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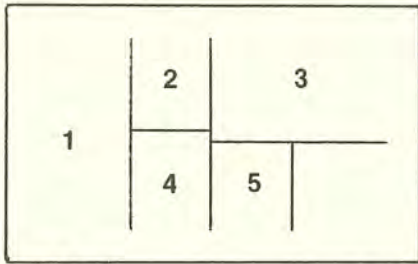

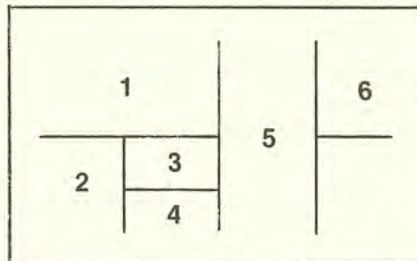

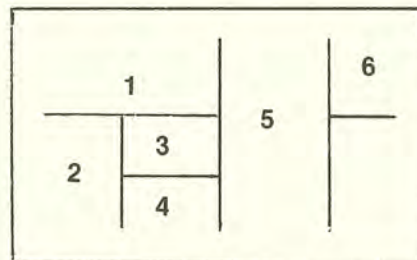

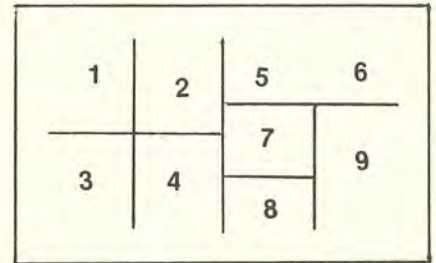

Seven Teachers Join FKHS Faculty



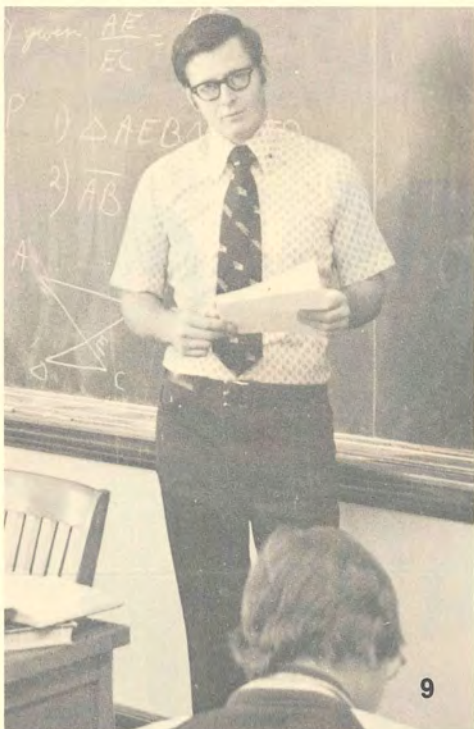

Yesterday's Youth Are Today's Leaders

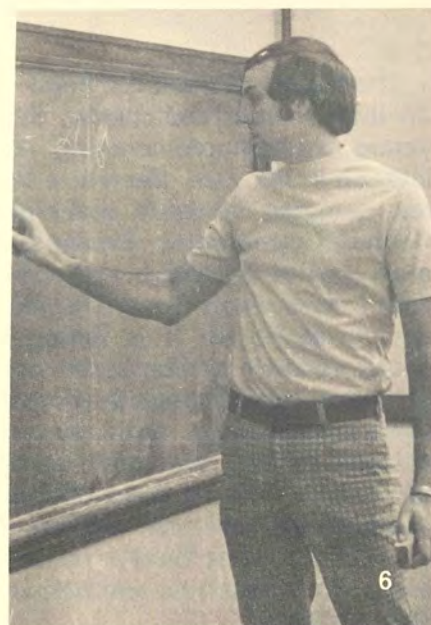

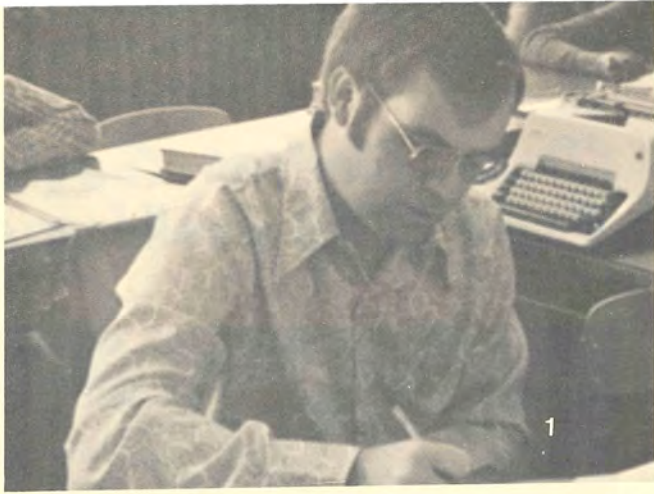

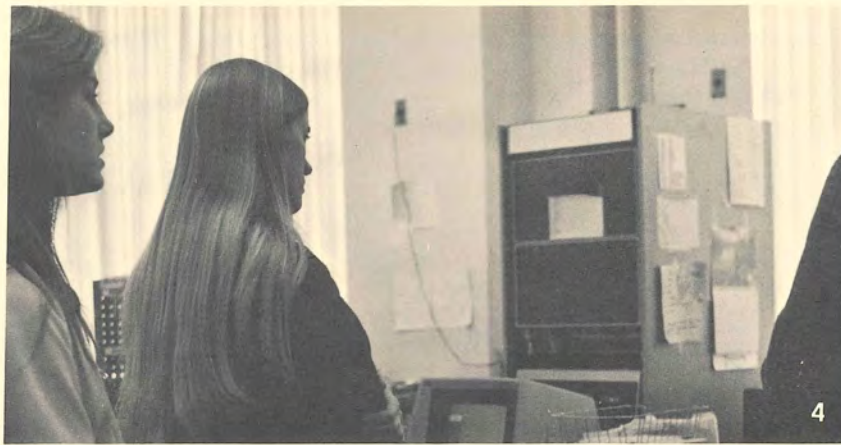

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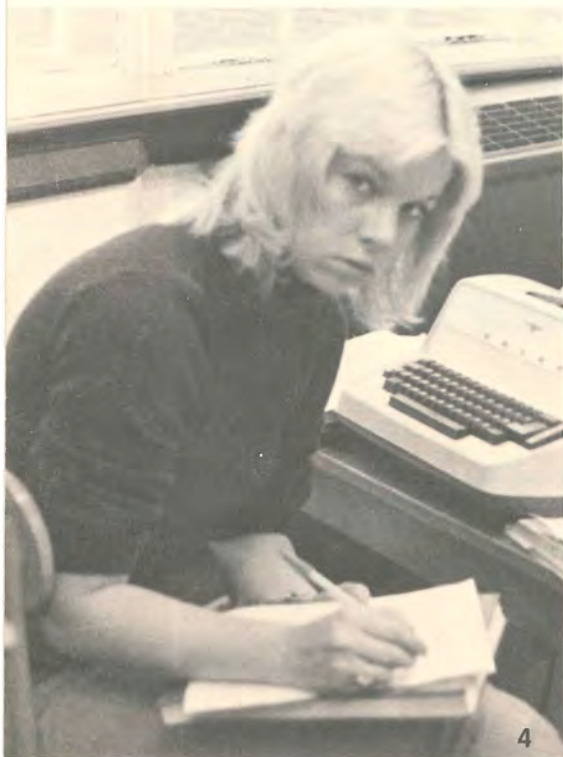


