

1 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Good evening,
2 this special meeting of the Monroe Township
3 Board of Education will come to order.
4 Please stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

5 (Pledge of Allegiance said.)

6 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: May we have a
7 roll call, Mr. Holliday.

8 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Kolupanowich.

9 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Here.

10 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Kaufman.

11 MR. KAUFMAN: Here.

12 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Braverman,
13 absent.

14 Mrs. Haring.

15 MS. HARING: Here.

16 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Homoki.

17 MR. HOMOKI: Here.

18 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Leary.

19 MR. LEARY: Here.

20 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Leonard.

21 MS. LEONARD: Here.

22 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mrs. Ostrager.

24 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Speizer.

1 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Faraone.

3 MR. HOLLIDAY: Madam Board

4 President, you have a quorum.

5 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Thank you. The
6 Monroe Township Board of Education has
7 caused notice of this meeting to be sent on
8 Friday, March 2nd, 2007 to, one, the Home
9 News Tribune and, two, the Asbury Park
10 Press. Furthermore, the Monroe Township
11 Board of Education has caused notice of
12 this meeting to be posted, one, at all
13 schools; two, on the school district web
14 site and, three, at the office of the clerk
15 of the municipality. At this time I would
16 like to turn the meeting over to Ms. Viola
17 Lordi, our attorney from Wilentz.

18 MS. LORDI: Thank you, Madam
19 President. Good afternoon, everyone. I
20 understand, Madam President, that there is
21 a motion to go into closed session at this
22 time. I would appreciate if the motion
23 would be read.

24 MR. HOMOKI: The motion be it
25 resolved pursuant to sunshine law,

1 N.J.S.A.10:4-12, et al, that the board of
2 education will now meet in closed session
3 to discuss confidential matters
4 specifically attorney review and advice
5 concerning the objections submitted by
6 Jennifer Dressel that a nominated petition
7 for annual school election applied for by
8 Amy Speizer, the applicable subject is
9 within the exemption permitted to be
10 discussed in closed session in accordance
11 with N.J.S.A. 10:4-13, information
12 regarding the board's closed session
13 discussion will be disclosed to the public
14 as soon as the reason for confidentiality
15 no longer exists.

16 MS. LORDI: Is there a second to the
17 motion?

18 MR. LEARY: Second.

19 MS. LORDI: Mr. Holliday.

20 MR. HOLLIDAY: So noted by Mr.
21 Leary.

22 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: All in favor?

23 Aye.

24 VOICES: Aye.

25 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Opposed?

1 MS. LEONARD: Opposed.

2 MRS. OSTRAGER: Opposed.

3 Ms. Haring
MS. LEONARD: Opposed.

4 MR. HOLLIDAY: Could those
5 individuals opposed to going into closed
6 session please state your name.

7 MS. OSTRAGER: Rita Ostrager.

8 MR. HOLLIDAY: Rita Ostrager
9 opposes closed session.

10 MS. LEONARD: Kathy Leonard.

11 MR. HOLLIDAY: Kathy Leonard
12 opposes closed session.

13 MS. HARING: Carol Haring.

14 MR. HOLLIDAY: Carol Haring opposes
15 closed session.

16 Counsel, according to my record the
17 motion does not carry.

18 MS. LORDI: There are three. It's
19 three three, Mr. Holliday?

20 MR. HOLLIDAY: Yes.

21 MS. LORDI: Okay, we'll stay in open
22 session.

23 MR. HOLLIDAY: Three four.

24 MR. FERRIE: There are three
25 opposed. How about Mr. Kaufman?

1 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Kaufman, are you
2 still there?

3 MR. KAUFMAN: I'm still here.

4 MR. HOLLIDAY: You have no
5 objection whatsoever to going into closed
6 session?

7 MR. KAUFMAN: I think I already
8 said that I was in favor of going into
9 closed session.

10 MS. LORDI: Thank you. How many
11 votes is that, Mr. Holliday?

12 MR. HOLLIDAY: Excuse me?

13 MS. LORDI: What's the vote?

14 MR. FERRIE: Five three.

15 MR. HOLLIDAY: Five three.

16 MS. LORDI: Mr. Holliday, the
17 motion passes, does it not?

18 MR. HOLLIDAY: The motion is
19 passed.

20 MS. LORDI: Mr. Holliday states the
21 motion passed five three.

22 Mr. Holliday, will we then now
23 convene in closed session?

24 MR. HOLLIDAY: The meeting will now
25 go into closed session. Because school is

1 in session, we would ask those members of
2 the public to go ahead and be removed to
3 the lobby.

4 (Closed session - off the stenographic
5 record.)

6 (Return to open session.)

7 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Mr. Holliday, I'm
8 turning the meeting over to you.

9 MR. HOLLIDAY: Thank you, Board
10 President. For the members of the public,
11 I would like to formally announce that Mr.
12 Braverman has entered the meeting, as well
13 as Miss Speizer; therefore, there are ten
14 members present for this special meeting of
15 the Monroe Township Board of Education.
16 Thank you, Madam Board President.

17 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: At this time
18 I'll will turn the meeting over to our
19 attorney, Mrs. Lordi.

20 MS. LORDI: Thank you very much.
21 Mr. Holliday, may I just use this.

22 Good afternoon again, everyone. We
23 are here this afternoon, as indicated in
24 the notice advertising the Board of
25 Education meeting, for the purpose of the

1 board's reviewing an objection to the
2 nominating petition of board member Amy
3 Speizer who seeks to run in the school
4 board election scheduled to be conducted on
5 April 17th, 2007.

6 Members of the board, you have
7 before you, and I would ask members of the
8 public to excuse me as I look to the board
9 with my back to you because this appears to
10 be the best way for the board of education
11 given the construct, the configuration of
12 the long table, to see counsel and we have
13 two board members as well participating in
14 the board meeting by telephone, speaker
15 telephone, just to Mr. Holiday's left so
16 I'm sitting over here so, A, they can hear
17 me and everyone on the board, at least, can
18 see me as I speak to the board and
19 recognize the various board members as the
20 various board members may wish to be heard.

