# Early assistance helps children better access their Lakewood education

Families may wonder at the development of their newborn or toddler. Some see a clearly defined area of concern while others are wondering about overall progress.

Lakewood School District offers assessment, evaluation and intervention services to help families ensure their child is ready to access their education when public school typically begins in kindergarten.

"Maybe the child is having difficulty articulating words correctly or there is another concern that might impact a child's ability to access their education," said Dale Leach, Executive Director of Learning Support Services. For example, a challenge in speaking will also inhibit a child's ability to learn to read or participate in class. It is important for that child to get help early for their future learning success.

Education is a major life function. It often dictates life success as an adult. Addressing concerns as early as possible is key, Leach explained. Families with questions are encouraged to contact Leach at the district administration office by calling 360.652.4500. After a thorough evaluation of the concerns, those children with needs impacting their ability to access their education qualify for school-provided intervention services. Then an individualized education program is prepared. Improving academic, social and adaptive skills are typical goals. Some plans may indicate the need for physical or occupational therapy. Others may specify help with cognitive or dexterity concerns. It all depends on what the child needs. Assistance ranges from a weekly visit to a school-based therapist to school staff coaching families to work with their child on specific exercises or activities at home.

At age 3, students who qualify will attend the district's Developmental Preschool program. The majority of students currently attending this program qualify for more than one area of assistance. Staff work individually or in small groups with students practicing skills identified in each child's learning plan. "It all depends on what the child needs," said teacher Kristine Sorensen. "We may read aloud with some students and practice identifying colors or shapes with others." Read more at www.lwsd.wednet.edu/news.

## Daily in person instruction returns

### K-8 students now learning 5 days per week on campus

No one can fault Lakewood students and staff for humming a popular Beatles tune with a slight lyric adjustment to "5 Days a Week – we la – ah -ove school!". Students in kindergarten through 8th grade started learning on campus five days a week this month.

This shift was made possible by the state Department of Health cutting in half the space required by schools for social distancing in classrooms. Desks have been rearranged in classrooms to accommodate the larger class sizes. Elementary students stay among their classmates for most of the day. About half the school remains in their classroom for

lunch and others sit six feet apart in the cafeteria. At the middle school, in addition to eating in the cafeteria and library, a large event tent has been added to ensure students maintain social distancing.

"Oh my gosh, we are so happy," said Sue Krause, a reading teacher at Lakewood Elementary School, of students on campus every day. "It is great to have our students together for this last bit of the school year to remind them how fun learning is and what a great place school is."

Unfortunately, confirmed COVID illness among teenagers in our community halted Lakewood High School's return. High school students will continue in the hybrid model of learning 2 days on campus with 3 days remote. The class schedule now allows 6 classes per day. Students will also be checking in online for each period during their remote learning days. The new schedule doubles the number of times teachers and high school students interact. The individual selected will serve until the next regular School Board election in November. At that time, a director will be elected for the remainder of Bean's term which expires in 2023.
