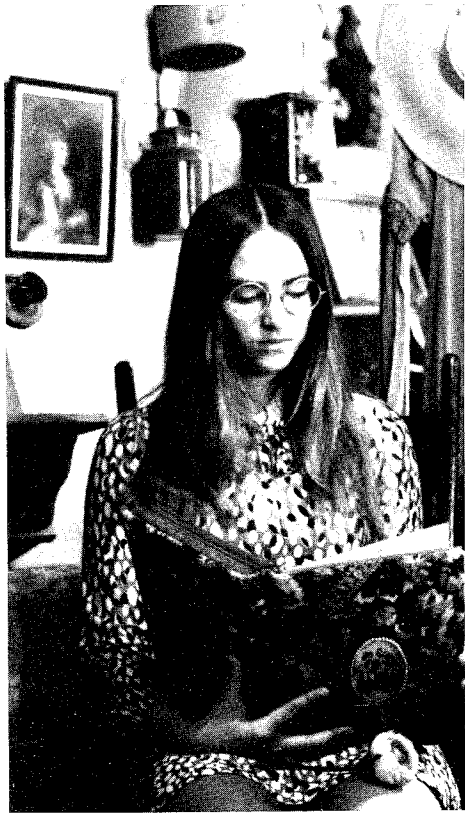

and how you spilled fingerprint on it

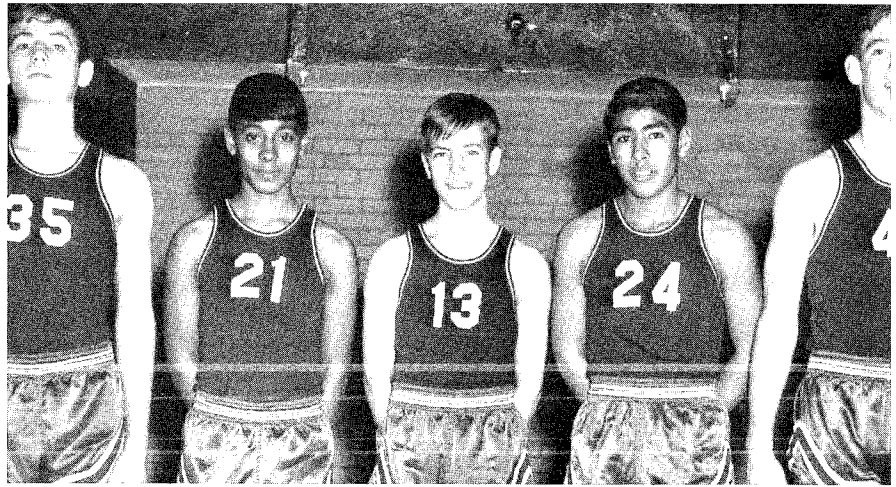
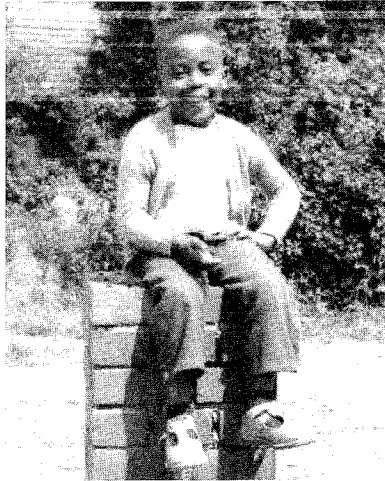
Thinking of junior high

cherish them - and remember...



