The basketball had more mass, so the basketball was harder to get from one person to another without adding more force to their pushes


Another example that they gave was including a tennis ball in a soccer ball. First they dropped the soccer ball and the tennis

#### 'Stars and Stripes Forever' Wows the Crowd at Willow Grove!

Note: This essay is part of an annual contest sponsored by the Mohegan Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The DAR sponsors the

essay contest to promote interest in American history. The topic this year is a newspaper account of the first performance of John Philip Sousa's "The Stars and Stripes Forever". This is 7th grader Gabby Cordero's newspaper account, acting as a reporter for the Philadelphia Times newspaper.

It was a hot, sunny day in Willow Grove Park on May 14<sup>th</sup>, 1897, earlier this month. The statue of George Washington was being unveiled by President William McKinley. While kids were going on rides, parents were watching the show, so

there was an activity for the whole family. This day, as the president unveiled the statue of George Washington, a new song came upon the crowd at Willow Grove Park: "Stars and Stripes Forever." This song is a marching band song first performed by the Marine Marching Band. John Phillip Sousa was the conductor of the Marine Band, and they were the most respected band of all military bands. You have to give him some credit because that must take hard work and dedication by Sousa.

The Marine Band is the United States' oldest active professional musical organization, formed around 1798. The band's first ever conductor was William Farr. The Marine Band con-

ductors were rarely acknowledged, and recognized until the amazing work of John Phillip Sousa

Sousa was conductor of his own civilian band, and is now conductor of the Marine Marching Band. Sousa was a member of the Marine Marching Band until 1880 when he became the conductor of the band. This is when the Marine Marching Band became the most respected military band, but they only became most respected under Sousa's leadership.

Sousa was nicknamed the "March King" because of all his well-known marches. The "Washington Post March" is one of my favorites. He also formed his own civilian band in 1892. He traveled around the country. This made him even more well known than he was already. You must be thinking, "Wow he's so famous already. How would he get even more popularity?" I'll tell you but keep in mind that his best was only yet to come.

Sousa was on tour with his civilian band in 1896 when he heard that his music promoter died. He was devastated and took the first ship home to

Washington D.C with his wife. As he and his wife washington D.C with his whe. As he and his whe were heading home, he was pacing up and down the ship thinking to himself, when he suddenly imagined a melody of "a mental band" playing "Stars and Stripes Forever over and over in his head. When he got back, he started missing his time conducting the Marine band and watching the American flor fly over the White House. He noticed how can flag fly over the White House. He noticed how every state he visited, flags differed from America's and how in his imagination the United States flag seemed to be "the biggest grandest flag in the world and I could not get back under it quick enough". Sousa was inspired by his memories of the flag flying over the White House as "Stars and Stripes Forever" was created.

He stated, "he couldn't rest" until he wrote it down and on Christmas Day, 1896, he finally did. When it was completed, "the feeling of impatience passed away" and I was content to

rest peacefully until the ship had docked and I was once more under the folds of the grand old flag of our country."

In 1897, his band set out on a national tour and his band started by play-

ing "Stars and Stripes Forever" in a few small towns. So even though May 14<sup>th</sup> is known as the first performance of this song, it really was one of the first few. So, when they played it, the audience loved it! The audience loved it so much, they were cheering over the performance and asking for an encore. One of the local news papers stated, "stirring enough to rouse the American eagle from his crag and set him to shriek exultantly while he hurls his arrows at the aurora borealis.'

Ever since the performance, every time the band performs, it's requested. Some peo-ple have said if they don't play it, the band will probably be tarred and feathered and run out of town.

While it is surprising, there are many food options made with blood (not invented by Dracula)! Maybe more than you

realized. So, here are some dishes with blood in them that you could try!

Blood tofu

Served in countries such as China, Thailand, and Vietnam, blood tofu is coagulated blood of a duck, cow, chicken, or • goose. Once it is coagulated, it is cut into squares.

Blood sausages

Blood sausages are well. . .sausages made from blood, as well as other fillings. Blood sausages have been made by many cultures for thousands of years. One well known example is

black pudding, from the United Kingdom. It's made with pig's blood and grain.
Other types of blood sausage are:

*Biroldo*, from Italy, which is made with either



cow's or pig's blood with nuts and raisins.

Morcilla, from Spain, made with pig's blood, rice and onions.

Drisheen.from Ireland, made with sheep's blood, spices, cream, and grains

*Verivorst*, from Estonia, made with pig's blood, flour, and rye. (It can also be served with sour cream

Gyurma, from Tibet, made with yak's blood with or without extra fillings.

Other dishes made with blood Some French sauces are made with blood:

Ratha Poriyal, lamb blood with spices and meat from India

Dinuguan, a Filipino stew made with chicken. pork, or beef blood.

A lot of blood stews, including Czernina from Poland, Tiet Canh from Vietnam (both made

with duck blood), Svartsoppa from Sweden (goose blood) and Haejangguk from Korea (ox blood)
