Class Prophecy . . .

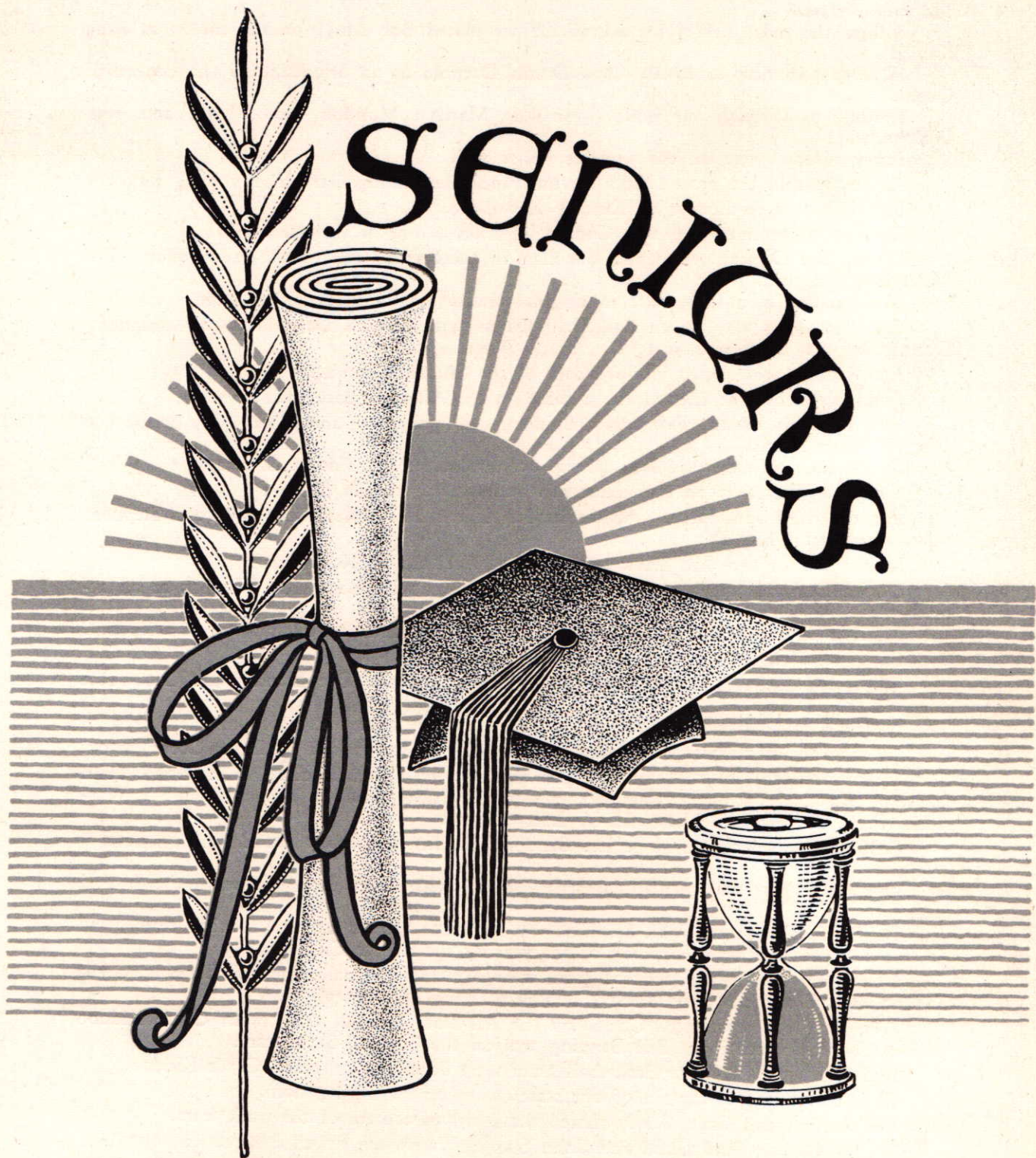

Leo Sandon and Gary Toney shared the duties of captain of the track team.