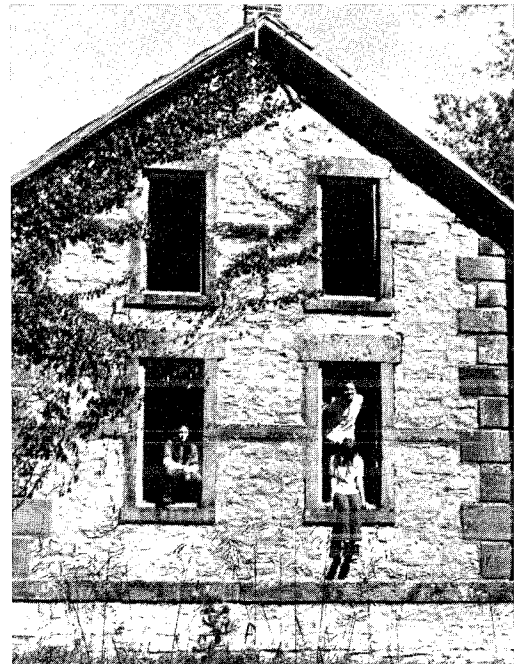
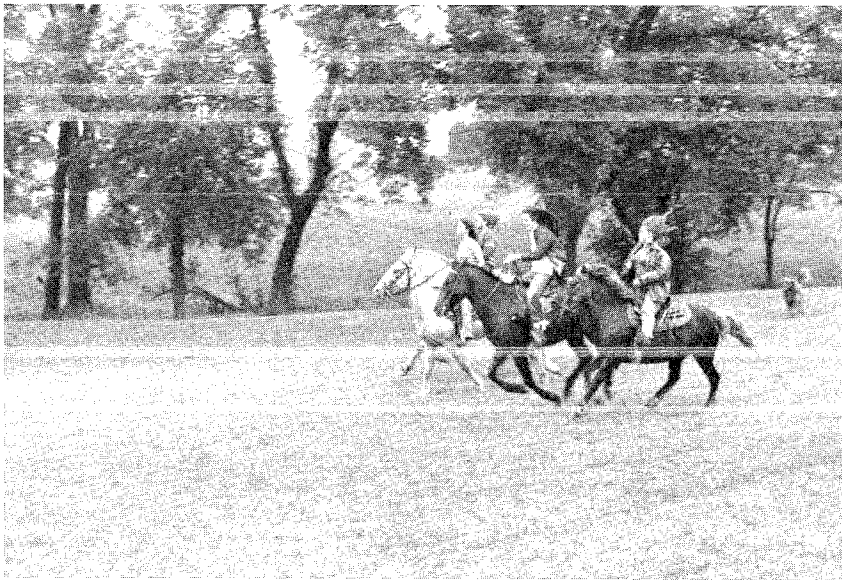

 (Not from reality but to it)

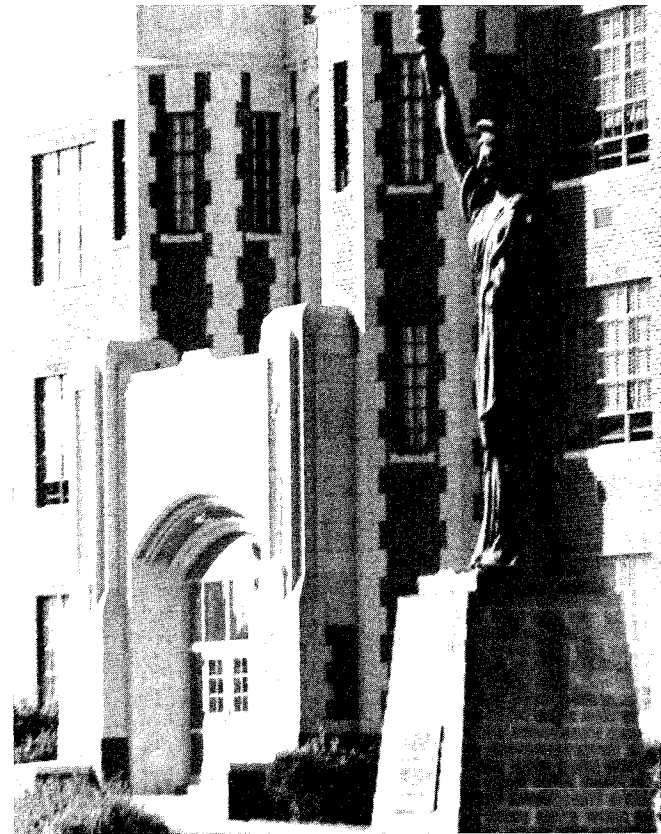


Joy was our playmate

 (We held hands with it in the Night)

