- All assessments are administered during the school day
- Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.301, places local testing-time limitations on districts. The cumulative total amount of time spent taking locally adopted districtwide or schoolwide assessments must not exceed:
  - 10 hours per school year, for students in grades 1–6
  - 11 hours per school year, for students in grades 7–12
  - The following assessments are NOT included in the limitations: ACCESS & Alternate ACCESS, ACT w/Writing, MCA & MTAS, International Baccalaureate and Advanced Placement Exams
