V. PUBLIC COMMENTS RELATING TO BOARD AGENDA ITEMS

There were no comments or questions from the public.

VI. PROGRAM

Dr. O'Malley reviewed the Program agenda.

- Item #1 is travel which is paid through the grant.
- Designation of October 18th through 22nd as School Violence Awareness Week.
 Many activities are going on at the schools throughout the week.
- Item #2 will Approve the Annual District Nursing Plan. The plan shares with the Board each of the health services provided at the schools. It's developed with the criteria established by the State and deals with students who have health issues.

Ms. Deluca stated there is one correction with regards to the figures reported under health concerns at Ravine Drive. The number should be 36, not 306.

Ms. Hayward inquired about teacher responsibilities. Ms. Deluca stated some of the staff is trained to deal with health issues.

• Item #3 is the Annual Violence and Vandalism Report from the previous school year. The four categories included are violence, vandalism, weapons and substance abuse. The number of incidences decreased due to the administration identifying areas of problems such as the hallways and cafeterias. Over the past 5 years the number of incidents has gone from 50 to 18 last year.

Ms. Demarest asked if the decrease can be attributed to finding out where the problems occur. Dr. O'Malley stated most incidents are at the High School and Middle School so the administration put hall monitors there.

Mr. Donaghue stated that most of the incidents take place at the cafeteria. Dr. O'Malley noted that they have decreased the passing time to limit incidents.

Mr. Kenny noted that historically there was concern with the accuracy of the reporting. This report is accurate due to the various procedures the District performed. The numbers are only sound if they are accurate. It is important to know that the Board has been assured that these numbers are accurate.

• Item #4 is the submission of the next CAP grant application "No More Bullies No More Victims." The District spends \$1,900 and those funds are matched by the grant and is very appropriate in the current times.

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Mr. Kenny stated he was happy to see item #4 on the agenda because it targets young children and young students in order to prevent this acts from happening. Dr. O'Malley stated that the Middle School is starting the "Kicking It" program.

• Item C is Special Services. The one change on the agenda is the first student listed will no longer be an Out of District placement because he exited the District on October 6. The placement will be from 9/7/10 - 10/6/10. The administration is still waiting on the final three Out of District placements.

Dr. Delaney questioned the number of incidents under the substance abuse portion of the Violence and Vandalism report. Dr. O'Malley stated it will be corrected.

Ms. Demarest inquired if the cost of the last student under Out of District placements is correct to which Dr. O'Malley answered yes. The District is liable for the cost for that student.

After meeting as The Committee of the Whole with the Superintendent, the Board approves the following items:

Due to the delay in the delivery of materials to the two schools the completion date will need to be extended. The new date will be November 12, 2010.

9. Approve Change Order Number 1 for the Wheelchair Lifts & ADA work at the High School and Ravine Drive School

Due to an unforeseen condition for asbestos removal and installation of additional carpeting to match adjacent conditions at the High School auditorium, additional labor for hand excavation of the concrete floor slab to save and existing buried electrical conduit and branch circuiting at Ravine Drive School for a cost of \$3,148.95.

10. Approve Change Order Number 2 for the Wheelchair Lifts & ADA work at the High School and Ravine Drive School

To provide and install additional electrical work at Ravine Drive School at a cost of \$1,060.50.

11. Approve the Refunding Bond Ordinance

REFUNDING BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REFUNDING OF UP TO ALL OF THE OUTSTANDING CALLABLE SCHOOL BONDS, SERIES 2003, OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE MATAWAN-ABERDEEN REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$23,500,000 OF REFUNDING BONDS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT TO FINANCE THE COST THEREOF; MAKING CERTAIN DETERMINATIONS AND COVENANTS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN RELATED ACTIONS IN CONNECTION WITH THE FOREGOING.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE MATAWAN-ABERDEEN REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY (NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF ALL THE MEMBERS THEREOF AFFIRMATIVELY CONCURRING), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board of Education of the Matawan-Aberdeen Regional School District, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey ("Board" when referring to the governing body and "School District" when referring to the legal entity governed by the Board) is hereby authorized to refund its outstanding callable School Bonds, Series 2003, in the aggregate principal amount of \$21,400,000 and maturing on September 15 in the following years and principal amounts (collectively, the "Callable Bonds"):

The exact amount of Callable Bonds to be refunded shall be determined pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board by not less than two-thirds of all the members thereof.