21 Members of the board, you have
22 before you the affidavit, excuse me, the
23 nominating petition of Amy Speizer. You
24 have before you as well, ladies and
25 gentlemen -- of course, that is a copy of

1 the nominating petition. You have before
2 you as well the challenge to the nominating
3 petition of Amy Speizer transmitted by
4 letter dated March 1, 2007 of Miss Jennifer
5 Dressel. That is, ladies and gentlemen, a
6 two-page document with attachments. You
7 have been provided with all of the
8 attachments that I understand were received
9 by Mr. Holliday in his capacity as
10 secretary of the board of education. Mr.
11 Holliday, I understand that Ms. Dressel's
12 objection to Miss Speizer's petition was
13 received in your office on Friday, March 2,
14 2007; is that correct?

15 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Holliday
16 speaking, that information is correct.
17 That information was received on the 2nd of
18 March, 2007 and I signed for it at 12:55
19 p.m. eastern standard time.

20 MS. LORDI: Under the relevant New
21 Jersey law, we'll call it the relevant New
22 Jersey statute, the Board of Education
23 must, as ^{Ms.} Mr. Dressel indicates at the close
24 of her March, her letter dated March 1,
25 2007, that Mr. Holliday noted as received

1 in his office March 2, the board must make
2 a determination on the objection. In
3 accordance with the New Jersey Statute
4 Title 19 Section 60-7, otherwise referred
5 to as N.J.S.A. 19:60-7. Your job, if you
6 will, ladies and gentlemen of the board,
7 this afternoon is to make a determination
8 about whether or not to sustain the
9 objection and you have to make a
10 determination with respect to the
11 objection. That determination must be
12 filed this afternoon with the county clerk
13 and we have someone -- we've made
14 arrangements to have the appropriate
15 correspondence to be hand delivered to the
16 County Clerk this afternoon at the close of
17 your meeting. So what I would like to do
18 right now is again to remind you of the
19 narrow focus before you today and to point
20 out as well the third document in your
21 package, which is the affidavit of board
22 member Amy Speizer responding to the
23 objection to the petition. Excuse me,
24 responding -- yes, to the objection to the
25 petition.

1 Now I would like to ask you board
2 members -- give you the floor, I've said
3 enough. Questions, if you would let me
4 know either by short raise of the hand or
5 voice that you would like to speak and I,
6 of course, will recognize you. Please
7 remember that we have a court reporter with
8 us in the first row this afternoon who is
9 taking down everything that we're saying in
10 open session, my words, your words, so I
11 would ask initially if you would -- I will
12 identify you and if I miss your name, I'd
13 appreciate if you would identify yourself
14 so Miss Gill, our court reporter, can
15 accurately reflect the record. I believe
16 Mr. Homoki wanted to be heard.

17 MR. HOMOKI: I know that there'll
18 be discussion on this. Would it be in
19 order to make a motion now, seconded, that
20 we can discuss this since this is the
21 issue?

22 MS. LORDI: You may do so if you
23 wish, if you wish to make a motion and then
24 have the matter discussed. You may instead
25 wish, it's up to the board, your

1 alternative is to simply have the
2 discussion and if the discussion reaches a
3 point at which someone wishes to make a
4 motion to sustain the objection, support
5 the objection, that motion would be made,
6 we would see if there would be a second; if
7 the motion is made, seconded, then I would
8 ask Mr. Holliday, I'd ask if there was any
9 further, I would ask any further discussion
10 on the subject, if there was no further
11 discussion I would ask Mr. Holliday then to
12 take a roll call. So you can do it that
13 way, but you don't have to do it that way.

14 MR. HOMOKI: Well since we'll have
15 to have some type of a motion anyway
16 eventually, I think it would be appropriate
17 I make it now. Would that be acceptable to
18 you in terms of the process?

19 MR. BRAVERMAN: No.

20 MS. LORDI: Well, we don't get to
21 say yes or no unfortunately. You can make
22 a motion if you wish, sir, but you might
23 want to have discussion first. It's up to
24 you. It's up to you, Mr. Homoki, if you
25 want to make a motion, see if there is a

1 second.

2 The question is whether or not, as
3 I understand it, there would be a motion to
4 sustain the objection if there is such a
5 motion to be made.

6 MR. HOMOKI: I would like to make a
7 motion and then second it and we'll discuss
8 it, but it doesn't make a difference at
9 what point. We can make a motion any time
10 and then have discussion, am I correct?

11 MS. LORDI: Yes, sir.

12 MR. HOMOKI: All right. There is a
13 hand up there before.

14 MS. LORDI: Mr. Braverman.

15 MR. BRAVERMAN: If he just said it
16 doesn't make any difference, why not hold
17 it off?

18 MS. LORDI: That's between you,
19 members of the board, to talk about that.
20 He is free to make it. You are free to try
21 to dissuade him from doing that.

22 MR. BRAVERMAN: If it doesn't make
23 any difference, why don't you hold it off
24 and then make it.

25 MR. HOMOKI: I can hold it but

1 maybe when we do come to that point, I
2 would like to.

3 All right, that's fine. I can
4 wait.

5 MS. LORDI: Okay, sir. Mr.
6 Braverman.

7 MR. BRAVERMAN: I came in late so I
8 didn't hear your whole spiel, but is Amy
9 going to speak and will she be able to
10 answer questions on her behalf?

11 MS. LORDI: Miss Speizer will have
12 the opportunity. You will have the
13 opportunity to ask questions if you wish.
14 By you, I mean all the board members will
15 have the opportunity to ask questions if
16 you wish. Miss Speizer, of course, will
17 have the opportunity to respond, Mr.
18 Braverman.

19 MR. BRAVERMAN: Thank you.

20 MS. LEONARD: Can I please remind
21 the board members to talk into their mic.

22 MS. LORDI: Everyone talk into your
23 microphones. Thank you, Mrs. Leonard. I
24 will entertain discussions from the board
25 members. Miss Ostrager.

1 MS. OSTRAGER: Yes, thank you. It
2 appears to me that the main problem, as
3 I've been researching this weekend, and I
4 looked to the New Jersey school board, is
5 trying to find a definition on residency.
6 Is there some legal guidance we -- you can
7 point us to as far as how you would define
8 residency for the purpose of this?

9 MS. LORDI: The issue is really
10 pretty common sensical, and did everyone
11 hear Miss Ostrager's question?

12 MS. LEONARD: Yes.

13 MR. KAUFMAN: Yes, I did.

14 MS. LORDI: Thank you.

15 The issue is really pretty common
16 sensical and that is, did the person, in
17 this case Miss Speizer, will Miss Speizer
18 have lived, resided in, lived in Monroe
19 Township for a period of at least one year
20 prior to the annual school election on
21 April 17th. That's the question. Reside,
22 we often deal with the subject of residing,
23 what does residing mean when we deal with
24 it in the student context, is the student
25 entitled to a free education in a school

1 district. Is the student domicile, what
2 does that mean? Well, does his mother and
3 father -- not where the mother and father,
4 we get into some very, very complicated
5 discussions in that regard.

