A New Playspace in the Woods

Pardon the dust – big fun is on the way!

This summer, Beanstalk Builders is constructing our Lower School creekside playground.

The team at Beanstalk specializes in engineering accessible playgrounds and aerial parks that foster an appreciation for the natural world. The platforms they're building are made from strong (and sweet-smelling!) black and honey locust wood. Inspired by sketches from our Lower School students, the design will include intricate, spider-web netting woven beneath the structures.

We recognize the importance of play in the daily rhythms of our Lower School students, and can't wait to see their reactions when they return and see this wooded wonderland in August.

WE & THEE | SUMMER 2024



One of the goals identified in our last strategic plan, *The Dream That Drives Us*, was to provide our students with "a learning environment for the students of the future, now." In addition to staffing and programmatic resources, this includes examining our physical spaces and their ability to meet the needs of our vibrant, whole-child education. Across our three campuses, it has long been known that the area most in need is our Upper School, where the original log cabin building requires extensive updates.

In last winter's issue of We & Thee. we outlined how we had selected Ellen Weinstein and Andy Goolsby of withArchitecture to assist us with our holistic Main Campus planning process, which has included seeking and receiving feedback from current and former families. students. and staff. We are excited to announce that late this spring, the Board of Trustees approved proceeding with a reimagined Main Campus plan that will improve pedestrian walkways, and vehicle safety, create outdoor learning labs, and create new Upper School facilities across the creek from the current configuration. A group of Upper School students this past year served on a planning committee that worked with Ellen and Andy.

The students were asked to think about what environments help them learn best (including lighting, seating, sound, and more), what features make activities during a typical school week easier, and what their greatest hopes and dreams for new facilities might be.

Over the summer, the architectural team will begin synthesizing feedback to create conceptual drawings for new Upper School facilities that will be reviewed in the fall. Student and staff feedback will be prioritized in the continued discovery and discernment process. We're excited to examine how to both carefully steward our financial and environmental resources and be able to provide our incredible community of teachers and learners with new spaces ones that will accentuate the strengths of our program and help take it even further, for generations to come.

CREATING LEARNING PATHWAYS

Updates on Our Curricular Review

When people step into one of our classrooms for the first time, they often speak of how different the educational experience looks and feels. Deeply relational, connected to the outdoors, and child-centered choices inform our teaching. As a learning community we have been working to make the choices that ground our work more visible.

The creation of the Director of Curriculum position in 2022, filled by Lisa Wilson Carboni, has provided teaching staff with a point person who will listen to curriculum challenges and aspirations and help figure out solutions on an individual and collective level. Lisa says the process so far has "lifted up and made evident the tremendous depth of curricular expertise and knowledge that our staff have" and "provided the means for continuing to accomplish that work with even more intention and support."

With support from our Head Teachers and Assistant Head for Teaching and Learning John Sharon, our teaching staff has made incredible progress in both articulating learning objectives and more intentionally building learning pathways—from year to year and from Early to Upper Schools. We now have "Understand, Know, Do" (UKD) documents for each age level that have been created by teaching staff over the past few years. Throughout the past year, time has been set aside for meetings within and across units to examine the UKDs and to discuss what materials and curricular resources are needed to strengthen and support our teaching. We're excited to share some of the latest developments in this ongoing process.

Science of Reading

Teachers have delved deeply into studying the "science of reading," a collection of cognitive science research that lays a path for best practices in teaching reading and writing. Our use of the Fundations phonics and phonemic awareness curriculum was widened to include even the youngest Early School learners, making it a progressive strategy throughout the Early and Lower Schools. The progress continues to refine curriculum in order to incorporate new understandings of reading comprehension and vocabulary development. Teachers have implemented a new phonics curriculum across the Early Schools and Lower School and piloted materials to support new understandings of reading comprehension. They have loved seeing the students' enthusiasm for Fundations and their playful acquisition of knowledge.

In addition, all Lower School classroom teachers have now participated in a yearlong professional development opportunity on the science of reading through either the Hill Center or The Knowledge Gap.

