Prior to his career in law enforcement, Officer Pipkin played basketball for Eastern Michigan University then went on to play in the National Basketball League (NBL) overseas for four years in Ireland, Austria and New Zealand where his team won the New Zealand Basketball Championship in 1995.

Officer Pipkin was later recognized for his superior athletic achievements when he was inducted into the New Brighton High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2005, the Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame in 2011 and the Pittsburgh Basketball Hall of Fame in 2019.

After his basketball career came to an end, Officer Pipkin soon realized that he not only wanted to work in law enforcement, but also wanted to work with kids.

“I became a police officer to make a difference in my community and protect people. I chose to be an SRO to be a mentor to young people and let them see the everyday human side of police officers,” said Officer Pipkin. “As a police officer newly on SRO, I have to be pro-active, approachable, firm and fair,” he explained. “But mostly, I have to be honorable both in and out of uniform.”

Known to the students as “Pip,” you can find him handing out high-fives across campus and bonding with the kids through friendly games of basketball and the ever-popular arm-wrestling matches.

“I have a deep sense of pride working for such an elite and diverse school district. It’s a good day when students have positive interactions, learn as much as they can and leave feeling just a little bit better than when they entered the building,” said Officer Pipkin.

Officer Pipkin and his wife are residents of Cranberry Township and are proud parents of current Seneca Valley students.

With the addition of Officer Pipkin, Seneca Valley now has three school resource officers (SROs) on the 7-12 secondary campus who are highly trained and certified police officers with the Jackson Township Police Department. These officers work closely with administration to assist with our security needs and have developed an excellent rapport with staff and students. IHS STUDENTS DIG IN, SPRUCE UP COURTYARD

Students, faculty and staff members at Seneca Valley Intermediate High School (IHS) are now able to enjoy their beautiful and tranquil courtyard just in time for the splendor of fall. But this wouldn't be possible without the help from the hardworking students in Ms. Carrie Ehrenberger's Foundations for Success class.

During the 2021-22 school year, Ms. Ehrenberger challenged students in her Foundations for Success course, a class specifically for ninth graders that focuses on the Six Pillars of Character. Students spent an entire semester learning about trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship; the last pillar which would include 10 hours of community service. Since students couldn't volunteer in the community last year due to the pandemic, they decided to work on beautifying their IHS courtyard, which would create a more positive learning environment and provide a place for students to hang out and eat their lunch.

Ms. Ehrenberger's students spent weeks designing and planning how they would improve the courtyard then presented their ideas to building administrators, student council, various school clubs, and the Seneca Valley Foundation. The SV Foundation awarded the class with \$2,700 in funding for their project and the student council provided the picnic tables for the courtyard space.

Students worked hard pulling weeds for several days, laying down landscaping fabric and painting rocks to bring color into the courtyard. They even worked with Mr. Jason Shorr, High School Art teacher and Mr. Joe Ehrenberger, IHS Applied Engineering and Technology teacher, to create a one-of-a-kind SV sculpture that is now a forever home in the IHS courtyard.

"My goal was to help students take ownership in their school and develop pride for their building. I thought if students were working hard to make the school beautiful, they would encourage their peers to also respect their school. I may have had a



small group of individuals working in the courtyard, but it had a significant effect on the building as a whole," said Ms. Ehrenberger.

"It was cool being a part of a new change in the school, knowing that future students will walk by and possibly think to themselves, when was that added? Has that always been here? Which are thoughts that I've had throughout past school years. Having a say in making the school a better place was an honor, and I've even seen more people use the courtyard this school year than I did all of last year which is rewarding and inspiring," said sophomore, Iliana James.

"This project was a great opportunity to make a positive change in our school. We hope that what we've done to the courtyard can make our school a friendlier and more welcoming space," said sophomore, Zach Garma.

Added Karley Schaefer, sophomore, "There is only one way to describe

working on the IHS courtyard - and that it was inspiring. It was a great way to communicate with my fellow classmates and learn some important life skills while also helping the school I love."

The IHS courtyard will continue to be maintained. Ms. Ehrenberger's current students have the opportunity to gain volunteer hours by weeding and adding flowers and/or fall decorations. The hope is to one day add a giant size chess board for students. ■

ERADICATE HATE GLOBAL SUMMIT

Seneca Valley teachers and administrators attended the Eradicate Hate Global Summit that was held Sept. 19-21 at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center in Pittsburgh. This event is the most comprehensive anti-hate conference in the world. It unites experts and leaders from around the globe who are dedicated to eradicating all forms of hate-fueled violence. The mission of the Eradicate Hate Global Summit is to identify and implement effective solutions for collective change.