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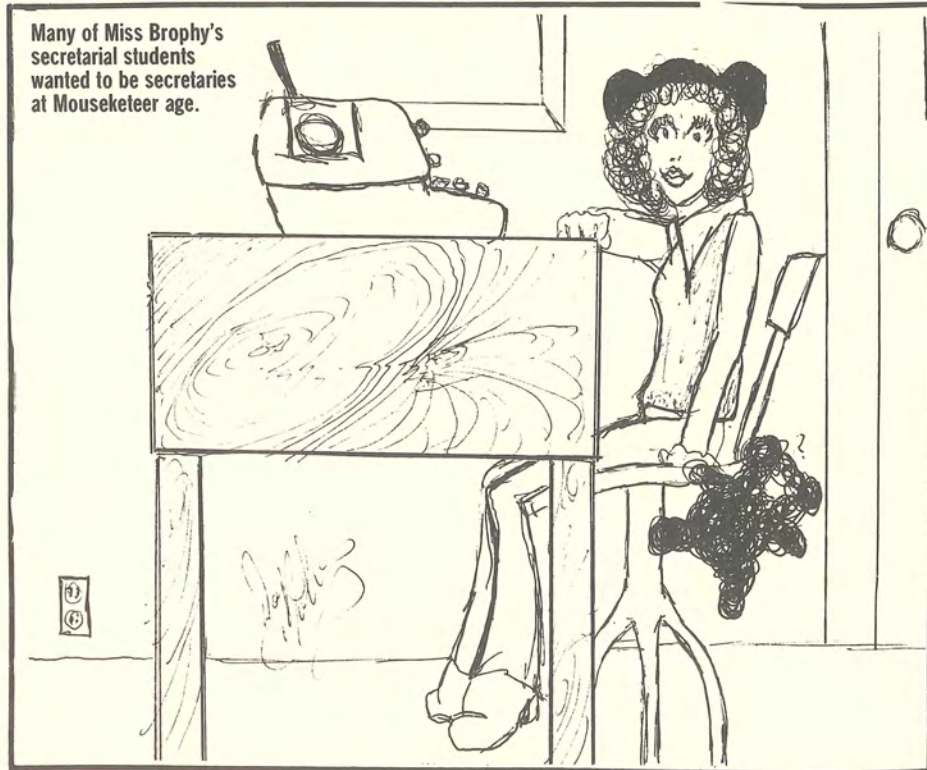
Secretaries Start at FKHS