6 In my view, in my review of the law
7 as well, this issue is not complicated.
8 It's did the person, has the person lived
9 in the district, been domiciled in the
10 district for at least one year prior to the
11 date of the school election? Is the place
12 where the person, this is what the cases
13 actually say, hangs his or her hat, intent
14 to hang his or her hat, is the place where
15 the person intends most days to put his or
16 head on the pillow in the district? That's
17 your residence under the law. That's my
18 understanding of the law having spent a lot
19 of time reading it.

20 Yes, ma'am.

21 MS. OSTRAGER: Not to harp on you
22 but it does seem to be the crux of
23 everything.

24 MS. LORDI: That's Mrs. Ostrager.

25 MS. OSTRAGER: Yes, because it

1 seems the primary evidence is this loan
2 application where she stated it's going to
3 be her primary residence, but is the
4 definition for primary residence for the
5 purpose, let's say, voter registration or
6 registering a child for school or I looked
7 at the Homestead rebate, the qualification
8 or, I work for a mortgage company, how I
9 would define residence there. I'm finding
10 different definitions of how you would
11 define that. Is there anything that we
12 could look to and say this is test we
13 should follow?

14 MS. LORDI: The test is in my view
15 where did she live? Where was she going
16 home night after night, what other indicia,
17 what other indicia of her residency can she
18 produce? Where did she have her driver's
19 license? Where did she vote? Where, if
20 she had homeowners insurance, what did her
21 homeowners insurance say with respect to,
22 if she had renters insurance. Where was
23 she telling people with whom she does
24 business, if you will, whether it's the
25 State, with our driver's license for

1 example, or private companies or private
2 people, entities, where is it that Miss
3 Speizer was telling people she lived.

4 Now, if you look at the affidavit
5 she notes, Miss Speizer notes in paragraph
6 2 A, and this may be a subject of questions
7 for Miss Speizer, perhaps, if I can help
8 move the discussion along. I will be a
9 citizen and resident of Monroe Township for
10 at least one year prior to the annual
11 school election on April 17th, 2007.

12 Perhaps, the best way to proceed is this,
13 and you all decide on your own, will be to
14 ask questions. Where was the person
15 living? What does that mean in the
16 context, in this context? I think I've
17 given you some guidelines that I believe to
18 be appropriate guidelines and believe me I
19 looked at this pretty closely starting
20 Friday afternoon and over the weekend. Any
21 other member of the board?

22 MS. LEONARD: I have a question
23 along that same line.

24 MS. LORDI: This is Mrs. Leonard.

25 MS. LEONARD: It doesn't sound

1 clear to me at all upon what a legal
2 residence of a person is. According to
3 what you just said it's anywhere I decide
4 to sleep for an extended period of time,
5 that there are no other connections, as
6 long as I can say that, hey, I'm staying at
7 John's house now for the next year, I'm
8 going to be a resident of John's town
9 regardless of anything else that's going
10 on.

11 MS. LORDI: No, Mrs. Leonard, you
12 absolutely are on the mark with respect to
13 one prong of the standard that I said I
14 believe is the appropriate standard, but
15 there is, if you will, a very broad second
16 prong in that it's not just a matter of
17 where I'm saying that I'm going to go home
18 and put my head on the pillow tonight, it's
19 also where I'm representing to the board --
20 excuse me, to the world that I'm actually
21 residing, living, where is my, I gave
22 examples and it's not an exhaustive list.
23 There will be lots of other examples.
24 Where do I list my driver's license? Where
25 do I have -- where do I vote? What voter

1 registration list am I on? What address
2 have I given to my employer? I've often
3 had to look at that in the context of my
4 work, not for myself but we're
5 investigating particular matters. Where
6 have I told my employer I live? Where have
7 I told, if I have children, where have I
8 told my children's school they can reach me
9 in an emergency? Where would she be
10 sending mail to me? Where do I receive my
11 mail? What have I told the post office?
12 Does the post office believe me to be
13 living in Monroe Township and do I have my
14 mail delivered in Monroe Township? So it's
15 really a totality of the circumstances kind
16 of test.

17 MS. LEONARD: We now have a
18 situation where we have a legal document
19 signed by Miss Speizer saying that her
20 primary residence was elsewhere, yet she is
21 saying she is still living here. Which set
22 of criteria do we use? Can you have more
23 than one legal permanent residence?

24 MS. LORDI: The employee -- excuse
25 me, the Board of Education member was

1 either living in Monroe Township for the
2 last year as of April 17th, 2007 or living
3 somewhere else; by living I mean residing.
4 It's either Monroe Township or it's
5 someplace else. So I think, frankly, we're
6 at the point where the facts, f-a-c-t-s,
7 are important. Miss Speizer, I'm going to
8 ask you if you wish to comment.

9 MS. SPEIZER: Well --

10 MS. LORDI: Where have you been
11 living the last year, I think that's the
12 question?

13 MS. SPEIZER: I've been living the
14 last 23 years in Monroe Township. One at,
15 I'm sorry, 12 Tenth Avenue until the year
16 2001 and from 2001 to the present at One
17 Namsan Drive, Monroe Township.

18 MS. LORDI: There seems to be some
19 concern about a document that's included in
20 the package of documents provided with the
21 objection regarding your assertion or a
22 statement that you would be living
23 elsewhere, can you explain to the board?

24 MS. SPEIZER: Sure. Back I believe
25 it was probably March or --

1 MS. LEONARD: I'm not hearing Miss
2 Speizer.

3 MS. LORDI: I'm sorry, is that
4 better, Miss Leonard?

5 MS. LEONARD: Yes.

6 MS. SPEIZER: My daughter and her
7 fiance' kind of talked to me about
8 purchasing the home here in Monroe that we
9 were living in and they expressed an
10 interest in doing it at that time for the
11 reason that they were a young couple, they
12 had the money and interest rates were going
13 up. I saw certainly no objection to that.
14 I would like to have my children -- my
15 grandchildren born and raised here in
16 Monroe. So what we did is we got ourselves
17 an attorney, Mr. Busch, and all three of us
18 used the same attorney and what we decided
19 was that I would sell the house to them but
20 they understood that because I am on the
21 Board of Education that I would continue to
22 live in this house. Now, yes, I did sign
23 that document and maybe at one time I
24 thought I would move down there, but I knew
25 I would never leave Monroe. I broke the

1 contract. My mortgage company is fully
2 aware of it. In fact, the documentation
3 they are sending me for my new residence
4 actually comes to Monroe Township, which I
5 have proof of. My mortgage company is well
6 aware of where I live.