Mr. Ashley Porter, Supervisor of Equity and Title IX Coordinator, along with Ms. Meagan Loewy, Mr. Ezekiel Stroupe and Mr. Gregory Smolinski, gifted Support Teachers from Ryan Gloyer Middle School, were in attendance with hundreds of others from around the Pittsburgh area. The Summit brought together leaders from government,

academia, journalism, business and the non-profit sector. The three days consisted of international keynote speakers, panelists and variety of break-out sessions that focused on deliverables that can enhance the efforts of those engaged in the battle against hate.

This event was very impactful for our SV faculty and staff. "After attending the Summit, I realized how many organizations and individual people of ALL cultures, races, religions and genders around the world, are working to dismantle systems of hate and violence. The experience was very encouraging and uplifting," said Mr. Porter.

Fifteen students embarked on a self-guided videography tour of the Carrie Furnaces, a long-closed blast furnace and popular location for major film productions located along the Monongahela River in Swissvale. In addition to learning the history of the massive iron mill, students sought out the most interesting angles and details to complete their own poetic documentaries.

Inspired by a series of abstract films created in the early 20th century, these students' poetic documentaries required them to find a tremendous variety of interesting shots using multiple lenses and other equipment. The goals were to give students a unique location for honing



their shooting and editing skills, provide a bit of local history, and give them an outlet for expressing their creativity in unique ways. Additionally, their visit to the Carrie Furnaces gives them a sneak peek at a location that will house a state-of-the-art film production facility for major Hollywood films and shows in the coming years. The love and support for Ginny escalated to a level very deserving for this tenacious and humble teammate.



A night full of fundraisers, awareness and education led to a donation of \$17,000 to the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society in Ginny’s name. Yes, in three short weeks the unbelievable efforts of so many generated **\$17,000** in donations. The sea of purple humanity was on full display September 14, 2022 and my pride in our community that evening is inexpressible. FALL SPORTS UPDATES

CROSS COUNTRY – Boys and Girls (Head Coach: Steve Strellick)

The season is still relatively young for the cross-country teams having competed in two dual meets and one invitational at the time of this issue of Raider Pride. On the boy's side, the Raiders took seventh overall (out of 32 teams) at the annual Red, White, and Blue invitational with senior Eli DeWitt coming in 25th and sophomore Max Smith 27th out of 232 runners. In the girl's race, Seneca Valley came in 14th out of 33 teams with senior Abby Kreber (52nd) and junior Samantha Moury (59th) leading the way. In dual meet action the boys defeated both Butler and Pine-Richland while the girls team split, beating Butler while falling to Pine-Richland.



FOOTBALL (Head Coach Ron Butschle)

Raider football has opened the season splitting its first four games. Wins have come against Penn Hills and Pine-Richland with tough losses to Peters Township and Canon-Mac. Leading the way statistically for the Raiders are as follows: Graham Hancox is 67/120 in passing for 812 total yards; Wyatt Craver is averaging 78 yds/game on 68 rush attempts; Luke Lawson leads all receivers with 20 receptions for 217 yards and Jackson Wetzel has seven receptions for 188 yards and three touchdowns. Defensively TJ Border leads the team with 34 total tackles, including three sacks and four tackles for loss and Chris D'Appolonia is right behind him with 32 total tackles, including eight tackles for loss. The Raiders have remaining section games against Mt. Lebanon, Central Catholic, and North Allegheny and those results will go a long way in determining playoff seeding for November.

GOLF – Boys (Head Coach Dean Leventopoulos)

The boys' varsity golf team currently sits at 6-4 in dual match play with two remaining matches and their annual SV Invite remaining on the schedule. In recent sectional qualifying play, the Raiders had four golfers advance to the WPIAL Individual semifinals. Congratulations to Payton Brown, Lucas Bruns, Casey Clawson, and Marcos Lopez. These four will compete at Champion Lakes at the end of the month with the goal of qualifying for the WPIAL individual finals. Good luck!

GOLF – Girls (Head Coach Kevin Wildrick)

The girls' varsity golf holds an 11-3 match record and a championship title from the second annual Climb the Ridge Invitational that saw the Raiders sweep the top three spots! Congratulations to Lihini Ranaweera (1st), Madison Sharek (2nd) and Sarah McCullough (3rd.) The team begins qualification for WPIAL individual championship play later this month. Good luck to all.