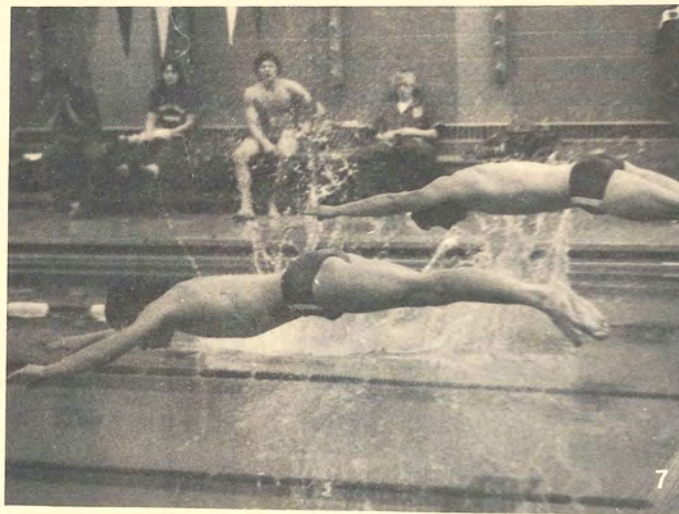

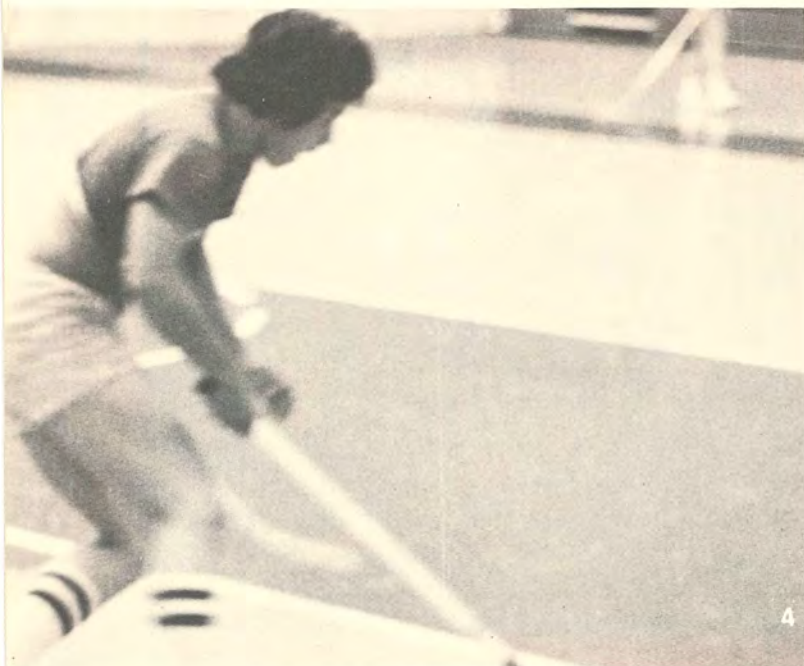
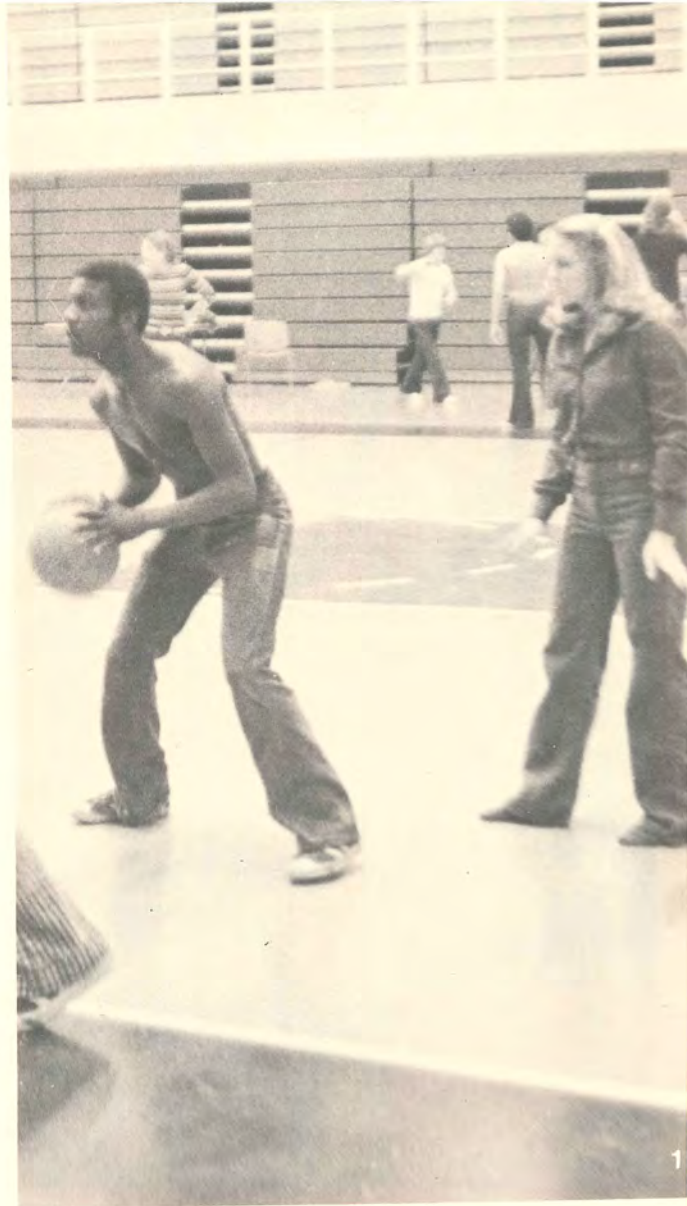

Title IX Forces Mixed Gym Classes

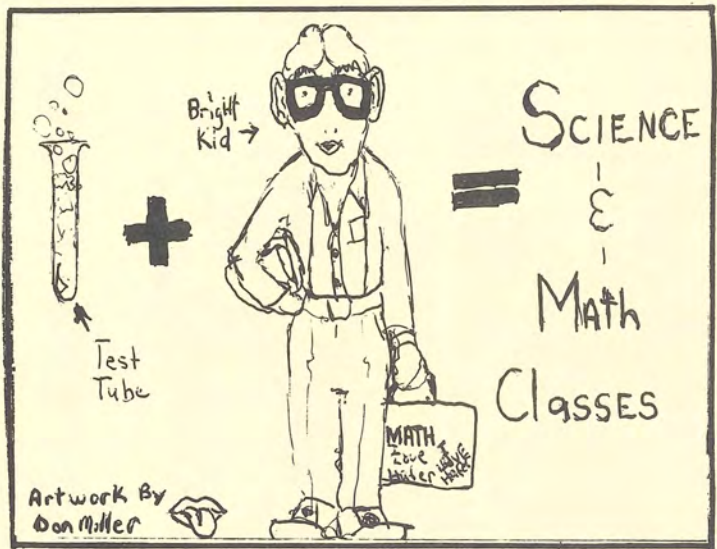
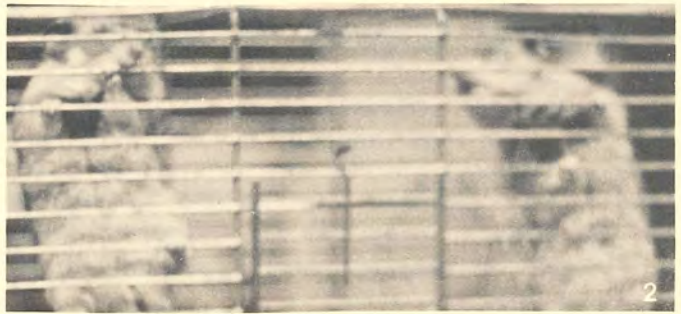

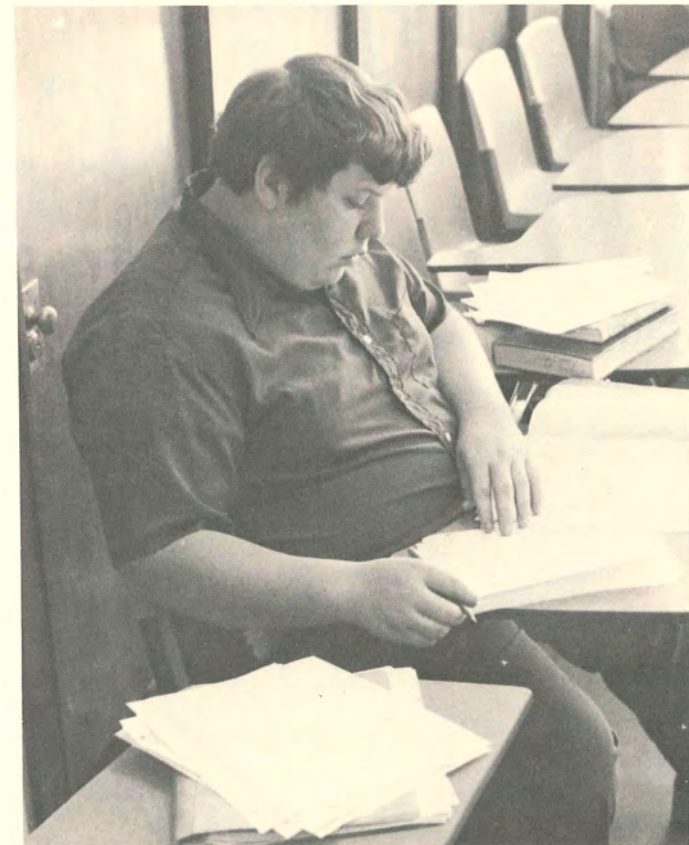

Girl's tennis season begins in August and it usually ends around the first of November.

