School Resource Officer (SRO) and a school counselor took a pie to the face.








GIVING BACK TO THE COMMUNITY


equity and inclusion within the District and community. This series is presented as a collaboration between the Art Club and the school's local chapter of SHOUT (Social Handprints Overcoming Unjust Treatment).

Mr. Jason Shorr, Seneca Valley Intermediate High School and Senior High School Art teacher, is working with Mr. Ashley Porter, Seneca Valley's Supervisor of Equity and Title IX Coordinator and Ms. Lisa Graham and Malika Christopher, Seneca Valley Intermediate High School Counselors and advisors for SHOUT, to collaborate and provide students with an opportunity to learn about a diverse assortment of art as well as diverse artists.

"The Celebration Art Series is the first of its kind in the Seneca Valley Big Gallery. We are always exhibiting local artists for the student community to see but this is the first series with a common theme. The artists represent diversity either with their art or related to their personal story. We have had two exhibitions so far and will focus on two more artists after the winter break into the spring," said Mr. Shorr. "Representatives from the art club and the SHOUT organization will be helping to choose the next two artists

and, in essence, help to curate the shows. This has been an exciting and unique opportunity for all involved."

This series is comprised of nine student representatives from the art club and SHOUT. The student committee is provided with a panel of local artists, then after their research



Each artist is invited for an "artist talk" to discuss with students their background, processes, materials used in their pieces and career opportunities in visual arts. Each exhibit is proudly displayed in the Big Gallery adjacent to the IHS cafeteria for about 5-7 weeks.

The Celebration Art Series officially kicked off in November and will run through April of 2023. Mr. Shorr along with Mr. Porter, Ms. Graham, and Ms. Christopher plan to continue working with students throughout the remainder of the school year to develop this student-led series of local artists celebrating diversity.





SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS TEACH LIFESAVING LESSONS IN THE CLASSROOM

Students at Ryan Gloyer Middle School (RGMS) are not only getting lessons in the classroom but lessons in life with the help of Seneca Valley's school resource officers (SROs), Officer Chris Pipkin and Officer Chris Miller.

Officer Pipkin and Officer Miller have teamed up with RGMS Family and Consumer Sciences teacher, Ms. Kayla Robinson, to co-teach her Personal Development class on topics related to the Character and Child Development Units. Through these classes, students are learning about stress management, communication, teamwork and important lifesaving skills.

"I am extremely thankful for Officer Pipkin and Officer Miller's immediate willingness to come into the classroom. The students get very excited when they know our guest speakers will be showing up because it gives them the opportunity to interact with the SROs in a positive manner. We always promote building a rapport with our students, so this has been an amazing experience to improve on that while also giving the officers a chance to speak on valuable topics," said Ms. Robinson.

Officer Pipkin and Officer Miller teach students what to do in an emergency, then practice various ways the situation could be handled. Students have learned first aid skills like the Heimlich maneuver, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and even how to apply a tourniquet.

"Working with Ms. Robinson and talking with her students about the importance of safety has been fun and necessary. At all times we must practice safety measures because we never know the minute, the hour or the day when a dangerous situation will come upon us. I told the kids that no matter how aware and diligent they may be as far as practicing safety, there may be a day when they may have to exercise lifesaving measures to a stranger, a friend or a loved one," said Officer Pipkin.

Additionally, Officer Miller has been working with Ms. Angela Kotula, RGMS Librarian, as she teaches digital



citizenship lessons for both seventh and eighth graders.

"Together, we cover a variety of topics including digital footprints, how words and actions matter, and, in January, we will be discussing the dangers of online predators with our eighth graders," explained Ms. Kotula. "Having Office Miller co-teach these lessons with me helps the students understand the seriousness of the digital world, and they are provided with the opportunity to make personal connections with our school and community law enforcement officers."

"The digital citizenship lessons gave me a chance to speak with the students in a classroom setting and give real examples of how irresponsible social media use can impact the students' lives socially and legally," said Officer Miller.





Seneca Valley has a total of three SROs on the 7-12 secondary campus who are highly trained and certified police officers with the Jackson Township Police Department. These officers work closely with administration to assist with our security needs and have developed an excellent rapport with staff and students. They also work with students to encourage positive and productive behavior.

CREATIVE AND COZY SPACES

In 2021-22, Stan Zimmerman, Ryan Glover Middle School (RGMS) Art Teacher, helped a student build a faux fireplace as part of his senior project and for final installation in the RGMS Library. David Harmon, SV Class of 2022, was able to build the project with all supply costs completely covered by the Seneca Valley Foundation and the RGMS Library Club. This is a wonderful example of how the District continues to transform library spaces into Creativity, Innovation and Research Centers (CIRC), maker spaces, and multimedia rooms while still maintaining the library component. These have become unique areas that promote exploration, curiosity and reading.

PMEA DISTRICT 5 HONORS BAND

On Tuesday, Nov. 15, auditions were held for the 2022 Pennsylvania Music Education Association's (PMEA) District 5 Honors Band at Westminster College. District 5 is comprised of all school districts in Beaver, Butler, Lawrence and Mercer counties. To audition, students must be in at least ninth grade and prepare a piece from a predetermined solo list for each school year. These collegelevel solos are selected by the directors of District 5. Over 200 students auditioned for a band of 125 musicians. Seneca Valley had 42 students earn a position in the Honors Band this year, more than any other school. This year's Honors Band was guest conducted by Dr. M. Gregory Martin, Professor of Music Education and Associate Director of Bands at Westchester University. The three-day festival culminated with a concert in Orr Auditorium at Westminster College on Dec. 10, at 2 p.m. The Seneca Valley Band Directors at the secondary level include Varden Armstrong, Robert Babick, Sara Snyder and Brian Croach.





