Students take the limelight for Cougar News

"Make it a day Lakewood; whether it's good, bad or great, it's all up to vou!"

Shouting "Quiet on set!" may not be necessary in the modest recording studio at Lakewood High School.

Filled with an anchor desk, two chairs and special lighting in front of a bright-green wall, student anchors study their lines while waiting for "Lights, camera, action."

The daily edition of "Cougar News in the Afternoon" opens with a snappy tune as black-and-white images of the school roll across the screen. The film evolves into full color, indicating the show is about to begin. American Sign Language students help lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

After reporting on classmates' accomplishments and other school news, episodes conclude with the same inspiration: "Make it a day Lakewood; whether it's good, bad or great, it's all up to you!" That closing was first used in 2018 by Josh Lizarraga, a video student at the time. "He said it one day in class and I thought it was great. It has been our sign-



off ever since," said teacher Chris Walster.

Video Foundations offers students a "real world" setting where they learn by doing, Walster said. Students operate cameras, digital editing software, audio equipment and lighting. They learn to gather information from a variety of sources, write a script and edit the video to the allotted time. Teachers play the video during fifth period.

"I'm pretty comfortable in front of people," said Smith. She started anchoring the show last year. It was familiar to her as she took the video class in 9th and 10th grade.

Smith says she loves being back on campus full-time this year. "I love seeing everyone," she explained. Her joy translates to an engaging on-screen persona that resonates with her viewers.

Riley admitted to being a bit nervous at first with the sports anchor duties he shares with Conyers. "I didn't have much experience in front of the camera," he explained. "It has become a lot more fun as time has gone on."

"It's a wrap" for Walster in June. He plans to retire after 40 years of teaching and coaching — the last 37 of those years in Lakewood schools. "It is good for him, but it is sad for our school," Riley said. "He does such a good job with video production."