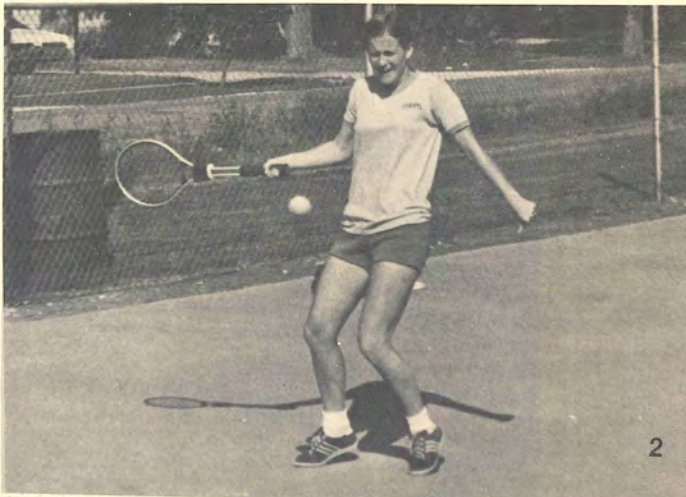


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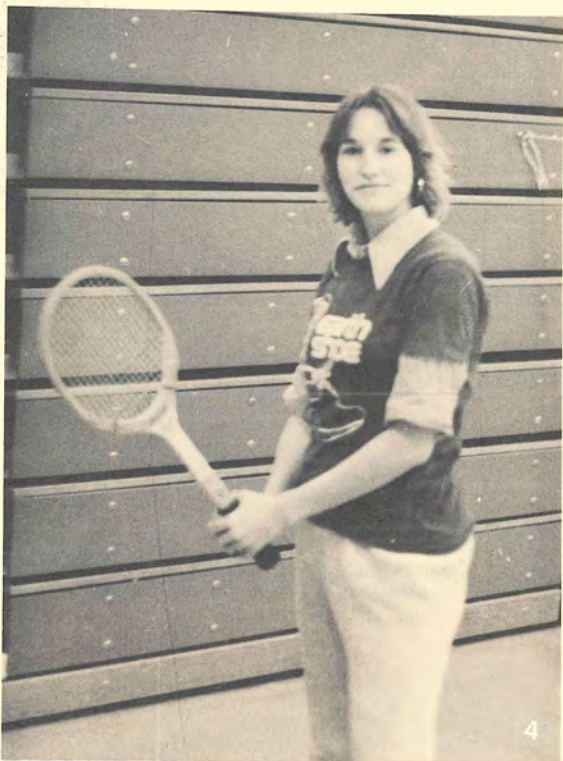

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Girls Basketball Goes Into Second Year With New Coach