7 Did that answer your question, Mrs.
8 Leonard?

9 MS. LEONARD: Well, I still have
10 confusion on why you signed a document
11 saying your primary residence was outside
12 of town?

13 MS. SPEIZER: Well it's a standard
14 document. In fact, I actually met a
15 gentleman this morning, his name is Richard
16 Braslow. I do have his card here. He is
17 an attorney and he is a real estate
18 attorney and when I asked him about this,
19 because he knew the situation, while I was
20 in Superior Court this morning. Basically
21 Mr. Braslow told me, this is just general
22 language. Basically, it's because the
23 mortgage company is trying to protect
24 themselves against me running a group home
25 or renting out this property or doing

1 something other with it then it being mine.
2 But I will state for the record I have
3 never lived in that house for maybe more
4 than two days and if I go down maybe once a
5 month, twice a month, it's a lot. My
6 children use it. They like to go to
7 Philadelphia. It's very close. My future
8 son-in-law has family down there. That's
9 all this residence is for. The reason that
10 I did purchase it is because I was waiting
11 for a condominium in Monroe Township
12 outside of the senior community, because
13 I'm not old enough to purchase one there,
14 to open up. I received a letter the
15 beginning of January, I'm not sure of the
16 date, letting me know that those
17 condominiums had opened. On January 15th
18 of this year I was at Monroe Manor
19 purchasing my condominium so I can move
20 from the Namsan Drive house with my
21 children to a condominium here in Monroe.
22 Does that answer your question, Mrs.
23 Leonard?

24 MS. LEONARD: So this house in
25 Flemington is an investment property or a

1 second home?

2 MS. SPEIZER: It's an investment
3 property.

4 MS. LEONARD: Then why does not the
5 mortgage say that?

6 MS. SPEIZER: Because that's how I
7 filled out the contract. I might have
8 thought at one time for a brief moment
9 maybe about moving down there when I
10 purchased it, but I knew I would never
11 leave Monroe. In fact, I would like to
12 read something from the mortgage agreement.
13 Going to paragraph six, occupancy, borrower
14 shall occupy, establish and use the
15 property as borrower's principal residence
16 within 60 days after the execution of the
17 security instrument and shall continue to
18 occupy the property as borrower's principal
19 residence for at least one year after the
20 date of occupancy unless lender otherwise
21 agrees in writing, which consent shall not
22 be unreasonably withheld, or unless
23 extenuating circumstances exist which are
24 beyond the borrower's control. To me that
25 clause says that I do not have to live

1 there. Granted, I did not send them a
2 letter, but it sounds to me, and I'm not an
3 attorney and I'm not in the mortgage
4 business, that they do not hold you to
5 this. And I would also like to say that I
6 called this mortgage company when I decided
7 to purchase my new home in Monroe. In my
8 conversation with Christopher Godwin, I
9 explained to him when he asked me why I was
10 purchasing another new home, I explained to
11 him that I did not live in the Lumberton
12 home, that I never had lived there and he
13 never said anything. This is the same
14 mortgage company. In fact, I have a
15 document here that he sent me that I can
16 produce, just recently, it came just last
17 week. It's actually for my new mortgage.
18 All of it was sent to Namsan Drive in
19 Monroe Township with my return address on
20 it as Monroe. So my mortgage company
21 clearly understands that I do not live in
22 that residence.

23 MS. LEONARD: To me that's not
24 true. I can have mail sent to any
25 residence in Monroe as long as I know that

1 person and they will take it in for me.
2 Receiving mail at an answer is not proof of
3 residence.

4 MS. SPEIZER: I believe you are
5 wrong.

6 MS. LEONARD: Well maybe my
7 standards are higher than yours.

8 MS. SPEIZER: Well maybe the
9 government standards are lower than yours
10 as well I guess. Because I happened to be
11 in the post office on Saturday sending Miss
12 Dressel a copy of my complaint and talked
13 to one of the mail clerks who told me that
14 where your mail is sent is where your
15 residence is. Are you saying that she is
16 lying to me?

17 MS. LEONARD: No, I'm not saying
18 that about the post office.

19 MS. SPEIZER: Thank you, Miss
20 Leonard.

21 MS. LORDI: I would ask the board
22 members let someone finish talking before
23 you talk so that Ms. Gill, our court
24 reporter, can be sure she gets everything
25 down on the machine. I believe Miss

1 Ostrager had another comment or question.

2 MS. OSTRAGER: Thank you. You
3 mentioned you are not in the mortgage
4 industry or an attorney. I think everyone
5 is well aware that I'm in the mortgage
6 industry. And you are correct in stating
7 that this is a very standard mortgage
8 contract, that you would have signed the
9 exact same mortgage if you were going to
10 use it as an investment property even if
11 you weren't going to live there. However,
12 if you were going to use it as an
13 investment property, there would normally
14 be a one to four family rider attached to
15 this mortgage. Was such a rider attached
16 to this mortgage?

17 MS. SPEIZER: No, it wasn't. I had
18 no idea that I was going to use it -- that
19 I had to fill out such a form. But I would
20 like to address you, Miss Lordi. Is this
21 about my mortgage or is this about my
22 residency because we seem to be
23 concentrating on a document that I
24 allegedly broke, a contract with a mortgage
25 company. I don't know if it's up to this

1 board to decide whether or not I broke a
2 contract. I believe that we are looking at
3 my residency.

4 MS. LORDI: The issue that you
5 raised is correct and, that is, as I
6 indicated at the commencement of the open
7 session, the issue today for the board to
8 consider is whether or not to sustain the
9 objection to your petition. The primary
10 issue arising from that objection is
11 whether or not you live in, that is, you
12 reside in Monroe. However, to the ex -- it
13 is correct that's the primary issue that
14 the board members have to answer today, the
15 primary question. However, to the extent
16 the board members believe it necessary to
17 probe related matters, I don't think they
18 are out of line. I don't think they are
19 out of order. If and when I decide that
20 discussion in my judgment has gone far
21 enough on that subject, I'll advise the
22 board and the board will either take my
23 advice or not. In any event, I would
24 permit some limited discussion further on
25 that.

