





Replacement Educational Programs and Operations Levy (EP&O)


- Replaces current EP&O levy that is expiring.
- Voters would experience a <u>flat tax</u> rate.
- Represents about 14% of the district's operating budget.

• No tax-rate increase thanks to district's eligibility for bond refinancing in 2024.

EP&O Levy: Teaching + Support (37%)

- Funds teachers and support staff when state funding falls short.
- Helps provide smaller class sizes.
- Technology Support: Staff to procure, maintain and troubleshoot district computers and other technology.
- Security: The district is exploring the possibility of hiring a School Resource Officer in partnership with the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office.
- Social Emotional Learning Support:
 Maintains current levels of support for counselors, psychologists, nurses and mental health services.







EP&O Levy: Special Education (20%)

- About one-fifth of the levy supports special education expenditures unfunded by state and federal apportionment.
- Occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech language pathologists, psychologists and a behavior specialist to meet student needs as outlined in individual educational plans.
- Teachers and paras beyond state funding to support students with disabilities.








EP&O Levy: Athletics + Activities (15%)

The state does not provide funding for athletics. The main source of funding for athletics and extracurricular activities is the EP&O Levy.











EP&O Levy: Athletics + Activities

- At Lakewood Middle School, students can participate in both individual and team sports as early as sixth grade.
- Lakewood High School offers 12 different varsity sports with teams at various skill levels.
- Programs such as athletics, music, art, drama, and clubs help keep students involved and engaged in school.











EP&O Levy: Technology + Operations (14%)

- Funds technology such as student Chromebooks, document cameras in classrooms, Boxlight interactive classroom panels, and operating software.
- Funds maintenance and repair of current devices.
- Allows access to digital curriculum and supplemental resources.
- Maintains access to state-mandated standardized testing and STAR math and reading assessments.
- Preventative maintenance and repair of facilities.
- Volunteer Management System.
- Outreach to families and community.
- Curricular resources, instructional materials, and student supplies.
- Utility, insurance and operations costs beyond state funding.








EP&O Levy: Professional Development (14%)

- Training for staff to improve student learning and success.
- Professional development to teach the building blocks of reading for elementary students.
- Supporting the use of classroom assessments to identify and diagnose student needs.
- Strengthening the ability of teachers to provide interventions that help students learn at grade level.
- Concentrated support for new teachers.










Some examples of positions funded by the EP&O Levy that you might not think about





Staff working in Lakewood School District (in FTE)

A nurse or health aide at each school to support student health



Custodians to ensure clean & healthy learning environments for students



Facilities/maintenance staff for 24 structures and about 85 acres



Psychologists for social/emotional support and mental health



2 Staff to procure and maintain technology for the entire district.



Athletic coaches for middle school and high school sports





How much money can districts ask for?

Washington State law allows for taxes to be levied on the lower of the following:

- \$2.50 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation
- or -
- \$2,500 per student*

*Before inflation adjustment

The proposed levy collection is less than either of the two parameters outlined by the state.



Replacement Educational Programs and Operations Levy (EP&O)

Approval of the renewal EP&O levy will **not increase** the tax rate.

The refinancing of the bonds saves our taxpayers \$4.6 million over the next 9 years and impacts current voter-approved measures(Bonds/EP&O) by maintaining our current tax rate.

The projected replacement EP&O rate \$1.73 (along with the bonds) would **not change the current tax rate**.

A failure to pass the EP&O levy in April would result in the district needing to cut \$3.96 M - \$4.4 M in the 24-25 SY.



If property values go up, do schools get more funding? No...and you'll likely pay less



Property values may change, but the district only collects the total amount approved by voters. When district assessed property taxes go up or when new construction occurs (adding to district property value) the levy rate goes down.





Capital Improvements and Safety Levy

Capital Improvements and Safety Levy

This levy funds facility needs not funded by the state, helping to ensure that our learning environments are healthy and safe. The focus of the Capital Improvements and Safety Levy is maintenance and preservation of district facilities and safety and security improvements.



The roof at LMS needs to be replaced to prevent water leaks. (Black patches show previous repair work to extend the life of the existing roof.)



Citizens' Facilities Advisory Committee (February-October 2023)




- In 2023, a district Citizens' Facilities Advisory Committee, comprised of parents, staff, and community volunteers, visited schools in the district to develop short- and longterm recommendations for capital improvements.
- For its short-term recommendations, the committee focused on:
 - 1. Maintenance and preservation
 - 2. Safety and security projects across the district

To maintain a consistent total tax rate, the levy amount adjusts as existing bonds are paid off.



Tax impact analysis

The estimated 2025 total tax rate increase for the new Capital Improvements and Safety Levy is \$0.87 per \$1,000 of assessed value. That's \$435 per year for a home with an assessed value of \$500,000. That equates to about 17 cents per student.