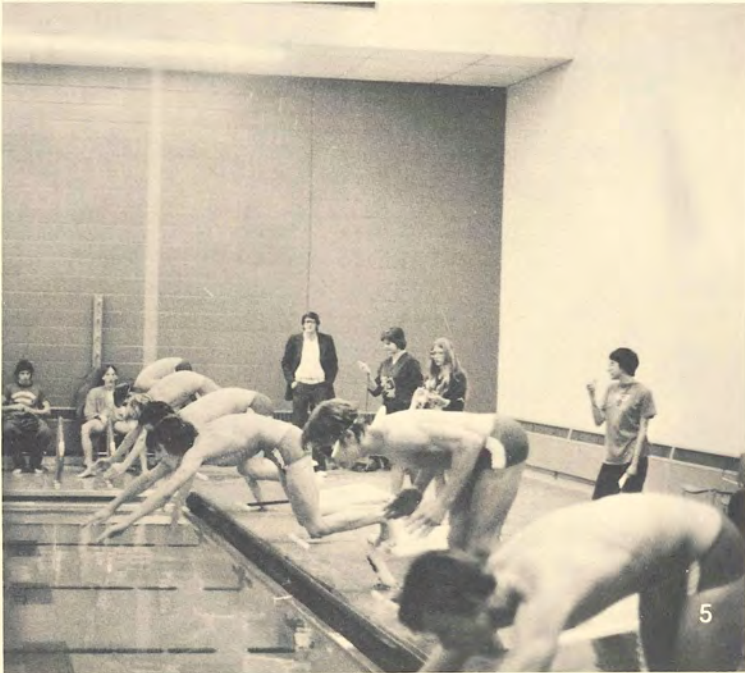

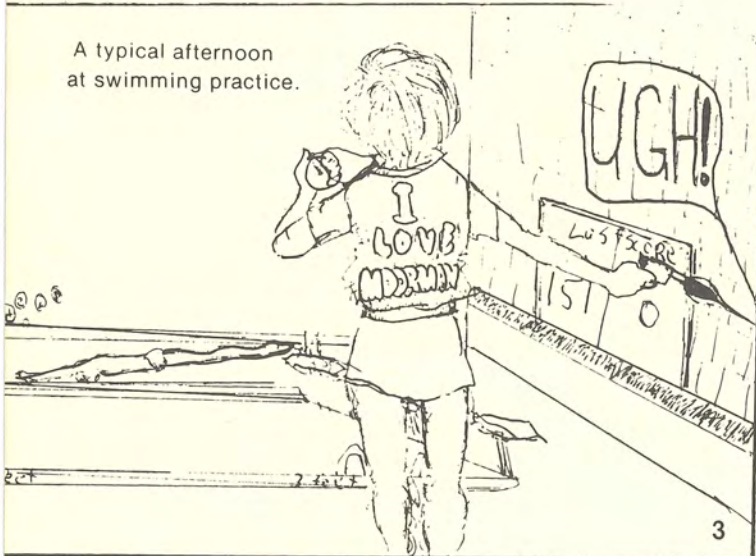

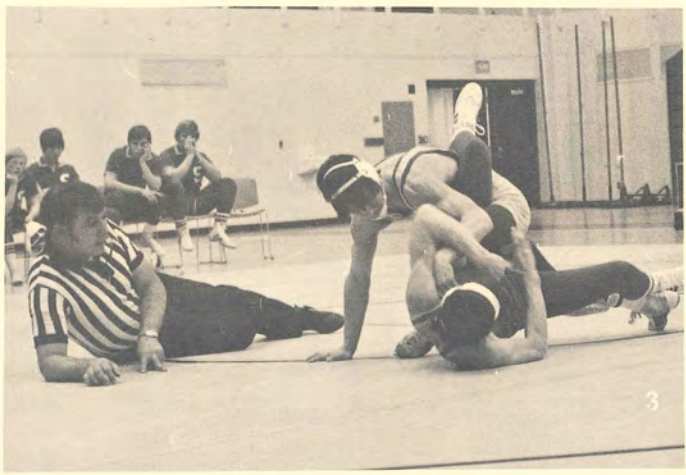

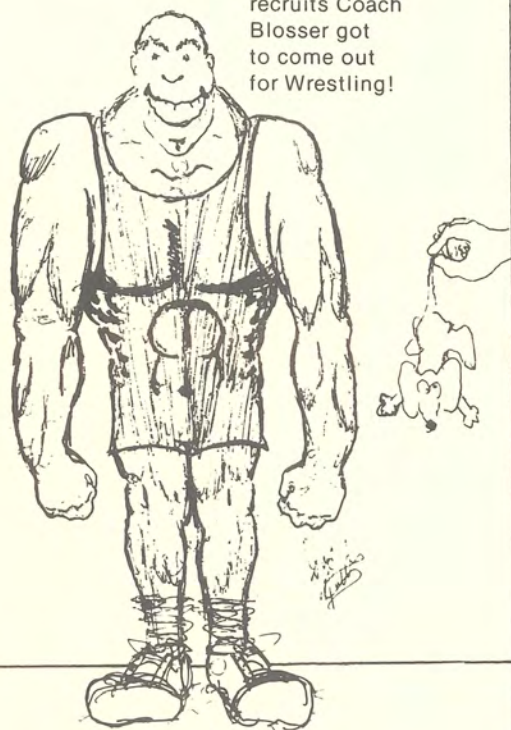
Coach Blosser said, "He feels and a lot of other people do also that wrestling is the most sacraficing sport in the world. It takes a special breed of human to withstand this."

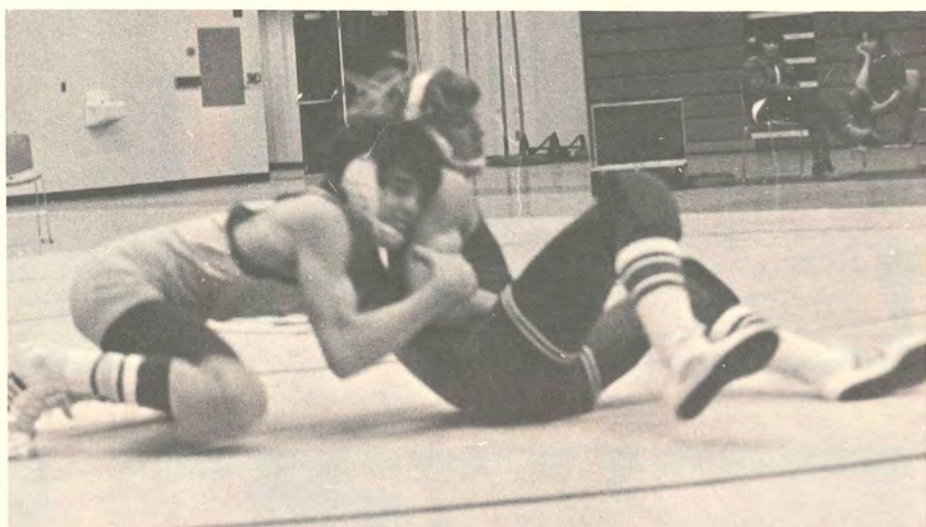

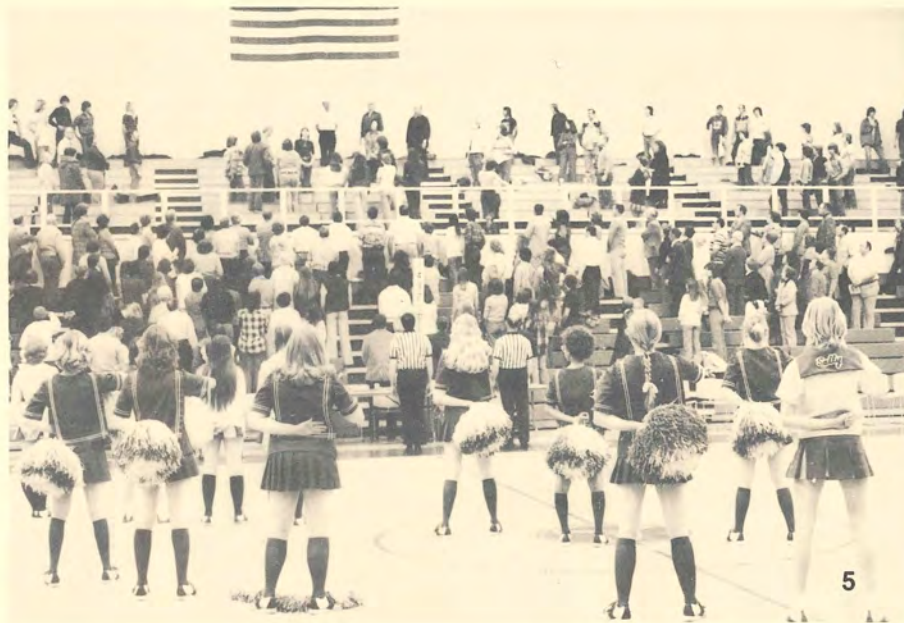

Regionals were held at Wichita North, and the whole Cross Country team qualified for State. The only individual winner was John Bilby. The State meet was held in Wamego, Kansas.