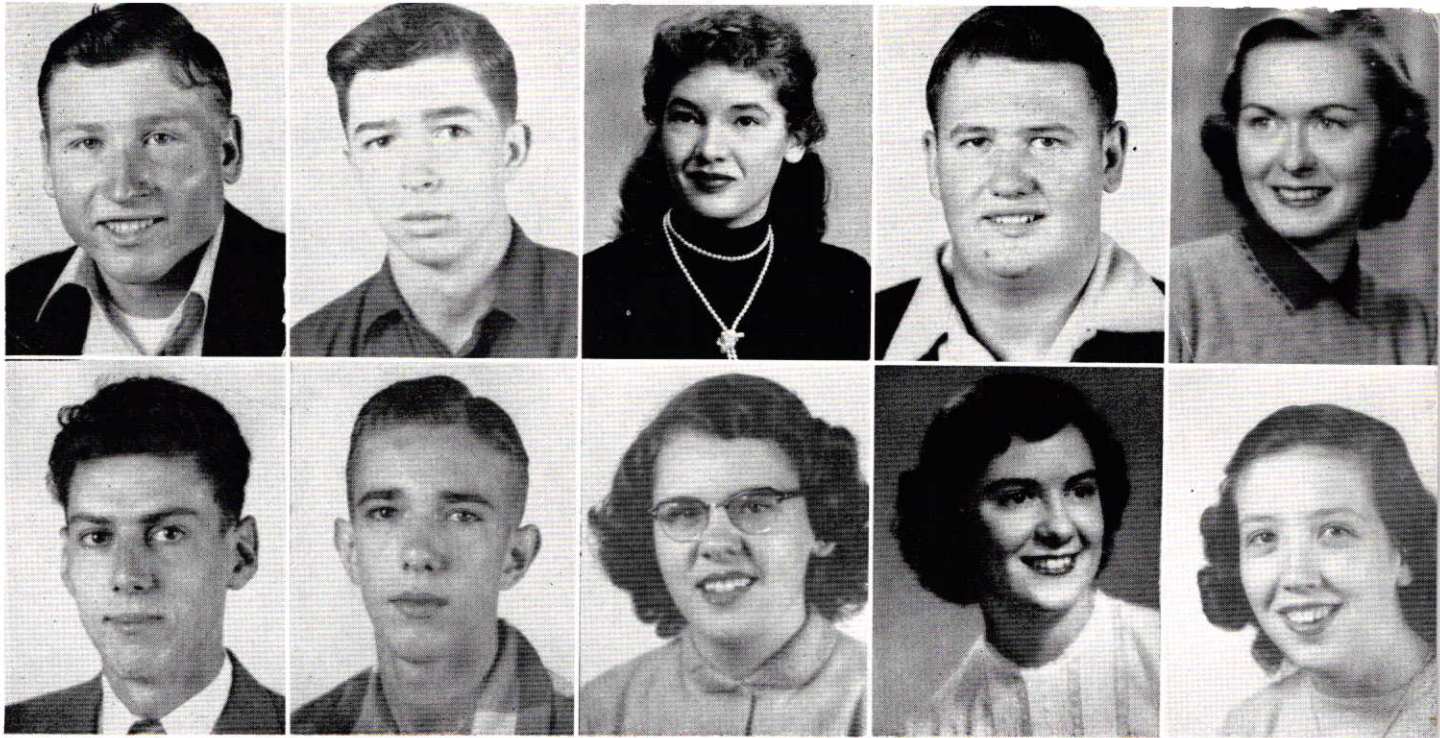
Wayne George, Paul Good and John Stephens were the record breakers in track.

Those long hoped for diplomas were received on May 29 in a very impressive commencement service with Dr. John Furbay delivering the address.



