PowerSchool Back-to-School Student Update

The School District of Onalaska is once again doing an online student data validation system update through PowerSchool. Powered by InfoSnap, this secure system allows the district to verify all student demographic, emergency and medical information for your child prior to the start of the new school year. The system will also allow you to electronically sign the annual permission forms for school district policies.

If you have not yet received instructions via email from the School District office, please contact the office for instructions and/or a paper copy if you do not have internet access.

This process was opened starting Monday, August 5. See page 4 for generic instructions. If you are still not able to figure out this process, please call the main office (608-783-4561) for assistance.

	POWERSCHOOL BACK-TO-SCHOOL UPDATE & PERMISSION WAIVER This online process through your students' PowerSchool Parent Portal account should be updated prior to registration. Instructions mailed and emailed by the School District Office. Look for "Returning Student Enrollment" bottom left column. Step-by-step outline on page 4.
	GENERAL FEE - This \$6.00 fee is for all OHS students and should be paid online or at registration.
	<u>STUDENT SCHEDULE</u> – On Tuesday, August 20, student schedules will be handed out at registration. Come to school at your scheduled time for your ID picture, pay fees if you have not already done so online, pick up class schedule and student ID card.
	"340" REQUEST GOOGLE FORM Juniors & Seniors – To be filled out after schedule is received. The Wisconsin Act 340 allows juniors and seniors to apply each semester for a one-hour release from school during their study hall or commons period. Students must have permission from their parents to participate and must be approved by administration based on grades, attendance, behavior concerns and teacher recommendations. All Junior/Senior parents will receive a 340 google form in their email or can be found on our website at: https://docs.google.com/forms/d/e/1FAIpQLSe1yc3q5cPMUMJi6pSbVqI-QWPaJrN5C11T29UoicUdJh_cNw/viewform . 




Student name, DOB, address, phone and contact 1 & 2 names are pre-populated from PowerSchool. Parent/guardian address and phone as well as medical information will need to be entered by the person completing the form. All mandatory fields are marked "required". You will not be able to submit the form

until all required fields are completed.

For parents with more than one student, after completing the first form, you will return to the parent portal - https://ona.powerschool.com - click the next student's name and then click Returning Student Enrollment again.

After entering the next child's date of birth, they'll have the option to import relevant information from the first form to save time or start from scratch.


All school fees can be paid through our online payment system, SchoolPay. There are no convenience fees this year regardless of your payment type. You can log into SchoolPay through PowerSchool or directly on their website: www.schoolpay.com

During the registration process, the General Fee of \$6.00 and Band and/or Choir fees are the only fees that will show as <u>owed</u> in PowerSchool for your child. *All other fees, such as Athletic User Fees, Chromebook Insurance, Senior Parking and Senior Baby Ad, are optional fees that you would be able to view in the School Pay program only.

Some students will eventually see class fees in PowerSchool, which are not due until after September 9. Since some students may decide to drop a fee course prior to the drop class deadline of Monday, September 9, those payments are not assessed until after that date.


BACK - SCHOOL REGISTRATION

We are holding our school registration on Tuesday, August 20 from 8:30 AM to 7:00 PM. Students will pay fees, get their schedules with locker and locker combination, and have a picture ID taken. Students are able to check out their lockers and walk around to familiarize themselves with the building. The designated Freshman/Parent Orientation meeting is not until 6:30 PM, but registration fees can be collected anytime during the 8:30 AM to 7:00 PM time frame. If for some reason you are unable to be at registration on August 20, you can come to the high school office any time after that date to pay fees and receive your schedule with locker assignment. The only thing you would not be able to do after the 20th is have the picture ID taken. Picture re-takes will be Monday. September 16, 7:45-10:00 AM and the ID picture will have to be taken at that time.

About Supplies....

Freshman parents often ask what school supplies are needed. Please find a list below for students in the core-subject areas.

English – folder, post it notes (2x2 or 3x3), and a highlighter

Math – folder, notebook or a binder with loose leaf paper as well as a calculator - the math department recommends a TI-30XIIS or similar model. If the student plans to eventually take Pre-Calculus, AP Calculus or AP Stats, a TI 83 or TI 84 is useful to provide access to a graphing calculator outside of class time. Some families choose to purchase the graphing calculator now while others wait until the more advanced coursework. NOTE - the more expensive graphing calculator is not needed for Algebra, Geometry, or Algebra II.

Social Studies and Science – folder, notebook, or a binder with loose leaf paper.

PE – The school does <u>not</u> issue uniforms for PE. Students will need to bring shorts, t-shirt and gym shoes from home.

Principles of Leadership – A 1-inch binder.