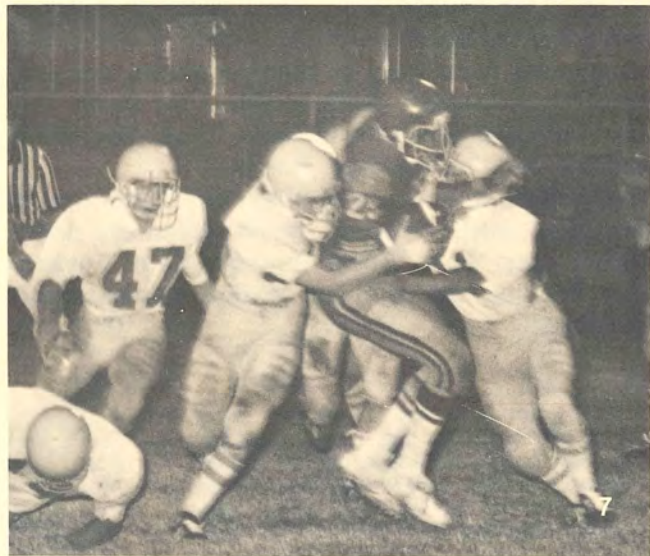

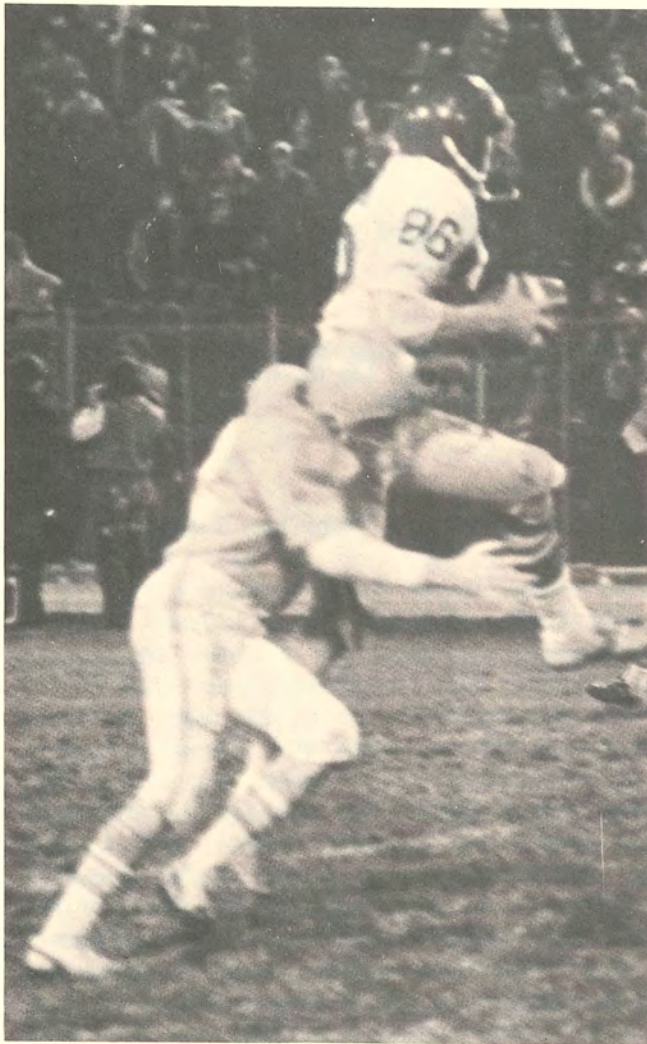

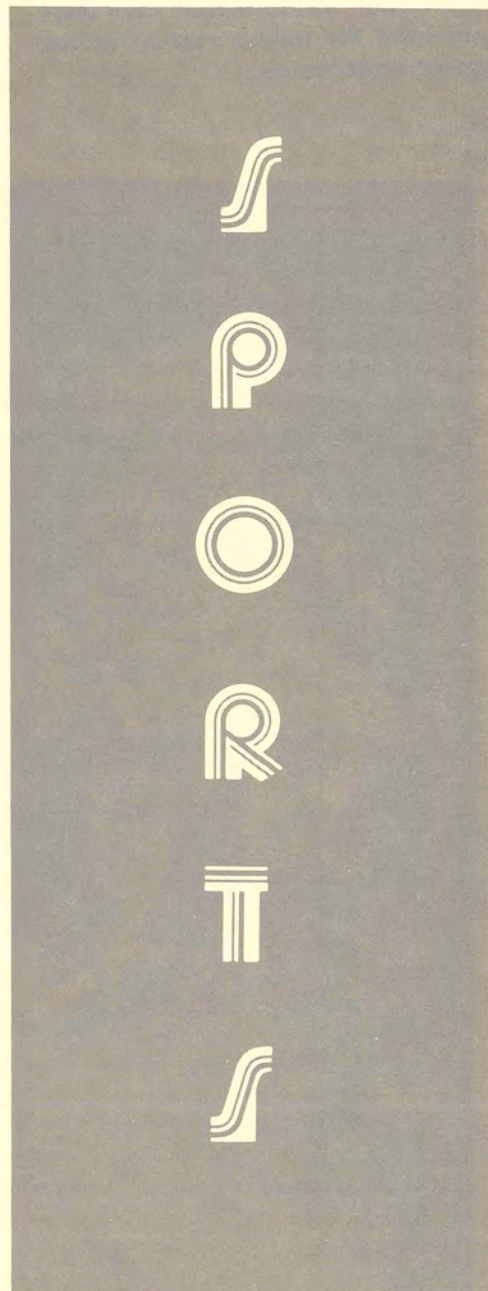

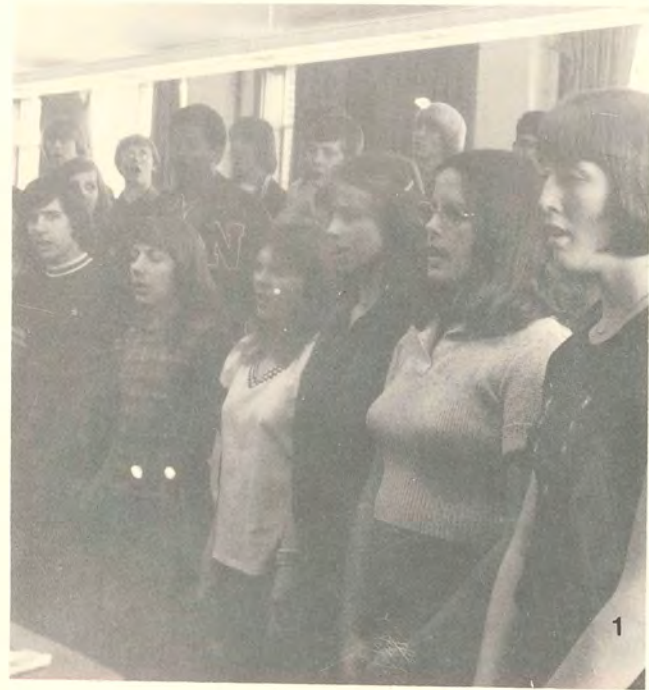
Sophomore Choir Keeps Singing

The girls had bake sales, participated in homecoming, and traveled to some out of town meets. Kathy Carey is head chantleader.

