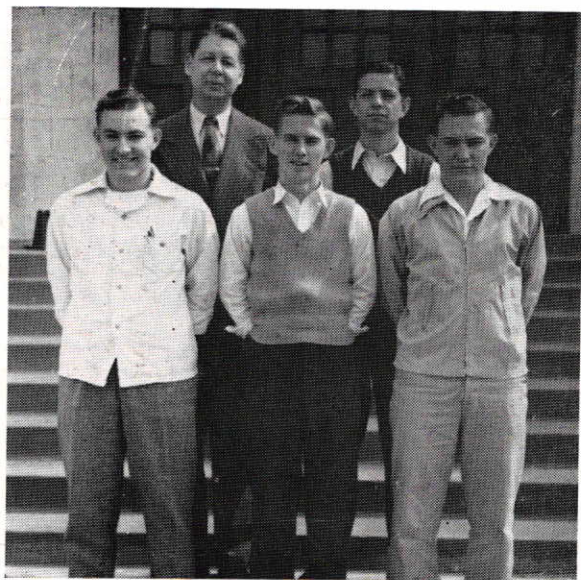

We closed our Hi-Y year with our annual election, and emphasis on Camp Wood attendance.



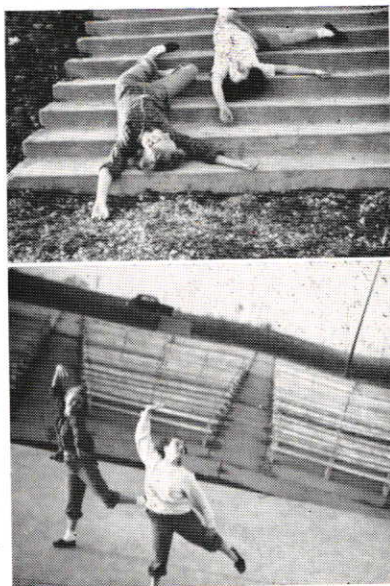

The Tornado Tankers started their eventful season with a very strong offensive under the direction of John Charlesworth, their swimming coach. The Tankers swam a full schedule of ten duel meets of which they won seven and lost three. Among those defeated by the C. H. The captains of the C. H. S. team were Jimmy Smith, Bill Geddes, and Davey Manis.



