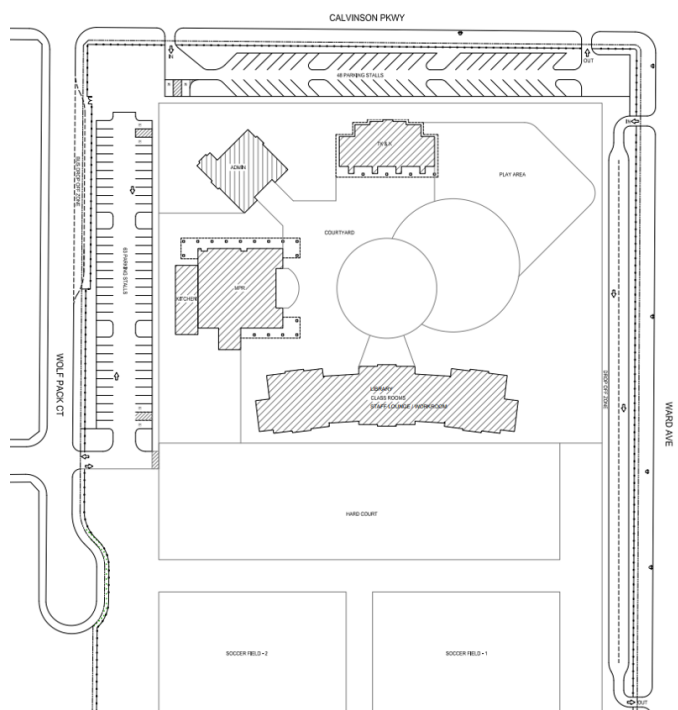
Additionally, the classroom for our new Cosmetology/Barbering program at Patterson High School will be remodeled and ready for instruction for the 2024-25 school year, with the salon set to be completed by the 2025-26 school year. This project will provide students with valuable career training opportunities in the hair care and beauty industry



In addition, we are in the design phase for several exciting projects. A new gymnasium at Patterson High School will further enhance our athletic facilities, while a new multipurpose building at Creekside Middle School will provide versatile space for various student activities and events. The design of a new parking lot at Las Palmas is underway, aimed at improving accessibility and safety for students and staff. Furthermore, new scoreboards for Patterson High School's athletic teams are being designed to enhance our sports facilities and overall game-day experience for our athletes and fans.

Tax Dollars at Work - Development of the New Elementary (Measure E)

Early development of our new elementary school, located off Ward Avenue, has begun. With site renderings drawn, contracts signed, and geotechnical reports completed, this estimated three-year project is on track for completion by February 2027, with occupancy in the 2027-2028 school year. Our district staff and trustees have visited neighboring school sites with architects to envision this new facility, ensuring designs cater specifically to our community's needs.



As part of our commitment to transparency, we have assembled a bond oversight committee comprised of members from businesses, parents, parent-teacher organizations, tax member associations, and the general public. This committee met four times this year to ensure we remain transparent and committed to the projects described by the bond measure passed in November 2022. The final report of their findings is available on our district's website on the "Measure E" page under the "Community" tab.

Additionally, we will work with a community-derived committee to start the school naming process for our new elementary school. This committee will collaborate and make a naming recommendation to our board of trustees. Please be on the lookout for more information about this endeavor soon.



We are grateful for the continued support of our community as we strive to enhance our facilities and resources. These projects and improvements are integral to our mission of providing an excellent educational environment for every student. We look forward to another year of progress, celebration, and education.