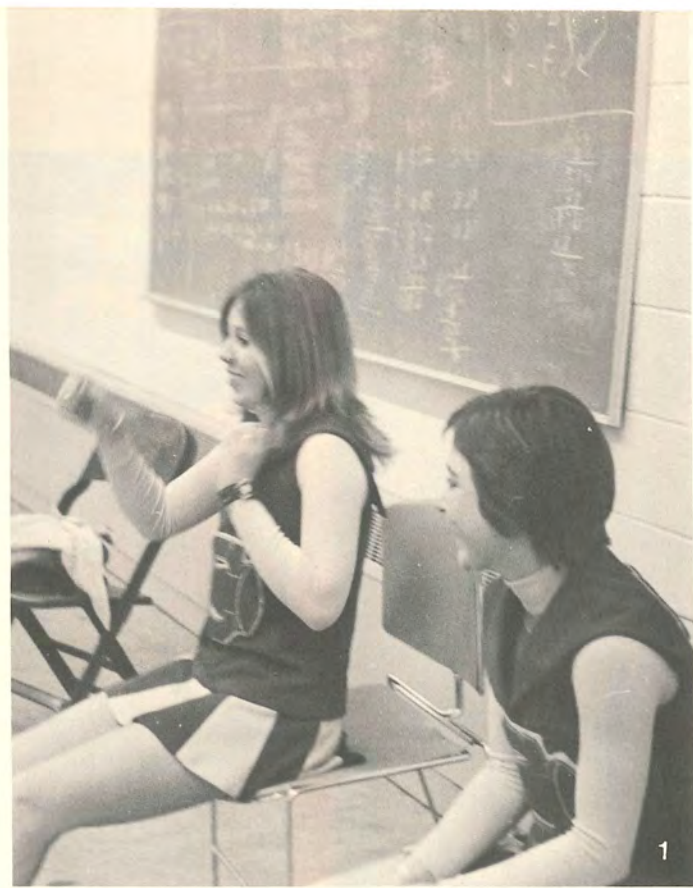

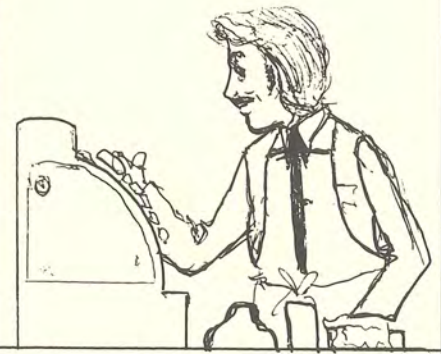

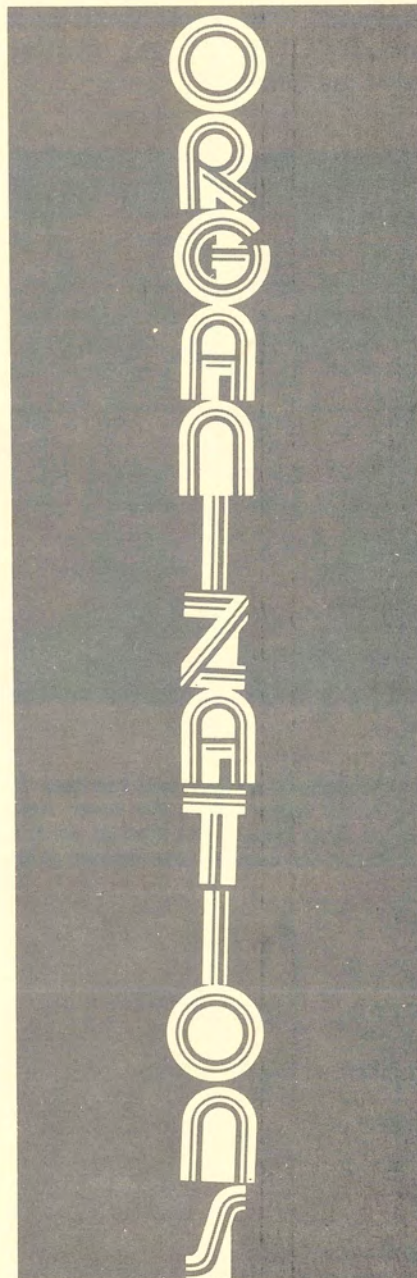
Field Kindley Band Is Busy With Performances And Trips

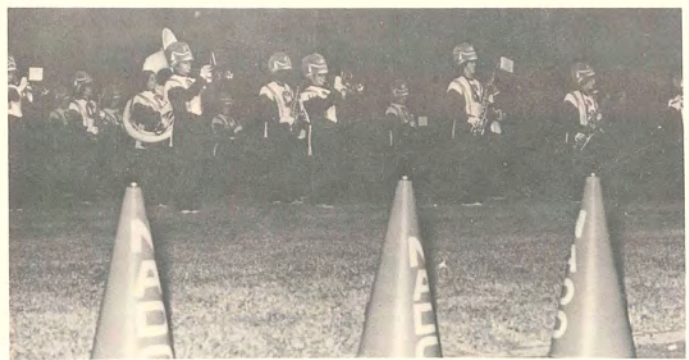

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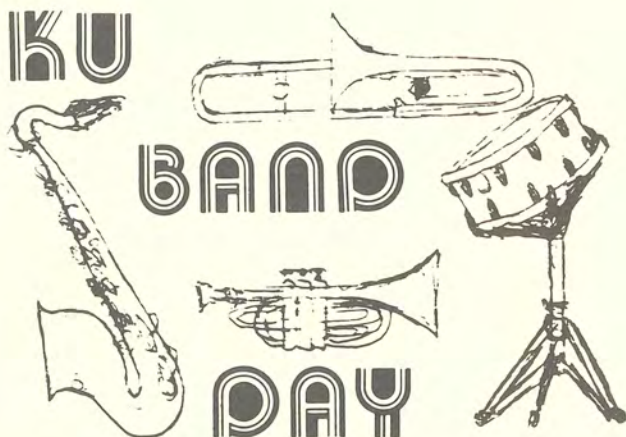


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Band Is Heard At Jayhawk Band Day

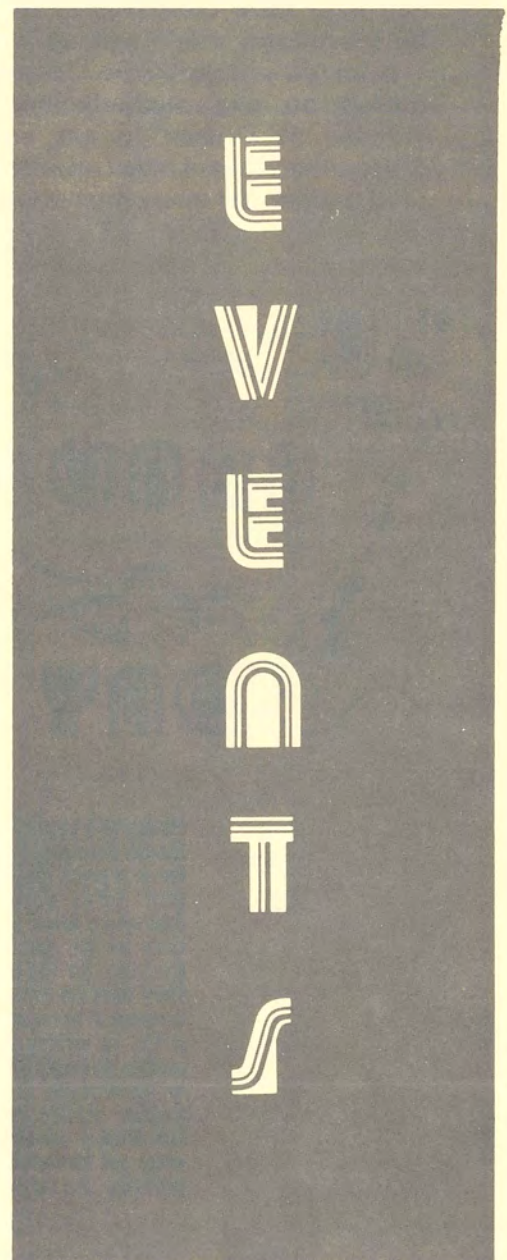
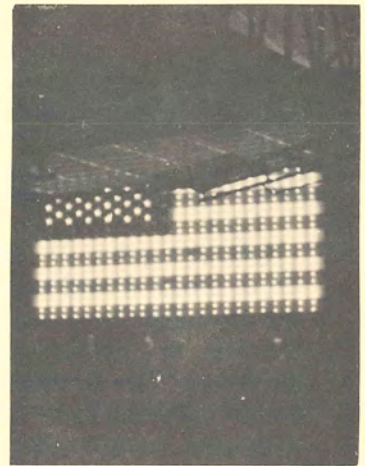