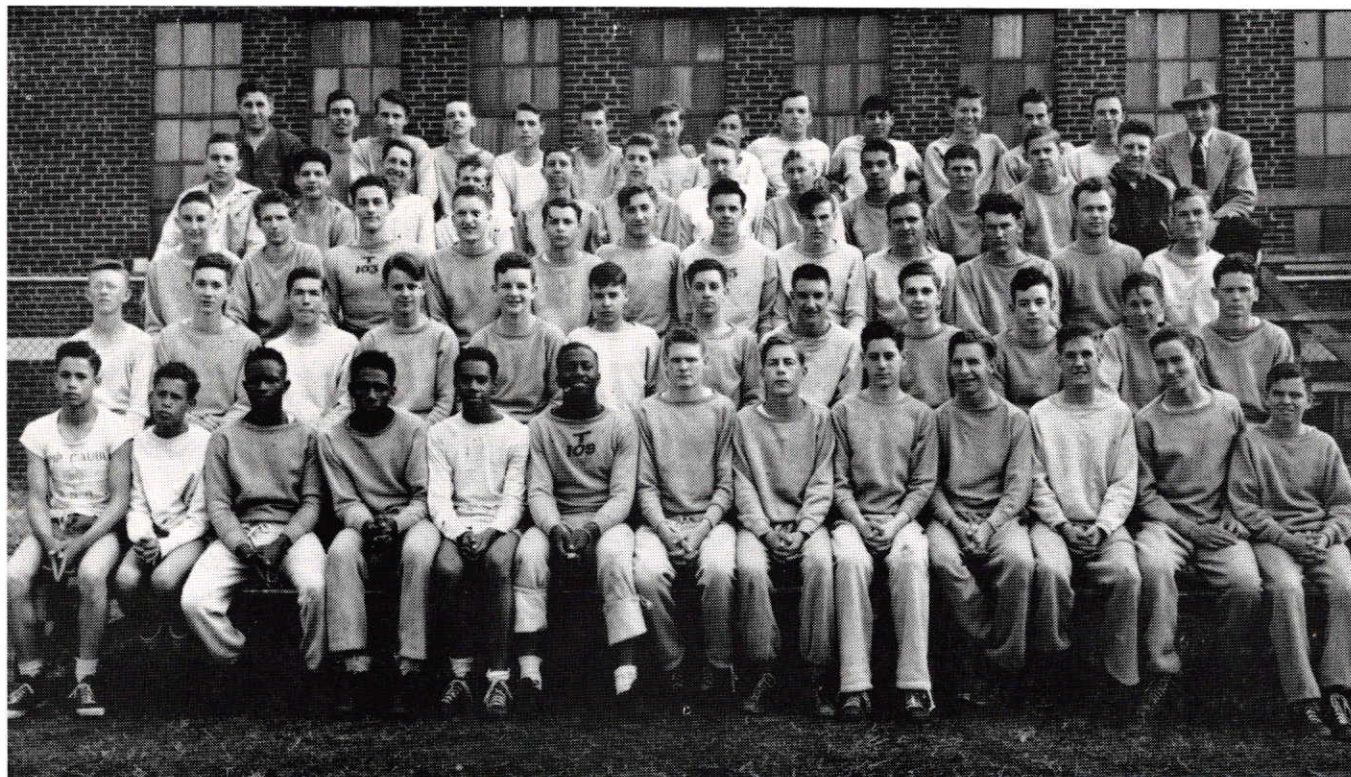

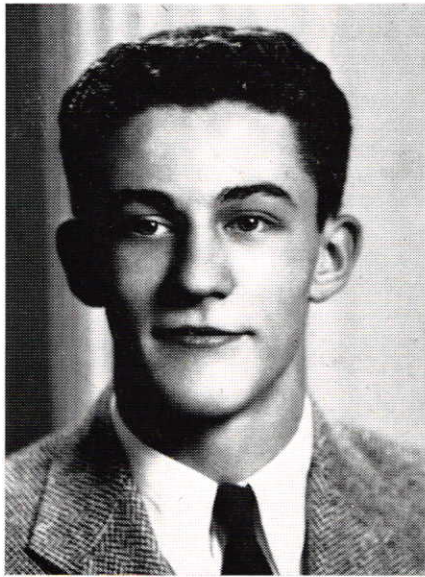

Thus closes the history book for 1947 and the class looks forward to an even more prosperous and eventful year in 1948.



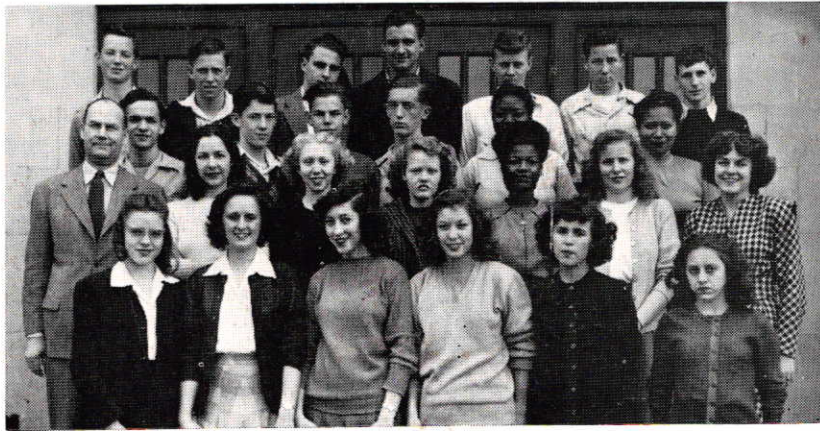
