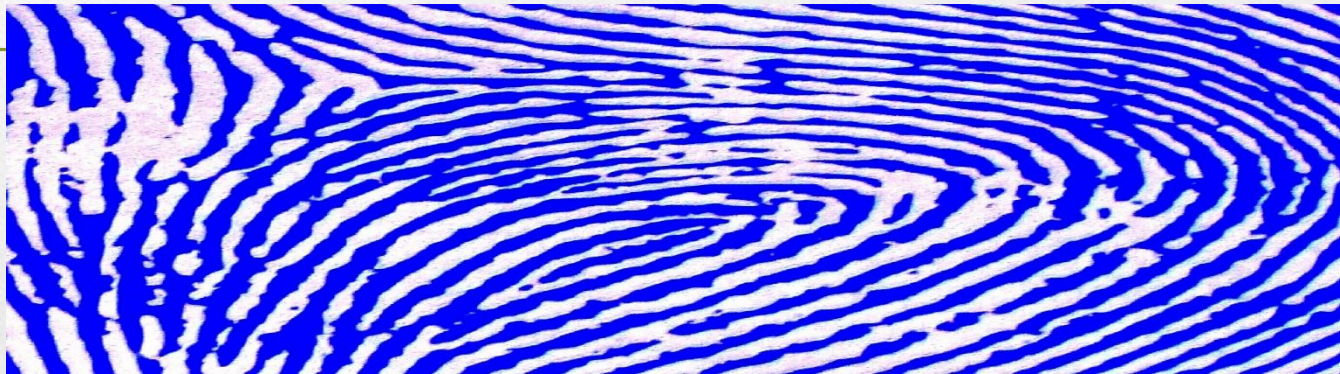

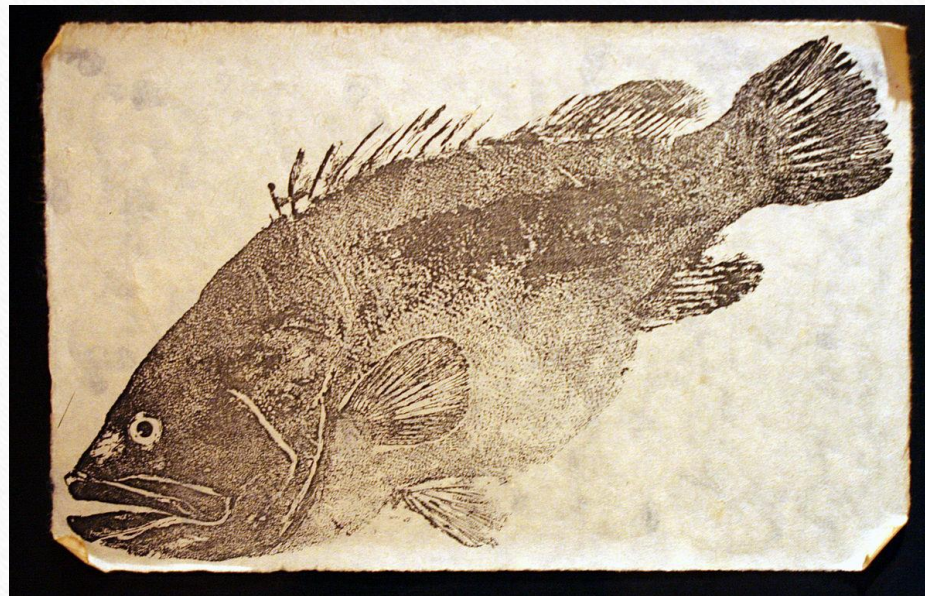




# What is a monoprint?

A monoprint is a print that can only be made once, unlike most printmaking which allows for multiple prints.

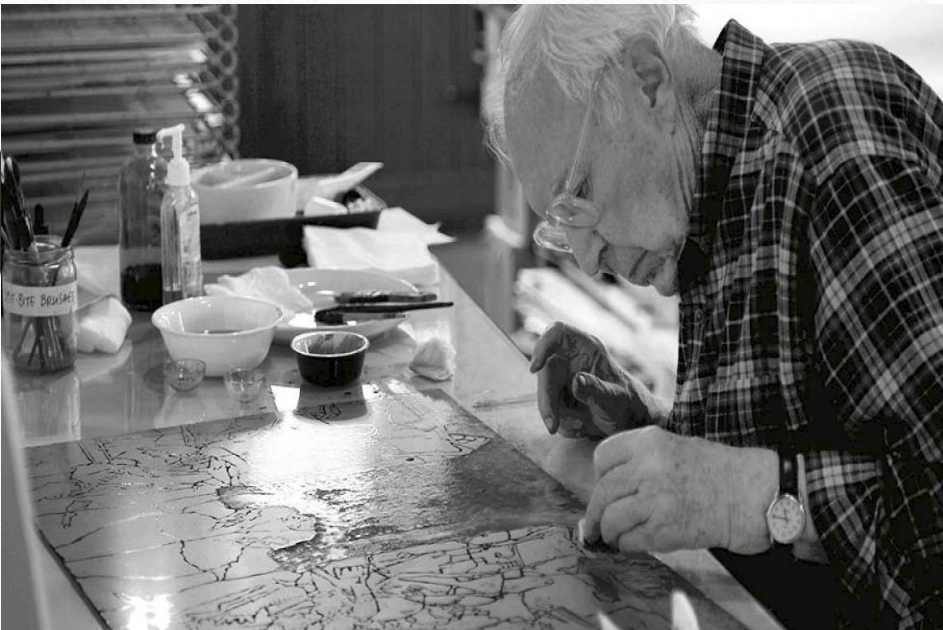
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# Famous artist Jasper Johns

“He is the greatest living printmaker. No doubt about that,” says Jennifer L. Roberts, a professor of art history at Harvard University. Printmakers have to think backwards—they have to be able to imagine things in reverse.





For this lesson you will create a  

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**monoprint.** Supplies needed are:

plastic baggies, plastic bag(any size), or aluminum foil.

Markers(any size)

spray bottle with water(can sprinkle with water in you do not have one)

white paper (any size)

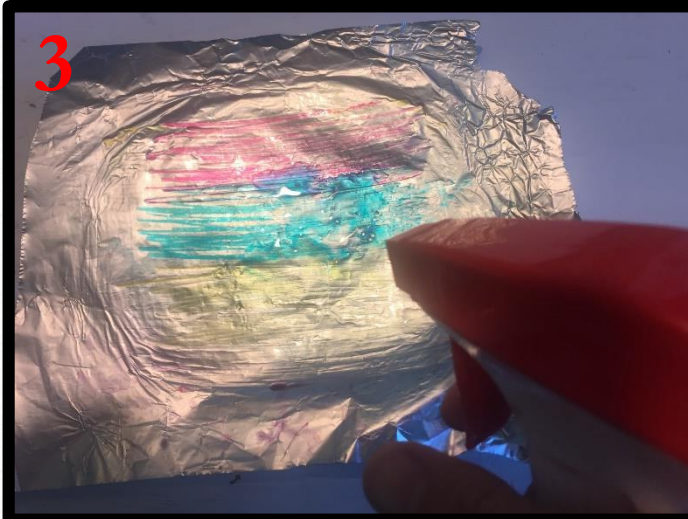
# Directions



1. Set up supplies.
2. Color bag/foil with markers(choose colors that go well together ex. warm or cool colors)
3. Spray bag/foil with water.
4. Turn over white paper and press into colors on bag/foil. Turn over and wala! You have a print.
5. Color again and repeat.