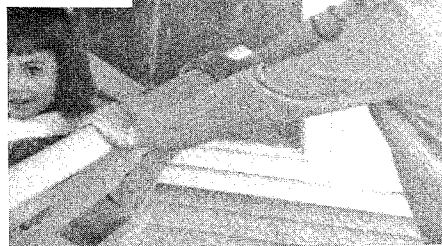




In our teenage evolution

"While we were sitting in the locker room I was scared to death. I don't really know why because I knew we could beat them. It really bothered me . . .

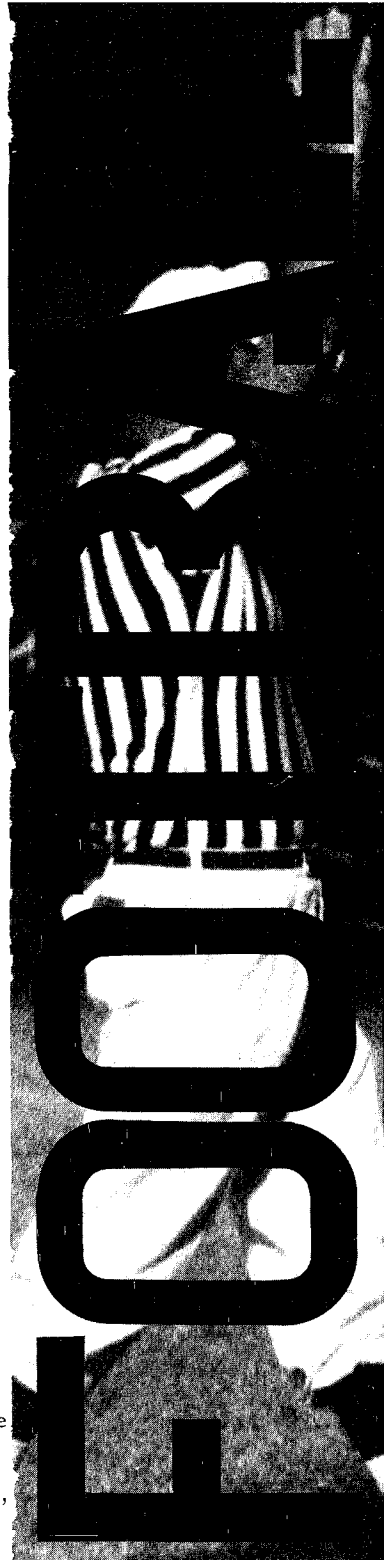
"At half, I was getting worried when we weren't moving the ball and also when Blue went out, we didn't know who could take us in . . .

