### BUSINESS DEPARTMENT MAKES HEADWAY

Under the direction of Miss Dorothea Fahler, the Business Department has experienced a year of success and improvement.

The objective of the courses was to help students master the basic knowledge and skills that are needed in choosing the business field as a vocation. The courses were also designed to help students in managing business in everyday life. The mechanical portion of the course helped students develop speed and also accuracy in typing and shorthand. Some of the units that were studied were duties of the office worker, general clerical procedures, and credit and collection.

The dictation and transcription of shorthand was the mainstay of the Secretarial Office Practice classes. Typing was also used in dictations.

In Clerical Office Practice classes, general office practice was studied with the emphasis being placed on filing procedures. Around 50 students were involved in these classes.







### "HISTORY LIVES"



# LIFE IS SPRING PLAY














#### SWIMMING The F.K.H.S. Swim Team experienced a FARES mediocre season