Students should also have an assortment of pens, pencils and dry-erase markers (2-3 - these are often used for individual white board learning activities). Some students have found it useful to purchase two 3-subject notebooks and use one notebook for morning classes and the other notebook for afternoon classes.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

We have worked diligently to develop a schedule that meets the needs of ALL our students. We have utilized our student information system scheduling program and tried to resolve students schedule conflicts as much as possible. We have made every effort to control class sizes; <a href="https://www.need.classes.com/hover.

Onalaska High School will continue to offer a quality education and are excited to welcome students to the 2024 - 2025 school year.

Building Entrance during the school day

All doors will be locked from 7:45 AM -2:50 PM, and access to the building is limited to the main office entrance with the use of a buzzer system. Once permitted access into the building, visitors will enter through the main office, which is located at Entrance "A" off Wilson Street. If you are continuing into the building further than the main office, you will need to swipe your driver's license for an approved printed visitor hall pass, using our Raptor Technologies visitor management system (see page 11 for more information).

Visitor parking spots are provided in the circle drive on Wilson Street, but space is limited. Please note that parking across the street **is** allowed for parents since the posted signs there read "No Student Parking."

Checking In and Out of School

Checking in and out of school for any reason must be through the main office. Students must have parent or guardian permission to leave school. This would be by either a note or phone call. When a note is brought to the office, a pass will be given with the time the student needs to leave. If a phone call is received, students are responsible to pick up a pass in the office prior to class starting. The office will NOT send a pass for an appointment that the child already knows about. Being responsible and taking care of his/her own schedule makes for less disruptions in class. If for some reason your child does not know about the appointment, the office will contact the class if necessary. Trying to keep classroom disruptions to a minimal helps make the learning process more successful.

Checking in to school is very simple. Students should always check into the office when they arrive. If the student is excused by either a note or phone call, an excused pass will be given. If the student arrives with no note or phone call, the student will report to class and be marked unverified until excused by parent/guardian. This absence, of course, can still be excused by a parent at a later time.

Proper Procedure: Check In and Out of school through the MAIN OFFICE!

Dropping Something Off at School

We all have experienced the absent-minded day that may result with something needing to be dropped off at school for a student. The office is more than willing to hold whatever item is needed for pick up. Please be sure to have your child's name listed somewhere on the item to insure that materials go to the proper person. Students will be expected to pick these items up between classes and will NOT be sent a note unless they do not know something is being dropped off for them. Again, this makes for fewer interruptions to the classroom.



In 2021, the School District of Onalaska started using an Online Visitor Management System called Raptor Technologies. This school safety system replaced our old pen and paper system and now allows visitors to check in safely just by swiping their driver's license. A picture ID sticker will print for the visitor and can be easily seen by all building staff and students.



We will be screening every visitor, including contractors, parents/guardians and volunteers. After an initial registration, visitors can then check in via self-service kiosk and will be able to easily scan as they exit and check out of the building.

The print badge will include the visitor's photo, name, date, time of entry, school building name and the visitor's destination within the school.

This system will generate an accurate, reliable district-wide and school-level report with complete sign-in/sign-out history on a daily basis, allowing us quick access to who is in the building in the event of an emergency.

Attendance 101

The Basics So All Children Can Be Successful

Wisconsin public schools abide by the same attendance laws (118.15). We know that attending school regularly is directly linked to academic and job success. In the event of an absence, the following is a breakdown of the three major categories and the codes we use in PowerSchool to distinguish them:

PARENT EXCUSED—this is when a parent/guardian calls or writes a note to excuse a student from school. Parents are permitted 10 parent choice days per school year. We determine the 10 days by counting the hours missed (i.e. Missing periods 1 and 2 does not count as an entire day). If a parent is getting close to using all 10 parent-excuse days, we will send a warning letter. Once all 10 parent days are exhausted, absences will be unexcused. Below is a list of the most common attendance codes when a parent excuses his/her child from class:

ILL=a parent feels his/her child is too ill to attend or stay in school

APT=student went to medical appointment, including dentist/orthodontist appointments.

PER=for personal reasons a student is not in attendance (e.g. running late, out of town, visiting someone in the hospital)

VAC=vacation

FNL=a parent excuses his/her child for a funeral

COL=college visit (juniors and seniors are granted one college visit per year that the school excuses and does not count toward parent-excuse time)

MEDICAL—this is when a student has visited a medical provider. Once written documentation of the visit is provided, the PER code is changed to one of the following and does not apply toward the 10 parent-choice days:

MED=student is ill and a physician indicates the day or range of days that he/she should stay home

MED=student went to an appointment and medical documentation was provided to the main office with the day and time of the appointment.