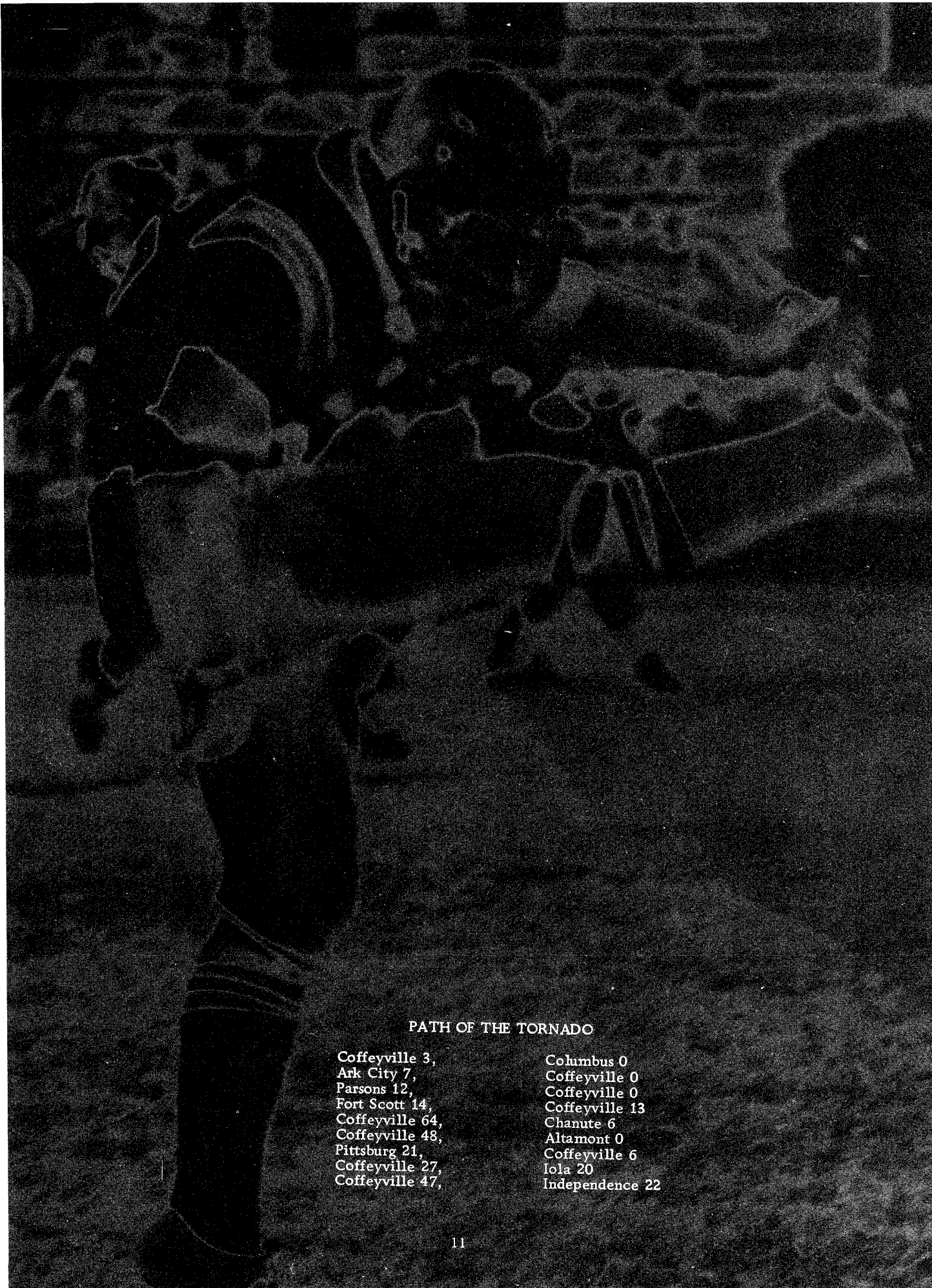

Musicians Capture '2001' Odysseys

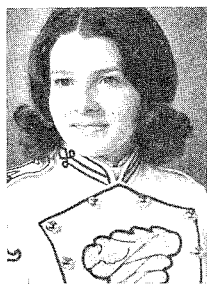

Seniors Don't Always Win!

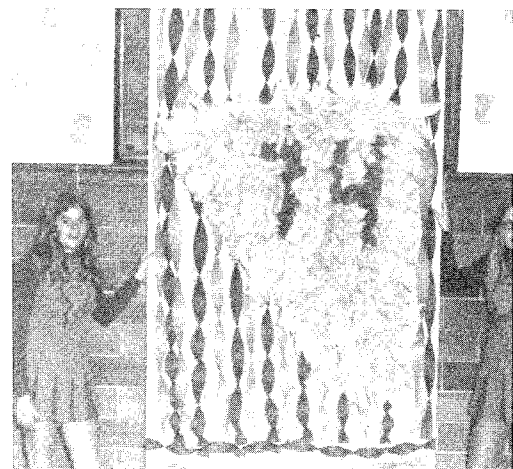
"...And we sought out Independence,

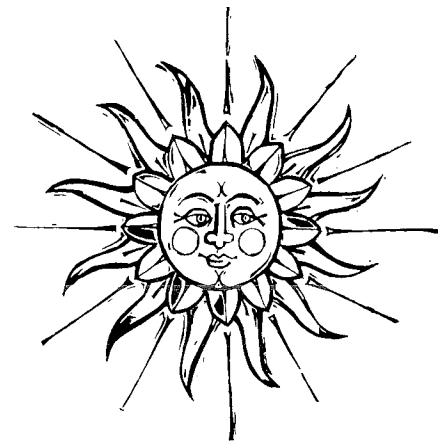
Typists Tap Sunny Rhythms

What is a greggette? "A greggette is boyfriend problems, tardy bell, and sweating palms during transcription."