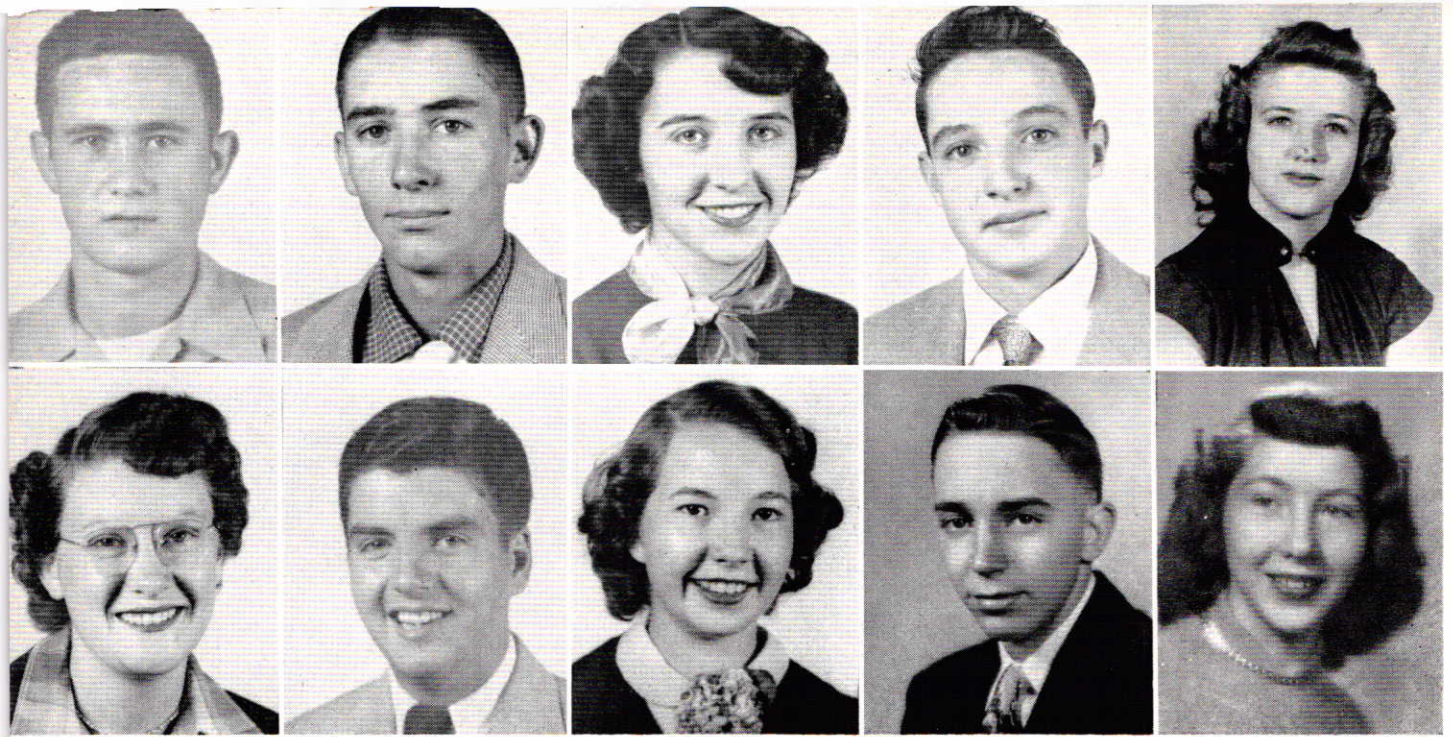

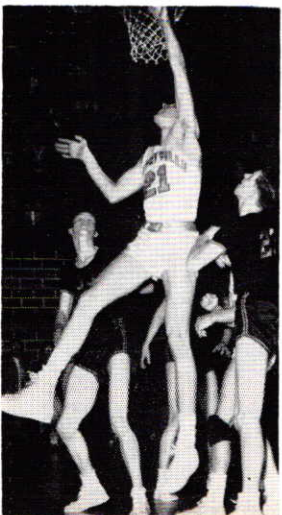
Returning home the Currierites started a string of victories and continued this string until meeting Parsons where the record was broken.