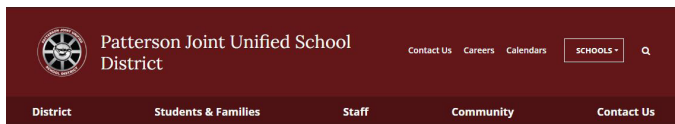


Focus Area 4: Communication & Collaboration

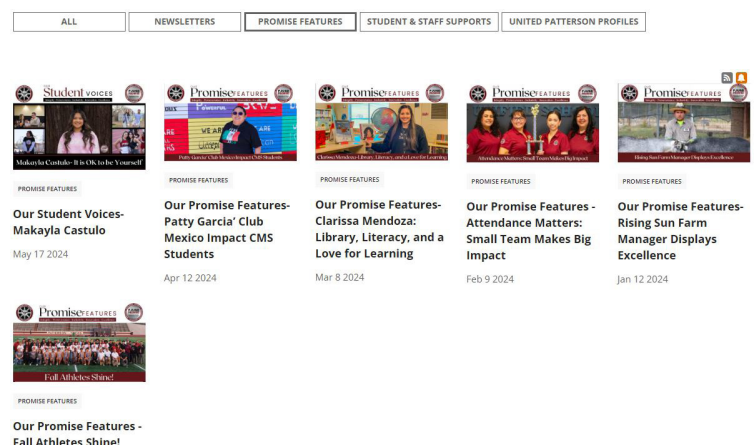

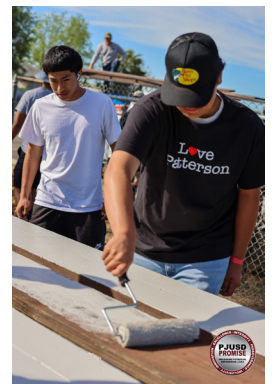

This initiative spotlights the incredible work of our staff throughout the district, recognizing those whose efforts often go unnoticed but significantly contribute to the success of our school district.





Our district is proud to continue collaborating with our community to bring forward initiatives, events, and activities that make our educational community stronger and our community a more vibrant place to be.

Over the course of the school year, our district participated in over 30 community and partner-driven initiatives and events. Highlights include the SOLES for KIDS 209 event at Grayson Elementary School, where our staff joined the non-profit group and the Patterson Rotary Club to provide brand-new shoes to all students at no cost. Seeing the excitement on our students' faces as they received their new shoes was a highlight for our staff. We also participated in Invest In Me's Annual Youth Empowerment Conference, providing our students with a platform to demonstrate their leadership while learning about other important subjects and leaders to help them become successful individuals. Other events included Public Works and Arbor Day celebrations with the City, featuring tree planting and career-driven educational activities, and the third annual Love Patterson Community Volunteer Day, which involved projects across all our schools for our students, staff, and community members to volunteer on.



Our district continues to remain innovative in its programs and initiatives. This year's second district-sponsored Special Olympics event saw more than 130 student-athletes compete in various games, celebrating inclusivity and achievement. This event was made possible through collaboration with the Special Olympics Organization, district staff, and community volunteers. It provided an inspiring and joyful experience for all involved. We also launched our first Summer Workforce Development Program for high school students, providing them with valuable work experience. In partnership with the City of Patterson and supported by the Stanislaus County



Board of Supervisors, the program offered internships across various departments. A total of 40 students participated in this paid internship program, working 20 hours per week for four weeks. Students not only earned wages but also received elective credits for their efforts, blending practical employment with educational components. This initiative helps prepare students for diverse careers, builds connections within our community, and exemplifies our commitment to unlocking potential.



These initiatives reflect our ongoing efforts to enhance communication and collaboration within our district. By fostering transparent, accessible, and meaningful interactions, we aim to create a supportive and engaging environment for all members of our community. We look forward to another year of progress and collaboration, driven by our PJUSD Promise.

Aspiring to (Teach) Lead

This year, our district proudly introduced the Aspiring Teacher Academy, a key component of our newly developed Aspiring Academy series. Running from January to May 2024, the Academy focused on empowering our classified staff to transition successfully into teaching roles. Participants received comprehensive training on curriculum development, classroom management, serving students with exceptional needs, professional ethics, and planning for their future careers in education. In May, we recognized 12 classified members who completed the program.



This program is the second in our Aspiring Academy series, following the successful launch of the Aspiring Administrators Academy last year, which prepared our teachers to become effective administrators. By establishing these pathways, our district is addressing the perpetual search for quality educators and creating opportunities for our staff to advance within our district and pursue fulfilling teaching careers that align with our students' needs.

In addition to our internal development programs, our Human Resources department hosted its annual teacher hiring event, attracting a number of enthusiastic applicants eager to join our team for the 2024-2025 school year. This event is part of our ongoing efforts to recruit talented educators who are committed to our mission of providing excellent education to our students.

We are also proud to celebrate the achievements of our outstanding staff through the PJUSD Promise Awards. 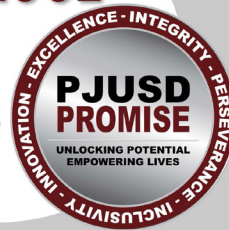
