BUDGET REMAINS WITHIN TAX CAP AT 0.94%

WHILE PRESERVING AND ENHANCING PROGRAMS

To My Fellow Community Members, Taxpayers and Parents:

Maintaining a commitment to comply with the state's tax levy cap, the Board of Education has proposed a budget that will provide excellent value for the East Islip community. It offers options for our children and the smallest tax levy increase in years of just 0.94 percent (equaling \$647,397) over the current rate.

All of the essential elements of an East Islip education that the community deserves and expects – strong, enriched academic, music and art programs as well as sports and clubs – remain intact. This will help to continue our ascendancy as an outstanding district that provides a sound foundation for the college and career success of its students.

Diligent effort and judicious management of fund balances have enabled us to present a budget that reflects one of the lowest tax levy caps on Long Island. It delivers cost savings both now and for the future, offering a proposed budget of \$110,785,649 for 2014-2015.

The district has studied enrollment trends and student needs, and has explored staffing with a keen eye while making adjustments where necessary and prudent. By doing so, we realized more than \$1 million in reductions. A carefully planned restructuring of the four elementary school


buildings, reorganizing them geographically into two K-2 schools (Connetquot and Timber Point) and two 3-5 schools (Ruth C. Kinney and John F. Kennedy) with universal pre-kindergarten on both ends, will not only save \$450,000 for the district, but will avoid raising class sizes. The adjustment of transportation start times also enabled the district to save more than \$300,000.

Building utilization has also driven savings by increasing revenue, most notably the rental of the Early Childhood Center. The five-year lease on the ECC, which begins in August 2014, will yield \$79,000 in revenues

for 2014-2015 with escalating rental revenue in the next four years. This too will help to stabilize and improve financial fitness.

Our schools remain exemplary, aided by a strong tradition of community involvement. The district remains proactive in ensuring that both student achievement and the array

Message from the SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Parents and Community Residents:

We are proud to present a 2014-2015 budget that supports East Islip's students, their families and the taxpayers in our community in a holistic way. Facilitated by teamwork and long-term thinking, this budget remains within the state's tax levy cap and increases by only 0.94 percent, confirming our fiscal responsibility to the district's residents. At the same time, the proposed budget not only maintains all of our current top-rated offerings in music, art, athletics, clubs and activities, but augments them by restoring dearly missed programs (from middle school robotics to third-grade music and sixth-grade foreign language).


Our goal is to continue the renaissance of East Islip as a top-notch academic district whose students are fully prepared and provided all the needed tools and experiences to succeed. College and career readiness remains at the forefront, a focus that reflects the impressive achievements of our students as they rise through the grade levels. Last year alone, our seniors were awarded more than \$6 million in scholarship monies and were accepted into dozens of prestigious post-secondary colleges and universities. Of these graduates, 97 percent received Regents-endorsed diplomas and 91 percent continued their education.

Adding to our three successful, nationally recognized Career Academy programs at the high school, a new fourth Culinary Arts and Hospitality Academy will debut this fall, one of many ways in which the district is proactively guiding students to success in burgeoning careers in today's demanding job world. In addition, the proposed budget will enable us to add two new Advanced Placement courses in psychology and music theory, providing more options for our students to excel and challenge themselves.

We have made it a top priority to ensure that resources are available to inform voters. Extensive budget information and presentations regarding the proposed 2014-2015 budget can be found on the district's website, www.eischools.org, in the Budget section under the District tab.

Q: What is the difference between the tax levy and the tax rate?

A: The tax levy is the amount of money requested from the Town of Islip by the Board of Education to balance the budget after state aid and other revenues are considered. The Board does not set the tax rate, which is a function of the assessed value of properties, and determined by the town assessor through valuation of properties in the town. The state's tax levy limit does not apply to the tax rate or an individual tax bill, but solely to the tax levy of the school district.

Q: How will New York State's new tax freeze affect the budget and taxpayers?

A: For school districts like East Islip, whose proposed budgets remain at or below the state's tax levy cap, homeowners who are eligible for the income-based STAR exemption may receive offsetting rebate checks from the government for the amount of money that their school taxes rose. To determine if you are eligible for this tax benefit, check our website in the future for more details.

Q: If New York State's Smart Schools Bond Act passes, will it impact East Islip?

A. This \$2 billion bond act for New York State schools, once approved by general election voters in November, would fund education project enhancements in areas such as classroom technology, safety initiatives and pre-kindergarten classroom construction as well as infrastructure improvements for high-speed broadband.

Q: What happens if the proposed budget is defeated and a contingency budget results?

A: If voters reject the proposed budget on May 20, it can be presented for one more vote before July. If the Board of Education does not opt for a revote, it can immediately adopt a contingency budget, which by the New York State tax cap law, would require the district to operate with a zero percent tax levy increase. If the district proposes a second budget and that is also defeated, the district must, by law, adopt at a zero percent increase. Such a contingency budget would force reductions from the proposed budget in such areas as staff, nonmandated student programs, athletics, clubs and the community's use of facilities.





Voter Registration Books Inspection

The register will be open for inspection at the district clerk's office upon completion and on the five days prior to the budget vote and election, during regular business hours and on Saturday, May 17, 2014 between the hours of 11 a.m. and 12 p.m.

Absentee Ballots

Applications for absentee ballots may be made at the district clerk's office. Such applications must be received by the district clerk at least seven days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or by the day before the vote if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.

A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available in the district clerk's office on the five days prior to the day of the vote during business hours. In order to be canvassed, an absentee voter's ballot must be in the district clerk's office by 5 p.m. on May 20, 2014.