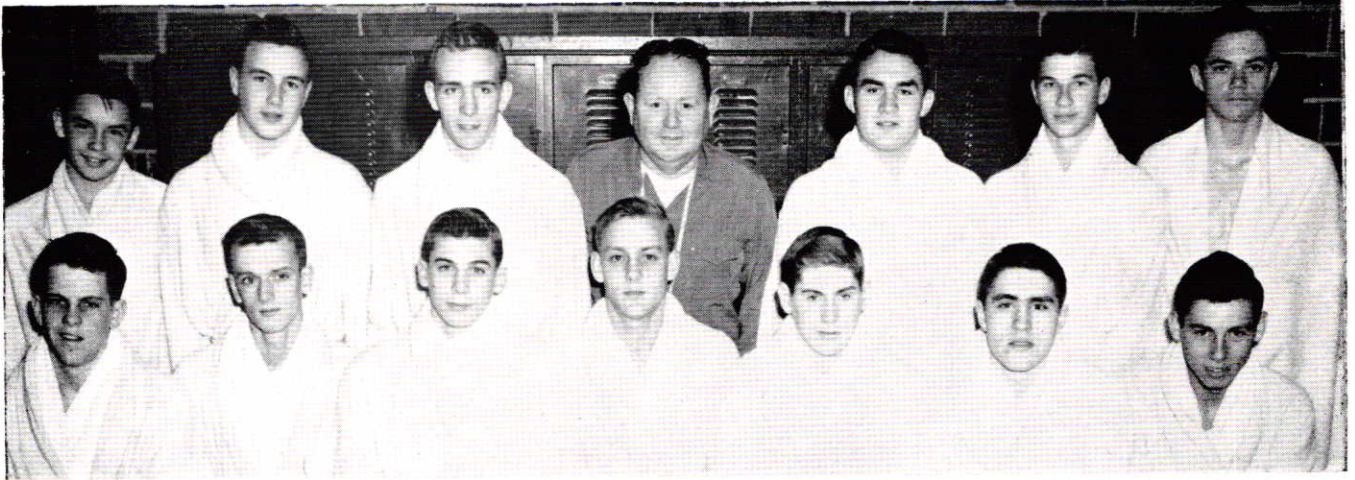

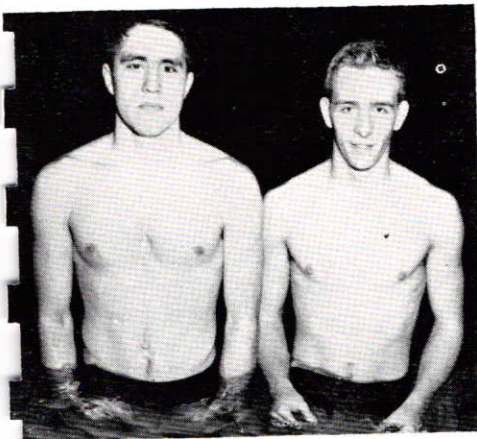
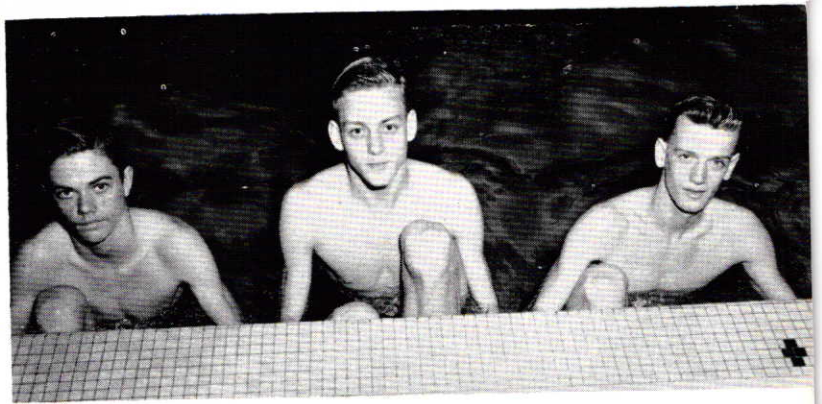
State Meet . . .