Hurrah! for the red, white and blue. This year, 1976, is our nation's 200th birthday. Many of the school's clubs have been promoting the birthday celebration.

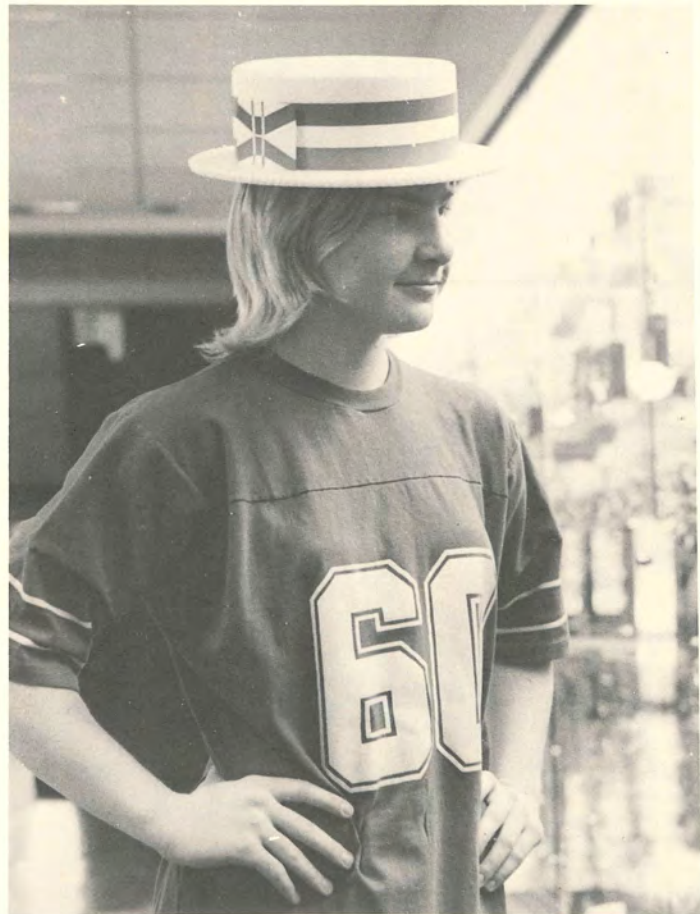
The Choral Club planned and put on a Candle-lighting Concert with songs and costumes from the year 1776.

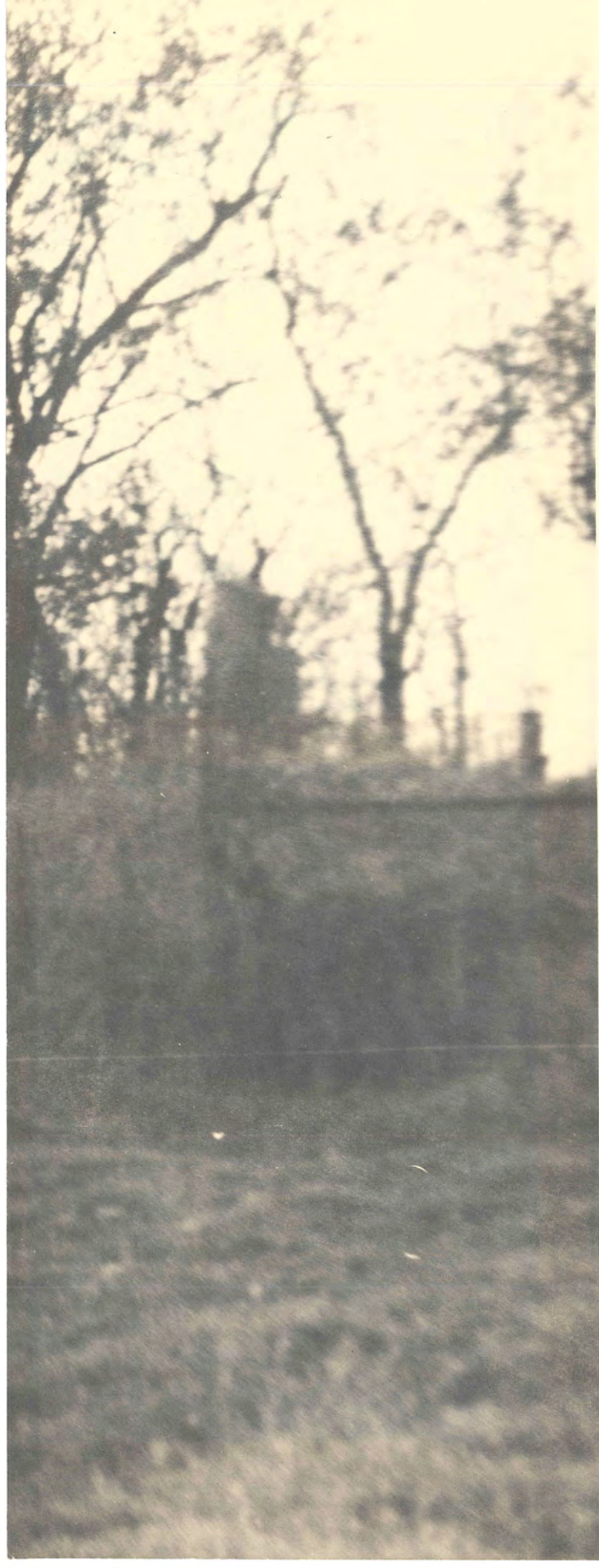