Subject Area Explorations

Middle and Upper School teaching staff have worked in subject area groupings including visual and performing arts, social studies, language arts, modern languages, science, and social-emotional learning to examine curricular alignment and progression, identify goals, and discuss ways to expand or deepen learning. For some, this has included identifying ways to fill in learning gaps and create supporting structures for students. For others, it has involved asking for and receiving additional teaching staff or restructured roles and responsibilities to allow for more elective courses or dedicated subject area teaching.

Even as staff ask for and receive curricular resources, Director of Curriculum Lisa Wilson Carboni says "our curriculum is not canned. We're still relying on the professional expertise of teachers to be curious, integrate knowledge and adapt the materials for classroom use." Lisa is also excited about the coming school year, when staff will have access to the documented learning objectives for each course available in TODDLE, a learning management system. She points out that this will make the documentation more visible and integrated into daily work, saying "I think we will get to an even greater level of quality by attaching the UKDs into the classroom management system in that way."

Sara Orphanides Durham Early School Lead Teacher

Sara has successfully completed the inaugural Racial Justice in Early Math Education Fellowship, a collaboration between Erikson Institute and the University of Illinois Chicago. Through this fellowship, Sara developed a robust understanding of racial justice in early math, implemented racial justice centered teaching practices in her classroom, participated in mentorship and peer support, and contributed to a growing understanding of how early math teaching can further the cause of racial justice. In June, Sara traveled to Chicago for the first National Meeting of Racial Justice in Early Math Education.




Lisa Wilson Carboni Director of Curriculum




MY LOVE FOR YOU WILL STILL BE STRONG by Nathan Kotecki




THIS ONE WILD AND PRECIOUS LIFE by Sarah Wilson

SHINING BRIGHT ON THE SUPER BOWL STAGE

For the past two decades, **Erick Walls '98** has been strumming his guitar alongside some of the industry's biggest stars. His impressive résumé includes two Grammys, an Emmy nomination, and collaborations with Toni Braxton, Alicia Keys, Beyoncé, John Legend, and many more. Following his electrifying performance at the 2024 Super Bowl halftime show with Usher, our community relations coordinator, Camille Berry, caught up with Erick and asked him about how his formative years at Carolina Friends School have been instrumental in shaping his remarkable musical career.

What do you remember most about your time at Carolina Friends School?

Back during my time at Carolina Friends School, there was a space called the "Music House." My advisor, Kris Whitenack—who is a great friend of mine today—taught classes there that changed my life. He really encouraged me to be creative, and taught me that music could be a creative outlet. I was given so much freedom to explore and express myself.

It makes me wonder what you'd be doing today if the Music House hadn't been there to enable you to experiment and explore!

Exactly! When I arrived at Carolina Friends in middle school, I was young and trying to figure out who I was and what I liked. The support of the whole Carolina Friends School community was so positive and unlike anything I'd experienced in a school setting before. It built me up. As I took music production classes and received encouragement, I remember thinking, "Wow, this is really something I could pursue professionally."

Tell us a little bit about your journey after you graduated.

After Carolina Friends School, I attended Berklee College [a renowned music conservatory] in Massachusetts. I was there at the same time as some really well-known, fantastic musicians today, like John Mayer and Esperanza Spalding. That's where I made a ton of valuable connections.

How did you make the decision to move to the West Coast?

I'd always enjoyed reading album credits and noticed that a lot of music I liked was being made out in California. Of course, I thought about staying on the East Coast, but I just got the sense that California was where I was meant to be.

So, I moved to California on a Wednesday, and one of my buddies from Berklee invited me to do my first gig that Friday. That one opportunity—just three days into living in LA—was literally my introduction to the "who's who" within the music business.

Speaking of the "who's who," congrats again on playing the Super Bowl halftime show with Usher!

Thank you so much. I try to never lose perspective because younger me would daydream about the things I'm doing now. This is a dream come true. And I try to understand the blessing of it all.

There were a lot of Carolina Friends School community members cheering for you that night, so you certainly made an impact on the people here! What lesson from CFS has had a lasting impact on you?


One, Carolina Friends School prepared me for the world. I was introduced to people from different cultures and backgrounds and learned that there is a common thread between all humans. Educational settings aren't all the same. There's a difference between memorizing information about a topic versus really understanding it and digging deeper into its context and backstory.