SOCCER – Boys (Head Coach George Williams)

The defending WPIAL champions and PIAA runner-up from a year ago currently sit atop the WPIAL rankings with an undefeated mark of 8-0 at the time of this writing. The Raiders opened the season defending their championship at the Inter-Section Kick-Off Tournament and have continued their roll through mid-September. The Raiders have scored 42 goals in eight games while conceding only three.



SOCCER – Girls (Head Coach Mark Perry)

Girls' soccer is off to a great start sitting at 6-0-2 and currently ranked fourth in 4A WPIAL soccer. Despite a rash of injuries that has taken its toll on the Raider defense, this team continues to battle each night. In eight games this season, SV has scored 20 goals while giving up only three. On the day of this writing the Raiders will host top-ranked North Allegheny in a mid-season key section battle.

**TENNIS (Head Coach Eric Grove)**

Girls' varsity tennis has been challenged this year in finding its rhythm, losing several close matches by one point. The team will close out its dual match season in early October with a home match against Peters Twp. In WPIAL individual section qualifiers Kylie Staudt and Anna Winland represented SV. Anna fell to the number two seed out of North Hills in the first-round while eighth-seeded

Kylie picked up a 10-2 first round win over the ninth seed from Shaler. In the quarterfinals Kylie lost a tough match to the top-seeded player from North Allegheny. WPIAL doubles section qualifiers will take place in late September.

VOLLEYBALL (Head Coach Brett Poirier)

To the surprise of many outside our gym but not to those practicing and competing every day inside the gym, the Raiders are currently undefeated in match play at 5-0 and have two tournament titles to their credit – winning the season-opening Canon-Mac tournament and, most recently, bringing home the team title from the Westminster (MD) Mason-Dixon Invitational. The end of September will feature key section clashes with top-ranked North Allegheny and Pine-Richland. ■

FUNDING THE FUTURE AT BUTLER COUNTY AREA VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL CENTER

The Seneca Valley Foundation (SVF) is excited to encourage more students to attend the Butler County Area Vocational-Technical Center. To do so, SVF is committing \$5,000 for “Vo-Tech Student Equipment Mini-grants,” where eligible students will be able to apply for funding



that will alleviate the costs of attending the area’s Vo-Tech School.

This project grew from a staff member in the Senior High guidance office, Ms. Kim Magill, alerting us to a student in need of financial assistance. This student started a vo-tech program this year but was struggling to find the money to pay for the work boots, shirts and pants required by the program. These costs can range from \$100 to over \$600.

Our trustees quickly decided it was time to provide assistance to students entering vo-tech programs, and is excited to offer these mini-grants to those eligible as they take strides to an exciting career. 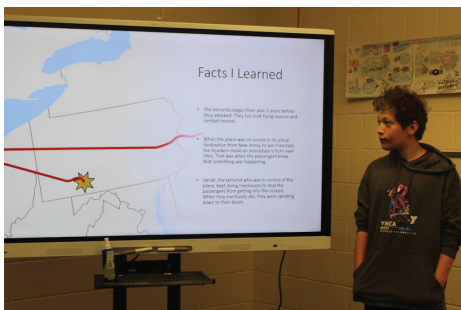
Mr. Donati, Mrs. Kotula, Mrs. Hughes and Mrs. Loewy spearheaded the project and

FREE BREAKFAST FOR ALL STUDENTS

We are happy to share with you some great news from the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE)! Starting Monday, October 3, **every student** will be eligible to receive a breakfast meal at school at **NO COST** regardless of qualification for free/reduced meals. While every student is eligible to receive their first meal at no cost, a la carte items and extra meals/food items will continue to be charged to student accounts as they have been in the past.

WHAT'S IN A LUNCH?

The Seneca Valley School District follows the Nutrition Standard Guidelines that the Department of Education has put in place for the National School Lunch Program as well as for Competitive Foods in Pennsylvania Schools. The keys for success to a healthy diet are moderation, balance and variety. Please encourage your child to make healthy choices and choose a variety of foods from each food group so that they receive the daily nutrients needed for health.

Students are offered all five food groups each day—grains, vegetables, fruits, dairy,

meats and protein alternatives. The students have the option to decline some of the food groups available, however they must choose at least three food groups for the meal to be considered a balanced meal; with one of the options being a 1/2 cup fruit or 1/2 cup vegetables.

