

A MINDSET SHIFT

Schools that implement restorative practices into their systems and culture show a significant improvement in school climate and a decrease in behavior incidents. This session makes a case for shifting away from a punitive focus on punishment to a restorative one centered on repairing harm and strengthening relationships.



STRATEGIES FOR BUILDING A RESTORATIVE CULTURE

Restorative Practices create a foundation of trust in schools. Experience two restorative strategies you can use to improve communication between yourself and students as you work towards building a restorative culture at your site.



AUTHENTIC CONSEQUENCES

Schools often respond to wrongdoing with punishment, but this is not the most effective way to address harmful or disruptive behavior. In this session, you will learn how authentic consequences can lead to improved relationships and lasting behavior change.



BUILDING COMMUNITY THROUGH CIRCLES

How would you describe the power dynamic between teachers and students at your site? Restorative Practices strengthen relationships by creating a different power dynamic in schools. One way this is done is through Circles. In this session, you will explore the elements of Circles and run one of your own.



SCAFFOLDING FOR LANGUAGE LEARNERS: FIGURING OUT WHAT TO SCAFFOLD

THE SECRET LANGUAGE OF POWER



Visible Thinking, Invisible Teaching: Student-Centered DISCOURSE AND THE ART OF PARAPHRASING

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
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
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