HOF/HEA=student went to our school health office and the nurse/health aide has determined that the student needs to lie down in the health office or go home (you will receive a call from the health office if your child is too ill to stay at school)

UNEXCUSED—this is when a student has been absent and the period(s)/day(s) have not been excused in any way. If this occurs, you will receive an automated call the day of the unverified absence.

UNV=unverified (unverified absences will change to either a parent or medical excused code or TRU if the absence cannot be cleared)

TRU=truant; absences that cannot be excused in any way because of skipping or no parent-excused days remain

"A student is considered truant if he/she is absent without an acceptable excuse for all or part of one or more days during which school is held. A student qualifies to be habitually truant when he/she is absent without an acceptable excuse for all or part of five or more days in a school semester" (Wisconsin State Statute 118.16). If students exceed the number of truant absences allowed by the state, truancy tickets will be referred to the school resource officer.

NOTE: Open Enrollment may be denied due to habitual unexcused/truant absences and/or tardiness.

We want to work together to ensure accurate and consistent school attendance, and we will communicate with you and your child when attendance—excused or unexcused—is concerning. Definition of Tardy and Determination of Absence

Attendance at the high school is taken by class period. At the high school level, a tardy is defined as missing any part of the beginning of a class period. If a student is tardy more than 15 minutes, he/she is considered absent. If a student accumulates more than 5 tardy notations in his/her attendance record during the semester, the school attendance officer or a designee will attempt to meet with the student. After 10 tardy notations a parent meeting (or attempt to hold a meeting) that involves the student's parent or guardian will be requested. Tardiness during the remainder of the semester that also involves an unexcused lack of the student's physical presence at school will be considered an instance of truancy under these procedures, but prior to such a meeting (or attempted meeting) such tardiness will not be considered truancy (Board Policy 3331).

High School - Tardies Contributing to Truancy

Before and during school tardies can contribute to truancy at the high school level.

After 5 Unexcused Tardies/Semester	After 10 Unexcused Tardies/Semester	Each Successive Unexcused Tardy for Rest of Semester
Truancy Warning Letter	Issue Truancy Warning Letter – if First Truancy Notice (by personal contact, email, or phone call then by 1st class mail) Parent/Guardian Meeting	Each successive unexcused tardy equals a truant period. See Table A for school and law enforcement action.





The School District of Onalaska follows the Wisconsin Childhood Communicable Diseases table when determining if a child shall be excluded from school due to illness. If fever is 99.9°F/37.8°C or higher, please do <u>not</u> send your child to school. When symptoms of possible communicable diseases are present, a child may be excluded based on district RN determination (i.e.: fevers, vomiting, diarrhea, etc.)

Student Parking

The City of Onalaska has instituted a parking ordinance that calls for no student parking during school hours on 8th Avenue South, 9th Avenue South, Green Bay Street, Johnson Drive, and Wilson Street.

Students failing to comply with the ordinance will be assessed a \$20.00 fine from the Onalaska Police Department. Students without permits are strongly urged to park on Oak Forest Drive to avoid being subject to any fines.


As a means to ensure traffic safety in and around the High School, the Onalaska Police Department will also be strictly enforcing parking violations on streets located in the High School area. This includes the State Park Trail parking lot, where fines are \$150-\$200.

Senior Parking Permits will be sold to <u>All</u> interested Seniors.

Drivers should be made aware of the following restrictions:

Parking is prohibited:

- * within 4 feet of the entrance to an alley or a private road or driveway;
- * within 10 feet of a fire hydrant, unless a greater distance is indicated by an official traffic sign;
- * closer than 15 feet to the near limits of a crosswalk.
- * upon any portion of a highway where and at the time when parking is prohibited, limited or restricted by official traffic signs.



Senior parking permits will be available for <u>ALL</u> seniors wanting a parking permit any time prior to the start of school in the main office at a cost of \$40.00. <u>Senior Parking google Form</u> required with car information.

Juniors may fill out a parking application online google form before school starts for a lottery chance at getting a Junior parking permit. The drawing process will begin after we determine senior spots. Please have **your completed request** filled out by the first day of school to be considered for the lottery. No payment will be accepted until after the drawing.

Please Note:

Onalaska School district reserves the right to deny parking privileges for disciplinary matters related to parking permit violations.

Student parking permits are subject to non-refundable suspension or revocation because of attendance and/or behavior.

Permits are non-transferable. Students may <u>not</u> give or sell their permits to other students. If this occurs, it will result in a parking citation and a loss of the parking privileges.

Dear School District of Onalaska Family:

We will continue to require pre-registration for all school busing to establish eligibility for ridership in 2024-25.

