

It has been predicted by Miss Weaver that Bill Ridgway will become one of the leaders in the field of history textbook writers.


Mr. Stoner agrees that there will never be another senior class with as many good looking girls.

In addition to winning their seventh consecutive state championship, which is an unbelieveable feat in itself, the tankers busted practically all existing records in our pool and in the state meet. In our own pool, records that were thought to be unbreakable were chopped down considerably by the Purple and Gold splashers. Field Kindley has the distinction of having two national interscholastic records broken in its pool. There are very few, if any other high schools in the country, who can boast of this. Our own Teddy Scherer broke the national record in the 100 yd. breast stroke with a 1.01.7 and Jeff Farrel of Wichita East swam a 2,11,8 in a dual meet here in the 200 yd. free style. In addition to these records the medley relay team composed of Bob Yates. Ted Scherer, and Dick Seaton swam a 1.38.4 race to become the third fastest time ever swam by a high school team in the country. Coffeyville has probably one of the finest divers in the country in Ronnie Smith. who was undefeated in dual competition during his high school career. "Pee Wee" has however competed in many other meets unattached and brought back his share of first place trophies. This year he, and various other members of the team, competed in the A.A.U. meet at Bartlesville. Ronnie came home with the low and high board trophies which were two of the eighteen brought home by the C'ville finmen.





high and say, "We're from Coffeyville."



Junior cheerleaders were Sissy McMillion and Sonya Perkins.



At Hutchinson David Bynum and Rollie Tesh took second. The highest of the season was the winning of the first place trophy at the district meet by the four man team