To review the menu in greater detail, here are a few examples of the types of foods being served:

- Pizza – Assorted varieties, 100% whole grain
- Fruit Bar- Unlimited assorted fruits served daily

- Vegetable Bar – Unlimited assorted steamed or fresh vegetables served daily
- Bread and Buns – Wheat and whole grains are offered daily
- Cereal – General Mills whole grain cereals are offered daily
- Snacks – Assorted healthy snacks approved through the USDA's Smart Snacks in Schools program
- Beverages – Water, Milk and 100% Juice

For the month of September, we are pleased to announce the newest members inducted into the SV All-Star Club, Ms. Beth Craig and Mrs. Madeline Nowak, paraprofessionals at Ehrman Crest Middle School.

The SV All-Star Club is an awards program developed by the District to express our gratitude to Seneca Valley classified employees (secretaries, paraprofessionals, maintenance, cafeteria) and bus drivers who are often the unsung heroes of our schools. We intend to recognize a new member of this elite all-star club each month.

Mr. Tim Eiler, Principal of Ehrman Crest Middle School shared, "Day in and day out, our schools could not operate without our paraprofessionals' hard work and dedication to our staff and students. We have the best of the best, and they step up and prove it repeatedly. With that said, what Beth Craig and Madeline Nowak did on Friday, September 2nd, took the high regard in which we hold our paraprofessionals to an entirely new level. They didn't just step up and do the right thing - they saved a life."

"On that day, Ehrman Crest had a serious and dire situation in which a student was choking on his lunch. The student's airflow became restricted, and he was not breathing. When these situations occur, they are obviously extremely jarring, but they solidify that we have great kids and great people who do the right thing."

Mr. Eiler explained, "Students got the attention of the adults in the cafeteria. Ms. Craig stepped up and began to administer the Heimlich maneuver. Though she was at first unable to remove the obstruction, she never gave up. Mrs. Nowak was then able to step in and relieve her, continuing the Heimlich. Within moments, the obstruction began to clear, airflow moved again, and color returned to the student's face. Our school nurse was able to take over at that point, and although she sent the student home early that Friday, he returned the following week without complications," said Mr. Eiler.

Mr. Eiler added, "This incident served as a reminder of how much we need each other. It wasn't just training that saved a student's

life; it was individuals looking out for each other, working in tandem, and exhibiting the willingness to be selfless. "What Beth and Madeline saw that day was unimaginable. But what they did was nothing less than heroic - they literally saved a life. We are honored to know and work with these ladies, and it's a pleasure to help recognize them for being so loving, caring and willing to step up when they were needed," said Mr. Eiler. ■

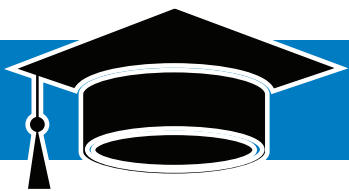

FBI WARNS OF KIDNAPPING SCAM

This comes directly from the FBI and has been occurring throughout our country and there have been cases in Western Pennsylvania including Butler and Allegheny Counties.

Virtual kidnapers can be very convincing, often representing themselves as members of drug cartels or corrupt law enforcement. Victims may hear screams in the background of a call, but virtual kidnapers have been known to use recordings to sound more realistic. Virtual kidnapers often request payment via wire transfer and push victims to act quickly.

FBI Chicago offers the following tips to help prevent virtual kidnapping scams:

- Never post news of upcoming travel dates and locations online.
- Discuss virtual kidnapping with family members prior to any travel.
- Have a “password” that family members can ask for in an emergency to confirm that a loved one is really in trouble.
- Be wary of providing financial information to strangers over the phone.

Hallmarks of a virtual kidnapping include:

- The calls may not come from the kidnapped target’s phone.
- Callers go to great lengths to keep victims on the phone.
- Callers are usually unable to answer simple questions about targets such as what they look like.
- Ransom money is only accepted via a wire transfer service.
- Callers request that the ransom funds be wired to multiple people in several small amounts.
- Using profanities and/or yelling to stir emotions to confuse your though process.

FBI DETAILS LAW ENFORCEMENT SCAM

The scammers claim they have an outstanding warrant for arrest that will need to be paid immediately or the victim will be arrested.

Law enforcement **will not ask** for payment over the phone, through wire transfers, gift cards, or websites not affiliated with law enforcement. If you get a call that you suspect is fraudulent, don't make a payment through these methods.