- 1. All children riding School District of Onalaska buses are required to have a Bus Agreement on file every year. This form is on the District website (go to onalaskaschools.com and click on the small school bus icon at the top of the screen). This Agreement is required to qualify for ridership, and must be updated if there are changes to your child's transportation needs throughout the school year. This Agreement will begin the process of determining eligibility for busing. Once you fill out the Bus Agreement you'll get an email back confirming the submission. Please contact the Transportation office if you cannot complete the Bus Agreement online.
- Eligibility. All forms will be reviewed for ridership eligibility; you will be notified before the start of school if your
 child is eligible to ride, with route numbers and times. Please review the eligibility guidelines for Open Enrolled,
 and Boundary Waived students, and students living less than two miles from their school as this is the criteria
 we use for bus ridership. This information can be found on the Transportation page of the District website.
- Deadline. The deadline for Bus Agreements is July 30, 2024. Any Agreements received after August 1, 2024 will
 delay routing. We cannot guarantee route notifications before school for parents who do not register by August 10.
 The exceptions to this are pending additional enrollments and address changes.
- Bus Badges. All students are required to "swipe" onto the bus for every ride. If your child(ren) have their bus badges from last year please use them.
 - Students are to use their Badge throughout their time in the District; by not printing the school name the Badge can be used as your child(ren) moves from school to school - including summer school.
 - High School students can use their Student ID cards instead of a new Bus Badge. The barcode used on the bus is the same as the barcode on their ID
 - Students with Smart Phones can access their Bus Badge (barcode) on their phones after installing Here
 Comes the Bus and registering within the app.
 - d. We will mail all badges to families at each students' primary residence submitted on the Bus Agreement. This will be the fastest and most reliable way to make sure that parents are getting the Badge(s) and can review Bus rules along with expectations of Badge use before the school year begins. A lanyard will not be mailed. The Elementary and Middle School offices will have lanyards available if you need one.
- 5. Bus Stop Optimization. Our goal is to provide safe and efficient travel to and from school. We continue to evaluate the best stops along all routes; please note there may be adjustments to the stops that we used in the past. We cannot change bus stops to accommodate students' extra curricular schedules. Our goal is to make the most efficient use of right-hand bus stops, and provide door-to-door stops for Special Ed and Pre-K students. But stops are allowed within District boundaries with very few exceptions.

Please visit the District's Transportation website periodically for updates, bus rules and procedures, and the Bus Agreement. If you have any concerns or questions please call myself or Shelli Kult at 783-5489.

After your student goes through the food service line and either fills a tray or takes a carton of milk to have with a sack lunch, the student gives his/her name to the cashier and punches his/her 4-digit meal code number into the keypad at the checkout station. The student's name and picture will flash onto a computer screen. After the cashier verifies that the correct student is being served, the system deducts the correct charge from the student's account. (Cashiers assist students with their meal code numbers until the students learn them. The system preserves confidentiality of those eligible for free and reduced priced meals.) Cash or four-digit lunch number may also be used for a la carte purchases at the middle and high schools.

The Onalaska High School Dress Code as it appears in the 2024 - 2025 student handbook

STUDENT DRESS EXPECTATIONS:

These guidelines are intended to define appropriate student attire and that align to school place readiness.

Clothing items that are considered unacceptable to wear to school include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Clothing that does not provide adequate coverage, including garments that expose undergarments, buttocks and/or chest area.
- Apparel that makes written or graphic reference to the following topics is strictly prohibited: alcohol, drugs, tobacco, violence, weapons, nudity, profanity, discrimination, vulgarity or gangs. This includes phrases of dual meaning.
- Shoes must be worn at all times in the building and on school grounds.

Onalaska High School Administration will use discretion to make decisions regarding the appropriateness of each student's dress and possible consequences for violation of the above policy. Repeated violations of dress code rules will result in disciplinary actions.

Military Recruiters Access to Student Directory Data

Districts receiving federal education funds are required to notify parents of secondary school students

- 1. that a secondary school student or the parent of the student may request that the student's name, address and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters or institutions of higher education without prior written parental consent; and
- 2. that the district must comply with such request.

School districts receiving federal education funds are required to provide, on request made by military recruiters or an institution of higher education, access to secondary school students' names, addresses and telephone listings unless access to such information has been restricted by the secondary school student or the student's parents as outlined above. Federal guidelines issued to implement this requirement state that if a school district does not designate student names, addresses and/or telephone listings as directory data it must still provide all three items to military recruiters and institutions of higher education upon request.

