#### Aledo ISD District Look-For Data

During the 2022-23 school year, Aledo ISD focused on and measured four instructional priorities district-wide. The four instructional priorities that are expected to be implemented with fidelity in each classroom daily include:

#### • Evidence of daily lesson frame

- A lesson frame directs students to the primary learning objective in a lesson so that students have clarity around the daily learning expectations. There are three components posted in the lesson frame which include:
  - <u>We Will:</u> Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills that will be covered in the daily lesson.
  - I Will: The student task for the day.
  - So That I Can: How students will apply their learning.

#### • Evidence of daily critical writing

 Critical writing is expected daily in all classrooms and is designed for the specific purpose of thinking and making connections.

#### • Evidence of high-yield formative assessment


 High-yield formative assessments are student tasks that are designed to provide the teacher with information related to a student's level of understanding so that instruction can be adjusted as needed.

#### • Evidence of learner engagement


- High levels of student engagement is expected daily in all classrooms. There are two indicators for learner engagement that were measured which include:
  - Active Participation: All students remain on-task, responding to frequent opportunities for active engagement throughout the lesson. Lesson is led by both teacher and students, and students productively progress through new learning.
  - <u>Learning Environment:</u> Students are encouraged to take risks and persevere through productive struggle. Students are praised for demonstrating commitment to learning. Students demonstrate respect for peers, teacher, and the learning environment.



#### Aledo ISD Professional Learning Community

Aledo ISD is a professional learning community (PLC) that is committed to ensuring high-levels of learning for all students. AISD's professional learning community is an ongoing process in which teacher teams work collaboratively in recurring cycles to improve student learning outcomes.

Three big ideas drive the work of the PLC process and include:

#### • A focus on learning

 Collaborative teacher teams work to clarify what students must learn and how student learning will be monitored. Students are provided with systematic interventions when they struggle and extension when they are proficient.

#### • A collaborative culture and collective responsibility

 Collaborative teacher teams work together to ensure that all students learn at high levels. A collaborative culture is cultivated through the development of high-performing teams.


#### • A results orientation

 Effectiveness is based on results rather than intentions. Data and information is used to promote continuous improvement.



A Focus on Learning: 2022-23 School Year




### A Focus on Collaborative Culture & Collective Responsibility: 2022-23 School Year






#### **Developmental Reading Assessment K-2 Data**

The Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA) is a diagnostic reading assessment that measures fluency, accuracy and comprehension. Students in kindergarten through second grade are assessed one-on-one with the teacher three times a year. Student scores are evaluated against the grade-level targets for each testing window and categorized as being exceeds expectations, meets expectations or below expectations. This assessment establishes each student's independent reading level and equips the teacher with necessary data to design guided reading instruction that will assist the student's progression to the next reading level.

The overall district data below shows the change in the percentage of students scoring exceeds expectations, meets expectations or below expectations on the benchmark targets from the middle of the year to the end of the year for Kindergarten and from the beginning of the year to the end of the year for first and second grade. Kindergarten targets are not set at the beginning of the year due to a lack of exposure to the reading TEKS.





#### mCLASS Texas K-2 Reading Data

mCLASS Texas is a universal screener given to kindergarten, first and second grade students to help determine which students may need targeted intervention in the foundational skills of reading. It includes 5-7 reading subtests ranging from letter naming to basic comprehension that are administered one-on-one by the teacher three times a year. Student scores are evaluated against the grade-level targets for each testing window and categorized as being either above, at, below or well-below benchmark targets. Teachers use this data to plan classroom instruction and targeted intervention.

The overall district data below shows the change in the percentage of students above, at, below or well-below the benchmark targets for each grade level from the beginning of the year (BOY) to the end of the year (EOY) for the 2022-2023 school year.


#### **IXL Math Diagnostic K-2 Data**

The IXL Math Diagnostic Assessment is a computer-adaptive assessment that provides information about students' math abilities in six strands:

- Numbers & Operations
- Algebra & Algebraic Thinking
- Fractions
- Geometry
- Measurement
- Data, Statistics & Probability

Students in kindergarten through second grade are assessed three times a year. Student scores are evaluated against the grade-level targets for each testing window and categorized as being either above, at, below or well-below benchmark targets. Teachers use this data to plan classroom instruction and targeted intervention.

The overall district data below shows the change in the percentage of students above, at, below or well-below the benchmark targets for each grade level from the beginning of the year (BOY) to the end of the year (EOY) for the 2022-2023 school year.





#### **MAP Growth Data**

The MAP Growth Assessment is a computer-adaptive assessment given to all third through eighth grade, Algebra, English I and English II students at the beginning and middle of the year and to targeted students at the end of the year.