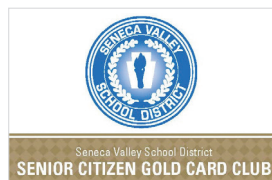
Police officers will not demand that you stay on the phone, and if you get a call about a criminal or civil accusation that you don't recognize, it probably is not true. Law enforcement officers will not threaten you or family members with additional criminal charges, police say.

If you get a call you suspect is fraudulent, you are urged to contact the respective law enforcement agency to determine if the call is legitimate. You should not confirm any identifying information about yourself to the scammer.

School Based Mental Health

Frequently Asked Questions for Seneca Valley Parents



About Glade Run

Glade Run currently contracts and provides outpatient counseling services in several school districts located in Allegheny, Butler and Beaver counties, including Seneca Valley School District.

Glade Run operates three school-based outpatient program models: Mental Health Partnership (MHP); Therapeutic Classroom; and Modified Therapeutic Classroom. The school-based therapists conduct initial psycho-social assessments and then provide individual, family and group therapy as determined by the individual student's treatment plan.

What is School Based Mental Health (SBMH)?

SBMH refers to mental health services for school age youth addressing social, emotional and behavioral health along with the ability to cope with life's challenges. Services are delivered in the school setting during the school day and, if needed, can continue during the summer months.

Why is Seneca Valley partnering with Glade Run Lutheran Services to provide school based mental health services?

Seneca Valley cares about its students and recognizes the need to provide access to services that will support mental wellness within the classroom. Research demonstrates that students who receive mental health support achieve better academically. In addition, classroom behavior, on-task learning, and students' sense of connectedness and well-being all improve as well.

Who will be providing mental health services to my child?

School based mental health services will be provided by licensed therapists through Glade Run Lutheran Services.

As a parent, do I have any financial obligation?

Payment is based on individual insurance similar to your medical insurance. After completing the referral and during the initial phone call from the therapist, parents will be informed of any financial obligation prior to the start of any services.

Where will my child's services take place?

Services are delivered in approved spaces within the school. These spaces have been approved by the Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (OMHSAS).

Will my child miss class or need to stay after regular school hours?

Appointment times are determined by the student, parent and school counselor and are typically during the school day unless the therapist, student and parent make other arrangements.

Can I participate in my child's therapy?

Therapy is confidential but Glade Run offers Family Therapy as well if the team determines it necessary and/or with a parent/guardian request.

How do I get started?

- » Referrals may be completed by parents/guardians, teachers, nurses, counselors/social workers or the student him/herself.
- » This referral is forwarded to Glade Run's outpatient referral coordinator, who verifies student insurance and forwards to the program supervisor for staffing.
- » At that time, the assigned therapist will contact the student's family to set up intake, which will take place at your child's school. This process is typically completed within 24-48 hours.

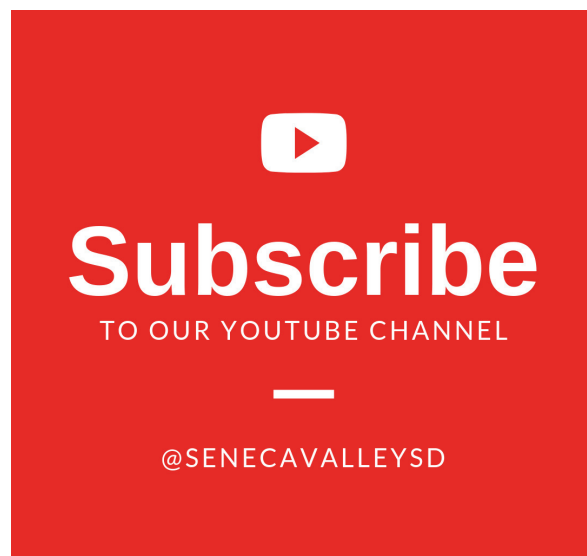

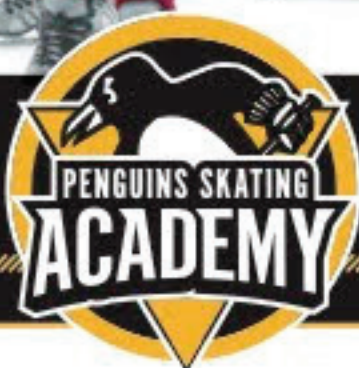