FCC Emergency Broadband Benefit Announced

The Emergency Broadband Benefit will provide a discount of up to \$50 per month towards broadband service for *eligible households* and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price. The Emergency Broadband Benefit is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Video Cameras in School

Board Policy 4164 – Electronic Surveillance of Public Areas of School Buildings Surveillance cameras are installed on school property, and video surveillance shall be used to promote the order, safety, and security of students, staff, visitors, and property.

When cameras are used, signs will be posted stating "NOTICE: This facility employs video surveillance equipment for security purposes. This equipment may or may not be monitored at any time." Cameras are authorized for use in the following areas where public, students, and staff have no reasonable expectation of privacy such as entrances, hallways, commons, gymnasiums, parking lots, athletic fields, and the exterior of buildings. Under no circumstances will video cameras be used in any area where the public, students, or staff have a reasonable expectation of privacy, including restrooms, locker rooms, and health rooms.

Only individuals authorized by the superintendent or building administrator may view surveillance recordings. Should surveillance recordings become part of a student disciplinary action, they become part of that student's record and shall be dealt with in a manner consistent with the district's student records policy and procedures. The District reserves the right to provide copies of recordings to law enforcement agencies as deemed appropriate by the district administrator and in compliance with appropriate federal and state laws.

Video Cameras on School Buses

Board Policy 4327 – Use of Video/Audio Recording Systems on School Buses The School District of Onalaska approves the use of video/audio recording systems on the school buses to enhance safety and provide a record of student behavior.

Parents will be notified once a year via the student handbook and the school newsletter or the school's newspaper that video/audio recording systems are being used on the buses. A sign will be placed in front of each bus stating that video cameras are used on that bus.

The transportation director, transportation contractor's bus manager, and the district's administrators shall be authorized to view the record for the purpose of documenting a problem. Administrators from the private schools whose students ride the District's routes are also authorized to view the record if students from a private school are involved in a problem. Disciplinary action may be taken with students or drivers based on a video/audio documentation.

The records shall not be available for viewing by the public in general, employees in general, media, or other individuals. The principals, district administrator or transportation director may authorize parents or other individuals, such as school counselor, school psychologist, nurse, teacher or social worker, to view segments of a specific record if viewing the record is beneficial to their role in assisting the student.

A log shall be kept of the dates and names of all individuals viewing the record. These recordings are not public record and do not need to be saved or archived. If the transportation director or administrators decide that a recorded segment may involve the violation of a law, the appropriate legal authorities may view the segment.

This fall a Faculty Committee will discuss NHS eligibility for juniors and seniors. Students interested in applying for NHS may use the following criteria to enhance their summer experiences, putting them in a better position for acceptance into NHS in the fall. *In addition, obtaining adult signatures verifying your hours of service work and leadership opportunities will save you time in the future.*

The NHS adviser will mail letters home in the late summer for juniors/seniors who qualify academically. Students who wish to apply will then receive an application to complete and submit.

The Faculty Committee will evaluate the following areas:

- 1. Scholarship 3.5 cumulative GPA
 - □ No classes weighted more than others
- 2. **Leadership** Must have TWO documented leadership experiences.
 - Demonstrates initiative in promoting school activities
 - □ Exercises positive influence on peers in upholding school ideals
 - □ Demonstrates academic initiative
 - □ Holds school offices or positions of responsibility
 - Demonstrates reliability and dependability
 - □ Leader in the classroom, at work, in other school or community activities
- 3. **Service** Must have 20 documented hours of service while in high school. Better defined as actions undertaken by student which are done with or on behalf of others without any direct financial or material compensation
 - □ Volunteers and provides dependable and well-organized assistance
 - □ Works well with others
 - □ Cheerfully and enthusiastically provides service to others
 - □ Assists teachers, students, visitors

Hello Hilltoppers! My name is Caitlyn Snyder and I am a licensed therapist that is contracted through Peace of Mind Counseling. We are partnering with the



ACT Updates

The University of Wisconsin System has suspended the ACT requirement for all UW colleges and universities **through the 2026-2027 academic year.** Many other colleges have also waived the ACT requirement. A strong ACT score can still help with admission to college and scholarship placement. Since most schools are now "test optional", students can choose not to use a score if they are not pleased with it. Students will choose if they wish to include their ACT scores as part of their application. Visit the websites of your colleges for more information.

Register to Retake the ACT

Students interested in retaking the ACT, please register at ACT.org.