The MAP reading assessment measures student performance in three instructional areas:

- Foundational Language Skills: Vocabulary
- Multiple Genres
- Author's Purpose and Craft

The MAP math assessment measures student performance in four instructional areas:


- Numerical Representations and Relationships
- Computations and Algebraic Relationships
- Geometry and Measurement
- Data Analysis and Monetary Transactions

Student scores are evaluated against nationally-normed cut scores and compared to the national quintiles. Teachers use this data, in addition to other data points, to determine which students may need intervention in reading and/or math and to monitor progress throughout the year.


The overall district data below shows the change in the percentage of students falling into each of the national quintiles at the beginning and middle of the 2022-2023 school year.




## 3-8 STAAR Reading 2023 State & Region 11 Comparison






## 3-8 STAAR Math 2023 State & Region 11 Comparison






## 5th/8th STAAR Science 2023 State & Region 11 Comparison






## 8th STAAR Social Studies 2023 State & Region 11 Comparison






## Q.3: How much respect do students at your school show you?



### Q.1: How big of a problem is the following issue for becoming involved with your child's current school: Childcare needs?


















### Q.5: How well do administrators at your child's school create a school environment that helps children learn?



### **Family Survey Summary Notes**

### In the Barriers to Engagement Category:

This category begins each question with, "How big of a problem is the following issue for becoming involved with your child's current school..."

- 48% of parents reported that because of their busy schedule it was difficult to be involved.
- 18% of parents reported that the school is not welcoming to parents.
- 5% of parents reported that the school does not communicate well with people of their culture.
- 25% of parents expressed concern that if they raised a concern the adults at school would treat their child differently.

### School Climate Category:

- 70% of parents reported that children at their child's school have quite a bit of respect for the school staff while 70% report the teachers have quite a bit of respect for the children at the school.
- 68% of parents reported administrators at their child's school create an environment that helps children learn while only 48% of parents agree the classroom lessons at their child's school are quite motivating.
- 61% of parents report their children enjoy quite a bit to a tremendous amount going to school.

### School Fit Category:

- 64% of parents report their child feels quite a bit to a tremendous sense of belonging at their school.
- 69% believe the overall approach to discipline works well for their child.
- 52% reported their child is quite comfortable asking for help from school adults.
- 81% of parents, given their child's cultural background, believe the school is a good fit for their child.

### School Safety Category:

- 30% parents report if a student is bullied at school it is somewhat to extremely difficult for him/her to get help from an adult.
- 32% of parents reported it is somewhat likely to extremely likely someone from the child's school will bully him/her online.
- 15% of parents report their child feels somewhat unsafe to extremely unsafe at school.




### Q.1: At your school, how valuable are the available professional development opportunities?












### Q.7: How relevant have your professional development opportunities been to your work?










### Q.1: On most days, how enthusiastic are the students about being at school?





### Q.2: To what extent are staff trusted to work in the way they think is best?





### **Staff Survey Summary Notes**

### 127 responses

We experienced a decrease in favorable responses in 4 of 26 questions and an increase in favorable responses in 20 of 26 questions and had *no change* in 2 of 26 questions.

### In the Professional Learning Category:

- 71% of respondents agree that the school has been supportive of their professional growth but only 45% report the professional growth opportunities are relevant to their work.
- 81% of respondents report their colleagues' ideas are helpful in improving their work while 61% shared they have learned many new strategies for their job while working at their school.
- 70% shared they learn quite a bit to a tremendous amount from the leaders at their school.

### In the School Climate Category:

- 81% report they are trusted to work in the way they think best and 75% are quite optimistic their school will improve in the future.
- 78% responded positively that the working environment is positive at their school.

### In the Staff Leadership Relationships Category:

- 87% of respondents' favorably report that school leaders are respectful towards them and when challenges arise in their personal life they are understanding.
- 83% report they are confident school leaders have the best interests of the school in mind and treat the staff quite fairly while 78% shared that when they face challenges at work their school leaders are very supportive.



### **Teacher Survey Summary Notes**

### 419 responses

We experienced a decrease in favorable responses in 1 of 34 questions and an increase in favorable responses in 31 of 34 questions and had *no change* in 2 of 34 questions.

### In the Faculty Growth Mindset Category:

 Approximately 52% of teacher respondents agreed they could improve their implementation of different teaching strategies and 48% said they could change their ability to work with dissatisfied parents.

### In the Professional Learning Category:

- 78% of teacher respondents report their colleagues' ideas are helpful for improving their teaching.
- 62% report they have learned many new strategies through working at their campus.
- 70% of teachers report the school has been supportive in their growth as a teacher.

### In the School Climate Category:

- 78% of teacher respondents report their school has a positive working environment.
- 75% are optimistic that their school will improve in the future.
- 62% report students are enthusiastic about being at school and they are trusted as teachers to teach in the way they think is best.

### In the Staff-Leadership Relationships Category:

- 86% report schools' leaders 84% are respectful towards them and when challenges arise in their personal life school leaders are understanding.
- 79% of teacher respondents report they are confident school leaders have the best interests of the school in mind.
- 64% of teacher respondents report there is trust between school leaders and the faculty.
