

When the baseball program was started in 1985, I became the Head Coach (1985-2000). Highlights of that period were 220 wins, 112 losses, a W.P.I.A.L. Championship (1994) and a P.I.A.A. State Championship (1995). I was named Coach of The Year three times.

I have been a P.I.A.A. basketball official for 35 years.

I am married (Martha) and have four children (David, Kathleen, Michael and James) and four grandchildren (Francesca and Talia Florie and Ethan and Rylan Graves).

My purpose of teaching, coaching and life is based on Proverb 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he or she should go and when he or she is old they will not turn from it."



Then Seneca Valley High School came into being and I moved to teaching their special needs students, coaching football and track and became a trainer for all sports. Often my day started at 5 am and ended at midnight. I went on the road with teams that had athletes with injuries and did training sessions on Saturdays and Sundays after church. With the help of many, I was able to start a Work Experience Program for Special Needs Students, Fellowship of Christian Athletes Program, Drug and Alcohol Awareness Program for Students and my wife and I took abused students into our home. I wanted them all to get an education and be able to deal with life's lessons.

I would like to thank my family: Nancy L. Lane, my wife, supporter and life partner, James A. Lane, Jeffrey T. Lane and Tony, my grandson, Kristen M. Lane, Captain and Mrs. Block, granddaughter Bella and another grandson due in May.

My wife and I are short-term missionaries to the Ukraine to help orphanages. My wife is a quilter and I am a horticulturist at Brookgreen Gardens. We are active at Timberlake Baptist Church in doing God's work here and overseas.

Norman McMurray Program Supporter

Norman McMurray was born January 4th, 1928 in Oakdale, Pennsylvania. He attended Cecil School District and joined the Navy at the age of 17. Norman served four years in the Philippines during World War II. When he returned to the Pittsburgh area, he began driving truck—a job he would have until he would retire in his early 60's. On August 22nd 1952, Norm married Gloria Young. Within a few years, the McMurray family had grown from two to five—adding Bonnie, Ron, and finally Tom. In 1959, the McMurray family moved to Cranberry Township.

The children were enrolled in Seneca Valley School District, and Norm's passion for Seneca's sports program began. Over the past 40 years, Seneca sports' teams have included many of Norm's relatives. No matter where the event took place, no matter who was on the field, Ron or Tom, one of his grandchildren, Michael, Jessica, or Amber, or even Ethan, his great-grandchild, you could find Norm in the stands. And he never went unnoticed. Whether it was his intense, high-pitched whistle, or his encouraging shouts, you knew he was there supporting your efforts.

Norm (or Pap as he loving became known once his grandchildren were old enough to start playing sports) loved his family; they always came first, and his family grew to an enormous size with his faithful attendance at Seneca Valley athletic events. Norm was quite popular around Seneca Valley, and once his own family graduated, he continued attending his favorite sporting events. Norm and Gloria could always been found at the wrestling matches. They followed the boys all the way through the season, even going as far as attending States in Hershey every year. This is just one small example of how the Seneca Valley Athletic Program and its members have been affected by Norman "Pap" McMurray.

After many months of battling esophageal cancer, Norm passed on October 21, 2008. To say that he is dearly missed, is a grave understatement. The loss was felt at Seneca as well. A large "N" was placed on the home mat by the SV wrestlers. Each wrestler, before their match, stepped on the "N" for a bit of luck—the luck they would normally get by shaking Norm's hand and receiving a few words of encouragement. He may never have worn a Seneca Valley uniform, but there was no greater fan for Seneca Valley than Norman "Pap" McMurray.
