Students gain experience from jobs




The students learned to wire the house, do the duct work (installing central heat and air conditioning) and also learned various types of masonary work.


The house, which should be finished by the end of the school year, will be sold to some lucky (? buyer.


If "Redneck Dancing" was more of your idea of a good time, there were the Saturday night Copan dances and a Christmas dance at Nowata featuring Rodney Lay.


Whether your choice was to boogle or swing, dancing was one of the most popular activities of this term's FKHS students.



Roston crowned Black Heritage Queen for 1979





"Love Laugh and Lift" was the theme for the organization. Senior president Ann Augustine said, "I thought this year was a good year for involvement within the club."







Senior president Alana Oelkers said, "I hoped to have made this the wildest and craziest year NHS ever had."




Stuco sells spirited pompons!


Their activities included several out-of-town tournaments and the hosting of the FKHS Invitational Open.




Coach Jess Moorman said of the team performance, I didn't think that this year's team could run from the locker room to the track, but this lacking bunch really came through and did a good job."

Coffeyville's Golden Tornado football squad traveled a "prevailing trail" to the State play-offs, but took a wrong turn and missed its goal by one controversial play.



For the fifth, the Tornado again traveled the path of victory to





At the Parsons Triangular, the team won all the singles matches. The girls beat Parsons, 6-3, and Fort Scott, 5-1.


At the Winfield meet, the team defeated Wellington but lost to Winfield.

















'Nado has an "up and down" season


Arch-rival Parsons was slapped in the face as the cagers beat them, 62-56. Mike Shobe lead all scorers, canning 26.






Junior varsity sophomores shine!

Coach Charles Bloomcamp said of the Gale season, "Well we just tried to teach them the fundamentals of basketball and give them playing experience."































Small 'Nado tanker group makes big splash