ALUMNI Q&A

Siona Sharma, SV '16, is currently working at the Global Fund to fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria in Geneva, Switzerland. She also works at Aid Pioneers e.V. and serves as their Chief Strategy Officer. We asked her to catch us up on what she is doing and how Seneca Valley influenced her life and career.

Q: Catch us up. Tell us what you're doing today:

A: Over the last few years, I have begun building a career in global public health. I believe that once you guarantee a person, especially a woman, their right to health, it allows them to find independence in security in every aspect of life. In our community at home, healthcare may often be a privilege we overlook, but this isn't the case in many low and middle-income countries of the world, including in India, where I am from. I currently work at the Global Fund to fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria in Geneva, Switzerland. There, we think about how to make sure countries have the funding they require to address the causes of the world's highest disease burden. After work, I work at Aid Pioneers e.V.; I serve as their Chief Strategy Officer and lead a project to get resources to lawyers representing victims of abuse in Rwanda. Prior to this, I studied Global Health at Georgetown University and later worked in the public sector practice of McKinsey & Co. in both Washington D.C. and Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

Q: How did Seneca Valley help you become the person you are today, both personally and professionally?

At Seneca Valley, I was able to explore my interests in international affairs and politics with the teachers and programs that supported me, even if they didn't know how—especially through the Purpose program and Academic Games. I planted my foundations of professional independence then, when I often had to forge my own path and was then given resources to explore my interests. Personally, Seneca Valley challenged me with perspectives that I learned to both empathize with and use to develop my own values. We did not have the most practice looking at communities and the world outside of our own, but especially when I moved to D.C. and lived through the political changes of the last several years, I reflected on the community that raised me and how their perspectives, even if perspectives

I don't necessary identify with now, are still critical to remember in politics that often forget places like ours.

Q: What do you think makes Seneca Valley such a special place to learn and grow?

A: I valued the flexibility that Seneca Valley offered me in charting my path toward college; and more than this, I do think I was raised by teachers and alongside students who shared



similar values for kindness and a strong sense of responsibility to our community. I carry these lessons with me to this day, regardless of where I am.

Q: Who was your favorite teacher/coach/SV staff member?

A: My favorite mentor was Mr. Dale Wagner, my Academic Games teacher in early middle school and Purpose teacher until his retirement. He always encouraged me to dream outside of the walls of our school, and he never questioned me while I did so. Now, having left SV and our corner of western Pennsylvania, I've found that Mr. Wagner gave me the vision for a career in public service that I have built upon over the years, but may not have been able to see in myself without him.

Q: What is one of your favorite memories from your time at Seneca Valley?

A: I was quite involved in Youth and Government, and with my peers from Seneca Valley, we led a delegation for our region. We grew from a group of two students to one of over 40, and I would always look forward to Monday nights spent debating and learning about political topics that I did not otherwise encounter in my daily life, considering the future of rural communities in the U.S. or implementing new healthcare measures for the public.

Q: If you had one message for teachers or staff, what would it be?

A: I would encourage teachers to open and expose their students' minds to perspectives from communities and the world around us, more than a decade-old curriculum may force through obligation. As much as I was raised with a strong sense of community, once I left, I realized there was a world of viewpoints, cultures and values that I'd not seen before—and it forced me to grow and reinforce my own principles in a way that I would have loved to explore much earlier on in life. I do believe in the power of teachers to influence not only what we, as students learn, but how we think. More than a nice thing to have, it is imperative for young people to practice curiosity for the communities that exist outside of our own to inculcate a sense of tolerance, compassion and responsibility for our global neighbors.

School Based Mental Health

Frequently Asked Questions for Seneca Valley Parents





About Glade Run

Glade Run currently contracts and provides outpatient counseling services in several school districts located in Allegheny, Butler and Beaver counties, including Seneca Valley School District.

Glade Run operates three school-based outpatient program models: Mental Health Partnership (MHP); Therapeutic Classroom; and Modified Therapeutic Classroom. The school-based therapists conduct initial psycho-social assessments and then provide individual, family and group therapy as determined by the individual student's treatment plan.

What is School Based Mental Health (SBMH)?

SBMH refers to mental health services for school age youth addressing social, emotional and behavioral health along with the ability to cope with life's challenges. Services are delivered in the school setting during the school day and, if needed, can continue during the summer months.

Why is Seneca Valley partnering with Glade Run Lutheran Services to provide school based mental health services?

Seneca Valley cares about it's students and recognizes the need to provide access to services that will support mental wellness within the classroom. Research demonstrates that students who receive mental health support achieve better academically. In addition, classroom behavior, on-task learning, and students' sense of connectedness and well-being all improve as well.

Who will be providing mental health services to my child? School based mental health services will be provided by licensed therapists through Glade Run Lutheran Services.

As a parent, do I have any financial obligation?

Payment is based on individual insurance similar to your medical insurance. After completing the referral and during the initial phone call from the therapist, parents will be informed of any financial obligation prior to the start of any services.

Where will my child's services take place?

Services are delivered in approved spaces within the school. These spaces have been approved by the Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (OMHSAS).

Will my child miss class or need to stay after regular school hours?

Appointment times are determined by the student, parent and school counselor and are typically during the school day unless the therapist, student and parent make other arrangements.

Can I participate in my child's therapy?

Therapy is confidential but Glade Run offers Family Therapy as well if the team determines it necessary and/or with a parent/guardian request.

How do I get started?



Referrals may be completed by parents/guardians, teachers, nurses, counselors/social workers or the student him/herself.



This referral is forwarded to Glade Run's outpatient referral coordinator, who verifies student insurance and forwards to the program supervisor for staffing.



At that time, the assigned therapist will contact the student's family to set up intake, which will take place at your child's school. This process is typically completed within 24-48 hours.
