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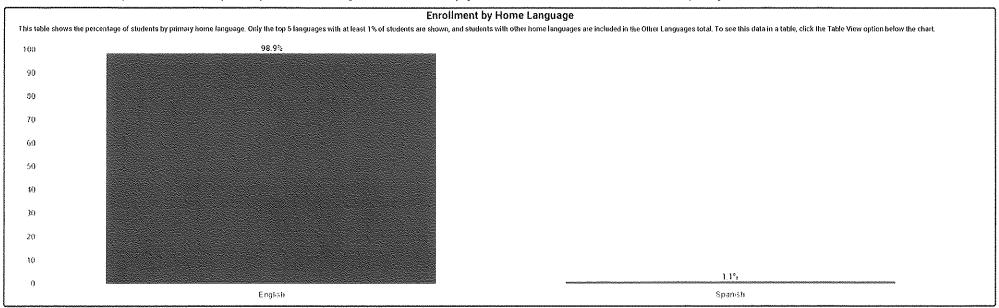
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## Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

Important Note for 2021-22 Reports: The calculation of the NJLSA in both 2019-20 and 2020-21, SGPs were not calculated for 2019-2020, 2020-2021, or 2021-2022. The 2021-22 reports will not include any mSGP data.

The NJDOE received approved through the <u>COVID-19 State Plan Addendum</u>, to use an alternative method to calculate academic progress for the 2021-22 school year based on aggregate score improvement on the NJSLA at the schoolwide and student group level between 2018-2019 and 2021-2022. For 2021-22, the NJDOE measured academic progress in ELA and mathematics using Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM). Results of the RSIM measure are available on the <u>NJDOE's Accountability page</u> under 2022 Accountability Data.

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#### English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show frends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM afternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

Important note for 2021-22; Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in 2019-20 and 2020-21, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years.

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### English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts(EEA) both overall and by students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Eevel 4 or 5 on the NUSEA assessment or at Eevel 3 or 4 on the DEM assessment.

This table shows both the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be fower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long term goal of 80% proficiency by 2032. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long term goal. 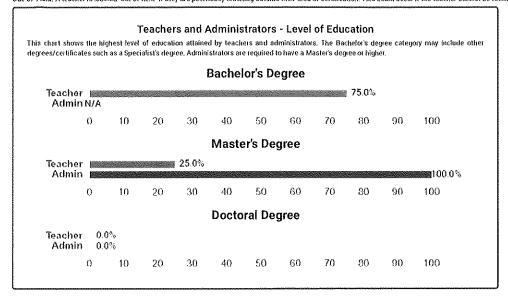

New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's approved ESSA state plan, NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- · Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:
  - Schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- · Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:
  - High schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- · Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):
  - Schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title t schools
- · Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:
  - Title Lschools identified as Additional Targeted Support and Improvement, Low Performing Student Group (ATSI) that are identified for three or more consecutive years, i.e. ATSI schools that do not meet exit criteria.
  - The NUDGE has not yet identified schools in this category as no ATSI schools have been in status for three or more years.

Annually, NJDOE will identify schools in the following federal category:

- · Targeted Support and Improvement: Consistently Underperforming Student Group (TSI);
  - Schools with one or more student groups that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row

For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

For more information about New Jersey's accountability system, how indicator and summative scores were calculated, how federal accountability status is determined, and additional data, see the NJPOE accountability page.

Important Note for 2021-2022; Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, New Jersey received waivers from the United States Department of Education (USED) in both March 2020 and March 2021 that waived accountability related requirements in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years. These waivers removed the requirements to:

- Calculate indicator scores and summative scores for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years;
- · Measure progress toward long-term goals and measures of interim progress for accountability indicators for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years; and
- lidentify schools for comprehensive and targeted support and improvement during the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years (based on 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 data, respectively).

As a result of these waivers, any school that was identified for comprehensive or targeted support and improvement during the 2019-20 school year will retain the same status for like 2021-22 and 2022-23 school years.

The NJDDE identified schools across four categories during the 2022-23 school year (based on 2021-22 data):

- · CSI: Overall Low Performing,
- . CSI: Low Graduation Rate;
- ATSI; and
- TSI

For the TSI identification that occurred during the 2022-23 school year, status in meeting annual targets for the 2018-19 and 2021-22 school years were used since data was not available for two consecutive years.

Additionally, all schools that were previously identified were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2022-23 school year if the NJDOE's Exit Criteria were met.