The following are tips to help students complete the registration process:

- Students go to myACT.org to log into their account, register and pay for the ACT test
- Plan to register at least a month in advance of the test date to avoid late fees!
- Decide if you want to take the writing test. Most schools do NOT require the writing test.
- Give yourself at least 45 minutes to complete the registration
- Decide which 4 colleges/universities you want FREE score reports sent to. It is better and easier to do this now to avoid extra steps later.
- Be prepared to upload a clear headshot photo to the website. Students without a picture are NOT allowed to test!
- Fee waivers are available for students who qualify see your school counselor if you need one.
- Print your admission ticket, and keep it somewhere safe you will need it to be admitted to your testing room.




New/Transfer & International Student Orientation

Seniors, Class of 2025 - It's Time to Schedule Campus Visits:

Many colleges are now offering virtual visits as well as in-person visits. Go to your college's website for more information. While it's important to meet with admissions counselors and take the official campus tour, it's also helpful to take your own personal tour. Check out the places they don't show you, talk to a student in the student union about what they like about the school, as well as what they do not like about the school. Pick up a campus newspaper to see what's important to students and soak in the environment. If you don't feel like the school is a good fit, it may be a difficult place for you to find success. Refer to your Junior STAR Conference materials for more helpful tour information.

College Bound Student Athletes

Students who plan to compete in D1 or D2 athletics in college must register with the NCAA in order for you to be eligible to compete prior to enrollment this fall.

Prepare to Apply to College Soon!

Seniors are encouraged to begin preparing to apply to colleges and universities, as they will be opening their admissions process soon. Students should begin to gather materials such as lists of activities, involvements, community service and recognitions, and letters of recommendation (if necessary) to make completing applications easier. It should be simple to find the application to your college on their website.

Regardless of the kind of school students plan on attending, it is very important to apply early. Technical college programs, especially, fill quickly on a first come first serve basis. Our goal is for ALL seniors going on to postsecondary education to have applications turned in and processed by Thanksgiving!

Application Process:

Once a student has completed their application, he or she should:

- 1. Request a transcript in person in OHS Student Services or fill out this form.
- 2. Include letters of recommendation, **IF necessary**. (Most schools do **NOT** require letters of recommendation.) 3. Include check for application fee unless paid online (no cash please).
- 4. **IF required**, bring completed application or counselor sheet from application to Student Services.
- 5. Applications completed using online programs like the Common Application or Send Edu will request a High School counselor's email address. Transcripts for these applications are sent directly to colleges using these programs and do not require students to make transcript requests in person.
- 6. Counselors will complete requested information, and all application materials will be mailed out in a timely manner.

Student Services will host a **2-part senior student & parent night** on 2 different important topics for the senior year.

The first session will discuss post-secondary planning including: options for after high school, the college selection and application process. This session will include specific information on how to effectively complete college applications and request transcripts and additional materials required for admission.

The second session will focus on paying for college. Presenters will include our Senior Class Advisor, Bridget Hubbard, and a financial aid expert. This session will briefly cover the OHS scholarship process, followed by a longer presentation on the Federal Financial Aid process (FAFSA). The FAFSA will be available to students and families starting on October 1, 2024.

It is not required for students to <u>complete</u> the FAFSA in October. Some families may choose to begin the federal financial aid process early, to assist in the college decision making process. Most financial aid offices will continue to recommend completing the FAFSA process in January to maximize students' chances at federal financial aid for college. Contact your college of interest for their FAFSA priority deadline. Both students and parents are welcome to attend **one or both of these sessions**!

On September 10 and October 14, counselors will meet with all seniors in social studies classes to discuss this content as well.



Opportunities for Juniors (Class of 2026)

All OHS Juniors Tuesday, September 24, 2024 Morning — Practice ACT Afternoon — Local college tours FREE!

Morning:

All juniors will take a FREE practice ACT test. This retired ACT test will be administered, timed and scored identically to an actual ACT. ACT will score this test, and provide students with sub scores, a composite score and most importantly an itemized list of correct answers compared to the student answers. Results will be shared with students in October.

Afternoon:

All juniors will be attending a campus tour. Juniors will have the opportunity to tour a technical college (Western Technical College), a 4-year public university (UW-La Crosse), or a 4-year private university (Viterbo University). Although students may not plan to attend these specific post-secondary institutions, they will receive helpful information on the process and various aspects of post-secondary education.

The campus visit is a crucial part of the post-secondary decision process. It is a time to ask questions, and obtain an overall perspective of the college's atmosphere. Visiting colleges will provide a better understanding of which college is the right choice. Students should be prepared to ask questions about:

- Academic expectations
- Popular academic programs
- Technology on campus
- Cost of attendance
- Financial Aid
- Scholarship opportunities
- Housing or dorm arrangements
- Campus food
- Extracurricular activities
- Sports
- Clubs/student organizations
- College social life



Now is the time for juniors to begin to narrow down post-secondary options and opportunities. A campus tour is a great way to motivate students in considering options that will ultimately guide the direction of their careers. The campus tour will provide a start in considering their post-secondary options! Permission slips for this event will be sent electronically to junior parents early in September. Assignments to colleges will be made first come first served – based on completed permission slips.

