Campus rules posted at all Lower Dauphin schools

At the start of the 2022-23 school year, the school board approved the administration's recommendation to close school campuses during the school day.

"We've had situations on campus where joggers were using the track during physical education classes or private individuals wanted to use the tennis courts during team practices," said Superintendent Rob Schultz. "Those are educational spaces – just like if someone would want to come into the building and use a classroom or the

gymnasium."

Under the new campus rules, only visitors with official business will be permitted on school property during the school day and will be required to check in at the main entrance for a visitor's pass. Other persons on campus with no legitimate purpose will be asked to leave and those refusing to do so may be charged with defiant trespass.

At each campus, signs will clearly indicate that smoking, vaping and use of tobacco is

prohibited. There will be no skateboarding or scooters on campus. Pets will be prohibited with the exception of service animals.

The signs will also explain that parking is permitted in marked spaces only and violators may be towed.

"There's nothing in these campus rules that should come as a surprise," Dr. Schultz said. "By getting approval from the board to post signs at all campus entrances, we simply want to delineate our expectations of behavior for visitors and guests on school property."



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Waters named National Merit Finalist

Lower Dauphin High School senior Tobias Waters was recently named a finalist in the National Merit Scholarship Program, bringing him one step closer to consideration for 7,250 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million.

Toby is the son of Pam and David Waters. He is a four-year member of the boys' volleyball team and a three-year member of the French National Honor Society, the Quiz Bowl team and Student Council. He is a two-year member of the Science National Honor Society, Math Honor Society, History Honor Society and Computer Science Honor Society, where he serves as treasurer. Toby is a member of the Chess Club and Mini-THON. He also plays club volleyball and participates in academic events including Rubik's Cube competitions.

In September he was named semifinalist and approximately half of the finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar title. Also earning recognition were Lower Dauphin seniors Shannon Angerer, Audrey Meyers, Abigail Nissley and Abrianna Nissley, who joined 34,000 students nationwide as Commended Students.

LDFD provides opportunities for students

Close to 190 educational support grants have been funded by the Lower Dauphin Falcon Foundation since its inception in 2006. These grants enhance educational opportunities in district classrooms allowing for students' horizons to be expanded.

Among the projects funded by the Foundation in the past two years are robotics kits in multiple buildings, a climbing wall at Londonderry Elementary School, and activity kits to reinforce science, technology, engineering, art and math concepts in third grade at East Hanover Elementary School.

The grant funding totals more than \$118,000 since 2006 and is supported through community donations and special events. For example, the recent Falcon Fling, held January 28, raised more than \$20,000 thanks to our sponsors and attendees, including event sponsor Capital Blue Cross.

With the support of LDFD grant funds and the use of Educational Improvement Tax Credits, the district was able to support a summer camp at the middle school the past two years, allowing 150 students each year to participate in one-week camps ranging from roller coaster building to digital photography.

Sixth-graders complete DARE program

"If you have the choice to do something nice for somebody, go ahead and do it," was the advice former Hummelstown Police Chief Bill Ryan had for the 304 students attending DARE graduation in November.

Ryan was the guest speaker at the event which celebrated the students' finishing the Drug Awareness Resistance Education curriculum. When he was an officer with the Hummelstown Police Department, he brought the DARE program to Lower Dauphin Middle School in the 1996-97 school year and taught DARE classes for nearly 15 years.

The DARE classes at the middle school are now taught by School Resource Officer Josh Martin in cooperation with health teachers. And while the curriculum has changed over the years, the message of staying free from alcohol and substance abuse and making good decisions remains.

Sixth-grader Helena Yoder talked about using the DARE decision-making strategies to make good choices. She explained that DARE taught her to Define the problem, Assess what to do, Respond with a good decision, and then Evaluate how that decision worked.

Bennett Sullivan echoed her remarks saying, "I plan to use what I learned in DARE to think before I act so I will not be in a bad or dangerous circumstance."

Martin agreed that the curriculum allows students to slow down and evaluate situations they may face and give them a great tool to help them make good choices.

"Taking time to stop and think – that can make all the difference sometimes," he said.

As the games got underway, all the athletes recited the Special Olympics Oath led by athlete Ruslan Burden, "Let me win. But if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt."
