## CONGRATULATIONS! FDR Class of 2024 moves on to the next stage



FDR saw 280 students graduate during the annual commencement ceremony on June 21 where they were recognized for their academic efforts and the ability to power through challenging situations.

Valedictorian Delaney Jarvis noted that the Class of 2024 began high school when COVID-19 was still raging across the world, but this only made them stronger as people. When it comes to the future, Jarvis told her fellow graduates that no matter how much someone influences them, they have the final say in their life choices.

"We are all immensely powerful since we, as individuals, are the only ones that can define our life and destiny," Jarvis said. "Throughout life, you will always face hardships, but those hardships are opportunities to find ourselves."

Peter Buttitta, FDR social studies teacher and track and field coach, was this year's commencement speaker who encouraged students to defy the odds and push past the limits of their potential. He noted how the United States Men's Hockey team beat the Soviet Union team during the 1980 Winter Olympics when it seemed impossible.

#### **North Park**


The moving up ceremony on June 24 was a celebration of 87 fifth graders who will be missed, but are ready for the next step in their educational journey.

CTI Principal Nick Millas informed graduating students that CTI's goal is to give them the tools to gain entry-level employment, but to also raise the bar once their foot is in the door.

"Our vision here is to turn out a workforce and not just workers, but good citizens, good community members, people who care about where they live, where they work," Millas said. "I think the representation in this room speaks to that."