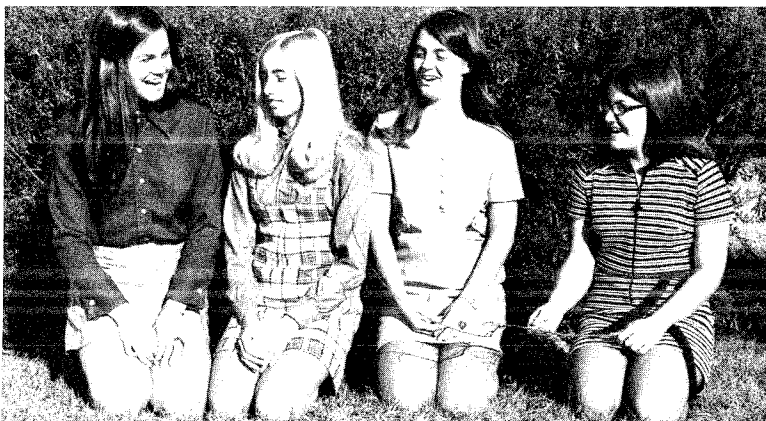

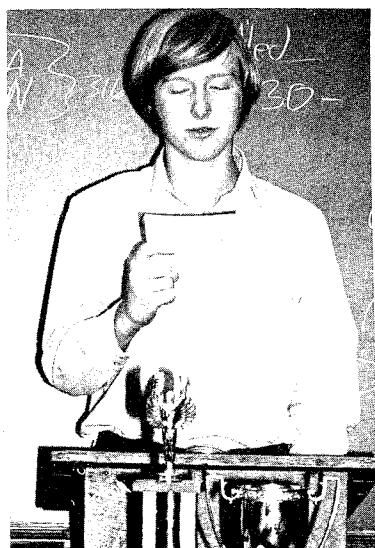
The four-man team of Rick Irwin, Dana Griffiths, Kent Kirby, and Mike Guest won the first trophy of the season at the Fredonia tournament.

