Drama's The Laramie Project Wins CETA's Best Play

John Burroughs' Drama Department had put on our semester play from November 17th through the 19th.

They acted out *The Laramie Project*, a play by Leigh Fondakowski, Moisés Kaufman, and Stephen Belber. It is about the 1998 murder of University of Wyoming student and main character, Matthew Shepard, in Laramie, Wyoming. The murder, a hate crime, and brought awareness to people about the plight of the LGBTQ+ community (as Matthew Shepard was a gay man). Matthew was played by our very own Paris Stacey.

The Laramie Project is about a play interviewing hundreds of people by the theatre company to help bring awareness. It is constructed of three acts with more than 50 actors. It was originally published in February of 2000.



One of the actors in our Burroughs play, Sarah Bruno, said, "Honestly, the play was such an amazing experience for me. This was my first play at Burroughs and I feel so incredibly honored to have been a part of something like this with such a big meaning behind it. The people that were in the play made it an even better experience and I really hope everyone who watched it enjoyed

it!" Sarah is a senior here at John Burroughs High School and is incredibly talented on stage. Like her fellow actors in the play, Sarah was in love with the message that was delivered from this play.

Another incredible senior that was a part of the play, Lauren Schlander also shared, "This play is a true story about a gay man in the town of Laramie, Wyoming named Matthew Shepard who was brutally beaten and tied up and left on a fence to die. We get to see all of the different townspeople and their actual thoughts about the matter including the homophobic people in the town and then the closest friends Matthew had. I think this play was so important to do because even though now it's almost 20 years later, the issues this play dealt with are still very relevant today in this scary time we live in. I can speak for all of the cast when I say this play really meant a lot to all of us and we really did put all of our heart and soul into trying to give justice to the town of Laramie. I'm so lucky to have been able to be a part of something so beautiful and I know the rest of the cast feels the same."

Lauren has always talked about how much she was in love with this play and if anyone had spoken to her about it her eyes lit up. As she said, this is still an important issue, even to this day, and people should be aware of the hate crimes that go on all around us every day. We should attempt to put a stop to things like this.



TEEN COURT

On Tuesday September 19, 2017, the trial-holding club here at JBHS, Teen Court, had its first trial from 3:15PM to 5PM. As it was the first time for many students, the club's coordinators decided to hold a mock trial for the new club members to have a better full understanding of what goes on during a real trial in Teen Court

For those who do not know of Teen Court, it is a national, restorative justice program where different high schools team up with county court systems and local bar associations to divert juvenile cases from the traditional courts to the high school campus.

At Burroughs, the trials are held in our library on the third Tuesday of every month. Students participate by sitting as jurors and asking offending minors and their families questions relating to the case, as well as recommending appropriate retributions for their Teen Court judge to understand more about the case.

Though it was only a mock trial, meaning the reenactment of a trial that had really happened before, students were both extremely excited and nervous about it. There were more than thirty student attendees who showed up, and were all eager to be selected as jurors.

The trial that recently occurred was based on a girl who reportedly put urine in a candy spray bottle and tricked her fellow classmates into thinking it was candy, who ended up allowing her to spray urine in their mouths on Halloween.

The girl claimed to be bullied by her classmates for her height, and by performing this candied dilemma was how she decided to get her revenge; in real life, the girl was charged with battery. One of our Teen Court officers, junior Kate Platten, played the part of the girl while other officers played the parts of her parents.

The trial was accompanied by officials that work at the County Court, including a few judges and bailiffs. They were there to guide our students through the process of a trial by telling them what kind of questions to ask, what

kind of clothes to wear at a trial, the appropriate behavior in the courtroom, and examples of possible sentences to present.

Students who were selected to be jurors were given notepads to take notes and other information about the case. Many students were very nervous, but as the trial proceeded, they became more comfortable with the trial-like environment and were eager to ask even more questions to the offender and her parents.

When a student asks a question that was considered inappropriate and/or off-topic, the judge or the bailiff would jump in and explain to the student how their question might be irrelevant or unnecessary.

Many things the judge kept reminding the students included asking open-ended and leading questions, to remember to ask the offender to elaborate as minors tend to answer the question with a non-answer, and finally to be loud and confident when speaking.

For the most part, students found the whole process to be very enjoyable as it was a new activity for them, and were all excited for future trial occurrences.

Even though only half of the students could be in the juror seats, the remainder of the students still sat on the side, concentrating on what the offender had said. After every juror had asked at least one question, the judge allowed the students that were sitting on the side to ask questions just so they could experience how it feels to be a juror.

At the end of the trial, the judge asked the jurors to think of possible sentences to give. The students gave suggestions such as therapy, community service, and apology letters to the victims. The judges and the bailiffs were pleased to see such excitement and compassion on our students

Overall, the JBHS' Teen Court's first meeting was very successful.