The NUDDE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the COVID-19 State Plan Addendum. Under the approved Addendum, the NUDDE will identify schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2022 and fall 2023. Schools identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 will be eligible to exit status in fall 2023 if all exit criteria are met. Schools identified for TSI status will be eligible to exit annually if exit criteria are met.

Members of the instructional staff are committed to improving their competencies and have participated in professional development activities to ensure that our students are receiving engaging, challenging and differentiated lessons.

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Quinton Township School started its first ever before and after care SACC program. This program is self-sustaining and run by our own employees. This program has shown to save working parents a lot of money. Additionally, the district offers a homework center, after school tutoring, peer tutoring and mentoring programs.

# **Before and After School Programs:**



Literacy and Mathematics Coaches meet with the instructional staff throughout the year to assist with the implementation of effective teaching practices. Additionally, our instructional staff members participate in both in-house and outside of the district professional development sessions, which are turn-keyed during Professional Learning Community sessions, which take place two times per month after school hours.

The district's Intervention and Referral Services Team works diligently to identify students who are in need of additional services, develop intervention plans and communicate with parents and teachers. As a result of the district's hard work and effort put forth to begin such a program the district was recognized by the NJDOE for having the highest percentage rate increase of students participating in the southern portion of the state.

# Student Health and Wellness:



Our Home and School Association is an active organization. Numerous events are scheduled throughout the year to increase involvement of the parents: parent lunches, guest presenters/readers, evening family events, fundraising efforts, chaperone dances, host book fairs, serve as room parents, yearbook preparation, etc. Parents communicate with the school staff via telephone, Email, Connect Ed weekly messages, OnCourse, Homework Hotline, Remind, Classroom DoJo, and website.

**Climate Surveys:**

NJDOE school climate survey for: school staff, students in grades 3 - 5, students in grades 6 - 8, parents. Every other year the School Improvement Panel utilizes the School Climate Survey and communicates the results to both the School Improvement Team and Board of Education. The latest survey conducted found: The district scored very high with teachers, students, and parents with Parental Support and Engagement and Safety and Emotional Environment.



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The building was built in 4 sections: 1928, 1950, 1980, 2001 We have a Library, one iPad cart, art room, multi-purpose room, and music room. The entire building has air conditioning. Our facilities are well-maintained and the district has already benefited from the solar panel purchase and installation (2012). Each classroom has a SMART Board as well as other technological devices for our students and staff to utilize. The carpeting and/or tile has been updated in most of the building.



The district takes all necessary steps to ensure the safety and well being of both the students and staff. The district holds monthly crisis and fire drills. The district is updating the camera system which will be more clear and accurate. The district just installed a vestibule for added security, and well as new steel doors to replace glass doors. The district uses the PBSIS program and a student peer mediation program to promote a healthy and safe environment.



Technology and STEM:

The district"s 1-1 technology initiative (grades 1-8) and iPads (K) allows our students to access electronic texts in math, science, social studies and health. Students in grades PK - K utilize iPads with applications that reinforce skills taught in the classroom. Each classroom has a SMART Board as well as other technological devices for our students and staff to utilize. We offer an after school culture club program where STEM activities are taught. The district also has a mobile iPad cart.



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Early Childhood Education:

The district's Early Childhood program is a full day program that runs from 8:20 AM to 3:00 PM. For this school year, there are students in each of three Early Childhood classrooms. We were able to expand from two to three classrooms when we were awarded the preschool expansion grant. The program uses the Creative Curriculum.



Addressing the Impact of COVID-19:

The district's COVID-19 Restart Plan has 100% of our students learning in person. The district has taken every step to ensure the safety of all who enter the building. 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The district's school day begins at 8:30 AM and goes until 3:00 PM. The school has two classes in each grade level, except kindergarten. Grades six through eight are departmentalized and the students switch classes. Students in grades three through five switch classes for science and social studies. Students in grade Pre Kindergarten through second stay with the same teacher throughout the day for all subjects/themes. Communication to all stakeholders are done through the district's website, which gets updated regularly. The district sends a weekly Connect Ed message (phone, email, and text) to all stakeholders. This message goes over all important news and events for the upcoming weeks. Teachers also use Classroom Dojo and well as Remind 101 to communicate to parents. The district is a Choice School currently with 36 seats. There is usually a waiting list for Choice Students. The district does not accept tuition students since it is a Choice District.
