What makes life fun are Spirit Week crazies




Wednesday, Gaudy Day was celebrated by students and teachers alike. Senior Mona Heasty took the prize on this day.





There were many more symptoms, but not everyone always got the same syptoms. One thing about this "sickness", though, those that had it didn't even seem to mind.



















NHS shows off honor students




The thirteen-member staff worked well together. They met deadlines and worked on paste-up every other Monday night before the publication came out the following day.

The hard-hitting 'Nado ''Murder Incorporated'' defense showed formidable prowess in the first half by shutting out a potent Miami offense, but the second half was a different story.

The Wardogs forced two turnovers that led to scores, and the loss of seniors Mike Lee, Chuck Phillips and Joey Vacca closed the door on the 'Nado chances, as the Oklahoma powerhouse untracked their offensive game to score 36 points while keeping the 'Nado scoreless in the second half.

Aaron Lang led 'Nado rushers with 61 yards on 13 carries. Junior Garold Beisly picked up Player of the Week honors for his secondary work and relief at quarterback.



Rauch leads 'Nado thinclads



In the second round the Carthage Tigers were victorious over FKHS, 69-57.



Coffeyville dropped three more outings to Labette County, Independence and Pittsburg.



Swimmers do well, despite number

The Tornado tankers opened this season with three seniors, two juniors, three sophomores and two freshmen. It was the smallest swim team Field Kindley has had for at least twenty years.

Undaunted by that, Coach Jess Moorman started his squad on a rigorous workout schedule complete with 6:00 a.m. practices, weight workouts, and after school workouts every day.

The finmen saw their first action of the year in the Coffeyville Invitational. They won nine medals and kept a trophy for their efforts.

They then met Wichita North where they tallied a 97-72 win. The squad took all but one first place in the meet along with many personal career best records.

The swimmers then bowed to Emporia, 69-51, despite still more personal records and first places.

"There just didn't seem to be enough depth here and all season," said senior Steve Fischer. "We could have done a lot better if we could have swam more people and got some extra points from third and fourth places."

Even so, the 'Nado came back in fine form to dominate two powerhouses from Missouri, Springfield Central and Hillcrest, with scores of 52-31 and 63-16, respectively.

The 'Nado grabbed all but three first places and raised their dual record to 3-2.

Senior Chris Jackson got a 3rd in the 100 butterfly and a fourth in the 200 freestyle. All swimmers made the finals but nobody else received a medal though the 400 free relay of Buchele, Birdsong, Fischer, and Jackson had a 5 th.

The tankers took on Emporia and Lawrence but again lost.

"We didn't do too badly there," said senior captain Mark Buchele. "Emporia got fifth in the state and they only beat us by a few points. With 22 points, the 'Nado grabbed a fifteenth place finish out of 32 teams. That was the best Coffeyville placement in a decade.





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
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


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



































































Which road do I take?