1 MISS LORDI: Miss Haring.

2 MS. HARING: Thank you, Miss Lordi.

3 I think that the problem that we seem to be
4 having, and you mentioned where I represent
5 to the world that I hang my hat. To the
6 mortgage company you represented that you
7 are living in Lumberton and to people in
8 this town you represented that you are
9 living here. So where exactly are you
10 living? And you need to provide some kind
11 of proof and I have a form from Monroe
12 Township public schools about residency
13 requirements that you need to satisfy in
14 order to register a child in the district.
15 So proof of residency for homeowners would
16 be a deed, an affidavit of title, current
17 tax bill or statement, valid driver's
18 license, voter registration card and then
19 if you are a renter, you need to be able to
20 provide a lease or notarized letter from a
21 landlord, that could be rent checks, a
22 current utility, I think it's easy enough
23 to not change your driver's license.

24 MS. LORDI: Miss Haring, you are
25 asking whether or not there are any other

1 objective indicia, objective evidence of
2 Miss Speizer living or residing here in
3 Monroe Township?

4 MS. HARING: Yes, Miss Lordi, I'm
5 asking her to prove she does actually live
6 here and not just having her mail sent to
7 her daughter's house and expect us to
8 believe she really lives there. That's the
9 question.

10 MS. LORDI: Maybe I can ask some
11 questions in that regard that would be
12 helpful if you'll permit.

13 BY MS. LORDI:

14 Q. Miss Speizer, you are employed?

15 A. Yes, I am.

16 Q. By whom are you employed?

17 A. I'm employed by Monroe Township Police
18 Department.

19 Q. And presumably then you get a paycheck or have
20 direct deposit to the bank?

21 A. Yes, I have that right here.

22 Q. Let me, I'm going to walk over and ask to take a
23 look at the document that you are holding up.

24 A. Yes, ma'am.

25 Q. I'll pass this document around, but for purposes

1 of making certain that the board members who are
2 participating by telephone, Mr. Kaufman and Miss
3 Leonard, are aware of what's going on, I'll explain. I
4 just walked over to Miss Speizer who had a document, has
5 a document that she would like to present to the board
6 to provide evidence of, she asserts, of her residency in
7 Monroe Township, Mr. Kaufman and Miss Leonard. Members
8 of the board, this is an earnings statement prepared by
9 ADP, the company that does payroll, and it is issued by
10 the Township of Monroe, if I get this wrong at any
11 point, please let me know, Miss Speizer, by the Township
12 of Monroe Finance Office in connection with your
13 employment by the township?

14 A. Correct.

15 Q. And I see an address here of One Namsan Drive,
16 Monroe Township. With your permission, I'm going to
17 pass this so each member of the board can see it.

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. Thank you. I'm going to pass it right now for
20 the record initially to Mr. Braverman, sir. Mr.
21 Braverman, I would ask that you simply review it and
22 then pass it down to your colleagues one after the other
23 on the board will take... Is there anything else, any
24 other indicia, any other evidence in that regard you
25 have, Miss Speizer?

1 A. Yes, I do. I would like to show you two, I own
2 two vehicles, one I gave to my daughter, one is mine.
3 These are from New Jersey Manufacturers Insurance
4 Company which recognizes I also live at One Namsan
5 Drive. A vehicle registration for my vehicle, I'm
6 sorry, I didn't bring my daughter's with me, that shows,
7 this is a brand new car, One Namsan Drive. My New
8 Jersey driver's license, One Namsan Drive. I have a
9 firearms ID, One Namsan Drive.

10 Q. Is that in connection with your employment?

11 A. Excuse me?

12 Q. Is that in connection with your employment?

13 A. No, it's not. This is a personal item I acquired
14 from the township. I would also like to show I have
15 credit bills sent and registered to One Namsan Drive.

16 MR. KAUFMAN: I have a question for
17 the councilman.

18 MS. LORDI: Yes, Mr. Kaufman.

19 MR. KAUFMAN: Mrs. Speizer, the
20 driver's license that you have in evidence
21 is that, perhaps, a six-point license?

22 MS. SPEIZER: I'm sorry, I didn't
23 hear.

24 MS. LORDI: Is it a digital
25 license?

1 MS. SPEIZER: Yes, it is.

2 MS. LORDI: Is that what you meant,
3 Mr. Kaufman?

4 MR. KAUFMAN: Yes.

5 MS. SPEIZER: Yes, it is a digital
6 license.

7 MS. LORDI: You can't get a digital
8 license, I know from my personal
9 experience, you can't get a digital license
10 in New Jersey unless you bring in those six
11 points of identification. Is that what you
12 were referring to?

13 MR. KAUFMAN: That's basically
14 where I was going down.

15 MS. LORDI: Okay.

16 MR. KAUFMAN: The State of New
17 Jersey has one of the most stringent laws
18 in determining residency not just for a
19 State authority but for local residency as
20 well, and that same piece of evidence is
21 used for everything that you do in town
22 whether it's going to get a voter
23 registration card or trying to get a
24 library card or anything that you do, that
25 determines your, not just your state of

1 residency but your township of residency,
2 and knowing that, and what you need to have
3 as far as documentation, I know that the
4 question earlier was asked what other
5 corroborating proof, but as far as I'm
6 concerned the State of New Jersey commands
7 a very strict guideline as far as what's
8 determining where somebody lives and a
9 six-point license, in my opinion, is an
10 extremely credible piece of evidence.

11 MS. LORDI: I'm going to pick up
12 those documents. Thank you, Mr. Kaufman.

13 MS. LEONARD: I have a question.

14 MS. LORDI: Yes, Miss Leonard, could
15 you just hold on.

16 MS. SPEIZER: I still have more.

17 MS. LORDI: Mrs. Leonard, just hold
18 that question for a moment. Miss Speizer,
19 go on please.

20 MS. SPEIZER: Laugh, this is the
21 ownership paper for my dog showing me at
22 One Namsan Drive. My dog licenses from
23 last year and this year. A check I wrote
24 to Monroe Manor. You can see the address
25 on the, and you'll be able to see the

1 address on the check as One Namsan Drive.
2 This is a FedEx package I received from
3 Country Wide Mortgage who owns my current
4 mortgage on the Lumberton home, will have
5 my new mortgage on the Monroe home, again
6 using the address, the return address of
7 One Namsan Drive. I have money at the
8 Sovereign Bank, they recognize me at One
9 Namsan Drive. I belong to the Middlesex
10 County Credit Union, they recognize me at
11 One Namsan Drive. Aetna, my insurance
12 company, recognizes me at One Namsan Drive
13 and New Jersey Manufacturers understands
14 that I do not live in the home in
15 Lumberton. It is only insured as a
16 dwelling. They recognize I live at One
17 Namsan Drive.

