2. School-Counseling Department Mission Statement

The Elizabeth Forward school counseling program addresses the academic, social and personal needs of all students by connecting with teachers, families and communities members to create a learning environment that nurtures the development of academic proficiency, career readiness, and personal responsibility.

All students in grades 6-12 will have equitable access to a comprehensive counseling program, which is developmentally appropriate. All stakeholders, including students, parents, educators/administrators, business/community partners, and post-secondary institutions will collaborate to remove barriers to learning and to provide opportunities and supports for students to reach their individual potential. Our goal is to empower students to achieve their academic, college/career, and personal goals, including the successful transition to their post-secondary plan.

Program Goals 2016-18:

<u>Academic</u>: Students will complete school with the academic preparation essential to be an effective learner in the post secondary environment and across the life span.

- High School: To incorporate PA Career Zone interest profile results and codes into the high school course selection planning. At least 50% of high school students will use these results to guide scheduling, set goals and identify course of study.
- Middle School: 90% of failing students will have a Plan for Success that will be communicated to parents.
- <u>Elementary</u>: Reduce the number of students with 20 or absences by 20 % by creating an Attendance Improvement Plan.

<u>Personal / Social</u>: Students will acquire the knowledge, attitudes and interpersonal skills to help them understand and respect self and others.

High School: Provide 100% of 9th grade students (in Health) with information about the Student Assistance Program, Behavioral Health Counselor, and Prevention Groups as well as how to utilize to school counseling program.

- <u>Middle School</u>: By end of the 2017-18 school year, all 8th grade students will have completed Units 1 3 in the Common Sense Media Digital Citizenship Curriculum.
- <u>Elementary</u>: Successful implementation of ESAP at one elementary school with the intention of expanding it to all elementary buildings.

<u>Career</u>: Students will understand the relationship between academia, requirements in the workforce and future career goals to gain success and satisfaction in the world of work.

- High School: All 9th grade students will begin a digital portfolio for career exploration and post-secondary planning. The goal is for students to build upon their portfolio each year, having a complete portfolio with artifacts and career pathways by end of senior year.
- Middle School: 90% of eighth grade students will complete a career interest inventory by the end of 2016-17 school year and be able to identify three career clusters. Career codes and PA Career Zone passwords will be stored in iPads.
- <u>Elementary</u>: 90% of 5th graders will demonstrate an increased awareness of career opportunities after participating in Steel Center classroom presentations.

4. Stakeholders:

Students

Students will help to deliver the counseling program by participating in goal-setting, problem-solving, career development and post high school planning. Students will focus on personal achievement and seek resources in the areas of academic, career and personal/social development.

Students will also provide feedback on the needs of the student body and on the manner in which those needs are being met. Students will offer input into the effectiveness of guidance services and ways to improve these services to better meet student needs.

Educators

Teachers, administrators, and school board members will be educated about career standards and career options available to students through their participation on the advisory council, the school website, and counselor driven presentations.

Teachers, administrators, and school board members will be members of the Guidance Advisory Council. They will support the school-counseling program by being firm believers in the department's mission, goals, and delivery. They will help promote the school-counseling program through classroom instruction, professional and parent meetings and by participating in curriculum writing. Educators will benefit by working as a team to discover students' individual strengths and needs to prepare them to be successful learners and transition from high school into the world of work.

Parents

Parents play a vital role in helping students make appropriate choices for their future. They will be informed of opportunities and options for their children so that they can be advocates in communicating and encouraging these opportunities to their children. Parents will be made aware of ongoing school-counseling programs and services throughout the school year through parent conferences, mailings, advertising, resources on the school website, and special planned events. Parents will work with their children and school staff in regards to academic course selections, college and career exploration, and post secondary planning.

Parents will have an on-going opportunity to provide input on the development of guidance services by serving on the advisory council, participating in school career programs and attending school events.

Community / Business

Members of the business community will provide students the opportunity to job shadow and tour their facilities, conduct presentations to students regarding the work force, provide support to help our schools carry out its program goals, and serve on the advisory council.

Students will become connected with business and community members through opportunities to visit local businesses, take the Holland interest inventory and connect it to the career curriculum/virtual job shadow and by establishing an earlier connection with the Steel Center Career and Technical School.

Post-Secondary

Post-secondary representatives will be connected to students at various levels at Elizabeth Forward schools. Students will become aware of various options after high school. Institutions can conduct recruiting visits and facilitate presentations regarding their programs, meet and greet staff and faculty, allow students and school staff to visit college campuses and interact with college students and professors. In addition, students will be able to participate in co-ops outside of the building as well as real life work experiences while in the school setting.

Representatives from post-secondary institutions including community colleges, four-year universities, and technical schools will become active members on the advisory council. They will help guide the school-counseling program to help our students become more knowledgeable and prepared for post-secondary success.

5. Role of the School Counselor:

- A. As a <u>Leader</u>, we effectively and efficiently create, implement, and manage a comprehensive and developmental counseling program. Counselors at Elizabeth Forward hold a variety of leadership roles such as Union President, Class Sponsor, Club Sponsor, SAP coordinator, Caring Team Coordinator, and Digital Citizenship Certified Educator.
- B. As an <u>Advocate</u>, we advocate for students, for the counseling profession, and for systemic change. School counselors' advocacy can have a lasting impact on attitudes, policies, and practices, which will ultimately help reduce or eliminate any potential barriers to students' learning so that they can reach their full potential in school and careers.
- C. As a <u>Collaborator</u>, we collaborate with all stakeholders, including students, parents, educators/administrators, business/community partners, and post-secondary colleges and universities, to create a positive learning environment so that optimal learning is achieved for all students to succeed academically, personally, and socially.
- D. As an <u>Agent of Systemic Change</u>, we help to encourage systemic change by strategically meeting the needs of students by removing educational barriers to learning and by implementing resources and support interventions to ensure all students graduate ready and prepared for post-secondary education and training and the world of work.

11. Individualized Academic/Career Plan (IACP):

The EFHS counselors and teachers formed a committee to create a Digital Portfolio using Google Docs. Students will create a Google account in a required freshman course, Building Bridges. Every year, students will add personal information, including career exploration, test scores, academic artifacts, and awards / accomplishments. This is a required process that is integrated into the classroom. Students can earn Digital Badges for completing certain tasks.

Students will start collecting information for their Digital Portfolio in grade 8. The middle/high counselor and transition coordinator will conduct classroom lessons using PA Career Zone. In addition, a representative from Steel Center will conduct a Career Interest Inventory with all 8th grade students. Students will store their password, career codes and clusters in an electronic format, currently eBackpack. This information will be added to student's individual accounts during freshman year.

High school students share their IACP with the school counselors during their annual scheduling meetings. Seniors meet with their counselor in September to review their plan and move toward action steps. The counselors are working on how to integrate the current graduation plan format into IACPs.