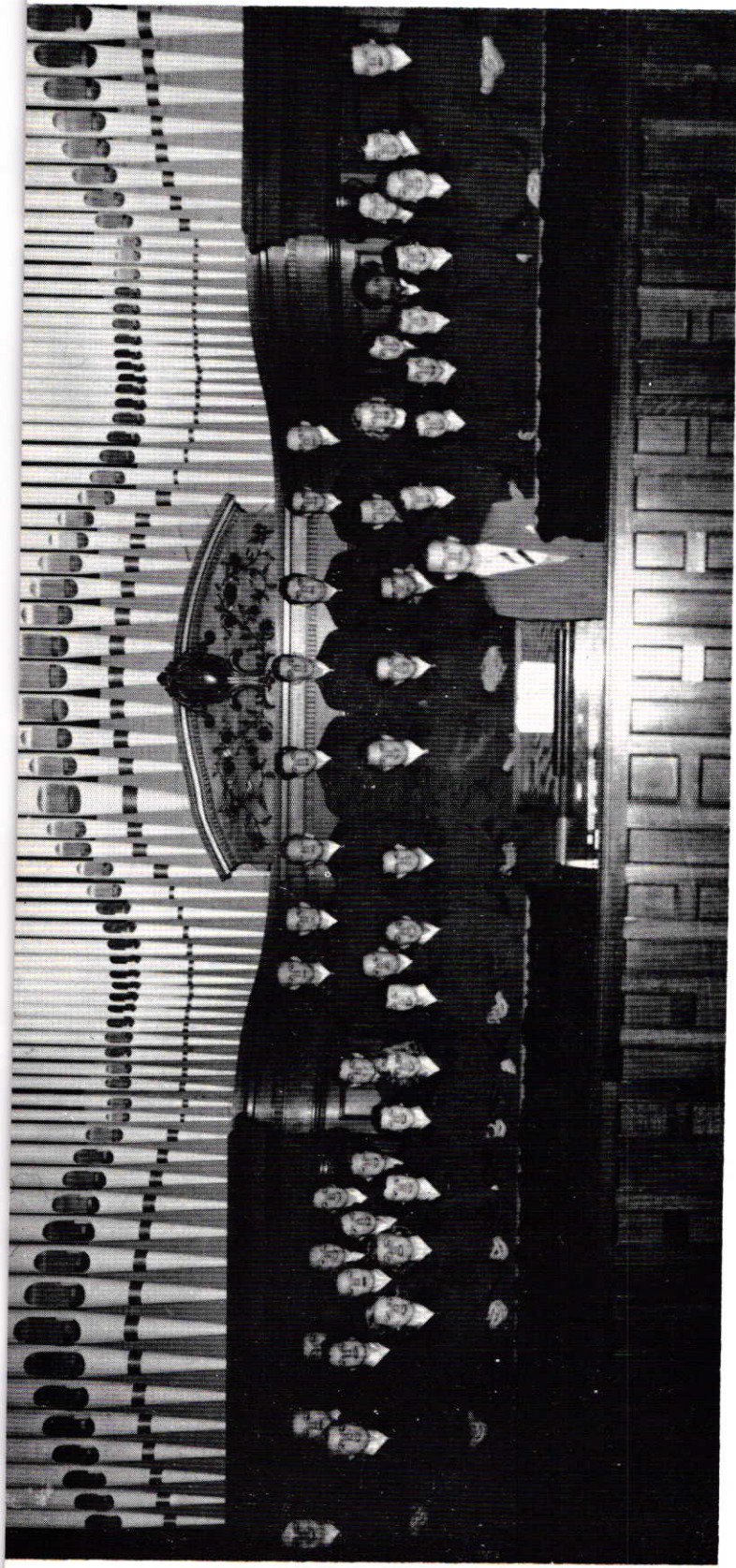