18 MS. LORDI: Miss Speizer, I'm going
19 to take those documents from you.

20 MS. SPEIZER: I would ask board
21 members to please be very careful with my
22 documents, apparently someone on this board
23 has given out personal information, phone
24 numbers for me that were unlisted so I
25 would appreciate my documents be kept

1 confidential. Thank you, and there you go.

2 MS. LORDI: Let's count how many we
3 have here. Seriously, there is one
4 outstanding. I'm counting the number of
5 documents that we're passing around so we
6 can check at the end. There is one being
7 passed around now. There is two, three,
8 four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten,
9 eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen,
10 fifteen, sixteen.

11 MS. SPEIZER: I just want to
12 explain, it's right up here.

13 MS. LORDI: Seventeen, eighteen,
14 and I will review those for the board and
15 then if anyone wants to see any of these
16 documents, they are obviously available.

17 MS. LORDI: Mrs. Leonard and Mr.
18 Kaufman, I now have the documents in front
19 of me. I'm back to my station here by the
20 telephone. The first document is indeed an
21 insurance card, automobile insurance card
22 from New Jersey Manufacturers written to
23 Amy Speizer at One Namsan Drive, Monroe
24 Township. I'll pass this around. Where is
25 the statement of earnings, has it made its

1 way back yet?

2 MS. SPEIZER: I'm sorry, what?

3 MS. LORDI: Do you have the
4 statement of earnings? Did it make its way
5 back to you?

6 MS. SPEIZER: Yes, it did.

7 MS. LORDI: Okay, you have it. Mr.
8 Braverman. I have a second New Jersey
9 Manufacturers insurance card for, this is
10 for a 2007 Honda, I assume that's for a
11 different car. Mr. Braverman.

12 Carol, could you just --

13 MS. HARING: 2001 Honda.

14 MS. LORDI: Thank you, ma'am. I
15 have here the digital auto driver's
16 license. This is what Mr. Kaufman was
17 referring to when you said that has six
18 points of identification required. This is
19 Miss Speizer's driver's license, her
20 picture on it, the Monroe Township address,
21 issued February 4, 2005, but you'll please
22 correct my vision if I'm getting that
23 wrong, Mr. Braverman, Ms. Haring.

24 MS. FARAONE: Miss Lordi.

25 MS. LORDI: Yes.

1 MS. FARAONE: Are you going to go
2 through all 18 documents?

3 MS. LORDI: Yeah, I am.

4 MS. FARAONE: Okay. Can I?

5 MS. LORDI: You want to ask a
6 question?

7 MS. FARAONE: I have a question. I
8 would like to know where Ms. Speizer goes
9 at night when she leaves work?

10 MS. LORDI: Miss Speizer.

11 MS. SPEIZER: When I leave work, I
12 go to number One Namsan Drive in Monroe
13 Township.

14 MS. FARAONE: Okay. I
15 unfortunately have to go back to work. So
16 I would like to call the question or --

17 MS. LORDI: It is -- you would like
18 to make a motion?

19 MS. FARAONE: Yeah. And I would
20 refer back to Mr. Homoki, the member for
21 the original motion.

22 MS. LORDI: Mr. Homoki, you want to
23 make a motion?

24 MR. HOMOKI: Yes, please. I would
25 like to ask you a question first.

1 MS. LORDI: Yes, sir.

2 MR. HOMOKI: Before I make a
3 motion. If the board supports removal and
4 then a restraining order is filed,
5 everything stops until the hearing,
6 correct?

7 MS. LORDI: Yes, sir.

8 MR. HOMOKI: All right. I move
9 that based on the order that was issued
10 this morning by Judge Happas that Miss
11 Speizer remain on the ballot until such
12 time as a determination and a hearing is
13 held on March the 13th in Superior Court.

14 MS. LORDI: Is there a second and
15 then I'll talk about that motion?

16 MR. LEARY: Second.

17 MS. LORDI: Second by Mr. --

18 MR. LEARY: Leary.

19 MS. LORDI: --Leary. Thank you,
20 sir. Mr. Holliday, I'll have discussion on
21 the motion if I might. Under the statute
22 you have to make -- you can't put it off.
23 The statute says that, I'm sorry, Title
24 19:60-7 says that you have to make a
25 determination on the objection. You

1 can't -- the statute doesn't permit the
2 board to leave the decision to someone
3 else.

4 MR. HOMOKI: If I may clarify, I
5 specifically said she will remain on the
6 board.

7 MS. LORDI: So what you are doing,
8 I believe what you are doing, I don't want
9 to put words in your mouth, but I think
10 what you are saying instead, Mr. Homoki, is
11 you are making a motion to sustain the
12 petition, that is, to decline the
13 objection?

14 MR. HOMOKI: That's correct.

15 MS. LEONARD: Then there will be no
16 hearing on the 13th, is that correct?

17 MS. LORDI: Just give me a moment,
18 Miss Leonard.

19 Hang on a second, I have to look at
20 the order again. It won't be declining the
21 objection. It would be denying the
22 objection.

23 I just want to be clear with my
24 words. I'm looking now at the order to
25 show cause.

1 MR. HOMOKI: I didn't phrase it
2 deny. I phrased it a positive way which is
3 essentially saying the same thing.

4 MS. LORDI: Oh, yes, I know you
5 did, but you have to -- what the statute
6 requires the board to do is to make a
7 determination on the objection.