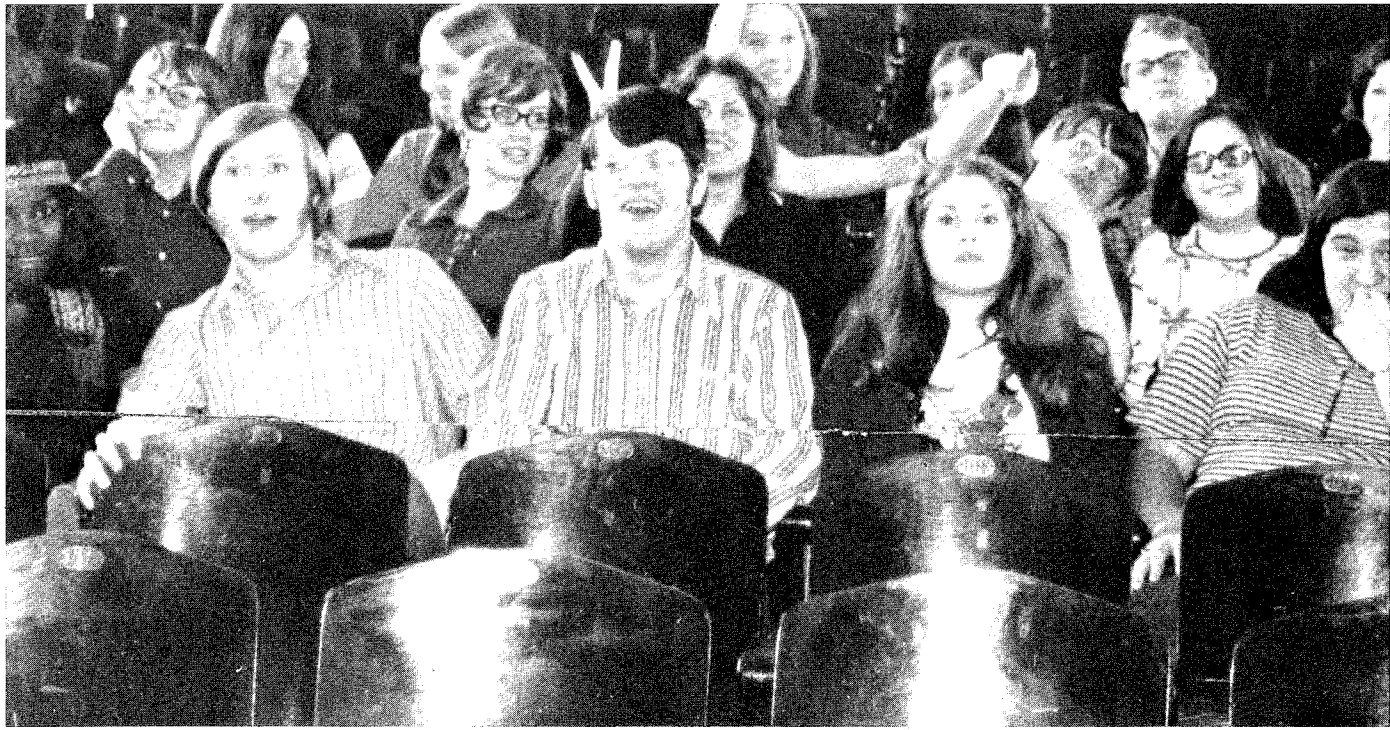


Black Heritage Week Ebony Pride Saw “Right On Royalty”

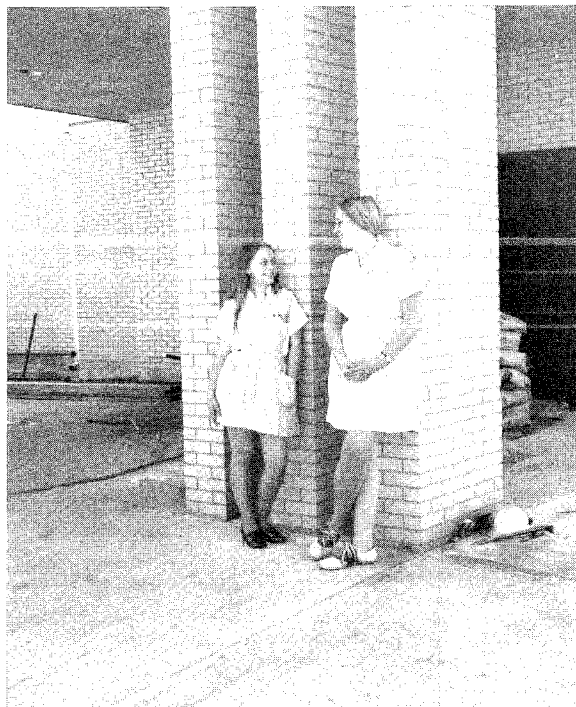
Candy Stripers

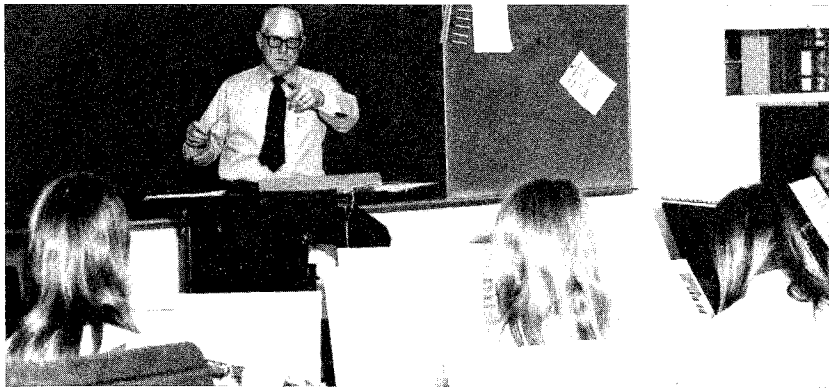

A former athletic star from Kansas State University, Oren Sontter instructs students in laboratory science and "life." Verbalizing what he feels to be the greatest immediate threat to today's youth he said, "Paying off the national debt."