- <u>Section 2</u>. To effectuate the refunding of the Callable Bonds, negotiable refunding bonds of the School District are hereby authorized to be issued in an amount not to exceed \$23,500,000 in one (1) or more series ("Refunding Bonds"), pursuant to the School Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 18A:24-1 et seq., as amended and supplemented ("School Bond Law").
- Section 3. An aggregate amount not exceeding \$200,000 for the items of expense listed in and permitted by Section 61.4 of the School Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 18A:24-61.4, has been included in the aggregate principal amount of the Refunding Bonds authorized herein.
- <u>Section 4.</u> The purpose of the Refunding Bonds is to affect an interest cost savings for the School District.
- Section 5. Each Refunding Bond authorized herein shall be designated, substantially, "The Board of Education of the Matawan-Aberdeen Regional School District, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey, School Refunding Bond, Series 20__" and shall be in the form prescribed and permitted by the School Bond Law, as Bond Counsel may advise, and as the School District shall approve.
- <u>Section 6</u>. The Refunding Bonds may be sold at public or private sale pursuant to a resolution of the Board adopted by not less than two-thirds of all the members thereof.

<u>Section 7.</u> To effectuate the refunding of the Callable Bonds, the President of the Board, Vice President of the Board and Business Administrator/Board Secretary are hereby authorized to enter into the contracts or agreements described in Section 61.10 of the School Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 18A:24-61.10.

Section 8. A certified copy of this refunding bond ordinance as adopted on first reading has been filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey prior to final adoption, together with a complete statement in the form prescribed by the Director and signed by the Business Administrator/Board Secretary as to the outstanding indebtedness to be refunded by the issuance of the Refunding Bonds.

Section 9. This refunding bond ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption after advertised public hearing, notice of which shall be given publicly at least seven (7) days prior to the date of such hearing in a newspaper circulating within the School District; provided, however, that the consent of the Local Finance Board has been endorsed upon a certified copy of this refunding bond ordinance as finally adopted.

IX. PUBLIC COMMENTS RELATING TO ADDITIONAL CONCERNS:

Various Aberdeen and Matawan residents made comments, expressed concern, and/or raised questions regarding the following items included in the agenda to which Mr. Kenny, Dr. O'Malley, Ms. Deluca and Ms. Irons answered.

Mr. Pidell, 87 Onyx Place,

- Questioned what the Refunding Bond Ordinance was. Mr. Kenny answered it was explained in greater detail at the previous two meetings but will have Ms. Irons review it. Ms. Irons stated with the bond rates going down the District has been able to save debt service costs. The refinancing of the bond debt may save the District around \$850,000. After the public hearing on October 25th the bonds will go out to the market. These savings are passed onto the public. Mr. Kenny stated there's no increase in the length of the payoff with savings being realized with the interest rate. The District could save somewhere between \$800,000 to over \$1 Million and it's a net savings after any cost of professionals doing the refinance.
- Inquired if the ATSA was that held last year and if so how was the attendance.
 Ms. Deluca stated the District did have ATSA in the fall and spring sessions and was very well attended.
- Questioned why only two field trips are allowed for the kindergarten and first
 grade classes at Strathmore considering these trips are funded by the PTA. Dr.
 O'Malley stated the Board does not provide the funding for field trips. Their
 concern is with the number of field trips being taken. A student's address should
 not dictate educational opportunities so a cap was put on the number of trips
 taken. Another concern is the impact of the instructional time lost.
- Stated that promethean boards were purchased by the PTA. Maybe there should there be a collective PTA for the District. Dr. O'Malley stated that originally the District and PTOs were trying to fund the Promethean boards. Every school has a level playing field when they each receive promethean boards. An additional cost to the District with regards to field trips is the cost of providing nursing.

Ms. Montgomery, 54 Johnson Avenue, Matawan,

• Thanked the Board for taking care of the bathroom issue in Ms. Perry's kindergarten class. A full time aide was appointed to help and Ms. Perry is pleased with the way the situation is working out.

Mr. Espata, Line Road,

• Inquired why item #4, the CAP grant was for the younger kids even though more bullying goes on at the High School. Dr. O'Malley stated the CAP grant is for

kindergarten through second grades only. Other programs pertaining to bullying occur at the High School and Middle School. The Middle School has the "Kick It" program. The High School does not have a specific program but there are many activities going on during violence awareness week. Mr. Kenny stated the goal for CAP was to introduce students to these programs at a younger age.
