Having the opportunity to create a mental health mural on the school walls. I was able to be fully creative with the mural and it will now be a part of School District 197 forever


### Which staff member made a lasting impact on you?

A couple of top choices have to be doing well at Speech/ Debate tournaments, watching telenovelas in Spanish class, and making new friends in all my activities


### Which staff member made a lasting impact on you?

Andrew, Dillon, and John discovered a shared passion for writing and acting, eventually leading them to produce films together. Since high school, they have collaborated on three short films and two feature films. The three filmmakers emphasize that their time in School District 197 equipped them with essential critical thinking, collaboration, time management, and leadership skills. Teachers like Mr. Guinn and Mrs. Temple had a lasting impact on their approach to film and life.

Their latest film, "Good Sport," is a satirical take on youth sports. Co-written by Andrew and Dillon and co-produced by John, it was shot in the gym at Heritage E-STEM Magnet School and other locations in West St. Paul.

# Bringing the Inside Magic to the Outside Moreland Unveils New Mural

Nearly five years ago, Moreland Arts & Health Sciences families began to dream and wonder how to showcase their school pride and bring the vibrant energy from inside the building to its exterior. The idea of creating a large-scale community mural took root. After three years of fundraising by the Moreland PTA, this spring saw the realization of that dream—aligning perfectly with this year's school magnet theme, "It's Possible."

### **Designing the Mural**

The Moreland PTA partnered with GoodSpace Murals for a school-wide residency project. The design process began in December 2023, when artist and GoodSpace owner Greta McLain held listening sessions with students and staff, asking questions like "What makes Moreland unique?" and "What does being a Moreland Monarch mean to you?" The school community also provided input about what they wanted to see in the mural. Greta crafted the design based on these ideas.

### **Making the Magic Happen**

Once the design was complete, the painting started! Greta returned in April to guide Moreland students and staff in painting the mural. GoodSpace Murals uses an indirect technique where murals are painted on canvas sheets before being installed on the wall. This paint-by-numbers approach allowed everyone to contribute to the mural's creation, fostering a sense of belonging and community.

The community was also invited to help paint the mural at a community paint party. Hundreds of people attended Moreland's community painting party. Rotary Club members, grandparents, city officials, and neighbors all showed up to help contribute to the community art project.

### It's Possible

During the last two weeks of school, the mural was installed like permanent wallpaper, ensuring its longevity of at least 20 years. Then, on the last day of school, Moreland celebrated the unveiling of the new mural—complete with singing, speeches, and even a freeze-pop toast to what can be accomplished when we work together.











**Student Reflections** 

We asked the students featured in the mural what they thought about it, and here's what some of them had to say:

**Nicholas, first grade, on why the mural is important:** "When you look at the mural, at yourself, it looks like you are looking at a mirror... It makes my heart happy."

Rayaan, second grade, on what her favorite part of the process was: "When we painted it together as a whole school in the art room. [That was my favorite] because the kids made it and grown-ups usually make it all the time."



Moreland students are not just residents of this community; they are integral parts of it. Their involvement in painting this mural fosters a sense of belonging and pride in their surroundings."

Alexa, fourth grade, on why the mural is important: "It's an arts school, and the mural adds to that [feeling]. Moreland is a very special school to me and the mural makes Moreland more special in its own way."

# Back-to-School Guide for the 2024-25 School Year

As we prepare for the start of the school year, our calendars and to-do lists fill up quickly with important tasks and dates. Here is a condensed list of resources and information to help you navigate everything from school meals to important upcoming events. Make sure to click the QR code for the full guide.





### Meet and Greet Orientations

Each school hosts meet-and-greets and/or orientations at the beginning of the school year to welcome students and families. These events provide an opportunity to meet teachers, staff, and fellow classmates, tour the school, receive important information about the upcoming year, and get excited for the year ahead.

### Application for Educational Benefits

While all students will receive free breakfast and lunch during the school year, it remains critical that all families complete an Application for Educational Benefits each school year. These applications determine how much funding your child's school receives for educational programs and supports. Additionally, eligible families can qualify for other benefits.

### **School Meals**

Every student will receive one free complete breakfast meal and one complete lunch meal each school day. If your student wants seconds, just a milk, or à la carte items, they will need money in their account.

### **Transportation**

Previously registered students will be automatically rolled forward to the new year. Only new students or those with address, daycare, or bus service changes need to register. Registered students should have received a card in the mail with their current information. If you need to register, please do so by August 1.

### **Fall Activities**

Registration for fall high school athletics and activities opened on July 1. The fall high school sports season starts on August 12. Registration for fall middle school athletics opens on August 1, and practices will start after the school year begins. Sports physicals are required and good for three years—make sure you have yours ready when you register.