"Why did I become a teacher? Sometimes I wonder!" quips Mrs. Sherry Richards. Expressing her concerns, Mrs. Richards warned: "The worst threat is moral stagnation. Today's youth must constantly strive for better ideals if our society is to improve." On ecology: "It will keep on getting worse until every person is truly frightened for his life..."

A product of Kansas State College of Pittsburg, Mrs. Janetta Springer, English teacher, feels that "our nations leaders are aware of the devastating state of our polluted environment. This is a concern for all peoples of the world. Without adequate controls, we endanger our future, both for animal and plant life."

"The worst threat facing youth today is the growing popularity of the drop-out philosophy. Many of our youth become discouraged with the world they see, withdraw to communes or to drugs, and assume no responsibility for WORKING to make things better," warned English teacher Mrs. Mary Stover. An avid believer in goal-setting in her own life, Mrs. Stover tries to help her students strive towards objectives.



"I am worried about the uncertainty of the future and the revolutionary forces within our country that seem to distract our youth from their immediate goals in life," revealed Harold Thomas, American history teacher. An alumnus of Pittsburg State, Thomas had the most trouble, as a student, "cooking his own meals".



Reflecting back on her college days, Mrs. Claudia Voelke admits "I had trouble getting to class. I skipped a lot, especially 7:30's." On the problems of today the language instructor asserted: "Students are not responsible to themselves and their fellow man. (Or realistic) She cites watching and playing in various sports (including the faculty basketball team) as her favorite extracurriculars.

A new business teacher at Field Kindley, Mrs. Nancy Walters teaches because, as she puts it, "she enjoys kids and couldn't think of any better way to be around them." When not in the classroom, Mrs. Walters enjoys sewing, playing bridge and being "out of doors."

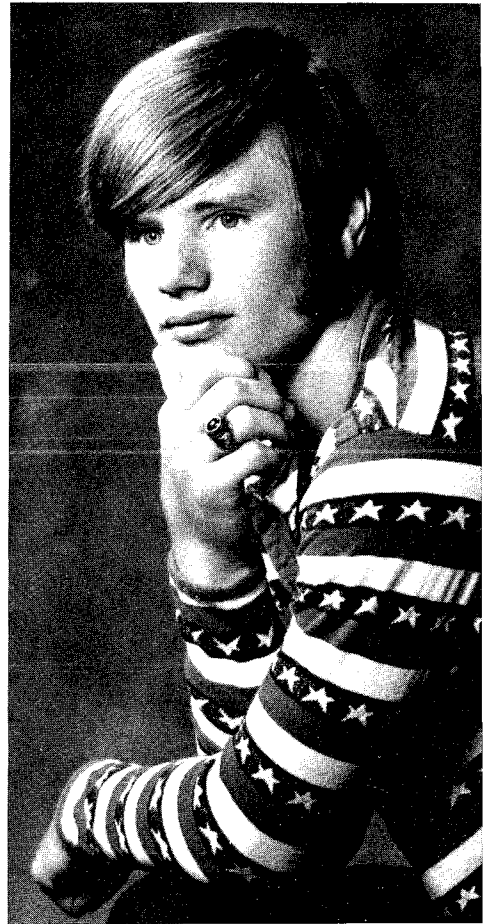


DEDICATION

School was held as usual the following Monday but there was a sincere and silent atmosphere throughout the whole week. Wednesday morning at 7:30 there was a memorial service held by the students in the FKHS auditorium.