8 MR. KAUFMAN: Is it possible for me
9 to say anything here?

10 MS. LORDI: Sure, it is. Go ahead,
11 Mr. Kaufman. This is open to discussion
12 now.

13 MR. KAUFMAN: I know that there is
14 a motion on the floor, but maybe this will
15 help the process here, and I don't know, I
16 guess maybe we have to finish talking about
17 the existing motion on the floor, and if we
18 haven't then I guess I'll --

19 MS. LORDI: Mr. Kaufman, just say
20 what's on your mind.

21 MR. KAUFMAN: I was just going to
22 say what I believe we need to do here today
23 is just to determine whether or not we have
24 ample proof that Mrs. Speizer has
25 definitively represented herself, provided

1 accurate documentation that she is a
2 resident of Monroe Township and if that is
3 true, then what I would like to suggest or
4 make a motion is that we reject the request
5 for the, I'm sorry you said it before --

6 MS. LORDI: What you are suggesting
7 is that the board deny the objection?

8 MR. KAUFMAN: We deny the objection
9 and that we end it here today and not wait
10 or put it off.

11 MS. LORDI: All right. The board
12 may do so, the board may vote, Mr. Homoki,
13 Mr. Kaufman and you are essentially saying
14 the same thing but if I might just for a
15 moment because I don't want to not answer
16 Mrs. Leonard's question. However the board
17 decides today, this Order to Show Cause
18 does indeed require the parties to appear
19 before Judge Happas on March 13th.

20 MS. LEONARD: Can that be withdrawn
21 by Miss Speizer?

22 MS. LORDI: This isn't Miss
23 Speizer's order, Ms. Leonard, this is Judge
24 Happas'.

25 MS. LEONARD: That order would

1 stand regardless of our vote?

2 MS. LORDI: Judge Happas -- Miss
3 Speizer can make whatever application if
4 she wants to, anyone can, make whatever
5 application one wants to to the Superior
6 Court judge; however, right now the order
7 that I have in front of me, which I can
8 pass around to the members of the board,
9 tells us that Judge Happas intends to
10 conduct a hearing on March 13th with
11 respect to the issue of residency; that,
12 however, does not preclude the board's
13 obligation today to make a determination.

14 MS. LEONARD: That's not my
15 question.

16 MS. LORDI: Well, I think I
17 answered your question, Miss Leonard, and
18 the answer to your question is whichever
19 way the Board of Education --

20 MR. HOMOKI: Mrs. Lordi, this is
21 Mr. Homoki again. I can accept Mr.
22 Kaufman's -- I would change my motion to
23 say, I would move that we deny the
24 objection and the rest of it.

25 MS. LEONARD: If you can answer my

1 question.

2 MS. LORDI: Yes, Mrs. Leonard, if
3 you will hang on a minute, we have a
4 revision to the motion. Mr. Leary, do you
5 second?

6 MR. LEARY: Second.

7 MS. LORDI: We have a motion by Mr.
8 Homoki, second by Mr. Leary. Now we have
9 Mrs. Leonard's discussion, Mrs. Leonard's
10 question.

11 Mrs. Leonard, I think I answered
12 the question, and the answer is whatever
13 action the board takes today, Judge Happas
14 has indicated in her Order to Show Cause
15 that she intends to conduct a hearing on
16 March 13th as to why judgment should not be
17 entered terminating plaintiff's residency
18 to be Monroe, New Jersey. I'm going to
19 pass this Order to Show Cause around so
20 members of the board can see it. I'll start
21 with Mr. Braverman again.

22 MS. LEONARD: I guess I should
23 change the question to, can only the judge
24 throw this out and not have the hearing or
25 can either party say we don't want the

1 hearing so it's called off?

2 MS. LORDI: The judge decides
3 whether or not to conduct the hearing.
4 Mrs. Speizer has a complaint before her
5 Honor, before Judge Happas. Miss Dressel
6 will have the opportunity to respond. The
7 board frankly is being required to respond
8 as well. You know, frankly, I can't read
9 the judge's mind. It's going to be up to
10 the judge to decide how she handles it.
11 Right now my job is to see that my Board of
12 Education votes and makes whatever decision
13 it has.

14 MS. LEONARD: I --

15 MS. LORDI: I'm sorry, Mrs. Leonard.

16 MS. LEONARD: I agree with you.

17 MS. LORDI: Thank you, ma'am. Is
18 there any other discussion on the motion?
19 Yes, ma'am. Mrs. Ostrager.

20 MS. OSTRAGER: Yes. When I called
21 the New Jersey School Board, they told me
22 even with an application for residency, it
23 would be reasonable to use New Jersey
24 Administrative Code 6A:22-3.4 as guidelines
25 for residency. I just want to make sure

1 before I vote that you think this is a
2 reasonable way to try to make this
3 decision. There are eight points here that
4 they have, one of which is property tax
5 bills and other things are things Miss
6 Speizer brought up, licenses, bank bills,
7 and stuff like that. It says to use a
8 totality of information, all of it; so, is
9 this a proper way?

10 MS. LORDI: Can I see that?

11 MS. OSTRAGER: It seems a question
12 of one document versus other documents, is
13 this a reasonable way to make the decision?

14 MS. LORDI: What, if you remember
15 earlier, I used the totality of the
16 circumstances phrase.

17 MS. OSTRAGER: Right.

18 MS. LORDI: Because I believe that
19 you have to look at the whole picture.
20 What you are holding there, you've been
21 advised by our colleagues down at the
22 school boards is to look at 6A:22-3.4 which
23 addresses student eligibility issues,
24 whether or not a student is eligible to
25 attend. I don't think this is

1 unreasonable. I don't believe this would
2 govern. I don't believe as a matter of law
3 this would govern. I think it would be
4 advisory, but I think, I believe, knowing
5 this regulation as I do, that the types of,
6 types of items that are being referenced,
7 that are referenced in this regulations are
8 really the types of items that one would
9 look at from a common sensical perspective,
10 I believe. The short answer is yeah --
11 yes.

12 MS. OSTRAGER: Because it's one
13 document that says she lives elsewhere but
14 there are other documents that say she
15 lives in Monroe and it does specifically
16 state in here that we shouldn't base our
17 decision on only one document but the
18 totality of the documents presented. Is
19 that a correct way to try and make a
20 decision?

21 MS. LORDI: I think that one looks
22 at the totality of the circumstances, the
23 affidavit, and the various other documents
24 that I have here that the question now
25 having been called, if there's any board

1 member who would like to take a look at
2 these documents, I offer them to you. Mr.
3 Braverman, I'm going to -- Miss Faraone,
4 I'm conscious of your legitimate concern.
5 I'm going to pass these documents to Mr.
6 Braverman, everything from the car
7 registration to a number of other documents
8 and at the end of the day, Miss Gill, I
9 would ask that we record these on the
10 record because I'm not marking them as
11 exhibits in order to move the process
12 along. I see a yes coming from you. Thank
13 you.