Students were happy to participate in the jurisdiction system while gaining service learning hours at the same time, and they look forward to the next trial event!

There's a new donut truck in town, and the jury is still out on how long donut lovers will be on board for the sophisticated upgrade in flavors and price.

Dream Donut Truck made its debut this past June, proving its appeal has at least lasted a few months. Teenage and younger donut eaters accustomed to Burbank favorites like Dad's Donuts, Donut Prince and the Doughnut Hut might not embrace this new taste experience but adventurous connoisseurs may really relish these high end treats. The eclectic mix of donuts provides a new experience and takes on the classic donut with a flair.

Our small test group of three (a middle aged male with a sophisticated palate, a 57 year-old female health nut with a sweet tooth, and a picky female teen) sampled five of the best selling donuts on the Dream Truck's menu. The hands-down favorite was "Rosetachio," a delicious, light donut rolled in pistachios with a unique hint of rose flavoring in the aftertaste. The Blueberry Cake was also good (crispy on the outside and light on the inside, though perhaps a bit too sweet) and the cookies and cream variety was also well received.

One often thinks that being vegan doesn't give you the protein or strength you need, especially for athletes- but "What the Health?" gives many examples of athletes who claim that they have never felt stronger. They say that after becoming plant-based there was nothing but improved energy.

"70% of Americans are obese or overweight. In the coming decade, 50% of Americans will be diagnosed diabetic or pre-diabetic. An economic disaster, 75% of all health care costs in America are attributable to these and a few other chronic lifestyle illnesses," says Dr. Kim Williams. He also continues to say that these illnesses are preventable, and majority of the time these things can be fixed with a diet change.

Many responded to Anderson's film by taking control of their mental and physical health, and began thinking more about the food that they're consuming.

Come to the Chocolate Mint, with two out of three finding the donut

itself a bit heavy and doughy and

the abundant chocolate topping a bit overbearing. The least favorite sampled was the Strawberry Nut, a raised donut featuring a topping that included dried strawberries that all three in our test group

found to hard and chewy.

One thing that could not be disputed was the congeniality of the Dream Donut Truck owner, who cheerfully served customers with courtesy and efficiency.

Along with the unique flavors, the average teenager may balk at the prices; the larger donuts cost \$4.00. However, the increase in size and piled on toppings may be worth it for some junk food junkies. Bottom line for donut lovers: give it a try. Either you will gain a new appreciation for your old favorites or you'll never be satisfied with a regular old donut again. Or maybe you'll have room for both.

It was really fun to be able to pick from a menu that makes many different kinds of grilled cheese sandwiches, rather than just being able to get one kind. Their creativity with all of the different ingredients inside is really cool, and in the end, the quality of the sandwich still ends up being better than you would think!

Diversity of other foods, besides the grilled cheeses, were all over, as a very good sushi food truck was right across the street from my first stop, and by just looking at the menu options and the size of the line, I would definitely suggest checking out that

RED MAPLE CAFE

Looking for a new gelato and cafe restaurant in Burbank? Red Maple Cafe is the place to go. Red Maple is a great spot that just opened on Maple St. in Burbank, it is split up into two separate restaurants.

There is a coffee and gelato store right on the corner of the street and then an American cafe on the side street. In the cafe they serve a variety of dishes from breakfast through brunch to dinner. The restaurant is known for their amazing coffees and lattes and innovative gelato flavors, one being Purple Yam. I decided to go grab a bite at the new gelato spot to get an opinion of my own.

As soon as I walked into the gelato restaurant I noticed the atmosphere was not very open and spacious; however, they do have an outside walk-by and pick up, it resembles a drive thru. The gelato

is visible from where the customer orders with transparent glass surrounding it so you can look at all the different varieties of gelato and watch them scoop the gelato into you cup. It is an order, pay, then leave type of restaurant, there is no seating area, but they do have a bench outside the store if you want to sit down and enjoy your gelato a little longer.

As I walked up to the cashier he greeted my family and me by asking if we were first timers. After replying he gave us the whole run-down of the restaurant and what to get on the menu. The great thing about gelato spots are you can try as many samples as you want no matter how many times you've been there. I decided to get the Purple Yam and Hazelnut gelato, although an odd mix both ice creams were very delicious. It was some of the best gelato I've had in a long time.

Unfortunately, you cannot find

the gelato menu online because the gelato flavors rotate too frequently for their website. However, you can find the drink menu and the cafe's menu. Red Maple's coffee and lattes are one of a kind. They proudly serve Verve Coffee, but also sell drinks from Cappuccinos to Macchiatos to Lemonade to Horchata. Their variety is exceptional. 

"World of Dance." The Lab was the last performance in the halftime show and then it was time to get back to the intense basketball game.


The last two quarters of the game were just as exciting as the first two since the teams were refreshed from the half-time show which they had a break during.
