



CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION / EARLY COLLEGE

Byron Area High School has had **Early College partnerships for** several years. Our current partners include the University of Michigan Flint and Baker College Owosso. Through the Shiawassee Early College Program we also partner with Lansing Community College and Mott Community College. This past year, 30% of upperclassmen, including six fifth-year students, took one or more college classes, at little to no cost to their families. This year's 5th year students earned 311 credits over their last three years. In 2024/25, 34% of the juniors and seniors will be taking college classes.

Students participating in **Career** & Technical Education programs, at either the Shiawassee College & Career Readiness Center or the Genesee Career Institute. represented 16% of the 11th and 12th graders. The residents



adding more sections of the current programs as well as a Heavy Equipment program. Twenty-five percent of our juniors and seniors will be participating in these CTE programs in the fall.

In addition to the above programs, upperclassmen may work and earn high school credit for that. The State of Michigan requires the job to be within the student's individual career pathway. In 2023/24, 7% of seniors did this.

Byron High School takes pride in acknowledging our 2024 CTE award recipients, Laine Freidel (Machine Tool) and Karsyn Dix (Agriscience), who were recognized at a countywide CTE Award Ceremony this past Spring.

been a nursing position in the school district, and the job was really mine to create and make my own. While I have been a registered nurse for 25 years, all of that time had been spent in a hospital setting. I was excited to see what could be accomplished in a community environment, one that I lived in, and in a school district that my kids had attended and several of my grandkids are currently enrolled in.

With the support of the building principals and our superintendent, we were able to put several new programs in place that have already had a positive impact on our students and staff.

In the elementary school, we initiated a program through **Michigan Model for Health** with









weekly lessons in all kindergarten through fifth grade classrooms. We've had lessons on a variety of topics from healthy eating, encouraging healthy sleep patterns, what to expect at the doctor's and dentist's office, good handwashing and hygiene practices and safety at home. In our older students' classes, we've also spent time talking about dangerous substances they could soon become exposed to, and ways to avoid unhealthy habits.

The focus of health education in our middle and high schools has been on vaping, drug and alcohol awareness. During National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week, Ms. Smith (our high school counselor) and


I put together a week's worth of activities and prizes for the kids to help encourage healthy choices. The response was overwhelmingly positive and we hope to make it an annual event. I have also been able to help Mr. Ladd with 9th grade health classes, as well as time spent talking with the middle schoolers to encourage them to decrease their intake of caffeine laden energy drinks.

In all of our buildings, we were able to restock and upgrade our emergency equipment and supplies. We formed two **Medical Emergency Response Teams** with volunteers from our staff and held training sessions to teach our teams what to do in the event of a cardiac or medical emergency.

And yet, there is so much still to do, and so much to look forward to. In between cleaning up scrapes, taking temperatures and consoling little ones with sore throat and bee stings, I am always wondering what project I should tackle next. I love being a part of this school district. I love getting to know the students, and I am excited about what the future holds for us at Byron Area Schools.