14 The question has been -- is someone
15 calling the question?

16 MS. FARAONE: Again.

17 MS. LORDI: Well, we've got a
18 motion and a second. We had discussion.
19 Now you're calling the question? Do you
20 want to take a vote? Is someone calling
21 the question.

22 MR. HOMOKI: Call the question.

23 MS. LORDI: Mr. Homoki. Someone
24 other than Mr. Homoki?

25 MS. LEONARD: I'll call the

1 question.

2 MS. LORDI: Miss Leonard called the
3 question. Mr., as I indicated, I don't
4 believe I indicated this in open session
5 earlier; however, there are ten members of
6 the Board of Education participating in
7 today's meeting, eight in person, two by
8 telephone, nine members of the Board of
9 Education are eligible to vote on this
10 motion. Mrs. Speizer will not be voting in
11 view of her personal interest in the
12 outcome of the vote. Mr. Holliday, would
13 you please take the roll.

14 MR. HOLLIDAY: For the purpose --

15 MS. LORDI: Excuse me, Mr.
16 Holliday.

17 MR. FERRIE: Would it be
18 appropriate to read the motion?

19 MS. LORDI: I'm sorry, read the
20 motion. Mr. Homoki, would you like to read
21 your motion?

22 MR. HOMOKI: I'll try to combine
23 it, but yes. I move that based on the
24 evidence provided we deny the objection and
25 I have the rest of it. You want me to do

1 the whole thing?

2 MS. LORDI: What do you have, Mr.
3 Homoki?

4 Specifically I understand you are
5 making a motion to deny the objection set
6 forth in the letter of Jennifer Dressel
7 dated March 1, 2007 to Mr. Wayne Holliday,
8 board secretary. Is that your motion?

9 MR. HOMOKI: That's the motion but
10 I also said she would remain on the board,
11 that doesn't need to be?

12 MS. LORDI: That's correct.

13 MR. HOMOKI: That doesn't need to
14 be said. And the March 13th hearing
15 doesn't need to be said.

16 MS. LORDI: That's correct.

17 MR. HOMOKI: All right, then that's
18 all the motion is to deny the --

19 MS. LORDI: To deny the objection.
20 The hearing, as I read this Order to Show
21 Cause, the hearing before Judge Happas will
22 occur unless her honor decides it shouldn't
23 occur. Mr. Holliday, take the roll,
24 please.

25 MS. LEONARD: One question.

1 MS. LORDI: Well, we were really
2 done with questions. We are ready to take
3 the vote, Mrs. Leonard.

4 MS. LEONARD: A yes vote, she stays
5 on the --

6 MS. LORDI: That is a very good
7 question. That's a terrific question. I
8 was just trying to follow Roberts rules
9 here. If you are voting yes, you are
10 voting to deny the objection which means
11 that Mrs. -- you are voting to accept Mrs.
12 Speizer's petition if you vote yes. If you
13 vote no, you are voting to, essentially,
14 Mr. Holliday, let me be clear, let me just
15 be clear. Mr. Homoki, if you vote yes on
16 Mr. Homoki --

17 MR. HOMOKI: She remains on the
18 board.

19 MS. LORDI: That's right.

20 MR. HOMOKI: If you vote no --

21 MS. LORDI: Her petition remains.

22 MR. HOMOKI: That's correct.

23 MS. LORDI: Her petition remains,
24 the objection will be denied if you vote
25 yes.

1 MS. LEONARD: Okay, I wanted to be
2 sure. I didn't want to get it backwards.

3 MS. LORDI: It's a really good
4 question. We're ready now to take a vote.
5 Mr. Holliday.

6 MR. HOLLIDAY: So noted. Mr. Leary.

7 MR. LEARY: Yes.

8 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mrs. Haring.

9 MRS. HARING: Yes.

10 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Kaufman.

11 MR. KAUFMAN: Yes.

12 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Faraone.

13 MS. FARAONE: Yes.

14 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Leonard.

15 MS. LEONARD: No.

16 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Braverman.

17 MR. BRAVERMAN: Pass.

18 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mr. Braverman, is
19 that an abstain or a pass?

20 MR. BRAVERMAN: That's a pass.

21 MR. HOLLIDAY: So noted, sir.

22 Mr. Homoki.

23 MR. HOMOKI: Yes.

24 MR. HOLLIDAY: Mrs. Ostrager.

25 MS. OSTRAGER: Yes.

1 MR. HOLLIDAY: Miss Kolupanowich.

2 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Yes.

3 MR. HOLLIDAY: The motion is

4 carried, one no, one pass.

5 MS. LORDI: Ladies and gentlemen, I

6 would ask the members of the board -- Mr.

7 Braverman, I didn't hear you. I apologize.

8 MR. BRAVERMAN: Yes.

9 MS. LORDI: Mr. Braverman votes yes.

10 I'm sorry, what, Mr. Braverman?

11 MR. BRAVERMAN: Yes.

12 MS. LORDI: Let me ask the members

13 of the board to make certain that all of

14 the documents that Miss Speizer passed on,

15 we have everything here. Miss Speizer, did

16 you get your homeowners and car insurance

17 card back?

18 MS. SPEIZER: I have my insurance

19 card back and my driver's license as well.

20 MS. LORDI: And I have everything

21 else. No one has anything.

22 MS. SPEIZER: Excuse me, Miss

23 Lordi, at this time would it be okay if I

24 present this to Miss Dressel? This is an

25 Order to appear before --

1 MS. LORDI: You can do that after
2 the close of the meeting.

3 MS. SPEIZER: Because the court had
4 asked me to personally.

5 MS. LORDI: I'm sure you can do
6 that after the close of the meeting.

7 There is no further business to be
8 conducted I believe here today. Mr.
9 Holliday, I give the meeting back to Madam
10 President.

11 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Thank you. Our
12 next scheduled Board of Education meeting
13 Monday, March 12, 2007, seven o'clock p.m.
14 at the high school. Motion to adjourn.

15 MR. KAUFMAN: So moved.

16 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Mr. Kaufman.

17 MS. SPEIZER: Second.

18 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Second by Miss
19 Speizer. All in favor. Aye.

20 VOICES: Aye.

21 MR. BRAVERMAN: No.

22 MS. KOLUPANOWICH: Opposed.