The Early College Credit Program (ECCP) for private and public 4 year colleges and Start College Now (SCN) for technical college offers students an opportunity to take college courses at Western, Viterbo or UW-L at no cost to them or their families. A student must have exhausted all course offerings in a content area and meet the college's admissions criteria in order to be approved for these programs. Students should contact OHS Student Services for more information and be sure to turn in an application no later than October 1st. **NO LATE APPLICATIONS CAN BE ACCEPTED!**

The PSAT (Pre-SAT) will be offered on October 15 at Onalaska High School. Juniors with very high PSAT scores may qualify for the National Merit Scholarship (for all students) and National Achievement (for Black American students) competitions. Students may also wish to take the PSAT as a way to assess their college readiness and practice for future college admissions tests. We encourage students with strong standardized test-taking skills, or those who are looking to prepare for future tests, to take advantage of this opportunity. Interested students should sign up in the Student Services Office. Space is limited, and filled on a first-come, first-served basis.





Tips for Talking to Your Teen about Mental Health

Heading back to school can be a stressful time for students. Keeping the lines of communication open and knowing how and when to talk to your teen about mental health can be key to making this a smooth transition. Here are 10 tips for talking to your teen about mental health, from The Jed Foundation website, by Katie Hurley, LCSW.

1. Be Genuine

Teens know when their parents are uncomfortable or anxious. If you aren't sure how to start, worry about how your teen will react, or are just plain new at this, own it. Say something like, "This is hard for me to talk about and I'm not sure how to start, but I want us to be able to talk about all the things, even the ones that feel difficult to say out loud."

Once you get the conversation started, be direct and simple: "I know this is a hard time for all of us, and I want to make sure I can support you in anything you need help with. Can we talk about how things are going for you?"

2. Connect Over Something Your Teen Enjoys

Contrary to popular belief, the car is not always the best place to talk to teens. Your teen may look forward to the car as a place to decompress and listen to music after a long day.

Engaging in an activity while talking is a good way to break the tension though. Walking together can be effective because you're not face to face and the physical exercise reduces stress. If a walk doesn't work, you can talk while playing cards or video games, baking or cooking, or any other activity your teen enjoys.

3. Get Comfortable With Silence


It takes time to process information or questions about mental health, particularly if it isn't something your family discusses often. Give your teen time to think. Interrupting a silence because you're uncomfortable may actually prevent your teen from sharing their thoughts. Give them a few minutes and then follow up to acknowledge how difficult it is to talk. Say, "I know this is hard to talk about. The more we talk about it, the easier it will get."

4. Share Observations and Ask Open-Ended Questions

Just asking your teen if they're OK won't get you far, because they can easily answer with a quick, "Yes," or, "I'm fine," and return to whatever they were doing. If you've noticed changes in your teen that worry you, be direct about it. Try something like, "I noticed you're doing/not doing [behavior] lately, and I wonder if that's related to stress, anxiety, depression, or something else?" That way you communicate that you are connected, paying attention, and ready to help. It also requires more than a one-word answer from your teen, which helps launch a real conversation.

5. Take Your Teen Seriously

You may not relate to the struggle your teen is having, but it matters to them if they are sharing it with you. So do your best to listen and really consider what they are saying. When teens mention self-harm or suicide, it can be really scary to hear. You may feel the urge to downplay those concerns out of your own fear. Resist it. The good news is that your teen is sharing these thoughts with you, which means they are open to help and you can help them find it.



Tips for Talking to Your Teen about Mental Health continued...

6. Use a Simple Rating Scale

It can be difficult for teens to put words to feelings when they feel overwhelmed, but starting with a simple check-in can help. Try asking for a number: "On a scale of one to 10, with 10 indicating that your mental health is really good and one indicating that you're struggling to even get out of bed and to school each day, where would you rate your overall mental health right now?"

That opens the door to talking about how your teen feels each day. If they rate themselves between eight and 10, talk about what that feels like and what strategies help them stay in that zone. If they rate themselves between five and seven, say, "It sounds like some days are better than others and you're having some struggles right now. I can understand that. Do you need support or solutions right now?" If they rate themselves a three or four, chances are they need some help. Acknowledge how difficult it must be by saying, "That sounds hard. It must feel like a challenge to get through the school day at times. Let's think about some supports that may help you."

