

What is WASC?

WASC stands for Western Association of Schools and Colleges. "WASC accreditation is a process schools use to monitor student learning and set school improvement goals. The Accrediting Commission of Schools (ASC) WASC accreditation is an ongoing cycle of quality" (www.acswasc.org). In addition to fostering ongoing improvement of the school's programs and operations to support student learning, accreditation validates the integrity of the school's program and transcripts which are important for college acceptance.

Is Coachella Valley High School accredited?

YES! CVHS is accredited through June 2030. The school and staff have made great progress and will continue to strive to improve student achievement.


When is the WASC Visiting Committee coming to review the school and who is coming?

We will have a mid-cycle, one day visit, in school year 2025-2026. In 2030, the Visiting Committee normally consists of seven (7) educators from California. They will arrive midday on a Sunday and complete their visit by the end of the day on Wednesday to provide the school community a review of their findings.

How are CVHS and the District ensuring the visits goes well?

- CVHS English and Math teachers have developed courses of study that align with Common Core Standards and Science teachers are making shifts towards Next Generation Science Standards. This work was already underway and we appreciate everyone's hard work and dedication!
- Teachers are collaborating and working together to continually improve their practice with a focus on learning during Wednesday Collaboration Days.
- The District has committed resources including training for all teachers in student engagement, rigor and relevance in addition to professional learning teams, Common Core Standards, funding for collaboration and professional development, data collection, and coordination of educational services.






Community involvement in the CVHS Strategic Plan process has been fantastic

How are the Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) goals and WASC related?

WASC is looking for an ongoing, long term plan to continuously improve student learning and the school. They also want to see how school goals are connected to the community. SPSA goals are mirrored in our new WASC Schoolwide Action Plan. Students, families, staff and community members have given valuable input into a vision for school experiences that promote authentic collaboration and real-world learning. Together, we identified enduring qualities that will enable all our students to flourish in life. These Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) are referred to as the CVHS Graduate Profile. The action plan describes what we will do and how we will measure impact on student achievement. We will regularly review our plans, including qualitative and quantitative data analysis, and make adjustments when needed. This is a snapshot of the CVHS Strategic Plan and WASC Goals:



- Decrease credit deficiency rate and increase GPA averages yearly until June 2027.
- Improve school climate by increasing student awareness and practice of appropriate school behaviors.





- Increase communication and opportunities for parent involvement in all school activities including students' academic progress and the WASC process.
- 4. Continue to build upon professional development training which will strengthen the PLC process and practices to include analyzing data in order to modify instructional and assessment practices to guide instruction and provide interventions to support all students.
- 5. Through the current use of PLCs and Learning Walks, CVHS should normalize the level of rigor in all subjects through implementing research-based best practices for student engagement, such as the current use of CVHS's Literacy Cycle and Academic Discourse, as guided by common formative assessment analysis and data-informed instruction.


What will happen when the Visiting Committee tours CVHS?

Additional WASC Background

- In December 2002 UC faculty approved a policy that requires all California public and private high schools to be WASC-accredited (or a candidate for accreditation) in order to establish and/or maintain an "a-g" course list.
- Accreditation is required with respect to the Cal Grants.
- The WASC/CDE (California Department of Education) process serves as the basis for the Single Plan for Student Achievement.
- Colleges and universities examine transcripts to determine if the students have attended accredited institutions.
- Teachers will not receive credit for the years during which they taught at a non-accredited school by many schools/districts nationwide. WASC receives calls from school personnel who are recruiting applicants for teaching positions with respect to their prior schools of employment.
- The military recruiters expect the applicants to be from accredited schools.
- Many districts have policies to accept credits only from WASC accredited schools or schools accredited by other regionals with whom WASC has reciprocal agreements.