If your teen rates themselves at a one or two, seek a licensed mental health professional. If you are concerned your teen or young adult is considering suicide, it's helpful to just ask them directly. It won't put the idea in their head, but it may make them feel some relief that you see how much they are hurting.

7. Offer Other Support Systems and Share Crisis Resources

Not all teens feel comfortable discussing their mental health with their parents. That doesn't mean they're not close to you or don't trust you; it just means they need someone else to talk to.

Offer a school counselor or therapist, other trusted family members, local or online youth support groups.

- At <u>TeenLine</u>, teens can get support from trained peer counselors at by texting TEEN to 839-863 every day from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Pacific Time (9 p.m. to midnight Eastern).
- <u>The Trevor Project</u> supports LGBTQ youth. Text START to 678-678 or call 866-488-7386 or <u>chat</u> with them directly from their site.
- Trans LifeLine offers 24-7 support for the trans community when you call 877-565-8860.

If you are worried your teen is in crisis, provide them with phone numbers where they can reach trained support staff for a confidential conversation.

- Text HOME to 741-741.
- Call or text the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline at 988 or use the chat function at <u>988lifeline.org</u> to talk with a trained counselor at any time.

You can also reach out to these resources for support on how to help your teen.



Tips for Talking to Your Teen about Mental Health continued...

8. Don't Push

Your teen may insist they're fine even when you see signs that they aren't. Resist the urge to prove you know they're struggling, since that will make them more likely to insist nothing is wrong. It's better to keep checking in and stay curious. If your teen has a difficult day, give them time to relax first and follow up by saying, "It seems like today was hard. I'm here if you need to vent. I won't offer solutions, unless you want me to. I can just listen."

9. Work to Stay Open and Calm

It is not always easy to hear things your teen is struggling with, especially if they touch on areas that worry you. This is an emotionally tough time for teens, so they may not always share what's going on with them in a calm, constructive way. Sometimes teens act out to get our attention, and it can be really hard not to react in anger.

We know teens open up when they feel connected, respected, and supported, so do what you can to stay calm and nonreactive during the conversation. Some deep breaths can help. If you still feel agitated or worried, it's OK to let them know you need a minute to calm down because this is emotional for you too. That's great emotional modeling for them. You're demonstrating that you can take space to regroup when you feel overwhelmed by emotions.

10. Keep the Conversation Going

Don't worry about having all the answers right away. Talking about mental health is an opportunity to learn together. The important thing to remember is that each conversation builds on the previous one. Once you get into the habit of talking about mental health with your teen, it will become a much easier conversation to return to as needed.

And remember to talk about the good times they are having and connect with them around the things they like to do. They will be more likely to share when things are hard if you've shown interest when things are going well.

Sports Physical Card? Physical Examinations – Athletes and dance team members may not practice for or participate in interscholastic

athletics until the school has registration on file attesting to:

- Completion of online registration and parent acknowledgement.
- Current physical examination by a licensed physician or Advanced Practice Prescriber (APNP).

-Examinations performed after April 1 of the current year are good for the following two school years. A physical form signed by the physician is required for eligibility.

Example – A student who received a physical examination on April 1, 2023, and turned in a physical form signed by the attending physician or APNP, would be covered for the 2023-2024 school year. That same physical would cover the 2024-2025 school year also.

-Examinations performed before April 1 of the current year are good for the remainder of that school year and the following school year.

Example – A student who received a physical examination on March 31, 2023 and turned in a physical form signed by the attending physician or APNP, would be covered for the remainder of the 2022-2023 school year. That same physical would cover the 2023-2024 school year.

Volunteer Background Check Information

VOLUNTEER BACKGROUND CHECK SYSTEM

The School District of Onalaska parent and community volunteer background checks are completed through an online system called BIB. BIB (Background Investigation Bureau) is a comprehensive online system that will provide thorough background checks on all volunteers. Please allow up to two weeks for a volunteer background check to be complete.

How does it work?

A volunteer will go to the BIB Secure Volunteer website and input their individual information. A direct link is provided on the School District of Onalaska website - https://securevolunteer.com/SCHOOL-DISTRICT-OF-ONALASKA-VOL/home.

The volunteer will receive an email from BIB stating they have passed the background check to volunteer. All volunteers need to coordinate with the building administration on volunteer opportunities.

The BIB background check is valid for 3 years. The BIB system will notify the volunteer via email when it is time for a recheck.

**If you are currently on the approved volunteer list and within your three year approved time, your background check is still valid and you do not have to complete the BIB check until your 3 years has passed. After the expiration of the 3 years, you will switch to the BIB background check. You may verify with your school secretary if you are a current approved volunteer.


